

# St. Johns Upsets Florida Powermen; Lemmond Is Winner

## Reel - St. Johns, Lemmond, Kilgore To Play Tomorrow

St. Johns softball team pulled a decided upset last night by defeating the highly rated Florida Power and Light club 13 to 1 in the second game of a doubleheader at the lake front diamond which saw Lemmond's classy outfit continue their winning ways with a 14 to 5 victory over Osceola.

There are no games tonight but tomorrow there is a doubleheader with Reels and St. Johns tangling in the first game and Lemmond and Kilgore mixing it up in the second. The games will start at 7:30 o'clock.

Some of the glory for the St. Johns win must be taken away because a couple of Florida Power's most valuable players were unable to play, thereby necessitating several shifts in the lineup and injections of substitute players.

However, St. Johns must be given due credit for playing heads-up ball. They garnered the lead off three Power's pitchers, meanwhile Johnny Cooke let the Power team down with three hits, two of which he gave up in the first inning.

Florida Power got their only run in the first frame. Cordell singled and went to third on an error but Kinlaw singled to left field to bring him across the plate.

St. Johns rushed two runs

across the plate in the first inning and it was not until the fifth frame that they were able to hit the real offensive that sent them drive seven runs home. They added four more in the sixth for their total of 13.

Robert Howell paced the St. Johns outfit at the plate with a double and single-out of four times up. The Florida Power team committed six miscues to aid the St. Johns club in racking up their score. St. Johns was guilty of two errors.

The first game between Osceola and Lemmond provided plenty of excitement with the Lemmond team finally running away after the third inning.

Osceola scored its five runs, four in the second and one in the fifth. Lemmond pushed two runs across in the first, two in the second, one in the third, seven in the fourth and two in the fifth. Bylisma pitching for Osceola permitted 14 hits while Williams and Swofford for Lemmond gave up three, one coming off Swofford and two off Williams.

Leading batters for Lemmond were Krider who banged out four singles, and Cole with one hit out of two times up.

## Writer Praises Florida Gators After Defeat Of Boston College

GAINESVILLE, Oct. 18.—University of Florida's football victory over Boston College was summed up by Arthur Siegel in the Boston Herald when he wrote that Florida gave "the Eagles a lesson in tactics." R. C. Siegel wrote, "was out-hustled all afternoon and they were out-determined, if there is a word like that. And not since No. 11 brought his centenary team to Boston to play—some of the boys never saw a football—has a team of youngsters ever shown more knowledge of the more advanced theory of defensive football."

Between the halves of the game Florida presented an all-out attack to Boston College. During the halves the Florida team presented Boston College with opportunities. The Gators also presented the Eagles with a defeat and with a football lesson in fundamentals, especially in defensive play, and also with a severe headache. And the Eagles learned to their distress that these Gators knew how to play football; were tough, fast, and slick.

Referring to B. C.'s five big scoring opportunities, Siegel wrote: "It was almost tragic the way Boston College would cross into Gator territory, come so close that they could spit into the end zone and then find themselves back down the field. For these Floridians may be young, but they must have started playing football at an early age. Defensively, they were immense.

"They would apparently pick

any number from five to eight, for their defensive line arrangements and a guard by the name of 'Mush' Battista would be the floater. If Battista is any relative of the gentleman in Cuba, it's easy to understand why Battista runs that tight little republic.

"Mush is not a towering young man; being built more on compact lines. He does everything but play roving reporter. Some of his stuff savors of the showboat variety but he is a fight-talking player and he can play football. So the Eagles would look up and call for a play against those openings presented by a five-man line and when the interference started rolling there would be no hole and the interference was piling into one another.

"Then again the Gators had a long, hungry-looking left end, a 20-year old fledgling from Stuart, Fla., named Forest Ferguson. Granting that 'only God can make a tree', the Fenway Park made 'Forest' Ferguson couldn't have been bothering the Eagles more if they had owed him money. He refused to be blocked out of plays and he was always taking care of plays in his area. By the time he becomes a senior he really should know something about football."

## Council Is Named For Administering Compensation Law

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 18.—The appointment of a State Advisory Council to aid in the administration of the Unemployment Compensation Law was announced today by Harold C. Wall, chairman of the Florida Industrial Commission.

