At Florida Supreme Court Ruling They're Mad Enough To Curse

Seminole County educators were dismayed today to learn the Florida Supreme Court says a law making it illegal to curse a teacher in front of her students is a denial of free speech.

The justices declared unconstitutional Thursday portions of a law designed to keep outsiders from disrupting public schools.

The court returned the measure conviction of Annette McCall who was fined \$500 for cursing out her daughter's teacher at Little River Elementary School in Miami.

Teacher Sade Branton brought charges under a law making it illegal to

upbraid, abuse or insult a teacher on school property or in the presence of students at a school activity.

The Legislature's intent was good, to ensure that schools operate smoothly and without disturbance from outside people, the court said in the unanimous ruling, but the law restricts freedom of speech.

Mrs. McCall's conduct was "unpunishable," but she was exercising her free speech rights, wrote Justice Joseph H. Hodge.

"I think it ought to be struck off the statute book if they have no more sensitivity than that," Seminole High School principal Don Reynolds said today. "With the amount of conflict teachers

are involved in they have to have some sort of protection," he added.

"When parents walk into a class in front of students the negative things they say are usually very vulgar. They are not only insulting to teachers, but

disrupt the education of the kids in the classroom. That is denying taxpayers the right to have their kids educated," Reynolds said.

"On the other side of the thing, when teachers

commit verbal assault on parents of this school, the teachers are unprotected," Reynolds pointed out.

Ralph Ray, administrative assistant and public information officer for the school board, agreed with Reynolds.

"Considering the fact that discipline has been the number one problem in schools across the country, this ruling really won't help," Ray responded.

"My reaction is one of dismay that judges would allow people to walk into a classroom, where the atmosphere must be con-

ductive to learning, and verbally abuse a teacher. It is so hard to maintain the attention of students at practically any level, and any outside interference causes a great deal of lost time because the teacher has to get the students back to the point where they were before the interruption."

"We have rules in this county that parents and other outsiders who come into the school must check in at the office. Does this ruling mean people in the front office will have to ask visitors what they want and how they plan to behave? Will the school administrator have to make a visitor to the classroom to be sure what he does to see -B.S.-1-B, Page 2A

Bell Replacing U.S. Attorney 'Emerging Cover-Up' Is Charged In Firing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Attorney General Griffin Bell's plan to fire a Republican U.S. attorney who has a reputation for investigating Democrats has triggered a GOP charge of an emerging cover-up in the Carter administration.

The plan to replace David Marston, a Concord, N.H., attorney, at Philadelphia first drew attention because of Carter's campaign pledge to select judges and U.S. attorneys on the basis of merit, not politics.

Carter told a nationally televised and radio broadcast news conference Thursday that replacing Marston was Bell's idea.

"I've not interfered in it at all," he said.

But Bell later said Carter, when told about the plan, asked, "Why is it taking you so long?"

Carter injected another issue by saying he had received a telephone call from Rep.

John Ellberg, D-Pa., urging that Marston be replaced quickly. Newspapers in Pennsylvania have reported Marston is investigating Ellberg.

Sen. Richard Schweiker, R-Pa., who employed Marston in his Senate office for three years, said he thought "there is more than politics involved because the Carter people are raising their reputations."

"I think some cover-up is emerging here," Schweiker said in commenting on Carter's news conference. Asked if he thought Carter intervened to save Ellberg, Schweiker said, "Yes."

The Pennsylvania newspapers have reported Marston is investigating Ellberg and Rep. Daniel Flood, also a Pennsylvania Democrat, in connection with financial irregularities on a hospital construction project.

Carter stressed, however,

that he did not know Ellberg was such an investigative expert before the Ellberg case arose. The White House has received more than 2,000 complaints about Marston's planned removal.

Rep. Peter H. Kostmayer, a freshman Democrat from Philadelphia, said he was outraged and had called to ask Bell to change his mind.

Marston, 35, a Harvard graduate who has held the job 18 months, said in Philadelphia after Carter's news conference, "I thought the performance of this office was considered outstanding up until a few minutes ago."

Justice Department officials previously said Marston was doing a good job and Bell, defending his decision to replace Marston, said he did not want to say anything against this young man.



BOB SENEY STOPS IN SANFORD DURING JOURNEY

All He Needs Is A Horse To Ride, Carry Supplies

Bob Seney left Texas in September, traveling around the United States. He is going to Canada — and he expects to be there the first part of July, if all goes well.

Seney explains in a quiet voice, he has stopped alongside U.S. 17-92 in Sanford and is trying to prevent his horses from rubbing at daisies growing wild through the cement 68 states once — a horse to ride and a horse to carry supplies.

