## **Afraid To Sell**

An interesting item in today's newspapers reveals hat the British and French governments are anxious to buy 5,750 airplanes from American manufacturers in the liate future. The cost of these planes is expected to proximate \$350,000,000 and would furnish employment rectly to thousands of workmen, not counting those who would necessarily be engaged indirectly in the manufacture

and transportation of the materials which go into airplanes. Of course the sale of planes to Britain and France is prohibited now by the arms embargo. Airplanes are regarded as implements of war and all such implements are embargoed to belligerents under our Neutrality Act. It is to lift this embargo and to permit the sale of planes, mitions, and contraband of war in general, to all belliggreats on a strictly cash and carry basis, that the fight is now being waged in the Unifed States Senate.

Isolationists argue that if we permit such sales, Germany could not take advantage of them, because she has neither ships to carry them in nor money to pay for them, and she might not like it if we sold planes and other war supplies to Britain and France. Isolationists say they are afraid that Germany might retaliate against this country for exercising its sovereign right, and its neutral right, as recognized by international law, of trading with all forcign powers.

Well, Germany might not like it. So what? It seems to us that there has been altogether too much talk about being afraid of Germany by all democratic powers during the last few years. We are inclined to believe that this is the principal cause for the predicament in which the world finds itself today. The oath which Oxford men took a few years ago never to fight for King or country no matter what, and the repeated fears which French and British statesmen have expressed that standing up for their rights might lead to war, provide the very reason

But much more is in the pres-entation than the authors intend-ed. The ad libbing is as various as the wayward moods of the star. During one performance, when John was deep in an especially hush romantic episode, part of the audience burst into laughter. He whipped around and exclaimed: "What are you laughing at?" He resumed his lines, carrying on until he had finished a pas-mage: "The blood of youth runs through my veins." Facing the now sober crowd, he balted: "That's when you should have laughed,"

sughed," - Only half-seriously disturbed by the proximity of a fire house to the theater, the actor interrupted another love scene to share his faelings with his listeners thus: "There goes that damned fire engine again."
