## Harris Says Class D Recruit To Be Pitcher For Washington

Associated Press Sports Editor Gives Sidney Charles Hudson Fine Chance To Succeed

ORLANDO, Mar. 23.—(AP)—It's hard to believe but you can take Bucky Harris' word for it that a bush leaguer from Sanford will pitch for Washington this year.

Sanford is in the Florida state league, a class D circuit that is one of baseball's kindergartens. And jumping from Sanford to Washington in the American league is equivalent to moving right out of the kindergarten into college.

But Harris, the one-time boy wonder and a pretty smart and honest baseball man, tells me without batting a guilty eye that Sidney Charles Hudson will make the grade.

"He looks like a pitcher," says Harris, and that is the manner of expressing high praise. Most pitchers are not so good looking.

"The double-A league, International American Association and Pacific, are just a few notches below the majors come up and fall to make the grade to get too excited over a Class D busher.

But Harris says he isn't kidding. Of course, the Washington pitching staff is so feeble that Bucky may be willing to take a gamble on anyone who doesn't lurch around.

Anyway, this Hudson was a ball of fire with Sanford. He won 24 games and lost only four.

"Honestly," says Bucky, "I doubt if a pitcher on our club, except possible Dutch Leonard,

could have turned in a better record with Sanford. It's tough to win 24 and lose only 4 in a tiddly-dee-winks league."

And say, I'm told they're not even charging Hudson with losing two of those four he dropped. One was lost on an error and the other because his team failed to score while the opposition tallied once.

Hudson led the league with 192 strikeouts and walked only 63 in 250 innings. He's a big lean right hander who reaches up 6 feet 4 inches and weighs 180.

Washington sort of placed a sheltering arm around Sanford's shoulder last year and Clark Griffith had first chance on that club's prospects. Clark, who knows the value of a nickel, is reported to have paid \$12,000 for Hudson and, goah, that's real money for a bush leaguer.

Right now Harris not only plans to keep Hudson but says that the 22-year-old kid will be one of his starting pitchers.

There'll be Leonard, who won 20 games last year, Chase, Krawcheck, Haynes, and then Hudson. Anything is possible in baseball and every now and then a rookie from the bushes startles everyone. There was the case last year of Gene Thompson of Cincinnati. Gene came up from Class C ball and Bill McKechnie liked his looks enough in Spring training to hang on to him. Gene turned out to be one of the standouts among young tossers.

He won 13 and lost 5 and got a ball of fire with Sanford. He won 24 games and lost only four.

Roosevelt, Lindbergh Call Record Milestone In Aviation

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and Col. Charles A. Lindbergh congratulated the nation's airlines yesterday for a full year's flying without a fatal accident.

The President said the record was achieved through cooperation and team work between the personnel of the air transport lines and workers in the federal government.

Lindbergh called it "truly a milestone in the history of aviation" and predicted that "the day is not very far in the future when most first class travel will be by airplane."

Chairman Hinckley of the civil aeronautics authority read the President's congratulations during a radio speech from Salt Lake City, Utah, the President.

The news that the domestic air lines will on March 26 complete an entire year of flying without a single fatal accident is indeed gratifying. Will you please extend my heartfelt congratulations to every last employe of the air lines—to the field boy, pilot or president—and to your personnel in the civil aeronautics authority.

I am deeply impressed by reports that during the year now closing our domestic air lines have flown 1,000,000 passenger miles, a truly remarkable aggregate. Looking back this record, in which we can all take such praiseworthy pride, we find it has been achieved through cooperation and team work between the personnel of the air transport lines and workers in the federal government.

I trust that this cooperation may continue with like satisfactory results through the years ahead.

A year's flying without a fatal accident is, indeed, a record. It is especially significant because it was not accomplished by shattering air transport with unnecessary and unwise regulations.

Lindbergh said: "It seems clear that the airlines have passed their period of infancy and youth, and now depend on their place among the major transport systems of the world. Much still remains to be done in the extension of routes and the development of aircraft, but one may look toward the future with much confidence as we had hoped 10 years ago."

Vandenberg Flays Reciprocal Trade

G. O. P. Solon Says Program Is Not Constitutional

WASHINGTON, Mar. 27.—(AP)—The House stood squarely behind the appropriations committee today and insisted on slashing the Roosevelt recommendations for the wage-hour law administrative expenses.

It defeated an attempt by Rep. Casey (D-Miss.) to restore the \$1,025,000 cut in the budget estimates for wage-hour salaries for the year beginning July 1.

While the House debated appropriations for various labor agencies, the Senate pressed forward its consideration of legislation to extend the reciprocal trade agreements. Another measure already approved by the Senate is a bill to extend the Hatch anti-politics law to state employees drawing federal pay, closed it first barrier.

The House Military Committee was told by Secretary of War Woodrow Wilson that the policy of retaining new type military aircraft without restriction or pressure and the policy would assist the United States Army to keep upplane development construction.

Senator Vandenberg told the Senate that the United States is about to "lose its shirt" under the reciprocal trade program. He called it unconstitutional, "reckless" and "unwise," and said it would drive the country to a state of unincorporated law which "will ultimately result in a state of anarchy."
