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Seminole Prosecutor Arrested On Drinking Charges

Assistant Seminole State Attorney Steven Johnson had planned to resign as a prosecutor to return to private practice later this month. But his departure was hastened due to a drunken confrontation with Orange County deputies and X-rated movie theater employees Tuesday night.

Johnson, 27, had submitted his resignation to W.J. Patterson, executive director of the Sanford office, effective Aug. 19. However, when Patterson learned Wednesday morning of Johnson's arrest on charges of disorderly intoxication and possession of an open beer can, "I opted to accept his resignation effective at the close of business, 5 p.m., Tuesday," Patterson said.

Johnson, who was hired as a misdemeanor case prosecutor on March 17, 1980, and later prosecuted felony cases, was

arrested at about 8 p.m. Tuesday in front of the Fairvilla Cinema, at 2415 N. Orange Blossom Trail, Orlando, deputies said.

Deputies said they asked Johnson, who they said smelled strongly of alcoholic beverages and appeared disoriented, if he knew where he was. Johnson told the deputies he was in Lake County, "home of the great sheriff," making additional unfavorable comments about the Lake County sheriff and deputies. Deputies asked Johnson if he knew what city he was in and he replied, "Taveres or Eustis." When asked further questions, deputies were told by Johnson to "just ask my car," which was parked in the theater parking lot.

Later, deputies said Johnson identified himself as an assistant Seminole state attorney and showed them his prosecutor identification.

Meanwhile, theater employees told deputies a man, whom

they later identified as Johnson, walked into the theater lobby and asked, "How about dinner?" When employees told him he was at a theater and not a restaurant, he asked to be admitted but was refused entry due to his apparent intoxication, deputies said. However, Johnson refused to leave the theater, jumped over the turnstile and locked himself in the restroom, witnesses said.

Deputies said Johnson left the theater a few moments later and was seen walking in traffic lanes of U.S. Highway 17-92, posing a hazard to himself and motorists. Deputies observed Johnson standing alongside the roadway waving his arms and yelling and approached him for questioning.

Neither Johnson nor his lawyer, J. Peyton Lea, of Orlando, could be reached for comment today concerning details of the arrest. However, Lea, who Johnson plans to work with in the Orlando law firm, said Wednesday his client will plead not

guilty to the charges. Johnson was freed under the pre-trial release program Wednesday morning and is slated for arraignment Aug. 24.

Patterson said Johnson had taken a vacation day Tuesday and that he was scheduled to take two weeks off for vacation in an effort to expend the accrued leave time before his Aug. 19 resignation. Patterson said he is currently investigating the circumstances of the arrest to determine if state law prohibits his office from paying Johnson for the vacation pay owed him. Patterson said employees are, by policy, required to "use up all of their leave time before resigning and I don't know if we can pay him for the time or not."

If convicted, Johnson could face a maximum penalty of 60 days in the county jail and a \$500 fine for each charge, Patterson said.

Ex-Track Manager Waiting Appeal

Carroll Toler, former Seminole Greyhound Park general manager, said today he hopes to be back at work at the Casselberry pari-mutuel facility within a month following two days of hearings on an appeal to have his pari-mutuel license reinstated.

Toler's two-day appeal hearing in Orlando concluded Wednesday with testimony concerning the role that convicted gambler John Fountain Jr. played during the track's first racing season in 1981.

Toler acted as the track's general manager in 1981, but had his request for a license to act as assistant general manager this year denied by the state Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering because state investigators contend that Fountain, who is barred from pari-mutuel plants, played an active role in daily operations of the track.

In denying Toler's April 1982 license application, the state outlined five charges against him, part of a 14-month investigation into alleged administrative improprieties during the track's first year of operation.

The charges are that Toler allowed an unapproved veterinarian to split duties with the licensed track veterinarian, that the track ran an excessive number of mixed grade dog races, that Toler failed to properly disburse funds to a state scholarship trust fund, that Fountain authorized gasoline disbursements at the track during the racing season and that Toler placed bets on National Football League games with a bookmaker.

Fountain, who now lives in North Carolina, has not talked to state investigators concerning what role he played in the track's conversion from harness to greyhound racing.

Former track president Paul Derveas said Wednesday he borrowed a total of \$321,000 from Fountain to acquire part ownership of the track which Derveas later repaid when the track repurchased his 43 percent ownership.

Derveas said Fountain later loaned him \$160,000 which went back into the track.

According to Derveas, Fountain was in charge of special projects and construction supervision while the track was being converted by owners Bill and Jack Demetree.

Toler testified that Fountain was at the track daily during the conversion, but never entered the track after it opened for racing.

Attorneys for the state Division of Pari-Mutuel Wagering displayed documents Wednesday that showed Toler had numerous phone calls from the track to Fountain and his Brevard County Real Estate Office and offered other documents that showed Fountain authorized gasoline disbursements at the track during the racing season.

Toler said he talked with Fountain after the track opened because Fountain was interested in the track's progress in its first year and that Fountain recommended some big-spending gamblers to the track.

Dan Hardin, a state investigator, said he was told there was an excessive number of mixed grade races because of a shortage of available racing dogs, but that after the track was notified of the mixed grade races in August, the track ended the mixed grade races.

Hearing Officer Steve Pfeiffer has instructed Toler's attorney and the state attorneys to file final memorandums on the hearing by next Wednesday.

Pfeiffer is expected to make a decision on Toler's license appeal within a month. Pfeiffer's recommendations on the case could range from reinstating Toler's license to a penalty as severe as permanent license revocations.

Miss Florida: DUI Publicity May Actually Be Beneficial

Miss Florida, Deanna Pitman, is keeping herself busy preparing for the Miss America pageant while she awaits a Seminole Circuit Court trial on drunk driving charges.

Miss Pitman, of 6 W. Myrtle St., Apopka has weekly schedules of dancing, weight training, mock interviews and gown fittings for the pageant scheduled for Atlantic City, N.J. in September.

She has made no public appearances as Miss Florida since she was arrested last month and charged with driving under the influence of alcohol.

But the chairman of the Miss Florida pageant said today that is not unusual. "Traditionally we schedule very few appearances between the Miss Florida pageant and the Miss America pageant," said Bill Wolfe. "She is very busy with preparations for the pageant."

In an interview Wednesday Miss Pitman said she's confident she won't be convicted of the DUI charge.

She says she was upset the night of July 16, but insists she was not drunk.

Miss Pitman says she isn't worried at

all. "It's not going to happen," she said of any possible conviction on the drunk driving charge. "I just know it's not."

Miss Pitman thinks the publicity may even be helpful in getting her another crown.

