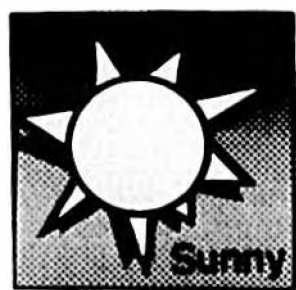

Number change

The telephone number for the Seminole County school district's Educational Support Center has been changed.

The district offices now can be reached at 320-0000.

Of course, that won't always get you through to the main number. On an initial try, a caller might connect with the phone mail system of Linda Dawson, director of personnel services; another time, the caller might get through to the switchboard operator; other times, one might not get through at all.

No one was available to comment on the difficulties and it is not known whether any of the voice mail messages were received by those for whom they were intended.

The telecommunications system, installed after much controversy required a new telephone exchange, officials said so that the planned expansion of the system over the next decade can be accommodated.

The new system is not yet fully automated, but a human telephone operator will connect callers to the extensions they need.

After the full system is installed, each extension will have its own direct line. The switchboard operator will still be available to direct calls as necessary.

Lights out

Power was out this morning for "a couple of hundred thousand" customers of Florida Power Corporation all across the state. The problem was most severe for those in the Central Florida area, however, FPC officials said.

According to spokesman Melanie Forbrick, a transmission line was "lost somewhere in the state" causing an underfrequency problem (an extreme voltage sag).

In order to protect the power plants, the system was taken off line, Forbrick said.

Across the state 95 percent of the customers had power restored within several hours. The remaining five percent were in Central Florida and Forbrick believed they would have power before the end of the day.

The power plant in DeBary was taken off line temporarily and a line between DeBary and Longwood was still being worked on late this morning.

Chief residence

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission last night approved a change in the requirements for police chief. With a unanimous vote, the commission approved the addition which specifies that any future chief be required to reside within the city limits of Sanford within six months of an appointment.

The decision was the only change made in requirements, following several months of discussion on whether or not to return to a requirement of a four-year college degree, as opposed to a two-year degree which was changed several years ago.

Historic meeting

SANFORD — The Sanford Historic Preservation Board will meet this Thursday beginning at 4:30 p.m., in the city commission conference room at Sanford City Hall.

Items on the agenda include applications for Certificates of Appropriateness, in both commercial and residential areas, as well as minor review committee actions.

Also scheduled for discussion are the city commission decision regarding the demolition of the log cabin along the lakefront, and the possibility of declaring the Chase Property as a potential historic area.

SANFORD — A formal decision on the future of a number of historic

homes divided into rental apartments in Sanford has again been postponed, this time until Wednesday.

About 19 Sanford residents who live near the various homes owned by Violetta Williams filed the limited seating of the city manager's conference room to hear the discussion.

The homes are located at 611, 615 and 621 Oak Avenue, 738 W. First Street, 210 Laurel Avenue, and 101 W. Ninth Street. The city

Murder probe continues

LONGWOOD — Police believed they had identified a woman whose blood-soaked body was found near a dumpster in Longwood Saturday.

"But it's proven not to be who we thought," said police Chief Greg Manning.

The yet-undecided white female was in her mid to late 20s, and was found in front of a dumpster Saturday morning on Milwee Road near SR-134, across from South Seminole Hospital.

Manning said an autopsy has indicated that death was caused by a gunshot to the mouth.

"We first thought it was the body of a missing Tampa woman," Manning said, "but she has turned up alive." Manning said there are identical scars on the body of both

No serious problems from sloppy weather

SANFORD — The rain simply wouldn't stop. It started in the Sanford area Sunday, and continued throughout the entire day yesterday. Today, the rain has let up, but cold winds continue blowing from the north keeping the wind-chill factor lower than normal.

While there was some street flooding at various locations around the area, the lack of rain in recent weeks allowed the downpour to be absorbed rapidly, and no serious standing-water problems were reported.

Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons said there was some standing water at a few locations in the city. "But even with what was a relatively large amount of rain," he said, "we didn't have to close down any streets."

Simmons said the water problems suffered in past months appear to be easing. "The water level in Lake Monroe is getting back down to normal," he said, "and I believe that will go a long way in preventing any serious flooding in the near future."

Lake Mary apparently had no serious difficulties. "Actually, it's been very calm here in Lake Mary," said that city's Director of Public Works Bill Temby yesterday afternoon. "I imagine there have been some problems, but no serious ones were reported."

Some residents said as bad as the weather was, here in "sunny Florida," it may as well have been snowing.

That's exactly what happened. There was snowfall reported in some of the northern parts of the State late Sunday and early yesterday. "It is unusual, but not unheard of in North Florida," said National Weather Service meteorologist Michael Ehrenberg.

however, was only a few inches deep, and was drained away shortly after the rain ceased.

There were reports of snow flakes in Baker County and in western areas of Jacksonville, said weather service meteorologist Scott Carroll in Miami. Areas around Tallahassee saw a sleet and

rain mixture overnight.

"Certainly no accumulation," Ehrenberg said. "It wasn't more than a bit of wet snowflakes."

Three Amtrak cars derail

CRESTVIEW — Three cars of Amtrak's Sunset Limited derailed in the Florida Panhandle, but no one was injured. The westbound train, which originated in Miami, left the tracks about 4:45 a.m. Monday, about 10 miles east of Crestview but did not overturn, said Amtrak spokesman Ray Lang in Chicago. The train was carrying 160 passengers. "It felt like we were doing 50 miles an hour over a speed bump," said passenger Robert Sturtz of Mobile, Ala., who was heading home from a vacation trip to Orlando. "We heard the bang when the train went off the tracks and we heard the rattle as the wheels were on the ties rather than on the rails," said another passenger, Mike Metlay of Tallahassee. "The train came to a controlled stop. There was never any sensation that we might go over."

The eastbound Sunset Limited arrived in Pensacola about 90 minutes later and its passengers were put on buses for the rest of their trip because the track was blocked by the derailment. That train was turned around and the westbound passengers were put aboard to continue their trip after they were bused to Pensacola.

The cause of the derailment remained under investigation, Lang said.