"This is my second time riding through the states," Seney says. "I've been in this second time around," he explains, adding that he began his trek in 1976.

Seney retired from the Air Force, which stationed him in Alaska, in 1963. He took a job in his home state of Washington breaking and training horses. After a few years of specializing in training jumpers he decided to mount up and hit the road himself.

Hospitality has been consistently good wherever he goes, Seney says. "I carry complete camping equipment with me. I use a regular camp stove, and carry a one burner Coleman stove with me."

Asked whether the Coleman is enough to keep him warm on a horseback ride to Canada in the winter, Seney just laughs quietly.

"About the only time I use it is when I'm lying in bed

reading," he says. "Bed" is a warm sleeping bag, which has seen him through some tough winters on his travels.

Seney's horses have been with him long enough to keep a pretty steady head as they walk alongside the traffic on state and U.S. highways, he says.

"Trooper, that's the horse I ride, and a horse to carry supplies."

"Trooper is 12 years old."

Casey, the pack horse, is "the baby" according to Seney. Casey is only seven years old.

"I lost a horse in Mississippi when he was hit by a truck," Seney says wistfully. "He didn't break any bones, but he couldn't go on with me. So a friend brought me this horse from Texas, which I bought, and took my other horse back and put him in the pasture."

Casey carries a 140-pound backpack, plus whatever grain Seney decides to carry along.

"I don't usually carry much extra grain to feed the horses," Seney says. He prefers to buy it as he goes along.

Horses aren't the only ones who have to be fed along the way. Seney usually stands the horses in a restaurant parking lot along about lunch time, and has lunch, "but breakfast and supper I usually cook for myself."

Seney says he rides eight hours a day, making about 22 miles each day.

He has a son and grandchildren back home in Washington State, who take care of his mail. Every now and then he goes back to see his family. "I don't want my grandkids to grow up without knowing me," he says.