"It's going to be the biggest positive," she said. "I've gotten the national publicity. As soon as I get off the plane in Atlantic City, they're going to be looking for me."

A trial has been scheduled for Sept. 13, but her attorney, Jack Bridges of Sanford, wants it moved up to mid-August so the case can be resolved before the Sept. 4 Miss America pageant.

Miss Florida pageant officials have already decided to allow Miss Pitman to represent the state if the charges against her are cleared. If she is found guilty, however, runner-up Kathy Allin of Bradenton will substitute.

Assistant State Attorney Angela Blakely says she still has several witnesses to interview before deciding to prosecute, and it is possible the whole case may be dropped.

After Miss Pitman ran her car into the mailbox, she refused a patrolman's request she take a breath test measure the alcohol content in her blood. The mailbox owner, Mrs. Pauline Sikes remarked that Miss Pitman "wasn't Miss Florida that night," but "just one emotionally upset young lady," and said she was surprised to learn of the drunk driving charges.

Miss Pitman is getting plenty of support from the people of Apopka, her hometown of some 6,000 located 12 miles north of Orlando. The town has rallied behind the beauty queen, crowned Miss Florida in late June.

There were billboards proclaiming "We Love Miss Florida" throughout the town and a committee has formed to help collect money to help her pay for the trip to Atlantic City. The billboards have since been covered-over.

About 30 residents of Apopka plan to attend the pageant. "We don't want to miss this," said Nancy Blalock, who is helping to raise money for the trip. "She's the hometown girl and we love her."

10.4% School Pay Hike Proposed

A proposed 10.43 percent pay increase for school administrators and employees who are not members of any bargaining unit will be presented to the Seminole County School Board at its Wednesday meeting.

The pay increase proposal is in line with the pay hikes given to members of four unions which represent school employees in the county.

Ernest Cowley, who oversees contracts with school employees, said today the pay hike follows the policy of the school board to grant the same benefits to employees not covered by the bargaining units as to those who are members of the unions.

He said the proposal calls for a 10.43 percent increase of base salaries. Longevity pay and other benefits will make some

employees receive higher increases.

Cowley did not disclose what the average increase will be for the employees. He said the proposal covers about 80 salary classifications.

The proposal itself covers about 300 employees ranging from assistant superintendents to clinic aides, he said. Under the new proposal, the maximum salary for an assistant superintendent with 15 years experience will be \$48,600. The old ceiling was \$44,000. Clinic aides, at the other end of the salary scale, will receive a flat 10.43 percent increase from their \$4,831 annual salary.

Dual Taxes: Cities Lost \$2.4 Million

Double taxation — an elusive creature some claim doesn't exist, but described by others as a monster with a ravenous appetite — does actually exist in Seminole County, according to a new study.

And it cost residents of Seminole's seven cities about \$2.4 million during the 1981-82 fiscal year.

Also, because the county "juggled" funds in its transportation budget, the cities lost an additional \$500,000 during that period, the report said.

Those are the conclusions contained in a study by Kelton & Associates Inc., of DeLand, commissioned by municipalities to find out just where city dwellers are charged county property taxes for services from which they receive "no substantial benefit."

The city of Casselberry initiated the search several months ago and the other cities later joined in.

A meeting has been scheduled for 2 p.m. Monday at Sanford City Hall, 300 N. Park Ave., during which the city managers or chief executive officers of each of the cities will "set up a game plan," Sheppard said.

Sheppard said County Administrator Roger Neiswender and County Commission Chairman Robert Sturm have indicated they will be happy to talk with the cities about the report and the double taxation issue.

Sheppard emphasized that court action by the cities against the county will be a last resort.

Of the \$2.4 million that double taxation has cost Seminole's city residents either through additional county taxes or lost municipal revenues, Altamonte Springs residents have lost the most, according to the Kelton report.

Altamonte residents in the past year either paid or lost 37½ percent, or \$900,017 of the total. Sanford residents were second at \$390,070, Casselberry, \$362,438, Winter Springs, \$291,911, Longwood, \$256,227, Lake Mary, \$129,353, and Oviedo, \$71,863.

The areas of double taxation which the Kelton report claims exist include the following:

— All costs related to the county planning division including comprehensive planning, water resource management, reviews of development projects in relation to the county's land development ordinances.

— All costs related to the county development department's land management and building divisions.

— All costs of parks and recreation programs and projects which provide no real and substantial benefit to property owners or residents within the incorporated areas and are financed from countywide revenue.

— All engineering costs relating to subdivision review, inspection and design, survey and inspection of the county road system.

— All road and bridge and other non-departmental road expenditures relating to "in" tenance or construction of the county road system including both paved and unpaved roads and road rights-of-way; and all drainage, maintenance or construction relating to the county road system.

— All costs of the Environmental Services section for inspection and issuing permits associated with new development waste water tie-ins to the county system.

— Road patrol and investigations as provided by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office including appropriate payroll, administrative, operating and capital costs.

— All costs for construction of fire stations which provide services to the residents of unincorporated areas.

— All costs associated with the acquisition, development, equipment, maintenance and operation of the refuse collection and disposal unit.

The Kelton report claims that services to the unincorporated sections of Seminole County during the past three years have cost the county \$11.6 million more than revenues collected from those areas in taxes.

The Kelton report suggests the county can remedy this situation by:

— Levying user fees, assessments and other similar fees sufficient to fund the cost of services in the unincorporated areas.

— Rebating to the cities their share of the double taxes they've paid.

Funding the cost of services to the unincorporated areas by additional property taxes on those areas and by reducing property taxes to city residents.

As an example, the report said the county could have reduced county taxes on city property by \$1.80 per \$1,000 assessed valuation while it increased taxes in the unincorporated area by \$1.64 per \$1,000.

U.S. Killer Satellites May Heat Up Arms Race

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An independent research organization warns testing of an American satellite killer now under development would step up the arms race and increase the risk of a war in space.

The American anti-satellite weapon has not yet been tested but Pentagon officials have said tests are expected to begin soon.

Researcher Daniel Deudney said in a report published Wednesday by the Worldwatch Institute, a non-profit group which receives money from private foundations and United Nations' organizations, the Soviet Union already has tested extensively a satellite killer.

He said the Soviet system uses a satellite that is maneuvered close to a target and then is detonated. The American anti-satellite system uses small two-stage missiles launched from a high-flying jet fighter.

From the standpoint of arms control and crisis management, Deudney said the American system will be far more destabilizing because it could strike anywhere with little warning, while the Soviet killer satellites can be tracked as they are launched and maneuvered in orbit.