Gators make a comeback

CHRISTMAS — Alligator farmer Ed Froehlich remembers 30 years ago when raising gators was illegal. The species was thought to be facing extinction because of the demand for leather products from their hides. Today, there's been a comeback in the population in the wild, and he says he can't keep up with demand. Meat is sold for food, and skins mainly are exported. Alligators remain on endangered species lists — classified in Florida as a species of special concern, which is the lowest protected status. They are considered a threatened species by the federal government. With an estimated 1 million wild alligators, state wildlife regulators have been considering removing the reptiles from the protected list. Resurgence may be due partly to the alligator's cunning and partly to the number of farms supplying meat and hides to the market, thus eliminating the need for heavy hunting. Florida has 52 licensed alligator farms, 42 of which are actively farming, said Lt. Tom Quinn of the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. That translates into 120,000 captive gators and about 30,000 harvested annually.

Farm transformed into museum

NEWBERRY — Three generations lived and worked the land, and now after the last of their clan is gone, the pine-planked house and property around it is left as a monument to Florida's agricultural heritage. The Dudley family turned the house and 24 acres over to the state park service to be used as a working farm to teach visitors about the state's agricultural past. Myrtle Elizabeth Dudley, the last of her family to claim a rocker on the front porch, died almost two months ago at age 94. The property had been in her family since the 1850s. She never married and in 1983 turned the land, and its rich sense of history, over to the state with the proviso that she be able to live there until her death. The park service plans to comply with her wishes, after it decides how to manage her gift as well as the 200-plus acres it bought from the family, said Willy Cutts of the park department office at Gainesville in Alachua County, east of here. "Dudley Farm is really going to be an island," said park ranger Sally Morrison, who has lived there nearly eight years and been helping sort through things to separate trash from treasure.

Missing swan leaves many sad

FORT MYERS — A swan who made his home in a neighborhood lake for four years has mysteriously disappeared, leaving behind a forlorn mate who won't take food and won't leave her nest. His name is Tuck, and for four years he lived in residential subdivision's lake, aggressively protective of his partner Patti during mating season. But sometime Saturday night, the 50-pound bird with clipped wings disappeared. Tuck's vanishing has become alarming to residents because now Patti won't leave her nest and seven pearly green eggs, even to eat or drink. Now state wildlife officials may have to intervene to save Patti. "The last time we saw both of them together was about 7 p.m. on Saturday," said Michael Hornung, a Fort Myers lawyer behind whose house Tuck and Patti built an 8-inch-high, 4-foot-wide nest. "They were never apart."

Busting 'big tobacco' could be Gov. Chiles' ultimate legacy

TALLAHASSEE — A little-noticed bill that passed easily in the final hours of the 1994 regular session is turning into the biggest brawl of this year's Legislature. Today, the state says more than \$400 million a year is at stake as it tries to make big tobacco pay the public health costs of treating patients who suffer smoking-related diseases. The tobacco industry, which has hired more than 50 lobbyists, and Associated Industries of Florida, a major business organization, have unleashed a multi-million dollar campaign on TV, in newspapers and in the halls of the Capitol to defeat the law.

Gov. Lawton Chiles is using all his personal and political clout to stop the override of his veto last year of legislation to repeal the tobacco liability law. His supporters have responded with their own lobbying blitz and TV and newspaper ads.

The governor needs 14 votes to block the two-thirds vote needed in the 40-member Senate to override the veto. Twelve senators side with Chiles. At least three others either haven't decided or could change their minds.

A vote could come as early as this week in the state Senate. If Chiles can fend off the vote, his own stature will soar after being grounded last year. It was tarnished when the Senate ousted Jim Towey, Chiles' secretary of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, and thwarted health care reform and other initiatives. "If Lawton Chiles wins this, he becomes the 800-pound gorilla," said Senate Democratic Leader Ken Jenne of Fort Lauderdale, who supports the governor. "He can only go up by winning this battle. By losing it he remains where he is."

Florida is one of at least five states suing tobacco, but it is the only one with a law that strips away the industry's favorite legal defenses.

The law, for instance, prohibits tobacco companies from using the argument that smokers share the blame for their own health problems.

Under the law, Florida can combine thousands of tobacco-related, Medicaid cases over the past five years into one lawsuit, then use statistical analysis to try to prove tobacco was to blame for some of the health problems and costs. The state would not have to call any victims.

Courts also can impose judgments against cigarette makers based on their market share — not their percentage of fault.

"Florida is by far the most complicated state because of those things," said Michael York, spokesman for Philip Morris Co.

Opponents have portrayed the law's reach as going far beyond tobacco. They said it exposes virtually every other business in Florida to legal action on behalf of the state and make an inviting target for trial lawyers.

Chiles said the law is aimed at tobacco only, and he wants legislation to make it apply solely to that industry.

That's not enough for Associated Industries president Jon Shebel.

"He's only governor for three more years, and there's no guarantee that someone else is going to come into office with another pet demon in industry that he or she wants to destroy," he said.

If the Senate overrides the veto, the House is expected to follow suit. The 120-member chamber overwhelmingly voted 102-13 last year to repeal the tobacco law.

"We are trying to assure people that I'm serious about narrowing the law to cover only tobacco," Chiles said Monday. "I feel that we'll be able to do that very quickly when we're able to sustain the veto."

House Speaker Peter Rudy Wallace, who supports the governor, told lawmakers last week that he would write his objections to an override at the bottom of the veto.

An Oldsmobile driven by Latifah Rance Anderson of Bethune Circle in Sanford was one of three vehicles involved in an accident Monday afternoon at about 2:30 at French Avenue and 13th Street. Sanford Police said Winter Springs police officer Robert K. Munshower went through a red light and struck Anderson's vehicle sending it spinning into another car driven by Don Albert Wilson of Sanford. Though several were transported to Central Florida Regional Hospital, none of the injuries were considered serious. Munshower was charged with failure to yield the right of way and with driving with an expired driver license.

Florida group makes waves as it branches across SE

MAITLAND — An organization that makes it easier for Florida banks to handle automatic transactions is making waves as it moves into other Southeast states. The Payment Systems Network Inc., a coalition of 400 Florida financial institutions, has signed bank members in North Carolina and Georgia in a quest to become a regional powerhouse. Similar associations in several other states are unhappy over the competition and are making plans to counter it.

"Historically, there has not been competition between the associations," said Gary Neabitt, executive director of the North Carolina Automated Clearing House Association in Charlotte, N.C. Payment Systems and 39 similar associations in other states help their members participate in an automated clearinghouse created by the Federal Reserve Bank in the early 1970s to centralize rules and procedures.

Jax NAS ranks 10th in toxic emissions

JACKSONVILLE — Jacksonville Naval Air Station ranked 10th in the military's figures on the emission of toxic chemicals, according to a government report.