Upon the recommendation of Governor Cone, the Commission appointed the following persons, all of whom have signified their intention of accepting: Vernon Bronson, Miami; M. D. Lambert, Pensacola; T. J. Davis of Jacksonville; W. E. McMillan, Perry; R. O. Riddle, Jacksonville, and W. P. Smith of St. Johns as employer representatives; Mrs. Thurston Robert, Jacksonville; William T. Bates, Lake City; J. M. Sikes, Fort White and E. G. Kilpatrick Jr., of Pahokee to represent the public.

An advisory council is provided for in the Unemployment Compensation Law and is expected to aid the Commission in formulating policies and solving problems related to the Act and in assuring impartiality and freedom from political influence in the solution of such problems and policies. The council serves without compensation but will be reimbursed for necessary expenses.

A meeting of the members will be called shortly in Tallahassee at which time the organization of the council will be perfected and a chairman and vice-chairman elected to serve for one year.

At this meeting the Commission will recommend that the council appoint a committee on public information to promote an interest in the law among various groups within the State. From time to time the Commission will undertake special studies in various problems affecting the agency and the council will be asked to establish a committee to assist in these studies. The council will also be asked to appoint a committee for the promotion of public relations affecting the Employment Service by the public.

The primary function of the council will be to promote a better understanding of the provisions of the law and the policies and practices of the agency among employers, employees, and the general public and to obtain estimates of public sentiment in local communities as it is the intention of the Commission to consult with the council on many of the administrative policies.

Support Softball

It's a great deal by not taking in the softball games down at the lake front diamond every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday nights. At the very beginning of the season over two weeks ago the playing wasn't of the very best brand but that was because sufficient practice hadn't been put in by members of the teams but now that most of the players on all the teams have had an opportunity to practice as well as the play is improving rapidly and the games are about as interesting as one would like to see for the small amount the City Recreation Department charges for admittance. Besides, the doubleheaders that went in effect Monday night gives the patron twice as much for his money. The switch to the doubleheaders was a good move on the part of the Recreation Department and will probably be continued unless expenses run too much. In case, it is found too expensive the teams will revert to the one game a week schedule which they started out. The players would rather play twice a week as they hardly get warmed up with one game but they can't have two games a week unless the gate receipts offset the extra expenses. If the public wants to see some good entertainment cheaper than almost anything else can be purchased, it should support the softball teams.

Most important of all, they point out two players in particular, freshman Forest Ferguson at end and Mush Battista at guard. Mush is a sophomore. That is good tidings for Florida supporters. Both will be back next year, and both will be let play better. Florida may not win all the rest of their games, having to get by such formidable opponents as Miami, Georgia Tech and Auburn, but we believe they'll give a good account of themselves in every game.