Reagan Talks Sternly

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A troubled President Reagan is sending stern messages he wants Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin to halt the attack on Beirut, and the PLO to "not delay" their departure from the besieged Lebanese capital.

White House aides said Begin had not replied to an urgent personal message from Reagan Wednesday telling him to the "absolute necessity" of reestablishing a strict cease-fire and maintaining it.

They said Reagan's letter was "firm" but contained no threats and discounted reports the president's advisers had recommended sanctions against Israel.

But ABC News said the letter to Begin "contains clear threats that if the Israelis do not stop their latest attack on west Beirut, there will be serious consequences, including a possible U.S. military embargo." ABC said the president warned if Israel goes into Beirut, it will raise "profound questions for the future bilateral relationship."

Imports Grab Big Share

DETROIT (UPI) — American automakers' sales plummeted to their lowest level in July since 1961 while foreign manufacturers grabbed their second biggest share ever of the U.S. market for the month.

Total industry sales for the month were 655,980 cars, automakers said Wednesday — down 6.6 percent from last year and the worst overall for the month since July 1964.

Imports accounted for 196,000, or 31.3 percent, of the total, their highest market share since a 31.9 percent in December 1981.

Sales per day were the worst for the industry since 1964. Domestic cars sold at the worst rate since 1961.

Domestic automakers' sales in July were 429,908 cars, down 13.5 percent from 497,151 last year.

NATIONAL REPORT: Severe thunderstorms spawned at least three tornadoes from Indiana to Colorado and lightning sparked a fire that killed a sleeping Iowa couple. Rain brought little relief from heat that baked the Plains with readings in the low 100s. Storms swept more heavy rain, high winds and hail into the central states early today. Temperatures peaked at 100 degrees Wednesday in Kansas City, Mo., 5 degrees above the record set in 1980. Torrential rains dumped more than 3 inches in 45 minutes on Colorado Springs, Colo., turning a normally dry creek bed into a raging river. Authorities were forced to close a road that divides the city from a neighboring county. A tornado touched down about 30 miles southwest of Kiowa, Colo., but no injuries or damages were reported.

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Sanford Man Charged In Kidnapping

A 21-year-old Sanford man was being held in the Seminole County jail today in connection with the kidnapping, armed robbery, sexual and aggravated battery of a 17-year-old Sanford youth.

Deputies said they arrested Frederick Eugene Siplin, of 4220 Orlando Drive, Apt. 29, after the youth told the deputies he had been kidnapped at gunpoint, forced to disrobe while riding around Sanford in a car and sexually assaulted at about 3:30 a.m. today.

The youth told deputies he was walking along U.S. Highway 17-92 near the ABC Liquor lounge when a man driving a white Pontiac Firebird offered him a ride. Deputies said the youth refused the ride but was forced to get into the car when the man pointed a gun at him. The gun was later determined to be a toy gun, deputies said.

Deputies said the man told the boy he needed to buy gasoline for his car and ordered the youth while nude to get out of the car and tossed him a pair of underpants.

The boy ran to a nearby home where he called deputies, informed them of the incident and gave them a description of his kidnapper and the type of vehicle he was driving.

According to sheriff's spokesman John Spolski, a deputy was patrolling in the area of Beardall Avenue and heard the description of the suspected abductor and vehicle. Moments later, the deputy observed a white Pontiac Firebird traveling along Beardall Avenue, about 1/2-mile south of State Road 46, Sanford. The deputies stopped the vehicle to question its driver concerning the reported kidnapping and assault and arrested Siplin as a suspect in the incident.

Siplin is being held in the county jail without bond.

Automakers Doubt They Can Meet Safety Deadline

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's automakers say they doubt they can comply with a court ruling ordering the Reagan administration to reimpose regulations requiring self-closing seat belts or air bags by 1984.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia put the government and the industry on notice it expects the safety equipment to be in all cars rolling off the assembly line after Sept. 1, 1983.

The decision was applauded by congressional leaders, Ralph Nader and the nation's auto insurance companies.

In its decision, the court rejected attempts by the Reagan administration to rescind the "passive restraint" rules, which have been in the making for 15 years.

The rules, completed in 1977 during the Carter administration, require manufacturers to install automatic occupant restraints in large passenger cars in model-year 1982, in medium cars in model-year 1982 and small cars in model-year 1983.

But the rules soon became a major target of a presidential task force, which had as its goal lowering the costs of regulation for the depressed auto industry.

Four months after President Reagan took office, the Transportation Department's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration decided to delay the standard for one year.

Last October, NHTSA Administrator Raymond Peck rescinded it outright, saying that car-makers planned to manufacture self-closing belts that could be too easily disconnected.

As well, he asserted, the rule could be costly to consumers and the industry.

The court delayed the compliance date for large and midsize cars from Sept. 1, 1982, to Sept. 1, 1983, citing "the obvious difficulties created by (the Transportation Department's) unlawful rescission."

The court Wednesday told the agency that it has until Oct. 1 to tell the court whether the Sept. 1, 1983, compliance date "is achievable or whether a longer period is required."

Rep. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., chairman of the House consumer protection subcommittee, called the decision "a major setback for this administration's capricious attempts at deregulation simply for its own sake, without regard for its impact... It is a clear message that the administration cannot flout the law."

The Ford Motor Co. expressed disappointment with the decision.

"The effect of the court order is to require us to divert scarce resources in an effort to meet a standard that, at the very least, will require significant change to resolve the many open issues," said Roger Maugh, Ford's automotive safety director.

The Chrysler Corp.'s complaints were even more strident.

"There is absolutely no way that Chrysler Corporation can meet the federal appeals court requirement to install automatic passenger restraints in all of its new cars by the fall of 1983," a spokesman said.

Congress Replaces CETA

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress has overwhelmingly approved a bipartisan job training measure emphasizing local officials and the private sector to replace the controversial Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

With unemployment highest since World War II, the House passed its bill to replace CETA by a vote of 356-52 after six hours of debate Wednesday. The Senate passed a similar bill, 95-0, July 1.

A conference committee likely will be appointed to negotiate differences in the bill, which could cost as much as \$5.4

billion.

Unlike CETA, which was administered through the federal government, the new plan places major responsibility with state and local governments, in cooperation with "private industry councils."

Rep. John Erlenborn, R-Ill., said the bill also differs sharply from CETA because it contains no public service or job creation provisions.

Although Chairman Augustus Hawkins of the House Education and Labor Committee found it difficult to accept the difference, Erlenborn said, "he agreed to

do so to get it passed."

Rep. Tom Coleman, R-Mo., said that "training is primary" in the bill and it does not contain "the thinly disguised income programs of CETA."

The training funds would be divided equally between programs for people below 22 years of age and those older.