A total of 325,648 pounds of toxic chemicals were either discharged into the environment or shipped off base for disposal, treatment or storage during 1994, the Defense Department's Toxics Release Inventory released last week said.

The report did not detail how much was released to the environment and how much was shipped out.

Bill Dougherty, a base spokesman, said the Naval Aviation Depot, which uses 93 percent of the base's toxic chemicals, is making strides to reduce its emissions as required by law.

"It's an industrial activity that requires handling toxic materials. But they are aggressively pursuing substitute materials that are not toxic," Dougherty said.

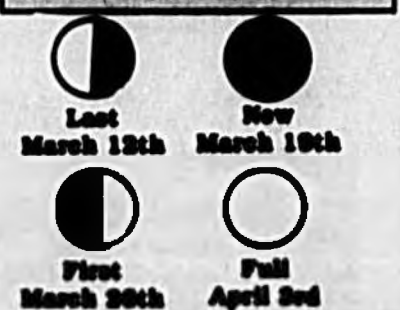

Bike rider

Sheriff's deputies stopped a man seen riding a mountain bike shortly after midnight Sunday, on Howard Avenue in Geneva. They said he had no lights on the bike. During the action however, they said the man gave a false name and identification, and struggled with the officers, kicking one of them.

Deputies eventually determined his identity was Robert Thomas School, 24, of 2520 Willow Avenue in Sanford. He was charged with two counts of battery on a law enforcement officer, two counts of resisting an officer with violence, and one each of resisting an officer without violence, obstruction by a false name, disorderly intoxication, and refusing to sign a citation.

Deputies also learned he was wanted on a warrant for battery, and one for violation of probation on a previous conviction of child abuse.

Lap dancing

Agents of the City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB) arrested eight dancers and eight customers Friday, at the House of Babes, U.S. Highway 17-92 in Fern Park. Each of the suspects was charged with violating the Seminole County adult entertainment ordinance which prohibits physical contact between dancers and customers. CCIB agents said the women were performing lap dances on the men.

According to sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough, this is the largest number of suspects arrested so far this year at the House of Babes nightclub.

QUAD arrests

Members of the Sanford police QUAD-Squad made two arrests Friday as a result of a traffic near the intersection of Celery and Locust in Sanford. Anthony Michael Paparella, 18, of 315 Saddleworth Place, Heathrow, and Curtis G. Fulcher, 18, of 943 Monroe Harbor Place, Sanford, were each charged with possession of under 20 grams of cannabis.

The QUAD-Squad also arrested Elijah June Jr., 18, of 3 Edward Higgins Terrace Friday. Officers said he was located near a railroad track between Sixth and Seventh Streets in Sanford, near Seminole Gardens. He was charged with possession of a controlled substance (marijuana), possession of drug paraphernalia, and resisting an officer without violence. Officers said he was also found to have \$107 in cash on his person, as well as a number of baggies, often used in drug sale activities.

Study: Alcoholics and relapse

CHICAGO — Recovering from alcoholism is similar to recovering from cancer: You need to be symptom-free for five years to be out of danger of relapse, says the author of a new study released today.

The study tracked the lives and drinking of alcohol abusers for 50 years, probably longer than any other study, researchers said.

A surprising finding was that poor, inner-city alcoholics recovered at a higher rate than college-educated upper- or middle-class alcoholics, presumably because the poor drinkers "hit bottom" faster.

"It's hard work to give up alcohol forever, and it helps if you're really hurting, which is hopeful in the sense that people who you wouldn't think would recover do," said the study's author, Dr. George E. Vaillant of Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston.

Vaillant's findings were published in the March issue of the American Medical Association's Archives of General Psychiatry, a theme issue on alcoholism.

Vaillant studied 724 men, all originally recruited as healthy youths during the late 1930s and early 1940s by researchers who were exploring topics other than alcoholism but who also gathered data on alcohol abuse.

The subjects were 456 adolescents from inner-city Boston and 268 Harvard University sophomores.

Of the 129 inner-city youths who eventually became alcohol abusers, 37 percent had achieved sobriety for three or more years by the time the study ended, when they were 60.

Of the 52 college-educated men who eventually became alcohol abusers, only 19 percent achieved sobriety of three years

or longer by study's end, when they were 70.

"The good news is that a lot of alcoholics make stable recoveries, in the same way people do from cigarette smoking, and the bad news is that a lot die young from alcoholism," Vaillant said.

One-quarter of the inner-city abusers were dead by age 60, and 18 percent of the college-educated abusers were dead by that age.

Of the men who achieved sobriety, 40 percent did so through Alcoholics Anonymous, their biggest source of help in recovery.

Among both the poor and rich, relapse was rare after five years of sobriety. But it was common after only two years of sobriety. Fifty-six abusers overall achieved two years of sobriety, and 41 percent of them, or 23 men, relapsed.

Vaillant said alcoholism recovery should be thought of similar to cancer recovery: Five years of living symptom-free before relapse is considered unlikely. Many researchers have measured recovery at six months or a year, he said.

Researchers not involved in the work praised the findings.

Dr. Daniel H. Angrea, director of addiction medicine at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center in Chicago, said five years of sobriety is an increasingly common standard used by state licensing boards in allowing alcoholic health professionals to resume practice.

The new study appears to be the longest ever done, Jasinski and Angrea said.

Get out and vote today

Today is "Super Tuesday." On this day, every four years, the citizens turn out to voice their opinions about who should become the next president of the United States.

Actually, the voters select the person who will represent the respective political parties during the national conventions. For today, the only opposition is in the Republican camp, therefore Democrats don't have to vote, at least on this issue.

Individual states hold their political primaries for several reasons. The most important of course, is to gain party support for the nomination of a particular candidate. Another reason is to let the rest of the nation know which way our people stand regarding the issues by the votes given to candidates with certain political beliefs or promises.

It should be noted that while Seminole County is only involved in the presidential primary today, other areas have added local referendum items or local government elections.

Therefore, for those living in other counties, don't stay away from the polls just because you are not a Republican. Voters in Orange County for example, are to make a decision on whether or not they want home rule when it comes to making decisions about casino gambling. The county wants control even if the state eventually decides to allow it.

For those in Seminole County, this Orange County item is going to be interesting. Seminole County is preparing a similar home-rule referendum and if it is approved, our residents may be voting on that this November.

Thus we find this election is most important: For some, to get out and vote. For others, to pay attention to the results.

Don't look at voting in this primary as a waste of time. Certainly, it will not officially determine who will be our next president, but it will go a long way toward helping someone get to that point.