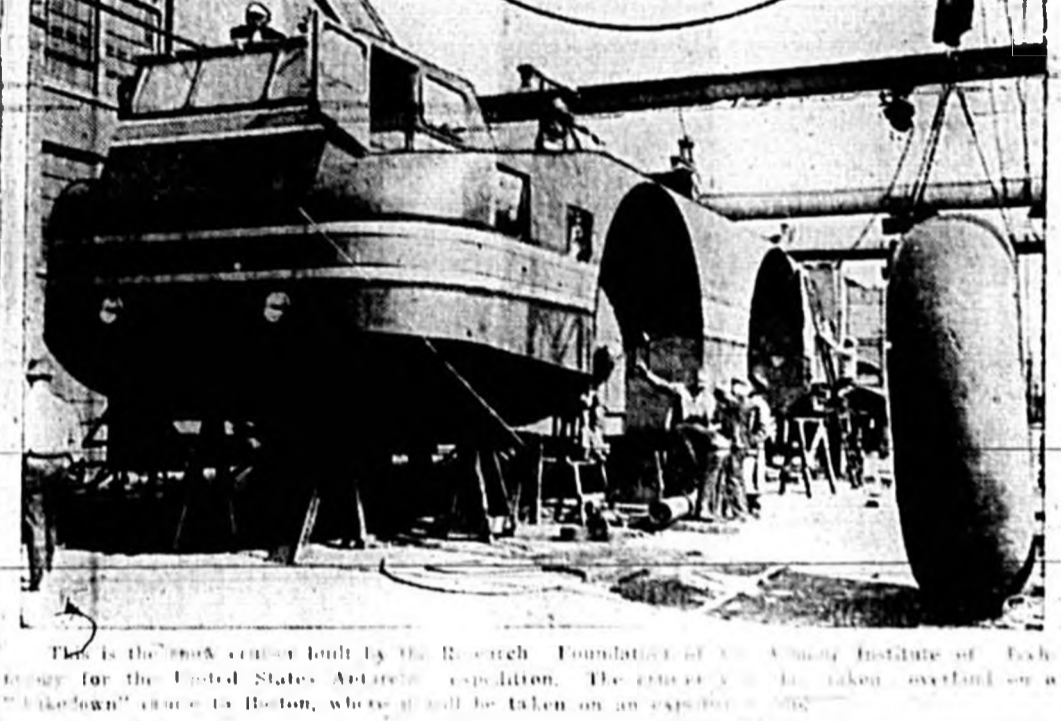

Announcement Underlines Fact German Troops Halt Advance At France's Border Hitler Formally Annexes Poland

ANKARA, Turkey, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Turkey, key power of the eastern Mediterranean, today signed a mutual assistance pact with Britain and France. The treaty was the outcome of negotiations which were interrupted by the recently unsuccessful Turkish-Russian talks in Moscow. Terms of the pact were not announced immediately, but it was official news that it binds the three powers to assist each other "in event of an act of aggression leading to war in the Mediterranean area." It contains a clause permitting Turkey to remain neutral in event of war among France, Britain and Russia.

### John Barrymore Drawing Record Crowds To Play

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—John Barrymore is getting away with murder in his new play—and he's making box office records doing it.

"My Dear Children," which opened here in May, is no great shakes as dramatic literature. But it's a success because Barrymore knows how to make a profitable fool of himself by interjecting lines and making up situations. So, between Barrymore and the script the play devastates all the sacred cattle of stage tradition, becomes as irreverent as a 15-year-old and twice as earthy. The audience seem to love it.

The script calls for Barrymore to cavort in Tyrolean get-up, to pose as a chef, to masquerade as Hamlet, to spank Doris Dudley, one of his daughters, in the play; to use his fists to rout a disagreeable young man, and to tell an image of himself as Hamlet to "go to Hell."

But much more is in the presentation than the authors intended. The ad libbing is as various as the wayward moods of the star.

During one performance, when John was deep in an especially lush romantic episode, part of the audience burst into laughter. He whipped around and exclaimed: "What are you laughing at?"

He resumed his lines, carrying on until he had finished a passage: "The blood of youth runs through my veins." Facing the now sober crowd, he halted: "That's when you should have laughed."

Only half-seriously disturbed by the proximity of a fire house to the theater, the actor interrupted another love scene to share his feelings with his listeners: "There goes that damned fire engine again."

On a hot August night trouble seemed to stalk every movement of the cast. An understudy was playing a supporting role; the usual smoothness was lacking; one of the girls tripped on her dress and fell flat at a crucial moment.

Barrymore turned a rueful face to an audience which was becoming a bit restive and lamented: "This is getting to be a madhouse." What might have been a wretched performance was changed into a swell romp.

Mrs. Chandler, a Richmond girl, is widely credited with giving direction to the budding talents of the master mixer. Kentuckians have it that she piloted him into politics where a knack for remembering 10,000 names and faces can be turned into retailable property.

### Births In State Exceed Deaths By Over 10,000

Greater Death Rate Declines From 97.3 In 1937 To 92.7 In 1938

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—There were approximately 10,000 more births than deaths in Florida in 1938, according to a special vital statistics report made public today by the Census Bureau, Department of Commerce.

Births totaled 21,090 and deaths numbered 11,024. The birth rate was 18.8 per 1,000, estimated population and the death rate was 12.8. The infant mortality rate was 57.9 per 1,000 live births.

The tuberculosis death rate in Florida rose from 57.5 per 100,000 estimated population in 1937 to 59.0 last year. The cancer rate dropped from 97.3 in 1937 to 92.7 last year. Little change was recorded in the motor vehicle accident death rate, which was 44.4 in 1938 and 41.6 in 1937.