"It is so far from what we ought to be doing in this nation at this time it is pathetic," Rep. Paul Simon, D-Ill., said. But he supported the bill anyway.

At its peak during the Carter administration, the CETA program cost \$7.5 billion annually.

House Has Time On Balancing Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Despite Senate passage, the proposed constitutional amendment to balance the budget will disappear with the 97th Congress in October if it is not approved beforehand by the Democratic House.

The Senate approved the amendment Wednesday, 69-31, two votes more than the necessary two-thirds margin. Forty-eight Republicans and 21 Democrats supported it. Sen. Russell Long, D-La., cast the deciding 67th vote.

To become part of the Constitution, two-thirds of the House, 290 members, must now approve the amendment and then it must be ratified within seven years by at least 38 states.

But even if given final congressional ap-

proval this year, supporters concede it will not become effective until fiscal 1987 at the earliest and could take until 1992.

A House Judiciary subcommittee planned to continue hearings today on the amendment, which Democratic opponents have kept bottled up in committee.

Minneapolis Mayor Donald Fraser, in testimony prepared for the panel on behalf of the U.S. Conference of Mayors, urged the House to reject the budget amendment, arguing it would be inflexible and sometimes inappropriate.

Fraser said passage of the proposed amendment would result in "deep cuts in federal programs over the next several years"

and "threaten the viability of many of our cities."

A discharge petition that would bypass the committee and send the amendment directly to the House for a vote has 184 of the required 218 signatures.

Neither bills nor resolutions carry over to a newly elected Congress, meaning the Senate's approval of the constitutional amendment could be wiped out.

Supporters of the amendment concede it will be a difficult task to achieve final approval before Congress adjourns around Oct. 8, and the problem is compounded by alterations made by the Senate before it passed the amendment.

Under a discharge petition, the House could

not significantly amend the measure on the floor to make it conform to the Senate version. It could either send it back to committee with instructions to change the language or approve it and try to reach a compromise in a joint conference with Senate negotiators.

A compromise would have to be approved again in each chamber by a two-thirds margin.

A balanced budget constitutional amendment has been suggested for years but never before came to a vote in Congress. The Senate outcome was by no means certain, and President Reagan lobbied a few senators by telephone earlier in the day to support the measure.

FLORIDA IN BRIEF

Lohman: Many Prisoners Don't Belong Behind Bars

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — As many as 15 percent to 25 percent of Florida's more than 25,000 prisoners may not belong behind bars, a spokesman for the Florida Clearinghouse on Criminal Justice says.

James Lohman, spokesman for the prisoners' rights group, told a special task force Wednesday that more than half of the prisoners currently in the system did not commit violent crimes. Other "sanctions" would be more appropriate for many of them than prison, he said.

"The prison system need not function as the wholesale dumping ground it has become," Lohman told the task force, which was meeting for only the second time in its effort to find a long-term solution to the chronic problem of prison overcrowding.

Lohman said possible short-term solutions are the immediate release of prisoners with 90 days or less remaining on their sentences, work release and furlough programs, greater use of parole, shorter sentences and a re-examination of the state's mandatory sentencing laws.

The state is under a court order from U.S. District Court judge Charles Scott and must be in compliance by Oct. 8. Scott's order says in part that the state may not exceed capacity at any of its penal institutions.

Drugs, Weapons In Schools

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) — A 118 percent increase in the number of Broward County students caught carrying weapons during the last year is a sign the school system's strict rules are working, school board officials said.

A report released Wednesday showed the skyrocketing increase in students caught with weapons, and showed that drug law violations also increased significantly during the last year.

School officials attributed the increased number of weapon and drug incidents to a strict school board policy designed to beef up enforcement of drug and weapons rules. The policy is also aimed at encouraging students to report fellow pupils who break the rules.

Deer Hunt Called Sound

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Although it drew protests from animal lovers nationwide, the state's plan to use hunters to thin out starving deer in the Everglades was based on sound wildlife management principles, Gov. Bob Graham's office has concluded.

In addition, a report released by Graham Wednesday, said the flooding that led to a shortage of food for the deer was beneficial to other forms of wildlife, including fish, aquatic reptiles and birds.

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Judge Overturns Own 1956 Ruling

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — A federal judge, saying he naively believed lies by the government, overturned his 26-year-old decision and granted a new trial to ranchers who claim fallout from nuclear tests killed 4,400 sheep in 1953.

U.S. District Judge A. Sherman Christensen said Wednesday events of the past decade have led people to be more cynical about the honesty of federal officials and indicated if he had heard the same evidence about the sheep deaths now he might not have accepted it.

Christensen vacated his 1956 decision relieving the government of responsibility in the sheep deaths, charging the military and Atomic Energy Commission defrauded his court during those proceedings. He set an Aug. 24 hearing to schedule a second trial.

The judge blamed a too narrow "government-tells-the-truth" attitude for his inability to detect the fraud.

He said he would still like to believe in the basic integrity of government officials, "despite the buffetings of Watergate, these procedures and other current disclosures.

"Nonetheless, I have concluded that by whatever standard or as of whatever period the circumstances found here are to be judged, they (the circumstances) clearly and convincingly demonstrate a species of fraud upon the court for which a remedy must be granted," Christensen said.

Former Secretary of Interior Stewart Udall said the ruling will significantly affect his claim that atomic testing in Nevada severely damaged hundreds of Utah families in the 1950s.

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WORLD IN BRIEF

Combat In Beirut Goes On; Israel Censured For Attack

Israeli and Palestinian gunners traded sporadic artillery and rocket fire at daybreak today, shaking Palestinian-controlled west Beirut before it could recover from an avalanche of air raids, artillery and gunboat fire.

The U.N. Security Council, with the United States casting a surprise abstention, censured Israel for attacking west Beirut, where no section escaped shellfire Wednesday in the fiercest combat in two months of war.

The council may meet today to consider the secretary-general's report and if necessary, to consider "adopting effective ways and means in accordance with the charter" to force compliance, meaning trade sanctions against Israel.

The U.N. spokesman, meanwhile, said Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin rebuffed a bid by Perez de Cuellar to visit Israel to discuss the Lebanese crisis.

The Palestinian Liberation Organization, apparently humbled by the Israelis' awesome military onslaught, submitted a new compromise proposal for evacuating its guerrillas from Lebanon, a PLO source said.

President Reagan sent a personal letter to Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin threatening a possible cut-off of military aid if the assaults continued, ABC News said Wednesday.

Altamonte Man Killed In Plane Crash

An Altamonte Springs private pilot was one of four persons killed in a plane crash in the Bahamas on Monday.