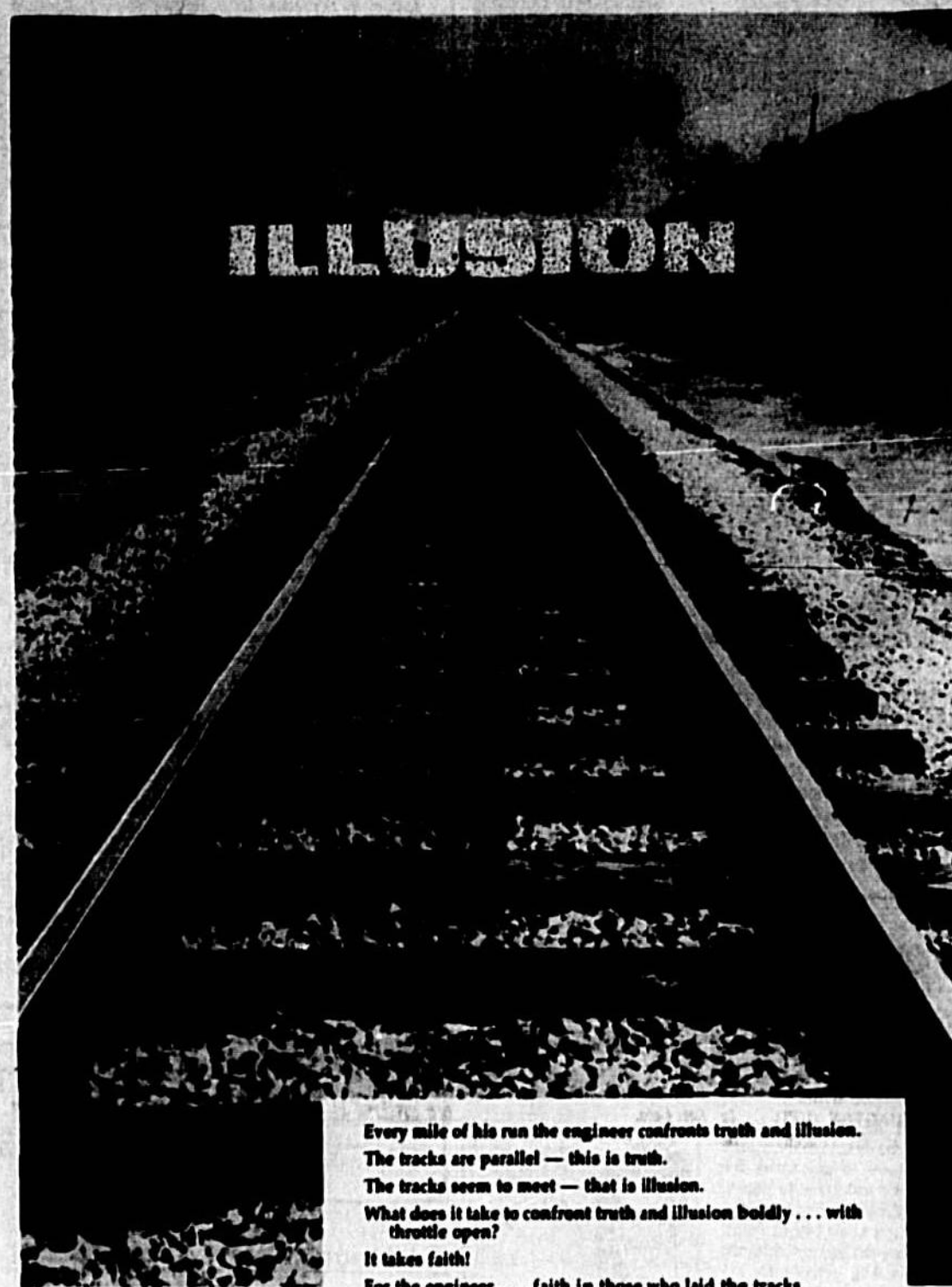

Is Episcopal Church An Endangered Species?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Is the Episcopal Church in the United States an "endangered species"? A growing number of people are asking that question as Episcopalians who object to the decision to ordain women and other recent changes attempt to pull out of the 2.7 million member church.

Some 50 women were ordained to the priesthood of the Episcopal Church in 1977, the first year the denomination has allowed women to function in the priestly role. In turn, 13 parishes voted to formally withdraw from the church in protest of the action and another 17 voted to withhold funds from the national church. In addition, 21 priests or deacons are under some form of inhibition or restraint as a result of their dissent on the ordinations and other issues clustered around it, and some parishes are embroiled in legal battles over the property of breakaway parishes.

Division is underway in the Episcopal church but how deeply it will cut into the denomination in terms of members or money will take some time to become clear. Scham, as leaders of breakaway movements in the southern Presbyterian and Lutheran churches will be quick to point out, is hard to pull off. A test will come Jan. 28, when the fledgling Anglican Church Three priests, the Rev. James Mele of Denver, the Rev. Robert Moore of San Francisco and the Rev. Peter Watterson of West Palm Beach, Fla., have been named as the three who will be consecrated. Under Anglican rules, the three must be consecrated by recognized bishops in the apostolic succession — a line that faithful believers maintain is a closely guarded secret and it is not known if any American are involved. One retired bishop, the Rt. Rev. Albert A. Chambers, Springfield, Mo., has been criticized and repudiated by the church's House of Bishops for ordaining dissenting priests.

Cassadaga 'Ghost Town'

CASADAGA, Fla. (UPI) — Sometimes a handful will keep the stream of cars bustling between Daytona Beach and Oviedo on Interstate 4 and take a short drive over pinyon hills to a village nestled among moss-draped oaks.

Perhaps the tourist wants to see the quaint frame homes, with a lot of Victorian architecture, or the aging green hotel in the center of town. Or perhaps he wants to communicate with the dead. That is usually what brings people to Cassadaga, a town of 500 dominated by a 30-acre spiritualist camp, a religious colony founded by a man named George Coley who came to Florida in 1875 and said he was led here by spiritual guides.

On a recent night, the Rev. D. Mona Berry, who has led his own spiritual church in Buffalo, N.Y., conducted a service for about 20 persons who sat on wooden stools arranged in a semi-circle. Mrs. Berry gave mostly reassuring answers to questions that had been submitted to her privately on small pieces of paper. She answered the questions before reading them.

The Body Skin Is An Elastic Sack

Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB—I have lost 125 pounds in 14 months and am now maintaining my good weight. The only problem is that my skin is saggy and my face is from firm.

During my entire weight-loss program I exercised regularly and have continued to do so with little effect. Is there anything I can do to get rid of my flabby stomach, legs, and arms? I have had plastic surgery to my face, but at the age of 36 I expect a firmer body.

It is possible to have plastic surgery to remove the excess skin. However, it is a major operation and you would need a considerable amount of fat to be inside the abdominal cavity.

Some readers will be surprised at your enormous weight loss. Actually it is only two pounds a week. You have illustrated a basic principle of diet—if you stay with it consistently you need not lose enormous amounts of weight every week. A good, balanced reduction diet is the basis for a consistent pattern of proper eating that will help prevent your regaining what you have lost.