Two sets of triplets and 353 sets of twins were born in Florida in 1938. Of these triplets, one set consisted of one boy and two girls, and one set of two boys and one girl.

Mothers between the ages of 20 and 24 gave birth to 9,832 children last year, to lead all age groups. Three babies were born to mothers between the ages of 15 and 19.

Accidents claimed 1,442 lives in Florida last year. Motor vehicle accidents accounted for 748 of these deaths. Falls in the home cost 145 lives. Four drownings occurred in the home last year.

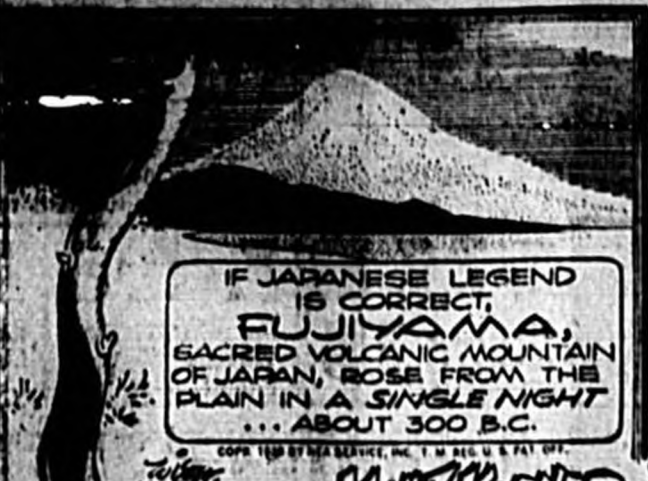

## Seizing Of Mail May Be Protested

**Secretary Hull Says Reports Received That British Have Stopped Mail Ships**

**Letters Censored, Returned To U. S.**

**Austin Suggests Ban On Arms Be Raised To Assist Allies**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20. (AP)—Secretary Hull said today the State Department was considering whether to make representations to Great Britain over the seizure of American mail en route to Germany.

Hull said the department had just received reports that in some instances ships carrying American mail addressed to Germany had been stopped by the British, the mail censored and returned to this country.

Meanwhile the situation in the Baltic had not changed a great deal from yesterday when, during a brief, rain intermission, the neutrality debate got down to what many senators consider the essential questions involved in re-opening the arms embargo—and a point that has been largely avoided in nearly three weeks' discussion.

This was the argument that the ban on arms shipments to belligerents should be lifted to help Great Britain and France win the war and thereby eliminate any danger of German aggression against the Western Hemisphere.

A Republican supporter of President Roosevelt on the neutrality issue, Senator Borah, raised that question yesterday, and in doing so set the Senate off to a short, excited flurry of give-and-take debate.

While Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) was asserting that the supporters of the Administration bill had lost sight of the objective of neutrality and instead wished to take sides, Austin interrupted to observe that "I think it is necessary to promote the peace and the security of the United States that the Allies win."

Senator Borah (R-Idaho), was on his feet at once demanding a definition of the word "win." Austin replied that "winning" meant stopping aggression and halting events that might lead to the occupation of Canada or nearby islands by totalitarian nations engaged in efforts to dominate the world.

