

# Johnson Swings Campaign Pitch To Pennsy Voters

## 6,000 Expected For Big Meet In Harrisburg

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson invades Pennsylvania tonight on a vote-cooking trip to help kick off the Democratic campaign in one of the key northern "background" states. Johnson was scheduled to address a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner at the Farm Show Arena building in Harrisburg, the state capital. About 6,000 persons were expected to attend the formal launching of the Democrats' election drive and hear the President deliver his second major political address since his nomination for a four-year term.

The President planned to leave the White House about 7:45 p. m. EDT less than two hours before his scheduled address between 9:30 and 10 p. m. EDT. He was expected to return to the White House late tonight.

Pennsylvania cast its vote for the late President John F. Kennedy in 1960 but elected Republican William W. Scranton to the governor's chair in 1962. The death of Rep. William J. Green Jr., long-time Democratic boss in Philadelphia, may make Johnson's task more difficult.

The Chief Executive opened his election campaign in Detroit with a Labor Day appeal for national unity. He stressed the goals of peace, prosperity and justice while indirectly challenging Republican candidates Barry Goldwater's views on presidential control of nuclear weapons.

The White House said the democratic national committee would pay Johnson's travel expenses on the Harrisburg trip, as it did for his appearance in Detroit.

Another presidential appearance—before the convention of the machinists' union in Miami Beach next Tuesday—also was announced by the White House.

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## Car 'Explodes' Into Pieces; Driver Unhurt

VERNON, Calif. (UPI) — "My station wagon literally fell apart. The body of the wagon turned over, and before I knew it there was a young woman—whom I had never seen before—crying hysterically by my side. We? I just had a few scratches. Then someone helped me out of the wagon and I knew I was all right. It was as simple as that."

This was how John Robert Brynes, 32, Long Beach, Calif., described his near-miraculous escape Tuesday night when his station wagon—going 65 miles an hour—struck a guard rail on the Long Beach freeway and almost disintegrated. Investigators said pieces of the vehicle were strewn 300 feet along the highway and the engine dropped onto a surface street 30 feet below the freeway.

Brynes said he lost control of his wagon when it started to swerve because the car in front of him was going too slow.

## Ancient Arch Lives Slow Pace

COVENTRY, England — (UPI)—Arthur Arch turned 66 today and said the world is moving too fast—20 minutes too fast, to be precise.

Arch has lived 20 minutes behind the times for 42 years. He maintains that everybody is out of step but himself.

"It's all very simple," he said. "In 1922 the clocks were changed 20 minutes. I never accepted this. Nobody was going to take 20 minutes off my life. So I just kept my watch at the old time.

"It has never stopped since and it is 20 minutes behind the foot's time that everybody else keeps."

Arch conceded that being a non-conformist has its problems. He has been fired a half dozen times for being 20 minutes late to work. He is consistently 20 minutes late for appointments. He has missed a lot of trains.

Even his wife keeps "fool's time," he said. "She has to. The radio keeps to it and she likes to listen to the radio."

"But they won't beat me," Arch said. "I'm going to die 20 minutes late to show them I was right."

## Barry Heads For East Rallies

SEATTLE (UPI) — Republican presidential nominee Barry Goldwater, "terrifically encouraged" by early campaign reaction, headed east today from the Northwest where he accused the Kennedy-Johnson administration of playing politics with foreign policy.

The Arizona senator described himself as greatly surprised and greatly pleased at initial responses to GOP campaign efforts. Midway in his first week of intensive campaigning, Goldwater scheduled speeches in Idaho, Montana and Minnesota today.

A rally here Wednesday night in the new Seattle coliseum was one source of encouragement to the GOP nominee. There were loud cheers, fireworks, cascading balloons and an overflow crowd which responded warmly to his regionally televised speech on foreign policy.

Rallies at the Boise, Idaho, courthouse and the fairgrounds at Great Falls, Mont., were on the senator's schedule today as his big three-jet campaign plane headed towards Minneapolis for what was described by aides as a major speech tonight.