If every eligible voter doesn't at least try to make his or her voice count, then we won't be giving the rest of the nation the true story of how we feel.

The polls will be open until 7 p.m. tonight. Get out and vote. It's the American thing to do today.

Property tax relief

In 1992, the Tax Reform Commission recommended that our Constitution be amended to provide for a taxpayers' bill of rights. The people enthusiastically adopted that amendment in the election that year. In the Legislature, we responded by preparing just such a bill of rights for taxpayers of state taxes. So far, we have failed to do anything for property taxpayers.

I am the principal sponsor of a bill that takes the first step in providing for rights for property taxpayers. More than 90 of my House colleagues have joined with me in sponsoring this legislation.

The legislation simply says anyone who wants to dispute the value set on their property by county appraisers has to prove to a judge that their valuation is more correct than the appraiser's. The legal term is "preponderance of the evidence." It means that the majority of the evidence is on your side.

Presently, it is almost impossible for property taxpayers to successfully challenge an erroneous imposition of taxes. By pure happenstance, a number of court decisions that were never intended to be applied broadly are now being used by some of our tax assessors, making it almost impossible for property owners to succeed in challenging overassessments. The present rule requires a challenger to prove that there is no possible way that the assessors value could be right.

The property appraiser's decision would still be presumed to be correct. The taxpayer would have to prove, through a preponderance of the evidence, that the property appraiser had assessed the property incorrectly. This test, which has obviously worked well for federal taxes and other state taxes, insures that taxpayers will be successful only when they can prove that they are right and the property appraiser is wrong. The property appraisers will still have the edge, but taxpayers who have been unfairly treated will now have a chance at fair treatment.

Generally, the tax assessors are resisting this change. They argue that millions of tax dollars may be lost. Those are tax dollars that, in some cases, should never have been imposed in the first place.

Choosing life, choosing death

PALO ALTO, Calif. — It's been nearly six years since Janet Adkins, a lover of music and mountain climbing, traveled to Michigan for a back-alley suicide.

Afraid of losing her mind to Alzheimer's disease, the Oregon woman climbed into a van that Jack Kevorkian had driven to a park north of Detroit. There, after saying thank you, she pushed a button that released a lethal drug into her body.

At the time Dr. Jack was an obscure pathologist, a self-described "obituarist" who believed in experimenting on death-row inmates and who advocated a chain of suicide clinics. Death with dignity was still a matter of "pulling the plug," not assisting suicide.

At that time, too, Gerald Klooster, a California obstetrician and gynecologist, had not yet exhibited the unmistakable signs of the disease he shared with Janet Adkins.

But in 1993, a small item in a California newspaper reported that Dr. Klooster had become lost and confused on his way home from choir practice. He was found sitting in his car two days later.

In 1995, his wife Ruth made an appointment with Kevorkian for a November "consultation." Before that appointment could be kept, Chip

Klooster abducted his father to his home in Michigan and became the first son to sue for custody.

Now in some odd symmetry, Jack Kevorkian and Gerald Klooster are both sharing the legal spotlight.

Dr. Jack was on trial in Michigan — again — for his role in the death of two more painfully ill men. He was found not guilty last week. Dr. Klooster meanwhile is the bewildered subject of a custody dispute between two factions of his family and between two states, Michigan and California, that have taken opposite sides, each legally claiming him for their own.

He's in a public dispute, as well, between two

points of view. Whether the son kidnapped or rescued the father. Whether the elder's rights have been violated or his life has been saved.

There are some 4 million Americans diagnosed with Alzheimer's. That's 4 million Americans who know that they will, sooner or later, lose their minds like a set of keys. If the "I" in identity is located in the mind, they will become mindless.

This reality casts the issues of death with dignity and even suicide — assisted or not — in a far different framework. How do you determine your own fate? Should you?

This cruel disease that takes your self before it takes your life offers chilling dilemmas. Do I as person of sound mind have the moral right to decide the fate of the person I would become? I may not want to live as that person, but that person — my future self — may want to live.

What should the appeals court do with Dr. Klooster? Send him home to California. Every member of his warring family now agrees, in a supreme irony, that he is no longer rational enough to choose suicide.

This is the moral fix we are in: A man is sentenced to life because he no longer has enough of that organ of consent — the brain — to choose death.

Armev uses Dem ploy to raise funds

WASHINGTON — When his hometown Dallas Cowboys recently visited the White House to celebrate their Super Bowl victory, House Majority Leader Dick Armev lived up to his brash Texan reputation.

"I'm certain the Cowboys will be at the White House next year," Armev said in a statement. "But I doubt they'll find President Clinton there."

In a recent fund-raising letter, however, Armev sounded more like a coward than a cowboy. And he was much less confident about his party's chances of keeping control of Congress than he was about putting a Republican in the White House.

Armev's three-page pitch reads more like a desperate plea penned by televangelist Oral Roberts than the musings of a macho man who has preached about how the "politics of confrontation works."

Back in 1987, Roberts told his television audience that God was going to "call him home" unless he raised millions of dollars in a couple of months.

Likewise, Armev told supporters that he was headed for political purgatory unless they injected fast cash into his coffers. "I need to raise \$67,895 in three weeks so I can gear up my campaign to respond to national Democrats' outrageous attacks," Armev wrote last month. "The stakes are incredibly high. ... I need your help immediately."

"You and I must meet our opposition on a level playing field," Armev wrote. "That means my campaign needs the money to fight whomever they send against us."

Who is this 800-pound gorilla that Democrats are hoping will unseat the second most powerful man in the House? He's Dr. Jerry Frankel, a 53-year-old urologist, who says he's raised a grand total of \$200. In December, Armev had more than \$700,000 in campaign cash, and he has won his past three elections with at least 70 percent of the vote — hardly a "level playing field" for Frankel.

"I'm flattered to hear he's in trouble," Frankel told our associate Ed Henry. "I didn't even know he knew that I exist."

An Armev spokesman told us the letter was an example of "democracy in action" because it showed that his boss is collecting small contributions. He said "the other side is highly motivated" and Armev "can't leave anything to chance."

In reality, Armev is using a tactic perfected by the Democrats during their 40-year reign in the House of Representatives: Incumbents raise gobs of money early in the election season as a way of scaring away potential contributors to their opponents. The GOP used to ridicule this tactic when Democrats were in control. Now they've raised it to new heights.

