

"Audacity. Always audacity. Again neity." These are among the greatest ditical words ever uttered. They are the terds of Denten, the French revolutionary hader, spoken when the foreign foe had invaded France, and Paris and the Revolution were in danger.

Today, little audacity is shown by Americe. And without audacity—not in the sense of foolhardiness, but in the sense of bold, positive assertion and action—this country will make little headway in foreign affairs. The danger to America and what is called the free world has not been fully absorbed. Too often when our leaders and commentators speak of the Kremlin Leaders' desire to subjugate the world, they do not truly convey a sense of urgency, And our foreign policy lacks audacity.

When so many leaders frequently speak of the cleverness of Russian propaganda and economic penetration they are risking the demoralisation of many people abroad. If the powerful United States cannot meet the inbellectual and ideological offensives of Moscow, it is suggesting that it cannot lead. And # America is not audacious, will weaker countries dere more than this country?