Dead is James Irving McKesson, 51, of 504-16 Orange Drive, Altamonte Springs.

The identity of the other three crash victims is unknown. However, one is believed to be from Argentina and another from Louisiana.

McKesson, a son of Navy Capt. (Ret.) Lewis J. and Ethel McKesson, also of Altamonte Springs, was a Marine Corps veteran who served in Korea.

According to the elder McKesson, the Federal Bureau of Investigation is looking into the circumstances surrounding the crash.

An Orlando FBI office spokesman said today the FBI has received no information about the crash. However, a Miami FBI office spokesman said today the FBI will look into circumstances surrounding the crash when its Bahamas investigator makes a trip to the islands on Friday.

According to the elder McKesson, the Bahamian police have given him conflicting reports about the possibility that drugs were related to the plane crash.

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Arafat's Last Card

Yasser Arafat and his trapped Palestine Liberation Organization followers in west Beirut, abandoned by Arab governments and helpless before the Israeli army, have precious few cards left to play.

Their only trump would be to recognize Israel's right to exist, thereby removing the sole barrier to direct negotiations between the PLO and the United States.

Arafat recently seemed to be trying to bring about the latter without quite doing the former. Predictably, it didn't wash.

Even State Department hands long eager for any sign of PLO flexibility on recognizing Israel cast ice water on the one-sentence statement released by Arafat.

That statement, recognizing "all U.N. resolutions relevant to the Palestinian question," might be construed as tacit recognition of Israel's right to exist.

Then again, it might just as easily be construed as diplomatic mush signifying no retreat whatsoever from the PLO's sworn determination to destroy the state of Israel.

Which U.N. resolutions are "relevant" to the Palestinian question?

Four successive American administrations have considered U.N. resolutions 242 and 338 — approved following the 1967 and 1973 Mideast wars respectively — as the basis for a just peace. Whether Arafat considers these "relevant" to the "Palestinian question" remains in doubt.

Arafat could eliminate this ambiguity by issuing an equally laconic communique worded thusly: "The Palestine Liberation Organization recognizes Israel's right to exist and to live in peace with its Arab neighbors."

Such a statement would break a diplomatic logjam that has prevented a Middle East peace for more than 30 years.

Such a statement would also trigger immediate, face-to-face negotiations between the PLO and the United States. It would create irresistible pressures on Israel — yes, even on the government of Menachem Begin — to commence serious negotiations for Palestinian autonomy on the West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

A clear, unqualified recognition of Israel would also remove the one justification every Israeli government has cited for refusing to deal with the PLO.

What government negotiates willingly with an organization openly pledged to its destruction by force of arms?

It may be that an unqualified recognition of Israel is beyond Arafat's power to deliver. After all, he heads a coalition some of whose members are unalterably opposed to any concessions at any time under any circumstances.

And even if Arafat could deliver, he may well choose to withhold recognition of Israel until it can be exchanged for tangible Israeli guarantees of concessions to the Palestinian Arabs.

But Arafat cannot expect to gain without giving, especially in his present dire circumstances. And what he offered recently seemed much more apparent than real.

"The league is concerned that a 'no' vote will indicate to the County Commissioners that citizens want the library system to remain at its present level, rather than expanding services and facilities to meet the needs of our growing county," said Helen Smith, league president.

Judicial Powers Debated

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The last thing that most members of Congress want in this election year is another heated debate.

But they are being forced into one by a little-noticed decision handed down by the Supreme Court in the closing days of its latest session. Many on Capitol Hill are holding Chief Justice Warren Burger personally responsible for this undesired turn of events.

In the June 28 decision, the Supreme Court, by a 6-3 margin, ruled unconstitutional a key section of the federal bankruptcy law. Congress passed that law in 1978 after years of hearings, debate and, in the end, sharp differences between the House and Senate. Those differences remain at the heart of the problem.

In effect, the 1978 law created a new set of courts to adjudicate bankruptcy cases. Bankruptcies previously had been the responsibility of the federal district courts with much of the actual work performed by referees appointed by the district judges.

But the workload had grown too great, and many district courts had amassed large backlogs of bankruptcy cases. So, Congress was persuaded to set up the new courts.

But these courts were not made equal to the district courts. Instead, they were made ancillary, and their judges were not given the same status as district judges. This is the crux of the problem.

Article III of the Constitution requires that the federal judiciary be independent of the other branches of government. Thus, most federal judges receive life tenure and salaries that cannot be reduced during their service.

The new bankruptcy judges, however, were given only 14-year tenure and salaries that could be raised or lowered by Congress each fiscal year. (Similar provisions apply to certain other federal judges in courts of narrow jurisdiction.)

At the same time, Congress gave these judges jurisdiction not only over bankruptcies but also over a whole range of civil matters—such as contract, anti-trust and labor issues—arising directly out of their bankruptcy cases.

This was too much power, the Supreme Court said, for judges who did not have the independence required by the Constitution.

The court did not go so far as to invalidate decisions made by these judges since 1978. However, it did demand that Congress "reconstitute the bankruptcy courts" by Oct. 4 if they are to continue to function.

Many members of Congress foresaw this problem when the bankruptcy law was being debated and therefore sought to make the bankruptcy judges equal to the district judges.

But Chief Justice Burger lobbied hard against the proposal. He ultimately convinced Congress to give the judges fixed terms of office and salaries that would be set annually as part of the federal budgetary process.

Many observers viewed this lobbying as an attempt at empire-building on Burger's part. As the chief administrative officer of the federal court system, he would have considerably more authority over judges who were serving limited terms at salaries that could be lowered.

Some of these observers saw the June decision as a personal slap at the chief justice by an increasingly divided and acrimonious Supreme Court. Only Justices Lewis Powell and Byron White voted with Burger on the bankruptcy case.

Mafia Seeks Revenge On FBI Infiltrator

WASHINGTON — In the widespread criticism of FBI officials' sins of commission or omission in the Abscam and Ray Donovan investigations, it's easy to lose sight of the fact that the bureau's agents — the "grunts" of the organization — continue to perform extraordinary feats of investigation, often at the risk of their lives.

As just one example, consider the special agent known as "Donnie Brasco." That's the undercover name he used to infiltrate the Bonanno crime family of New York City. The skill with which "Brasco" and another G-man, "Tony Rossi," infiltrated the Mob led to indictments of Bonanno family members as well as the reputed underworld boss of Milwaukee, Frank Balistreri.

The Mafia dons are raging. They have vowed to kill the agent who embarrassed them by winning their confidence in a masquerade that lasted more than six years. "Brasco" was so successful that at one point he was being considered for formal induction

Connecticut Family Feud

HARTFORD, Conn. (NEA) — Politics is a very serious business for its practitioners everywhere, but the virulence of a longstanding political feud between two wealthy Connecticut families probably is unmatched in any other state.