Frankel told us he's spent about \$400 so far for buttons and bumper stickers. As a practicing doctor, he's running on a plan to radically restructure the health care system. He even crafted a motto to help create interest: "Together we can move mountains; together we can have health and prosperity for all Americans."

But what about that help from national Democrats that Armev is so scared of? Frankel admits that he did attend one meeting with the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. He was advised to shove his motto down to two or three words, so now it's: "People First."

In addition to his huge campaign war chest, Armev's separate leadership PAC is bulging with \$421,800 from special interests.

If you can't help, don't hinder

Family members and society: If you can't support addicts, don't hinder them.

Sometimes I don't think recovering addicts (whether they are recovering from drugs or alcohol) are given the credit, encouragement, love and support of family members or society they deserve and need.

We as family members and as a society may not realize what recovering addicts are going through, and some of us won't or don't take the time to find out or take the time to care. Some of us are so self-centered/self-righteous that we have no room in our lives for others who are finally trying to put their lives in order.

In trying to put their lives in order and trying to stay clean, recovering addicts experience some very difficult times. Admitting to themselves and others that they are addicts is very difficult for them. How many of us think that we could admit to ourselves that we have let drugs or alcohol become the controller of our lives. Most of us don't want to admit it when we are wrong and some of us won't. To recovering addicts, this must be a very frustrating and devastating thing to admit — to finally realize they have allowed drugs and/or alcohol to control their bodies and minds.

Acknowledging that in order for them to function, they had to have conquered the desire for one or the other, or both, is the recovering addict's first major step. After getting over this devastating acknowledgment, they can begin to wonder what is it that they can do and where can they go for help to start putting their lives in order. Some of them will be like some of us — hating to admit that there are times in our lives we need help, and then when we do finally realize it, we are too ashamed to ask for it. They begin to wonder if there is any hope in straightening out their lives.

We don't realize the shame and humiliation they must feel in asking for this kind of help. It must make them feel they will be putting their entire lives on display for the whole world to see. This being the lowest point in their lives, they fail to realize the pride they should be feeling in showing they have accepted their faults and are now willing to make a change. They want to do something positive, meaningful and constructive with their lives. They have reached that crossroad in their lives and are now willing to take the right road.

Thank God for the recovering addicts and the vast majority of professional people in our society who realize that recovering addicts need someone to give them encouragement and help. Some of these addicts had the foresight to start organizations such as Alcohol Anonymous (A.A.) and Narcotics Anonymous (N.A.). These organizations aren't institutionalized. The recovering addicts go of their own free will. They attend meetings with their peers. These people give each other the

strength, encouragement and love that is needed. They are caring, unselfish people. Many of them have traveled the road of addiction and recovery that a lot of recovering addicts are just now beginning to travel. They care about their fellow man. They are there to give new recovering addicts the support they will need to complete the steps in starting and maintaining a life from drugs and alcohol. These recovering addicts and professional people realize that we, as family members and as a society, are so self-centered/self-righteous and unforgiving, that most of the recovering addicts wouldn't have anyone to turn to while trying to get their lives back in order.

Recovering addicts are no different from the rest of us except that they found a more damaging way to put their lives on hold.

Addicts, like the rest of us, have some deep-rooted problems. We are resentful, we have insecurities, past experiences that we haven't let go. Some of us have been hurt so badly in our lives we are afraid to be loving and caring people.

Recovering addicts have to do a lot of soul-searching. They have to go into their inner selves to be able to find out the cause of their deep-rooted problems. There are different steps in the N.A. and A.A. that have to be completed in order for them to reach a clean, drug or alcohol-free life. These aren't easy steps. Some are more difficult than others. The soul-searching, recognizing their faults, realizing they have done some very disgusting things, realizing there are some things they really don't like about themselves, are probably some of the most difficult ideas to accept.

If you are one of the people who they have hurt at one time or another before they decided to clean their lives up, if and when they come to ask for your forgiveness, then find it in your heart to forgive them. If they are sincere about apologizing, then accept it. If they want to talk to you about it, then give them a listening ear. You don't know the difference you will make in helping them on their road to recovery.

If you feel in your heart that you can forgive them, then let them know or just ask them to give you a little time to come to terms with the situation. This is all you have to say. You don't have to go back into the past and drag up all the unpleasant things.

construct a major facility on airport property at the intersection of Mellonville Avenue and E. 26th Street. It has been touted as providing a healthy increase in local employment, and as a major new industry in the area.

During Monday afternoon's Sanford City Commission work session, Steve Coover, attorney for the Sanford Airport Authority, presented a proposed resolution to the city for consideration.

A previous resolution passed by the city, allows the city to revoke its delegation of authority to the Sanford Aviation Authority. Coover indicated that Hill Dermaceutical was concerned over the possibility of the city, some day, taking back the airport. He said the people providing the financing for the construction were concerned over the lack of an assurance for a long term commitment by this ordinance.

Last year, the city passed a special resolution to regard to the financing for construction of the new international arrivals terminal at the airport. Coover said this is a similar situation. "Nothing here is different."

Coover explained, "except it's a different lease."

The proposal however, had not been given to the commissioners in advance, with copies only handed out during the commission work session meeting. The lack of advance information disturbed commissioner Lon Howell.

"It seems to me all you attorneys have had a chance to go over this," Howell said, "but no one told us about it, and that disturbs me."

Coover reiterated that he was representing airport officials, and admitted that he felt uncomfortable bringing this presentation before the commission at the last minute. "It's not the airport authority or Hill Dermaceuticals doing this," he explained, "but it's assurance the bonding and finance people want on this."

During the regular commission meeting, further discussion took place, with City Attorney Bill Colbert explaining that because of the earlier approval of non-disturbance granted by the city for the international arrival terminal last December, the commission could expect these requests to come up again in the future.

"I just don't like this being brought up at the 12th hour," commented Commissioner Bob Thomas, "no matter what the rationale may be."

Commissioner Kerry Lyons finally moved to approve the resolution.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein seconded the motion, but commented, "My objection isn't with Hill Dermaceuticals," he said, "but with the airport authority, which changed the name of the airport without even consulting the city."

The change, approved by the Sanford Aviation Authority several months ago, was to change the name from Central Florida Regional Airport to Orlando Sanford Airport.

Eckstein continued, "I see that as a slap in the face. We pick the members of the advisory board, but they didn't even ask us about that change. Now they want us to approve this resolution."

The vote in favor of the resolution was four to one, with Commissioner Howell voting against it.