I am sending you The Health Letter number 4-7, Weight Lossing Diet which you can use as a correct pattern for a continued dietary control program.

The danger most people run is regaining what they have lost. That is why it is important to stay with good program after you have reached your goal.

Don't underestimate the value of exercise in helping to lose weight and stay lean. It is the same principle as the diet—if you use a few extra calories every day by the end of a year it represents an enormous number, translated into a good amount of fat tissue.

Incidentally, some patients with an enormous weight loss have had it surgically removed. In some instances the apron of fat is so large that a mechanical hoist system has to be rigged in the operating room to lift it. That does not remove a similar amount of fat that is inside the abdominal cavity.

When you are overweight, the sack will stretch to accommodate its contents. Even though you are just 20, you have already stretched your skin for years. Think of it as if you emptied out 125 pounds of water. That would leave a lot of room inside.

You will never exercise enough to build enough muscle to fill the space occupied by 125 pounds of fat, and you wouldn't want to. Your skin will regain some of its elasticity and will improve, but not overnight. Wait at least a year while you maintain your weight at your new ideal level before doing anything about it. At that time if you still have an enormous amount of loose skin you could consult a plastic surgeon and see what needs to be done. Excess skin can be removed.

How much it would cost depends a lot on the doctor and how much he is going to do. You would need to hear what he will want for such a repair.

'He Did A Lot...'

Shoppers surveyed in Sanford expressed admiration and sadness today for Hubert H. Humphrey, who died at his home Friday night at age 66.

"He would have done all right if he was elected president," Louise Carpenter of Sanford said. "He would have done more for us than Jimmy Carter's doing now."

"I think he was a great leader in Congress," Sanford Police Captain Earl Bourquard said. "I met him when he visited here. I took him as a good American."

"He was a very likeable person, very tender-hearted and compassionate," Lula Robinson of Sanford said. "He was very concerned with birth defects in children."

"I think he did a lot for poor people in this country," Willie Stevens of Sanford said. "His bill (the Humphrey-Hawkins Full Employment Act) didn't pass before he died."

"He was a delightful man in spite of his privilege and importance," recalls former Sanford Mayor W. Vincent Roberts. Others have recollections of the late senator, too — Page 5A.

A man of monumental legislative achievement, Hubert Humphrey was praised today by political allies and foes alike for his vision, courage, and humanity.

The 66-year-old Minnesota died Friday night after a long battle with cancer.

His body was flown in a presidential jet to Washington today to lie in state for 48 hours at the U.S. Capitol rotunda. It will be flown back to St. Paul later to be honored in the Minnesota capital.

Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, Humphrey's running mate in the 1968 presidential race remembered his friend as one who "never forgot that the business of government is helping people. That was his greatest ambition. I think he succeeded."

APL-CIO President George Meany, one of Humphrey's oldest allies, called him "a genuine supporter of the labor movement in good times and bad. Workers knew he was their champion. They trusted him, supported him, loved him and will miss him terribly."

Blacks cited the Minnesota senator's fight to commit the Democratic Party to civil rights 30 years ago.

Follow politicians said he was a "guiding star."

President Carter said Humphrey was "a member of every family in America... The only thing more courageous than the way in which he led his life was the manner in which he left it."

Vice President Walter Mondale, who announced the death of his mentor Friday night after his return from a political trip to the West, called Humphrey "the most remarkable public servant in U.S. history."

They'll Go In A Bank Female 'Talent' Hunt Is On In Seminole

There is a talent hunt on in Seminole.

The major requirement is that those responding to the hunt be female.

Since early November, the Central Florida Commission on the Status of Women, Winter Park, has been working to establish a bank of women willing to serve on government panels.

Through its first two months of operation have been primarily organizational, the talent bank already has contacted the county commissioners seeking their support.

"The county commissioners are very anxious to find women willing to serve and they are aware that a number of positions are opening up," said Anne Jones, staff person for the commission.

Expertise in certain areas of county government is not required for service, according to Ms. Jones.

"We are looking for people who are interested in bettering their community. We want young women and old women; women who have worked in a particular field and women who have been non-professionals," she said.

Ms. Jones said most boards need representation from all sectors of the community. In that sense, she noted, a lack of expertise can be beneficial.

"One of the things many of the boards have found, I think, is that interested people will ask interesting questions and they will be the same questions the average citizen needs answered," she declared.

"One of the problems in the past, with many boards, is that they tended to have on those boards a lot of influential people who did not really have the time to spend," she said. "But those people (from the talent bank) will have enough time."

She noted that, while a certain amount of time is required to attend meetings and review information for board decision, most boards meet only once a month.