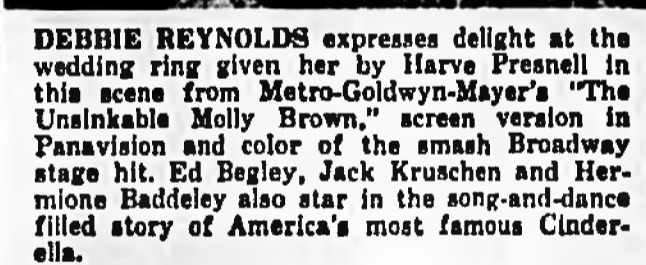

Composer Does Quite Well

By Joan Crosby, Newspaper Enterprise Assn. NEW YORK — (NEA) — For "une poule qui a perdu un canard," Maurice Jarre has done very well for himself. Composer Jarre, who won an Oscar for his musical score for "Lawrence of Arabia," is decidedly, he says, the black sheep of his family. (In France, a black sheep is known as a "hen who lays a duck's egg." See above.)

Jarre, a good-looking, ruddy, blue-eyed, 40-year-old native of Lyon, France was born to a "completely technical family of engineers and mathematicians." But members of the family were allowed to study music, if they decided. When Jarre's sister decided to study piano, Maurice, then 16, was told he, too, could study music.

Jarre, now one of the most in-demand of motion picture composers, has composed the background music for "The Train," and in October will go to Hollywood to compose the music for William Wyler's picture, "The Collector." He does not write at the piano, since he is still less than proficient at the instrument. That doesn't discourage him from attempting to play it though. "When I sat down to play for Sam Spiegel the score of Lawrence of Arabia," Jarre said in his halting English, "Monsieur Spiegel listen, then say, 'Never have I heard such beautiful music so badly played.'"

The Doctor Says: Shaving Can Be Tricky

By Wayne G. Brandstadt, M.D., Newspaper Enterprise Assn. Q—I am a 18-year-old boy and I have acne pretty bad. What is the best way to shave and not make it worse? A—There is no one method that is best for everyone. But most boys find an electric shaver easiest on the skin. Others try the electric then switch back to a safety razor. If you use a safety razor, shave carefully with the grain, not against it. Soften your beard with soap and hot water before you start. If your beard is not too heavy, shave only once or twice a week. After shaving rinse with

cold water and apply an astringent antiseptic solution. Q—Is there such a thing as a carrier of a venereal disease? If a man had gotten such a disease from a woman wouldn't she know she had this disease? A—If by "carrier" you mean a person who has a venereal disease in the contagious stage but does not know there is anything amiss, the answer is yes. Women are much more likely to have infectious syphilis or gonorrhea without symptoms than are men. In case of doubt it is best to have a blood test. Q—I have been having severe pains that run from my

nose over my eye, down my neck and out to my shoulder. My doctor says I have Shiner's headache but so far as I'm concerned he can have it. What causes these headaches? A—Sluder's neuralgia is a type of facial neuralgia that is caused by chronic infection in the nasal sinuses. As with other forms of neuralgia, drugs taken by mouth give very little relief. Injecting the nerve root with hot water or alcohol should help you. If the effect wears off too quickly a more permanent type of relief can be obtained by having the nerve root cut across completely.