"I don't think we should hold back development because of personal feelings," observed Mayor Bettye Smith.

believes they are being used as apartments, without proper licenses, and have been found in violation of a number of fire and safety codes.

During the Sanford City Commission meeting on Feb. 26, commissioners gave Williams until March 8 to have the structures brought back into acceptable condition. It was clearly stated at that meeting, that if the buildings were found to still be in non-conformance, they would be closed through action at the March 11 commission meeting.

During last night's work session however, the commission postponed the matter again, calling for a special commission meeting to be held this Wednesday afternoon beginning at 3:30.

At the work session, Director of Community Development Charles Rowe, building inspector Dan Florian, Fire Inspector Vince Fioretti, who had spent almost the entire day inspecting the homes, gave their reports.

Regarding having too many units, Rowe explained that the property at 612 Park Avenue is licensed for four units but has six. "I believe four are in the

main building," he said, "but two of them are in a separate building, and no license is needed for a duplex, so that probably answers that matter."

At 621 Oak, Rowe said there were four units licensed but five in use.

"At 621 Oak," he continued, "there are apparently seven units, but Ms. Williams lives in one of them and uses another for an office, so there are probably only five units, although the structure is licensed for four."

Fire Inspector Fioretti explained his checking for fire codes, reporting that some problems he found during an earlier inspection had been resolved, but that he noted a few new problems during Monday's inspection.

Commissioner Lon Howell however, continued his drive to have all of the structures closed. "She is non-conforming," he said, "and the buildings are not safe. They should be closed out."

Howell continued, "What if they burn down tonight and we haven't done anything and people are killed? The way I look at it, this is our responsibility. For that building at 621 Park, I believe it's our obligation to ask

made the payments, though Hunter told one resident he didn't want to answer when she heard the question being posed.

Williams said she believed the neighbors had a "vendetta" against her sister because she rented to Hispanic farm workers and others who were down on their luck.

Neighbors have complained Williams' tenants have verbally threatened and harassed them, and that a drunken tenant rammed into neighbors' cars, damaging them and almost hitting two children and an adult, before escaping into one of the apartments.

Howell alluded to the statement made two weeks earlier to have a definite decision made during this week's meeting. "We said to have the buildings brought up to code," he said, "if not, move 'em out. It's time this city started taking a stand in such matters."

Mayor Bettye Smith appeared reluctant to make a formal decision without input from the city attorney, who was not on hand for the work session. "I realize this has become a rather emotional issue," she said, "but I hesitate to take any action without hearing from our attorney regarding the legal rights of Ms. Williams and the city."

Mayor Smith suggested a special meeting be held on this single subject, and initially suggested it be called for this afternoon (Tuesday), with attorneys on hand representing both sides. After further discussion, it was deemed more practical to have the meeting beginning at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday afternoon. The meeting will be held in the city manager's conference room on the second floor of city hall.

Mounting pressure to surrender

With Bob Dole poised to claim a commanding majority in today's seven-state primaries and secure his lock on the Republican presidential nomination, his nearly crippled challengers face mounting pressure to surrender.

But all signs showed Pat Buchanan and Steve Forbes digging in for a long fight, even as polls in the "Super Tuesday" states put them at long odds for winning many — if any — of the 382 convention delegates at stake.

"We're going all the way to San Diego. That decision has been made. That issue is closed," Buchanan said Monday night, referring to this summer's Republican national nominating convention.

Forbes said from Florida, "I'm in for the duration."

Gingrich advises lawmakers

WASHINGTON — Setting out a political strategy for the year, Speaker Newt Gingrich is telling Republican lawmakers to cast the 1996 election as a "choice between America and Washington" — with the GOP on the side of America.

"We are working toward common sense solutions that are outside the mainstream only to those in Washington," Gingrich wrote as part of a "strategic plan" he recently presented to lawmakers of his party and congressional aides.

Other election-year themes identified by Gingrich include emphasizing "the failing Clinton economy" and seeking to raise doubts about the president's character. "We need a president with integrity who can provide real, consistent leadership," he wrote in the outline, a copy of which was made available to The Associated Press.

In Gingrich's model, lawmakers are urged to depict themselves not as "purely political leaders" but as "community leaders who do politics and legislation," on the theory that for most Americans, politics is a matter of relatively small importance.

GM has plenty of cars to sell

DAYTON, Ohio — General Motors Corp. says it has plenty of cars to sell despite a strike that has forced the shutdown of more than half of the automaker's North American assembly plants.

But analysts cautioned that the world's largest automaker could lose millions of dollars if the strike at two brake plants here continues. In all, about 60,000 workers have been idled.

GM had an 82-day supply of cars at the end of February and a 78-day supply of trucks. Generally, a 60-day supply is considered ideal.

"Inventory-wise, we're in a pretty good position," said GM spokesman Tom Klipstine. "It's higher than normal."

Clinton heads for summit in Egypt

WASHINGTON — Pledging to "combat the merchants of hatred with every means at our command," President Clinton was leaving for the multi-nation summit in Egypt today to search for ways to restore a bomb-shattered peace in Israel.

"We must not let the terrorists in the Middle East have the victory they seek: the death of the very hope for peace," he told an Irish-American audience in New York on Monday. "I ask for your prayers."

He spoke about the Mideast summit even as he was being honored as the "Irish American of the Year" for his peace-making efforts in Northern Ireland — a peace that also was disrupted by recent bombings in London.

"The willingness of peacemakers in this world (better than) the strongest, the bullets or bombs," said Clinton, his voice scratchy from a cold. "The will of the people for peace is much more powerful than the impulse for division."

Squeaky wheel syndrome

WASHINGTON — Army veteran Brian T. Martin says it was only the "squeaky wheel syndrome" that got him through the Veterans Affairs bureaucracy and won him compensation for Gulf War-related illnesses.

Martin, 33, of Niles, Mich., told a House panel Monday how, five years after the end of the Gulf War, he is one of just three veterans receiving 100 percent disability for health problems resulting from Gulf service.

He told the House Government Reform and Oversight subcommittee that he saw movement on his case only after Michigan congressmen came to his aid and he got publicity in the media.

"I am not here today highlighted as a trophy case of window dressing for the VA," Martin said. "I am here today because of the problems I have had with the VA, which is still happening to this day."

America Online hooks up with AT&T

WASHINGTON — America Online Inc. is linking up with AT&T Corp.'s new Internet service and with Netscape Communications Corp., maker of the popular Internet browser software.

Netscape's Navigator "browser" program will become an integral part of the software America Online distributes to its subscribers and will be integrated with GNN, AOL's Internet-only access service.