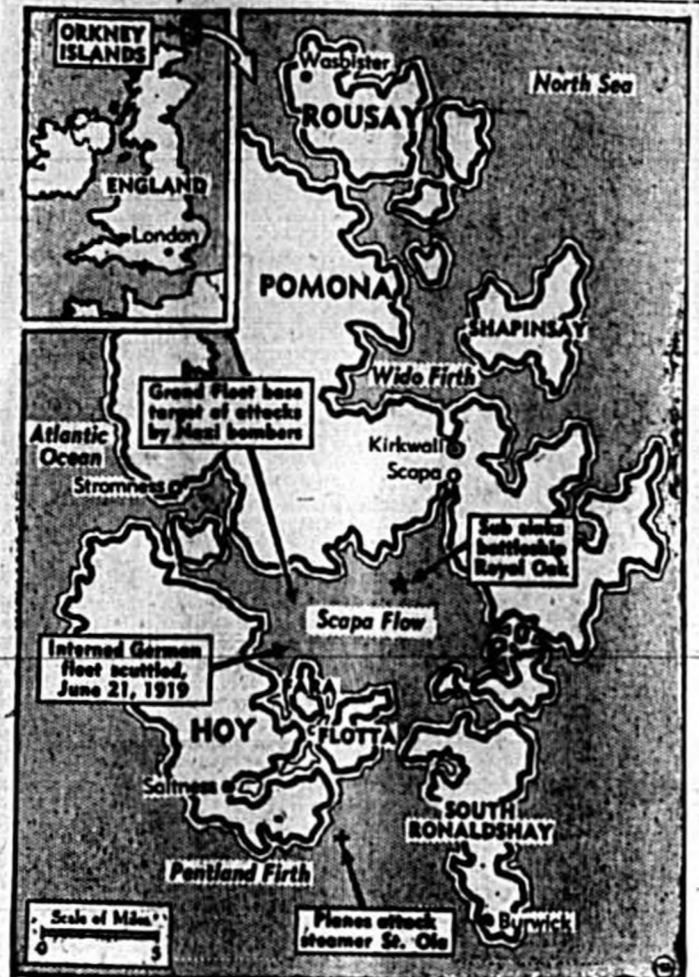
But McCarran was anxious to get on with his set address and overhauled the exchange while Borah, smiling faintly, remarked that he did not yet understand what Austin meant by his use of the word "win."

The floor of debate followed the presentation of a series of amendments by democratic supporters of the bill which Senator Pittman (D-Ore.) said vitally reduced the issue before the Senate to the one question, whether the embargo should be repealed.

## Local Guardsmen Ordered To Hold 2 Drills Weekly

**7-Day Field Maneuver Is Also Included In Intensified Training**

Pursuant to instruction received from Adjutant General Vivion Collins, the three local National Guard units have been ordered to drill twice weekly until Jan. 31, 1940 at least, according to orders issued today by Major George A. DeCottis, commander of the local post.

The three local companies now drill on Monday nights and the commanding officers of the units have not yet decided definitely the day of the week for the second drill.

In addition to increasing the drill to twice weekly, Major DeCottis said the local units will participate in a seven-day field training exercise sometime before Jan. 31. The date nor the place of the maneuver has not been decided upon, he said.

The telegram from the Adjutant General to Major DeCottis, commanding officer of the first battalion, of the 124th Infantry regiment, was as follows: "Pursuant to the War Department directive, you are directed to increase the frequency of training. Army training for the period Oct. 11, 1939, to Jan. 31, 1940 will consist of two drills per week, but not exceeding eight in any one month. Additional pay is authorized for unit officers and enlisted men."

The increase in training which will mean a corresponding increase in pay for the enlisted men may encourage enlistments, Major DeCottis said, pointing out that some vacancies still exist in the three local units. Officers of the National Guard have expressed a desire that there may be still further increases in the strength of the units in the near future and the officers of the regiment have expressed a desire to have all companies in the 124th Infantry to their full authorized strength before any new increase in pay.

He said he could distinguish the conning tower and outline of the craft plainly but could not tell its nationality. While he was looking he said, it began to submerge and soon disappeared. He estimated the vessel was about ten miles off shore.

Clarence V. Hudson and John F. Good, who were fishing on the pier at the time, corroborated Messer's story. All three said they watched the submarine through binoculars.

**Germans Dig In After Pushing Frenchmen Back**

PARIS, Oct. 20. (AP)—Official dispatches from the Western Front last night reported that the Germans are hastily digging trenches and installing machine gun pillboxes in the trench occupied Monday, indicating that the German general staff may be preparing to follow up its advance of four days.

Elsewhere the front was quiet except for artillery exchanges. Rain kept plants, pruned all day.

French war communiques No. 102 reported last night that "during the day there were many attacks by both sides, especially in the region east of the Meuse."

"Our artillery was particularly active in the same region," the communiques continued. "Complete reports received in date that the Germans on Oct. 16 attacked heavily over a six-kilometer (3 1/2 mile) front east of the Meuse and a 30-kilometer (18 1/2 mile) front east of the Saar. These attacks were ineffective."

Elements of cavalry supported by some infantry units advanced in the retreat of the main force of our divisions which participated in the offensive during September, retreat which was forested simultaneously with the beginning of preparation by artillery.