On one side of the seemingly ceaseless confrontation is Sen. Lowell P. Weicker Jr., R-Conn., an outspoken political maverick who thrives on controversy and is described as aggressive by his friends and abrasive by his enemies.

Pitted against him in a blood feud that has been raging for at least 12 years and possibly as long as three decades is the patrician family of Vice President George Bush.

In 1970, Bush was scheduled to address the Connecticut Republican Party's statewide convention, but GOP officials reportedly had to withdraw the invitation belatedly because of strenuous objections from Weicker.

Ten years later, when Bush was seeking the party's presidential nomination, Weicker attempted to embarrass him by publicizing his version of an episode that occurred at the height of the Watergate scandal when Bush was chairman of the Republican National Committee.

According to Weicker, Bush telephoned him in 1973 to ask what the senator wanted done with documents detailing secret campaign contributions made to Weicker and 38 other GOP candidates under the direction of President Nixon's political operatives, than said, "What should I do — burn them?" Bush termed that account as "an absolute lie."

Bush's bid for the Republican presidential nomination was unsuccessful, but he was selected to be Ronald Reagan's running mate. Weicker dutifully (if not enthusiastically) supported Reagan but pointedly refused to endorse Bush.

The Weicker-Bush feud was perpetuated this year when one of the vice president's brothers, Prescott S. Bush Jr., mounted a challenge to Weicker's bid for re-election even though he had never before sought public office.

Does the Bush family have a dislike for

Weicker? "There's no such thing on our side of the fence," insists Prescott Bush, who claims Weicker is responsible for the hostilities. "He's been just aggressively against George on everything."

But Bush isn't especially charitable to Weicker, whom he describes as "a hypocrite." The senator's combative behavior "has antagonized a lot of people" and his animosity toward the Bush family is the product of "just sheer jealousy," says the vice president's brother.

Weicker also isn't inclined to forgive or forget. "To know (Prescott) Bush is not to like him," he says while simultaneously disclaiming any responsibility for the history of antagonism between himself and the Bush family.

At the GOP's recent statewide convention here, Weicker defeated Bush by a margin of almost 2-1 in the contest for the party's endorsement of a senatorial candidate to run against Rep. Toby Moffitt, the Democratic nominee.

White House officials claim that both Reagan and George Bush maintained their traditional neutrality until the Republican Party's selection process was concluded — but there is evidence of considerable meddling in recent months.

Shortly after Lyn Nofziger resigned as Reagan's principal political adviser, he traveled to Connecticut for public appearances on Bush's behalf and wrote a widely publicized letter endorsing the vice president's brother.

Rather than engage in an arduous, expensive and probably futile campaign against Weicker after the convention, Bush decided not to extend his challenge to a Sept. 7 primary.

But the unique family feud undoubtedly will continue with a vengeance in the years to come. It could flare up as early as 1984, if Reagan decides not to seek a second term, Bush makes a bid for the presidency and Weicker again attempts to sabotage Bush's political career.

On Moral Issues

The current phase of the unilateral disarmament campaign is one in which radicalized or profoundly unrealistic Western clergymen play a central role. They are the most open advocates of the "Better Red Than Dead" position.

A case in point is the Rev. John Stone Jenkins, rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in New Orleans, La. In a sermon delivered June 20, which has been brought to my attention by a concerned parishioner, Mr. Jenkins condemned President Reagan for what he termed his "cynical" response to the Soviet Union's declaration that it would never resort to a nuclear first strike. Mr. Jenkins said that America should "speak with a unified voice to congratulate the Soviet Union" and added that "the Russians really out-Christianized us in what they did." No wonder thoughtful parishioners were disturbed — and all this from the pulpit.

Mr. Jenkins failed to notice that the Soviet "no-first strike" proposal was embodied in a statement that also called for a "convention on the prohibition of development, production and stockpiling of chemical weapons." That quote is from Moscow News (Novosti Press Agency) for July 4-11. The entire world knows that the Soviets are using chemical weapons in Afghanistan and in Southeast Asia. How can anyone, even a glib cleric, believe the Soviet pledge about a nuclear first strike — anymore than the hypocritical statement about chemical weapons can be believed?

Mr. Jenkins' sermon went beyond incredible political innocence. He asked rhetorically: "Is it possible to come to some kind of circumstances in which we would have to accept defeat without death?" Working his way to the heart of his appeal, he asked: "Is it perhaps not a better heritage to our children to give them a planet with a bad set of politics and maybe a bad economy to it and let them work through that than to commit ourselves to this type of total destruction?" In other words, isn't it better to live under communism than to experience nuclear war?

If Americans were to answer Mr. Jenkins in the affirmative, they could forget about freedom for themselves and their children. The Soviet military machine would have triumphed without firing a shot.

What Mr. Jenkins fails to understand is that a communist political triumph doesn't mean an end to killing. The Soviet regime triumphed in Russia over 60 years ago, and ever since then it has been killing its own people in concentration camps that Alexander Solzhenitsyn described. Today, the people of Poland are in a vast communist concentration camp, denied the hope of liberty that they enjoyed only two years ago.

Is that a heritage that Mr. Jenkins would give to the generations to come — a heritage of tyranny and oppression? Does Mr. Jenkins — and others who share his views — remember Patrick Henry's "give me liberty or give me death?" Countless brave people in the captive nations of the Soviet empire refuse to accept what Mr. Jenkins suggests that Americans be prepared to accept.

It is very tragic that men of the cloth should be in the vanguard of the fearful appeasers of Soviet totalitarianism. Fear of war should not lead free men to settle for slavery.

and one in the seventh but fell short of the victory when Hayes struck out Butch Bernard to end the game.