Separately, subscribers to AT&T's WorldNet Internet access service will be able to easily reach America Online at a reduced rate, which wasn't announced. The AOL link to AT&T rolls out later this summer, and it won't be included in this week's launch of the new AT&T Internet service.

"This is the first integrated consumer offer between a leading on-line service and a major telecommunications provider offering Internet access," AT&T chairman Robert E. Allen said in a statement Monday.

Steve Case, chairman and chief executive of America Online, said the venture will help it reach the 89 percent of U.S. households who do not subscribe to an online service. AOL's software will be distributed with the AT&T Worldnet software, officials said.

With Netscape, AOL will gain a presence on Netscape's heavily used World Wide Web site, which could attract even more users. The two companies also plan to create information and entertainment opportunities they can jointly promote and draw advertisers.

A browser program allows users to easily find and manipulate text, graphic or photographs on the World Wide Web.

Foreign trade deficit second worst in 1995

WASHINGTON — The deficit in the broadest measure of U.S. foreign trade increased to \$152.92 billion last year, the second worst performance in history, even though it improved in the final three months of 1995.

The 1.1 percent rise in the current account deficit reflected a huge jump in the imbalance in goods and the second straight annual deficit in investment flows. The United States is now the world's largest debtor country and must pay the interest on its debt to foreigners.

The current account is considered the broadest gauge of America's trade performance because it measures not only trade in goods and services, reflected in the government's

monthly report, but also investment flows between countries and foreign aid.

The small increase in 1995, up from a 1994 deficit of \$151.2 billion, marked the fourth straight year the deficit has widened — although the pace of the increase slowed sharply.

The Clinton administration, which has made foreign trade a key element of its foreign policy, has argued that more than 140 market-opening trade deals negotiated since President Clinton took office will help to boost U.S. exports and narrow the deficit in coming years.

Bolstering that view, the deficit for the October-December quarter showed a sharp 22.8 percent improvement, narrowing to \$31.07 billion from a third quarter deficit of \$40.25 billion. The fourth quarter deficit was the lowest quarterly imbalance

since a \$30.3 billion deficit in the third quarter of 1994.

Private economists believe that the country has turned the corner on trade, and next year better growth in major U.S. markets such as Europe should help to boost American exports.

Before 1982, the United States ran perennial surpluses in its current account as its earnings on service trade, such as tourism and consultant fees, were enough to wipe out the deficit in merchandise trade.

But in the 1980s, the United States was transformed from the world's largest creditor nation to the largest debtor country. That means that foreigners now own more in U.S. assets than Americans own abroad.

For years the problem did not show up on the bottom line as American investments overseas earned a higher rate of return,

and the investment portion of the current account remained positive in America's favor.

However, in 1994, the investment flows turned negative for the first time, subtracting \$9.27 billion from the current account. The investment deficit rose another 23 percent in 1995 to \$11.4 billion. Analysts said with the level of foreign holdings in the United States, that investment figure should continue to worsen in coming years.

In addition to the rise in the investment deficit, the merchandise deficit was up 5 percent to a record \$174.47 billion.

Offsetting those increases, America's surplus in service trade such as tourism rose to \$63.05 billion, also an all-time high. The final category, which includes U.S. foreign aid payments, dropped 15.8 percent to \$30.10 billion.

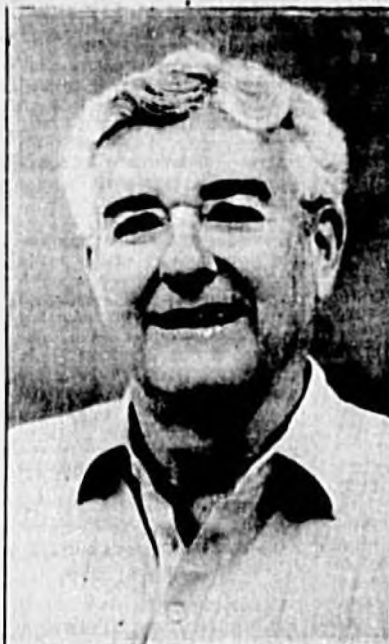

With a schedule as busy as Laver's he actually has little time for relaxation. Yet, when he does take a breather he enjoys studying computers and business principles.

Beauty of dogwood adds to landscape

You can spot a flowering dogwood in your neighborhood very easily, the trees are now in full bloom and have a beautiful white color. Actually, the flowers are small with a greenish-yellow color, surrounded by four large white bracts. Pink dogwood cultivars exist in northern areas, but they do not grow well in Central Florida because here they do not get enough hours of chilling temperatures.

The tree is native to the eastern half of the United States. In Florida, it grows well in north Florida and the northern section of Central Florida. They can grow 15 to 25 feet tall, and 15 to 25 feet wide. The tree can be grown in full sun or partial shade, but shaded trees will be less dense, grow more quickly and tend to have poor fall color. In this area, the trees perform best in partial shade. The leaves are deciduous, opposite and medium green in spring and summer, then red and gold in the fall. The fruits are red, about 1/2 inch long and are borne in terminal clusters in the fall. Birds frequently eat them but are not considered edible for humans.

Used as a specimen, the dogwood is a tree of extreme beauty because of the different colors it takes during the seasons. It requires fertile, slightly acid and well-drained soils high in organic matter and may require additional irrigation during the drier months of the year.

Establishment: Container grown trees can be transplanted anytime. Make sure that the transplanting hole is larger than the root ball and the tree is planted at the same depth it was in the container. Water trees frequently during the first months after transplanting, preferably every 7 to 10 days and to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. Fertilization with one pound of 16-4-8 annually is sufficient for a tree with a stem diameter greater than one inch. The fertilizer should be placed evenly under the canopy of the tree and should be watered immediately to incorporate into the soil. Mulch is recommended to preserve moisture and control weeds, but the mulch should not be in contact with the main trunk.

Pests: Several insect borers will damage dogwood trees. Symptoms of borer damage are holes in the trunk, leaves smaller than normal, and dieback of the crown. Twig borer will induce leaves on small branches to wilt. They can be controlled by pruning infested twigs below the affected area and destroying the wood to kill the larvae. Insect galls are

produced near the tips of young shoots during late spring or early summer. The leaves on affected shoots may be distorted and the branch may fall to form a flower bud. Control this insect by pruning out the galls before the mature insect emerges from the gall. Scale insects can do some damage; use a dormant oil spray to control them. Leaf miners produce blister-like lesions on the underside of the leaves. Aphids also affect dogwood trees, a strong stream of water with a garden hose can be sufficient to control this insect.