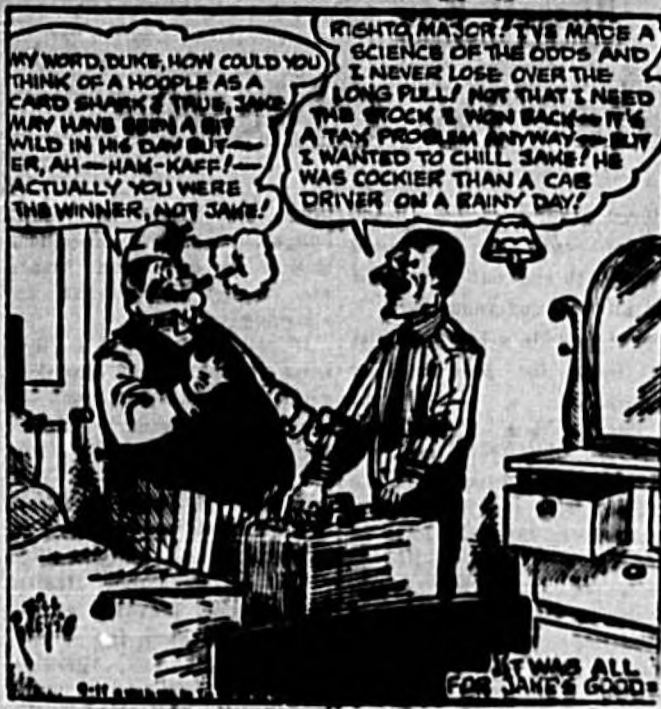

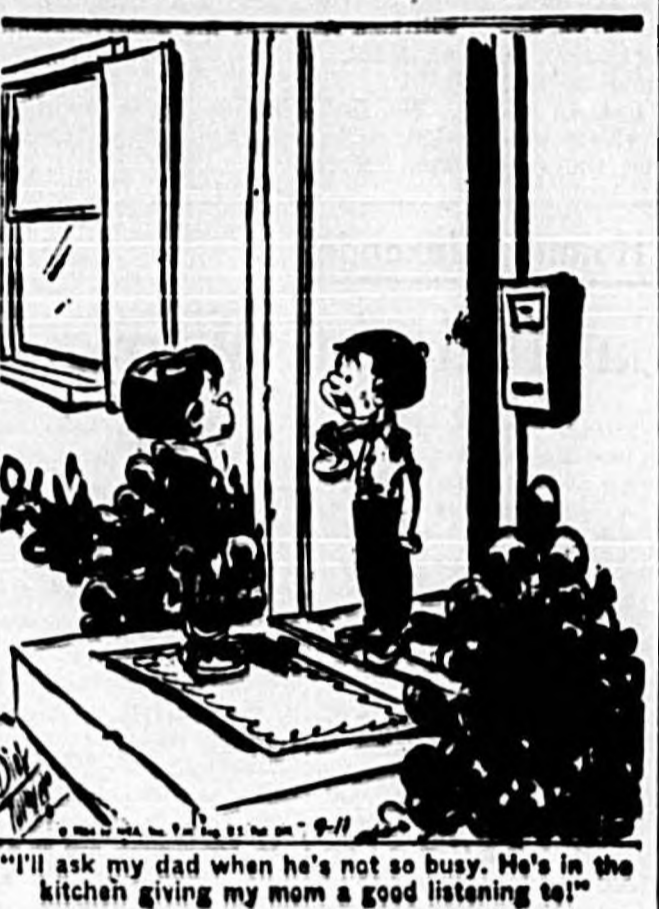

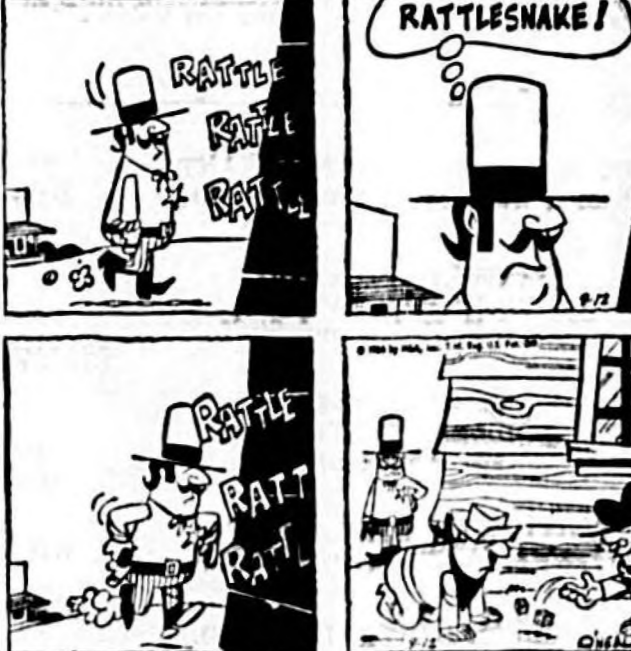

# Gladys Warming Up In Dora's Spawning Grounds

## It's Already At 70 MPH

**SAN JUAN, P. R. (UPI)** — Tropical storm Gladys intensified today into the season's fourth hurricane with 60 mph on hour winds. Forecasters said Gladys offered no threat to land at the moment.

Weathermen said at 8 a. m. (EST) "very little information had been received from the vicinity of Gladys during the night" but estimated its position at latitude 17.5, longitude 81.5, or about 450 miles east of Antigua in the Lesser Antilles.

