Personnel of Southern Bell and Winter Park Telephone maintained service in many areas and when lines were down in other sections emergency crews immediately went on the job. Sanford Gas Company had only one emergency call but it quickly repaired a gas line damaged by the roots of a fallen tree.

Among governmental agencies, commendation is in order for members of the Florida Highway Patrol, the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and the police departments in each of Seminole's six municipalities.

Members of the Sanford Fire Department and other fire fighting units scattered throughout Seminole were on the alert and promptly rendered services when called. So did the other departments of the county and the municipalities.

Parents Level Criticism On

A group of some 25 to 26 parents of Southside Elemenlary School p upils dropped three major problems into the laps of Seminole County School Board members Thursday afternoon and none o them were resolved.

The group wanted bus transportation, more police protection for children at major thoroughfare crossings and the starting time changed from 8 a.m. to a later hour. Recently Southside was made a "walking - area" school but the parents complained that it was extremely dangerous for elementary school children, particularly first and second graders, to havet o walk on such streets as Sanford, Melloqville and Celery Avenues with no sidewalks and traffic lights, particularly during winter months when it is still dark when some would have to leave home.

The elimination of bus iransportation, parents told the Board, has created a traflic problem.

The board explained that according to state law pupils who reside within a two-mile radius of the school cannot be transported by school buses. This rule, it was explained, has been in effect for some time but this year it is being enforced and as a result some 1,448 courtesy rides were elim-

While the board agreed that the Sanford Police Department has been extremely cooperative and performing efficient service, more protection was needed at crossings adjacent to the school. It said it would call this to the attention of the City, Meanwhile, mothers agreed to investigate



A torrential downpour of pearly four inches of rain that hit Seminole County Thursday between 2:30 and 4 p. m. has brought ground-water conditions to the verge of severe flooding, county and city officials said today.

Many areas are still underwater today though major traffic arteries drained off during the night.

LBJ Calls FBI

President Johnson left the Robert Baker case to the Senate as long as he could, and some would say longer. His decisive action now, in directing the FBI to investigate the latest Republican charge, has the effect of confirming what we and many others have felt-that the Senate's investigation of itself was inadequate.

Mr. Johnson's early reassurances sound even blander in the light of his new step. He said he was sure the Senate investigating committee would, "in their wisdom," render "proper judgment."

But the questions raised by Mr. Baker's associations were a problem not only for the Senate but for the country. For the President to have interfered in the self-scrutiny of his old club might have alienated legilators whose goodwill he needed to pass measures for which he had broad approval. Thus there may have been a political case for his keeping out of it, reasons beyond the possible embarrassment involved because of his own former relationship with Mr. Baker. Yet as national leader he might have been expected at the least to show an attitude of greater con-

Now, as soon as Senator John J. Williams made his "kickback" charge, Mr. Johnson called in the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It was a politically wise move as well as a morally justifiable one. In addition to showing the President taking a hand in the matter, the step could deflate the charge by delaying a complete report on it until after the election.

Republicans, of course, are already making political capital of the new combination of ingredients. They possess the tactical advantage of having favored more investigation all along, though presumably Republicans as well as Democrats might be

Meanwhile, Mr. Johnson has put himself where the President should be-in the role of actively promoting the search for facts to clarify any partisan atmosphere of scandal and any objective doubt about public servants' ethics. (From the Christian Science Monitor.)