Diseases: Anthracnose is by far the most important disease of dogwood trees in the United States. The disease was first reported here in 1978 and since then, it has caused serious losses in the south. Symptoms begin with small leaf spots with purple borders that eventually develop into large tan spots. Infection begins in leaves and spreads to twigs and branches. Main stem infections cause cankers which kill the trees. Wet sites and higher elevations predispose the plants to more serious infections. Mulching, pruning, and watering during droughts help in controlling this disease. Fungicides can be used to control the disease on highly valued trees. The disease kills dogwoods of all sizes, but it is especially severe on young seedlings. Cool, wet weather in spring and fall contribute to the severity of the disease. Trees growing in full shade are often more affected than trees growing in full sun.

Other diseases of dogwood are crown canker, flower and leaf blight, leaf spots caused by several fungi and powdery mildew.

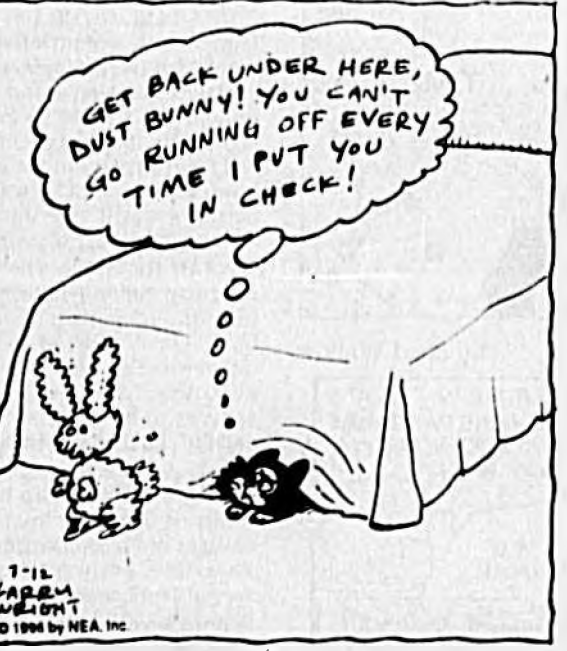

Back surgery may be unnecessary

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 55-year-old female with spondylolisthesis of the spine. I have a displacement of the vertebra between 4 and 5. My doctor indicates I should be careful lifting objects. Is it 100 percent given that I will need surgery in the future? If not, how can I avoid it? I want to remain active, yet will give up any physical activity necessary to protect my spine.

DEAR READER: The tongue-twisting term "spondylolisthesis" means that one or more of your vertebral bones is displaced. The cause is unknown. The affliction is diagnosed by X-rays. In your case, the problem appears to be centered on the fourth and fifth lumbar vertebrae.

In its mild form, spondylolisthesis is not a hazard to health but can cause recurring back pain from spasm as the muscles try to compensate for slippage. Therefore, early treatment includes special exercises and physical therapy.

More severe forms can cause nerve compression, leading to sciatica (pain in the buttocks and legs).

In such instances, corrective surgery may be necessary.

Your doctor has properly cautioned you against lifting, because your back is "unstable" and this activity could initiate painful muscle spasms.

The degree of restriction is up to you. I advise you to be sensible about your activities but limit them only if your back hurts. In other words, your back will tell you what not to do.

If you learn to "live with" your back problem and undergo physical therapy, you probably won't need surgery. However, in the event that your problem progresses to cause nerve injury, you'll have to reconsider your options.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My granddaughter went to a dermatologist because of skin that felt like sandpaper. The doctor said her pores were closed. Do we accept this or should we get a second opinion and, if so, what is the condition called?

DEAR READER: There are several skin conditions that can disrupt or plug the skin's pores. Some, such as keratosis (dry skin) are treatable with moisturizing creams; others, such as ichthyosis ("fish skin") are inherited and untreatable.

I suggest that you hold off on a second opinion until your granddaughter's dermatologist has had a chance to prescribe topical therapy (to relieve the roughness and soften the skin). If the treatment is ineffective, you can

check. The cause is unknown, but some authorities believe that the neuralgia occurs when blood vessels press on the nerve.

The diagnosis is quite evident, because of the typical location and nature of the pain. No one knows why trigeminal neuralgia is more common in patients with multiple sclerosis, a chronic neurological affliction.

Along with analgesics, the anti-convulsant carbamazepine usually reduces the severity of the pain and the frequency of attacks.

However, resistant cases may require surgery to release pressure on the nerve or to inactivate it.

In my opinion, patients with this condition should be under the care of neurologists.

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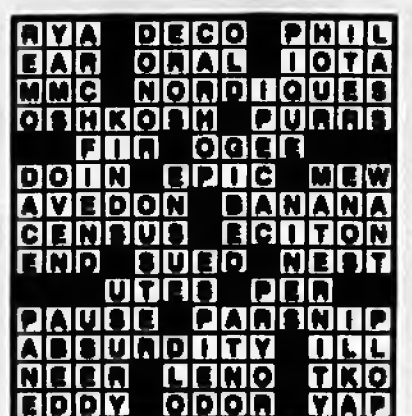

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WIN AT BRIDGE

After you. No, after you.

John Maynard Keynes, the famous English economist who pioneered the theory of full employment, wrote, "The avoidance of taxes is the only pursuit that still carries any reward." Unless you are caught, of course.

In bridge, there is an avoidance play. You maneuver so as to keep a particular opponent off the lead. In today's deal, though, declarer wants to avoid playing a particular suit. He doesn't want to lead it from hand or from dummy, but instead to get the opponents to lead it for him.

Playing in four hearts, South starts with nine tricks: five hearts, three diamonds and one club. If the opposing

diamonds split 3-3, the 10th trick will come from that suit. But otherwise a spade trick must be generated. If forced to play the suit himself, South should start with dummy's queen, hoping that East either doesn't cover with his honor or has both honors. (As West didn't lead a top spade, he cannot have both the ace and king.) Yet, if only the defenders would lead a spade...

South won the first trick with the club ace, drew trumps and played on diamonds. When East showed up with four, South ruffed dummy's last diamond in his hand before exiting with the club four.

Whichever opponent won the trick had an unavoidable, unappetizing choice. If he led a spade, declarer would play second-hand low to guarantee a trick in the suit. And if he led a club, declarer would discard a spade from hand and ruff in the dummy. Either way, South had his 10th trick.