The storm was moving toward the west-northwest at about 18 mph and was expected to continue its course and speed.

Gale winds extended out 125 miles in the northern semicircle and 80 miles in the southern semicircle. Gladys was discovered Sunday by ships plowing the waters in the tropical Atlantic. It is the fourth tropical storm to rise up out of the area within a month.

## Saturday Downpour Floods Casselberry

Casselberry's lakes and streams, already swollen from Hurricane Dora, went over their banks as the result of Saturday's torrential deluge inundating roads and threatening homes.

Overbrook Drive was "underbrock" for a while Saturday night as the stream ran through carports and yards when the culvert filled to capacity. Water threatened to flood the fire station and Triple Drive was temporarily closed to traffic.

Crews from the telephone company still were working Sunday night to restore service to many parts of town and Casselberry Utilities' crews worked day and night to keep the water and sewage services in operation.

## \$96,000 Asked For Flood Relief

### Sanford Canal Cost Is Next Big Question

How much will the construction of the St. Johns - Indian River Canal cost?

"That's the big question now," said John Krider, manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the canal district.

"That's why we recently voted to ask the Housing and Home Finance Agency for a \$4,000 loan," said Krider.

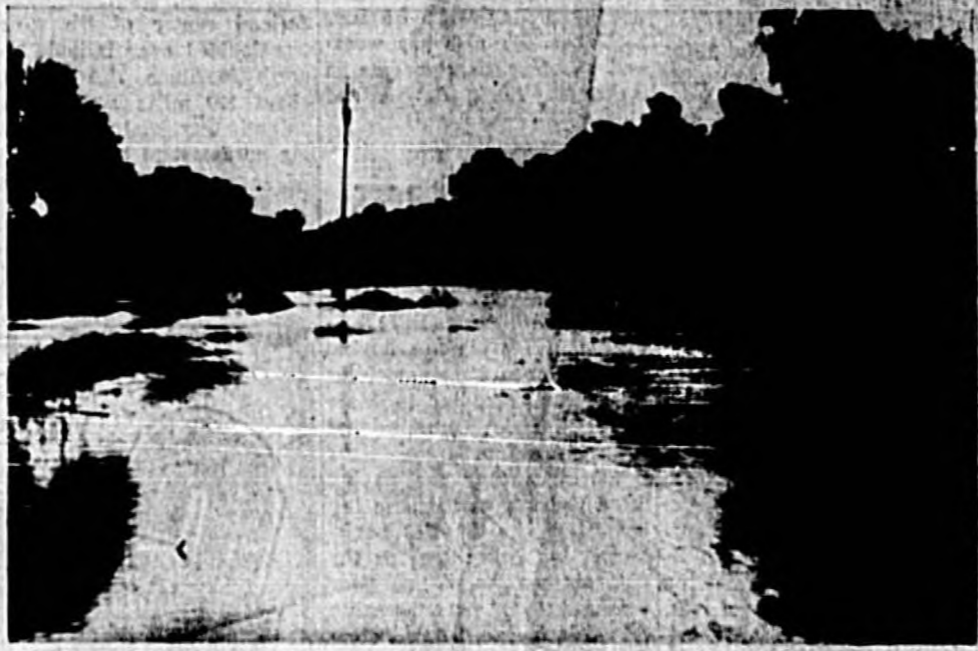
He explained that the last official feasibility and economic study of the canal project was accomplished in 1957.

"We must update that report," Krider pointed out, "and the engineers will also start designing the bridges and locks."

"This will enable the district's board of directors, in conferences with the engineers, to pin down the cost and we'll then have a complete package."

Krider declared that when the district can determine the construction cost figures and the right-of-way acquisition is completed, "We will be ready to obtain financing."

Krider added, "We will then have completed 50 per cent of the battle."

### County Board Acts To Meet Emergencies

County Commissioners meeting in emergency session this morning, approved a \$96,000 request for funds to provide flood control for soggy Seminole County.

Primary projects approved by the commission this morning included replacing Lockwood Bridge in the south-east section of the county, which was carried away by flood waters from Hurricane Dora; drainage operations in Gee Creek to permit it to drain properly from Lake Kathryn to Lake Jessup; and drainage operations from Big Lake into Cub Lake.