Their (the French) movement was effected successfully over the whole front at a depth amounting to 10 kilometers (six miles). At certain points they halted, as foreseen, at a line previously organized in front of our permanent fortifications.

## Continuation Of Hyacinth Control Urged

**U. S. Engineers Hear Testimony On Benefits Of Program At Statewide Hearing**

Navigation interests, fishermen, yachtmen, and others from all over Florida commended Col. Lewis H. Watson and the U. S. Army engineers for their hyacinth control program and expressed a desire that the program be continued at a statewide hearing in the City Hall this morning, conducted by a staff from the District Engineer's office in Jacksonville.

Approximately 200 persons attended this morning's hearing and considerable data were presented on the economic value of keeping the troublesome water plant under control in the St. Johns River and the lakes through which it passes, as well as the value of the program in other navigable streams over the state.

The cattle interests were also represented at the meeting, expressing a desire that the program be continued, requested that the engineers refrain from the use of poisonous chemicals in killing the water plants.

C. E. Watkins, chief of the district staff, explained at the opening of the hearing the work that has been done in connection with freeing the St. Johns River channel of hyacinths. He pointed out that a number of traps have been erected between Sanford and Jacksonville and also explained the mechanical equipment which is used to saw the hyacinths into bits that gradually sink to the bottom, thus reducing the floating mass.

Pointing out that approximately 10,000 acres of 25,000 acres of hyacinths in the St. Johns River and its tributaries have been destroyed in the campaign since it was launched in August, he said that the Chief of Engineers had approved the hyacinth control program and had allotted approximately \$250,000 to each of the two branches of the district.

Watkins stated that it would require from \$50,000 to \$75,000 annually to continue the program and pointed out that he had no estimate of the cost of the hearing on the benefits to be derived from these expenditures.

Mayor Edward Higgins was the first speaker and told the staff of engineers that the City Commission was vitally interested in the work being accomplished and that it was the desire of the people of Sanford that the program be continued, because of its benefits to navigation and portmen.

Many other speakers followed from all sections of the state.

**Jurors Recommend Safety Devices For ACL Crossing**

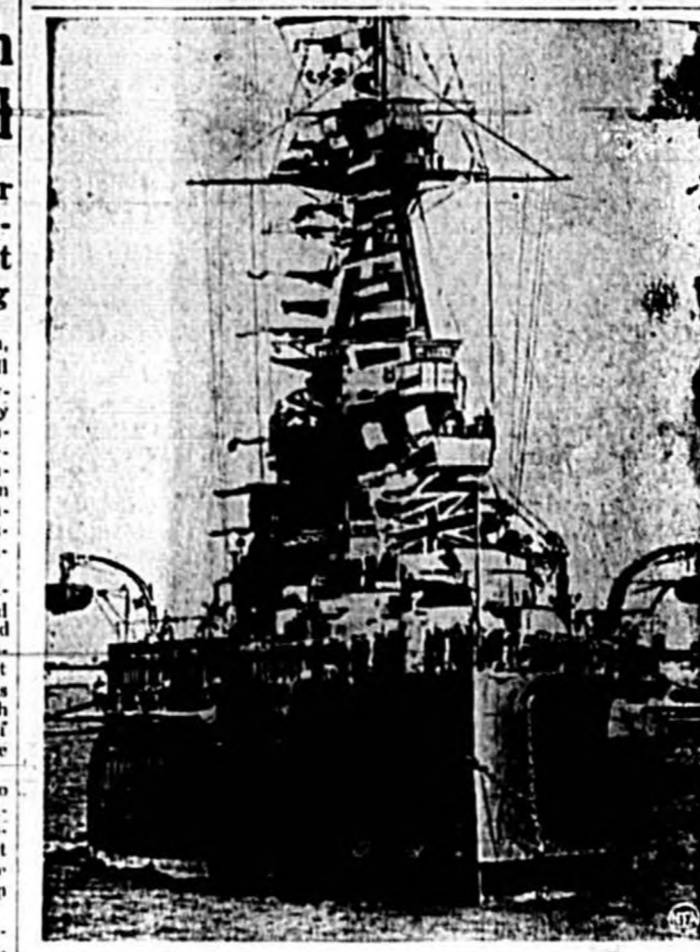

## DeWolfski Deplores Unpreparedness Of Nation Against Surprise Attacks