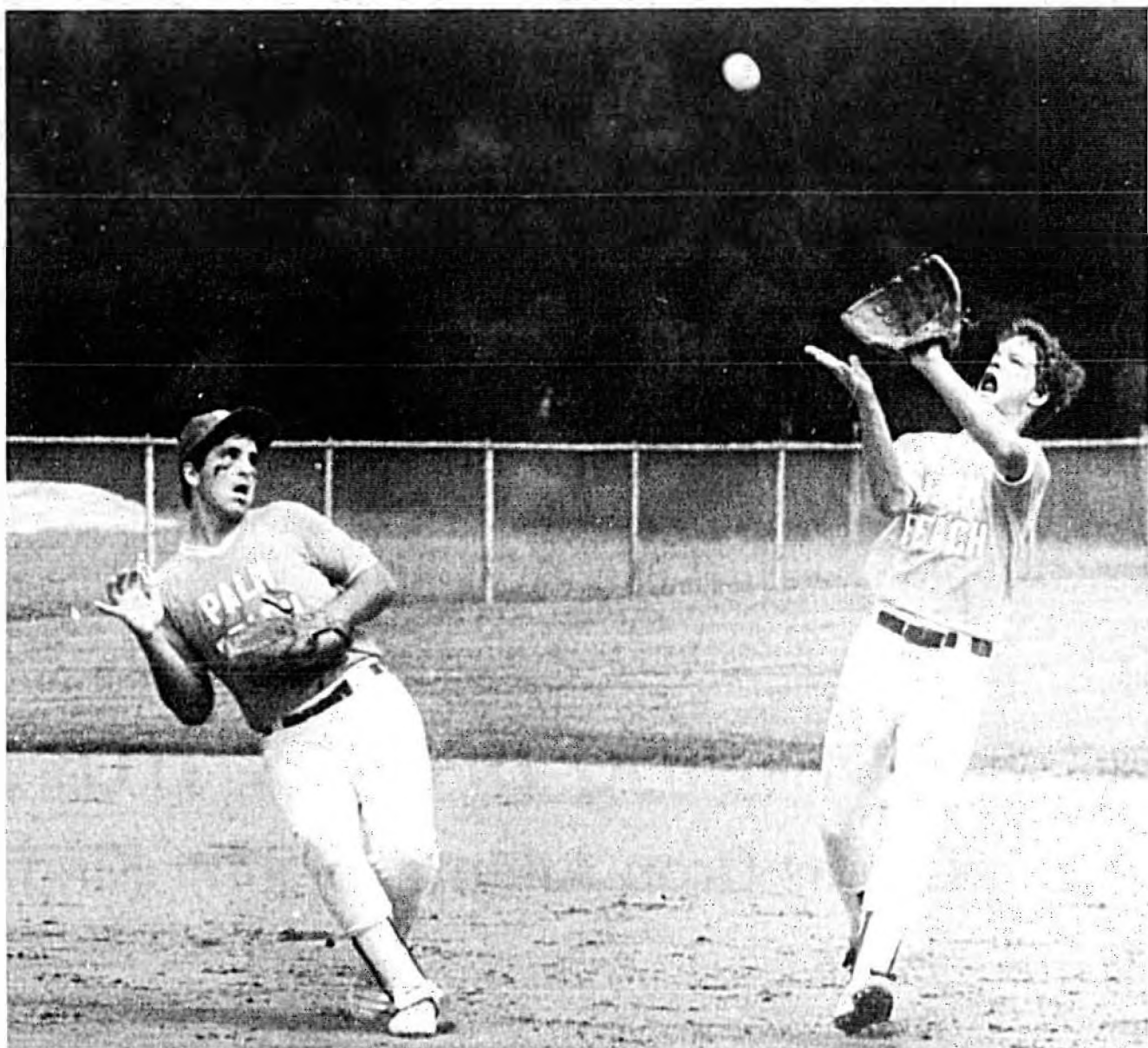

Thin-Ice LaRussa Unruffled By Michael's Departure

NEW YORK — Tony LaRussa, the Chicago White Sox manager, had just gotten back to the hotel early Wednesday morning after his club had cremated the New York Yankees, 1-0, and then thrown the ashes in their faces, 14-2, in two-night doubleheader sweep when he got the news.

"Did you hear what happened?" someone asked him.

"No," LaRussa was curious. "What happened?"

"The Yankees fired Gene Michael and named Clyde King to replace him," LaRussa's informant advised him.

The White Sox manager never even blinked. He has been on thin ice himself with his job the past few weeks, and still is, in fact, and while he has no wish to see any manager fired, his primary feeling was, he was glad it wasn't him.

"You realize any time a club is struggling, one guy is more vulnerable than anyone else," LaRussa said in the visiting manager's office in Yankee Stadium before Wednesday's night second straight two-night doubleheader with the Yankees.

"Sometimes a guy survives, sometimes he doesn't," LaRussa went on. "When I heard what happened to Michael, I felt bad for him.

You know what they say about this game, though. 'That's baseball.'"

Clyde King knows that very well. He's 57, has spent 38 of those years in professional baseball and has been fired as manager by the San Francisco Giants and Atlanta Braves, so being shoved into the breach as interim manager of the Yankees by George Steinbrenner at 1:04 Wednesday morning didn't exactly work out to be the thrill of his life.

King has been with the Yankees since 1976 doing a variety of jobs for them. He is a man from the old school does what his superior officer tells him to, but that doesn't mean he's always toadying to owner George Steinbrenner as some have unfairly and uncharitably said about him.

When Steinbrenner asked him to take over as interim manager and the club's third manager of the season, he said although he accepted the job "reluctantly," he also took it "willingly."

Steinbrenner assured him he could have his old job back when his tour of duty is over. That could be at any time, just as it was for Bob Lemon and Michael, both of whom have already managed the Yankees twice, and King is perfectly aware of that. It doesn't bother him at all.

"You don't seem nervous," his wife, Norma, said to him when he left his Westchester home Wednesday for the stadium and his new job.

"I'm not," he told her. "I don't know why, maybe it's the 38 years I've got in this game."

Clyde King is much like Jim Fanning of the Montreal Expos, who came out of the front office to manage last year. He knows there's a job waiting for him in the organization when he's fired. Michael has one with the Yankees, too, if he wants it and I'm sure he does. Or at least he will want it when the pain of being replaced as manager subsides more.

I'm also reasonably sure the Yankees next manager will be Earl Weaver, now piloting the Baltimore Orioles, or Don Zimmer, now unemployed.

Meanwhile, King has no complaints about

his "interim" label.

"It's fine with me," he says. "I'm not a bit concerned about managing next year although Mr. Steinbrenner said I could if I wanted to. Normally, you'd insist on having a second year in this kind of situation, but I'm not. If that's what the club wants, fine. If not, that's fine, too."

Clyde King is the type of individual who never looks for rewards and therefore often gets more of them than he anticipates.

Once after he had been used four straight days in relief by Manager Leo Durocher while he was pitching for the Dodgers, Durocher called him into his office.

Leo was wearing a snazzy blue checkered jacket.

"Like it?" he asked King.

"Oh, boy!" was the appreciative answer. "Try it on," Durocher said.

King found it was a couple of sizes too big for him. Not long afterwards, a jacket exactly like it, but the right size, was delivered to him.

"That was Leo's way," King explained. "He never hugged you or paid you a lot of personal compliments, he just showed how he felt about you in his own way."