Commissioners will request emergency Federal funds to help cope with the flood condition problems, created by the hurricane.

The Lockwood Bridge replacement is estimated to cost \$33,000.

An on-site inspection of engineers determined that Gee Creek is not permitting an outfall of water from Lake Kathryn to Lake Jessup due to storm trash, which is stopping up the creek. Estimated costs providing a proper ultimate outfall are approximately \$20,000.

Gee Creek, engineers said, provides the only ultimate outfall of drainage for 4,000 acres in the south end of the county, including 300 acres in Alamo Springs, 2300 acres in Casselberry, 175 acres in Longwood, 1,200 in Seminole County lands and 25 acres of miscellaneous commercial complexes.

The outfall from Big Bear Lake into Cub Lake will provide flood control for 2,100 acres of heavily developed suburban area. Estimated cost of this project has been set at \$5,000.

At noon today, County Commissioners were still considering other emergency projects, with projects already approved totaling \$96,000.

## LBJ Speeds Relief To Stricken Areas In Florida And Georgia

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson is keeping in "close touch" with the governors of Florida and Georgia to speed up damage repairs from victims hurricane Dora.

Johnson said in a statement Saturday that "I have pledged all possible federal assistance to the people of Florida and Georgia and we are fulfilling that promise."

As the President announced that more than \$200 million in damages already had been caused by Dora the hurricane's tattered remnants reversed course and swung back across North Florida and Georgia dumping torrential rains of up to 18 inches.

The President's statement followed his inspection tour of the hurricane damage Friday. "While damage surveys have not been completed," Johnson said, "it is apparent the total damage, public and private, will approximate the \$200 million figure estimated by Mr. Edward McDermott, making this one of the most severe storms to hit this area in this century."

McDermott, director of the Office of Emergency Planning in Washington, will make a special request for presidential disaster funds after the damages have been asayed.

"I am prepared," Johnson said "to make that allocation promptly and the funds for that purpose are available."

The Corps of Engineers to help complete damage surveys so that federal assistance funds may be allocated.

The Small Business Administration to provide a staff in the disaster area to process loan assistance applications from property owners.

## Work Begins On ACL Building

Precisioning Inc. began today to put the ACL building which they leased several weeks ago on North Myrtle Ave. into shape for production of catapult strips for the Navy.

Earl Provencher, president of the engineering firm said at noon today that two 20 foot high towers will be erected on the north end of the building to house the cording and de-cording reels and provide additional space for the 300-foot-long catapult strips, which will be assembled in the building.

The towers have already been fabricated in the company's base plant seven miles south of Sanford, and erection will begin the first of next week.

Production of the catapult strips, which are being engineered on contract for the U. S. Navy, is expected to begin around Nov. 15.

Provencher said that 10 or 12 persons will be employed in the Sanford building, with hiring of "probably eight new machine operators."

## Goldwater Club Sets Motorcade To Plaza Rally

Seminole County's Goldwater for President Club will sponsor a motorcade to Orlando Tuesday afternoon to hear the Republican candidate speak at a rally at Colonial Plaza.

Members of the group will meet at the county GOP headquarters across from Seminole Plaza on U. S. 17-92 at 1:30 p. m. They will be joined by members of the Sanford Goldwater for President Club and proceed to the 2:30 p. m. rally.

## Baker Qualifies

A check of City Hall records today revealed that Commissioner Joe Baker has qualified to run for reelection to his office in November. Incumbent Baker has been challenged by the registration of E. C. Harper Jr., who announced his intention to run a few weeks ago.

## U. S. Protests To East Berlin

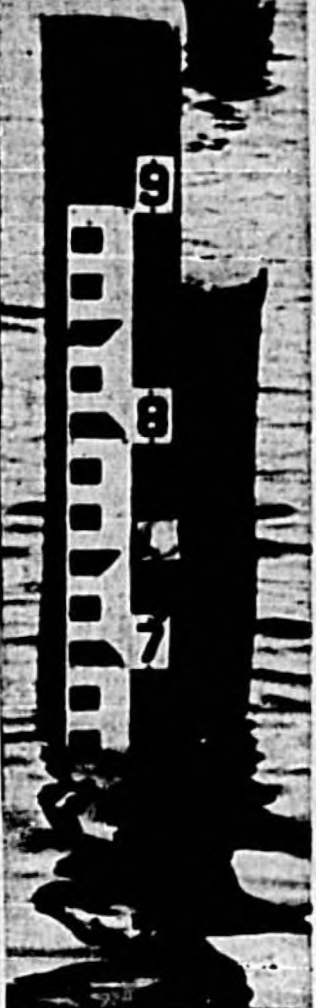
BERLIN (UPI) — The United States today protested to the Russians against the firing of shots into the American sector of Berlin by East German police pursuing a wounded refugee Sunday.

