According to a recent decision of the supreme court, newspapers are practically prohibited from giving the ordinary news from the courts, and a newspaper that publishes the substance of a declaration, or a bill of complaint, or bills of exceptions submitted to the court in an important lawsuit, is running considerable risk of prosecution under the laws, as they are now interpreted.

It has been pointed out by a leading newspaper writer that the trouble with the law as it now is on the statute books, and the supreme court decisions, goes back to the bill of rights in the constitution. If this view is correct, the work of reforming the law will be considerably greater than if it were merely a matter of appealing to the legislature for the common justice for which newspapers ought to seek.

In any event the State Press Association, as representing all of the newspapers of Florida could set in motion the machinery necessary to secure the reforms needed.

Newspaper want and ought to want only justice, but under recent decisions it is apparent that a burden is placed upon the press not contemplated by the people, and which in actual practice works to the disadvantage of both the press and the people.

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NEWSPAPERS WILL SUFFER BY WAR

No doubt many people have been wondering just what is the reason for the jaundiced hue of many of the pages of the dailies and in some busy way connect it with Germany and the war, which is quite right.