George Steinbrenner does the same thing.

He fought in the Civil War, was wounded twice, settled in Natchez, Miss., married Emma Mayer, moved to Birmingham, Ala., and died in 1924.

Samuel Ullman was a prominent merchant with a penchant for public service. He became president of the board of education in Birmingham, and a high school in Birmingham bears his name. He helped to organize

the Temple Emanuel where he served as a lay-rabbi for three years.

I have received no less than 100 different versions of Samuel Ullman's essay on youth. Mayer U. Newfield, a grandson of Ullman, sent me a copy of the correct version, which appears in "Twilight Time," published by the C.R. Gibson Co. in 1979. It is truly a masterpiece.

What Happened To The Gall Stone?



DEAR DR. LAMB - I would like some information about gallbladder disorders. I'm female, age 64, and in good health as far as aches and pains are concerned. I stay busy and am on the go quite a bit, so I feel kind of drabby sometimes.

Nearly four years ago I had what my doctor diagnosed as a gallbladder attack. He said a stone had lodged in the common bile duct. The night before I had eaten quite a bit of fried shrimp and was quite sick the next day. I stayed in the hospital eight days and haven't had any problem since. I can eat anything and never have any discomfort.

Each time I go for a checkup my doctor says I'm doing fine but "You need your gallbladder out."

DEAR DR. LAMB - I believe a person's heart is the main part of his body and that this has been proved. I've been told this isn't so. If a person had high blood pressure, a dead gallbladder, a bad spleen plus cirrhosis of the liver - and a very bad case I must add - would not this cause a person's death due to weakening of his heart?

Since you have gone so long without symptoms you would be regarded as an individual with an asymptomatic gallbladder disease - provided you really do have stones in your gallbladder. I would certainly want to know whether or not there are now any stones in your gallbladder before having surgery. This can be determined by X-ray studies. Such studies will also tell if your bladder is functioning or not. If it is functioning and you have no stones you certainly do not need an operation.

DEAR READER - The beating of the heart is one of the vital signs. The most common method of determining death is by noting when the heart stops beating. That means that the last event in any number of fatal illnesses or accidents is the stopping of the heart. If a person has pneumonia and death occurs, the death occurs when the heart stops.

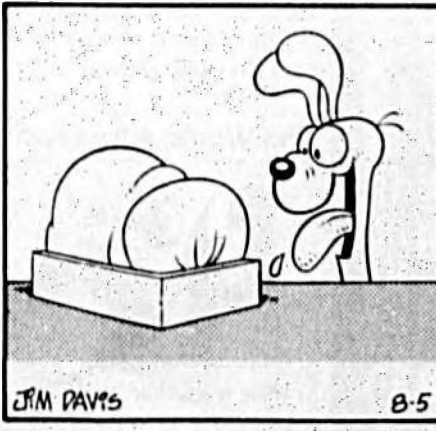

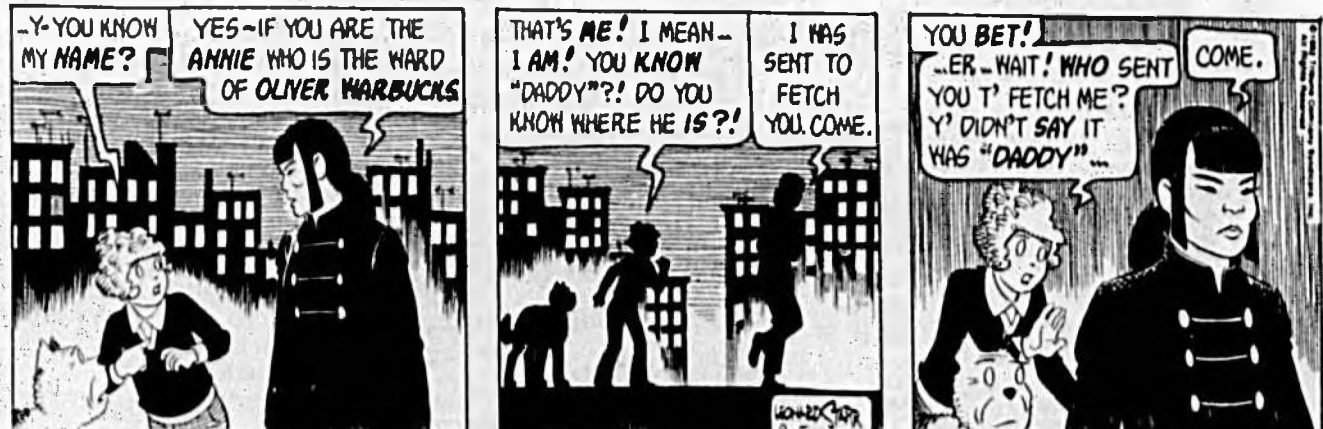

Poor Economy Is Boon To Alabama Business

MOBILE, Ala. (UPI) — Despite a 10 percent unemployment rate in its four-state territory, a Mobile-based television and appliance rental firm has used the recession to become one of the nation's 100 fastest growing businesses.

"With a bad economy people are more inclined to rent than buy," says Judy McCann, 37, who, along with her husband, James B. McCann, 45, founded Elean Investments, Inc., in Gulfport, Miss., in 1975.

"It (recession) sure hasn't hurt us," says Mrs. McCann. The company, which has 11 stores in Alabama, Mississippi, Florida and Georgia, has done so well that it has made the list of 100 fastest growing businesses in the United States compiled by Inc. magazine.

The Boston-based magazine's survey is based on growth over a five-year period. From 1976 to 1981, Elean grew from three employees to 87 and had a sales growth of 1,300 percent.

Elean, 59th on the Inc. list, had gross sales of \$3.76 million in the 12 months ending March 31, 1982, said Mrs. McCann. In the previous 12 months, sales were \$1.65 million.

Sales for the current year are projected at \$6.3 million with the opening of new stores in the Sunbelt during 1982.

The McCanns also own M&J Leasing, which rents TV sets and appliances in three Virginia cities. But that company's sales are separate and were not a part of the Inc. survey.

Mrs. McCann says hard work and daily supervision have helped the computerized company's growth, but she concedes that economic hard times have also helped spur profits.

"A lot of people right now don't want to make long term purchases," she says. "If they get laid off, we can just pick it (television set or appliance) up and they continue to have credit."

With three-fourths of its sales in TV rentals, Elean outlets — franchised through Color Times Inc., of Dallas, Texas — are renting sets for \$12 to \$17.50 per week and also offer monthly or twice-a-month rates.

Mrs. McCann says the rental plan — for 12 to 24 months — is an alternative to financing.

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