Five American military policemen braved Communist gunfire to help the refugee escape over the Berlin wall. It was the first time American soldiers had taken an active part in the rescue of a refugee escaping to the West and also the first time Communist border guards had fired at U. S. soldiers.

## Rapist 'Didn't Know What To Do With Babies'

FORT WORTH (UPI) — The boy who confessed stabbing and raping his mother said he drowned little David and Dickie Adams because he "didn't know what to do with them." They were to be buried today, but their mother did not know they were dead.

Mrs. Carolyn Adams, 20, was in critical condition, suffering shock, exposure and stab wounds. Doctors said she was improving but must not know, for now, that David, 1, and Dickie, 2, were killed Thursday night.

The darkly handsome youth accused of the rape and double killing, Charles Roy Hefley Jr., was in his Tarrant County jail cell, where he will remain until December when he turns 17 and can face trial as an adult. Because he is only 16 now, life imprisonment is the maximum penalty he can receive.

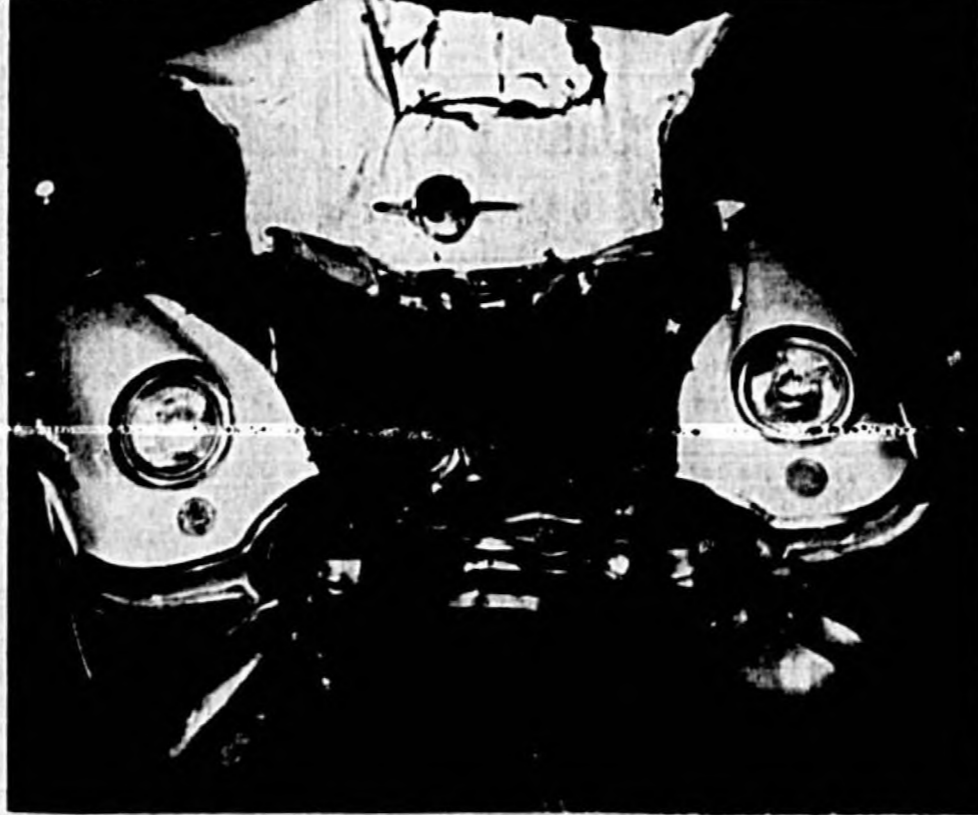
