MIAMI (AP)—A major transportation strike is threatening to idle more than 3,000 Miami Railroad workers as picket lines continue to blossom like spring flowers across the nation.

Although a nationwide trucking shutdown has so far had little effect on the Florida public, an impending national rail strike could halt all rail movement into the state.

Six Miami AFL-CIO rail shopcraft union locals say they are ready to join a nationwide walk-out against most of the nation's railroads Wednesday or Thursday.

Union officer J. P. Greese said 300 members in Miami will picket the Seaboard passenger terminal, passenger stations at Opa-Locka and Hialeah and the railroad's Hialeah shops.

The unions locally are threatening to strike the Seaboard which operates passenger and freight service to Miami and the Atlantic Coast Line which operates passenger trains between Miami and Northern cities.

Greese said the strike would affect the technically strike-bound but still operating Florida East Coast Railway.

Including other union rail workers, the nationwide picket lines, Greese said the strike will idle about 1,000 rail employees in Miami unless a last minute settlement is hammered out in Washington.

Delays in procedures under the railroad labor act have been exhausted and the unions are free to strike anytime, he said.

Greese predicted that supervisory personnel may be able to operate a few trains at the start of the strike but he claimed the walkout would eventually strangle all rail transportation over the two lines and over most other lines throughout the nation.

Although the nationwide shutdown of the major truck lines has not yet begun to affect Florida or Miami critically, a subsequent shutdown of rail transportation could.

About half of Florida's truck lines have been closed down in the dispute with the Teamsters Union. But smaller lines and non-union carriers, who carry most of the food cargo in the state, are still rolling.

LBJ Thaws \$1.1 Billion For Roads

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Johnson administration has unblocked another \$1.1 billion for highways and other construction from since last year.

NEW YORK (AP)—Negotiations reached a tentative settlement today in the nation's first radio and television strike that put celebrities on picket lines and threatened on a schedule of old films and reruns. The strike began March 29.

Terms of the agreement between the American Federation of Radio and Television Artists and ABC, CBS and NBC were not revealed pending a union press release. But it is believed that the settlement was announced at 6 a.m. today after a session that began at 11 a.m. Sunday.

Pickets still walked outside NBC at Rockefeller Center in New York City, however, and mediators would not say if the lines would be withdrawn. No date was announced for the union vote on acceptance.

"The strike is still on," one picket said.

Immediately involved in the settlement was the fate of the motion picture Academy Award and scheduled for tonight on and. It was not known if arrangements could be made to broadcast the show.

Explanation of the non-graded school was presented by Rear Lake Principal Floyd Richards at meeting of the Paradise Community Club at the April meeting.

In his talk, Richards noted "history shows that the non-graded school is new... the grade school quiet recent. First in the United States was at Quincy, Mass. in 1848.

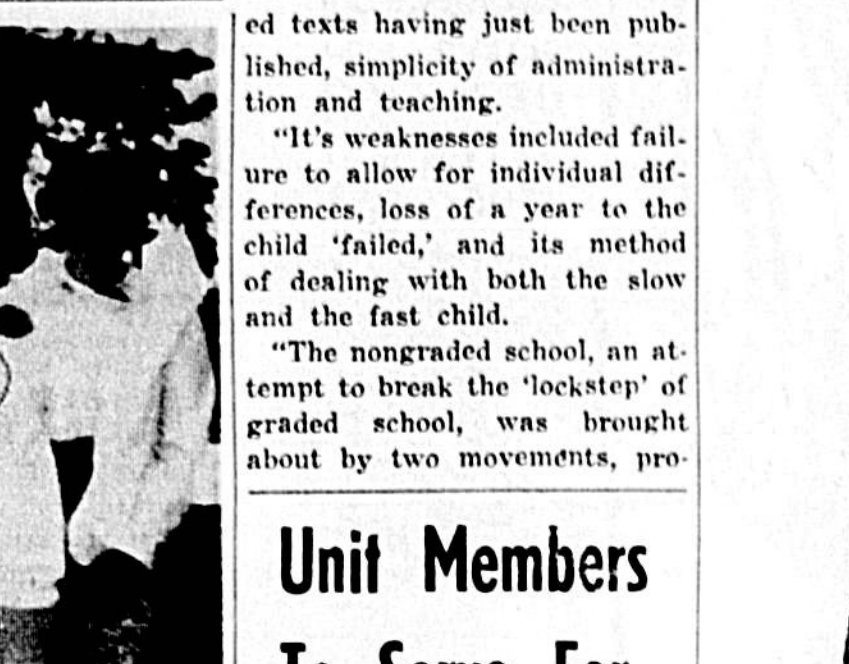
"The graded school came about due to crowded class rooms because of mass public education and was kept due to lower costs per child, first graded texts having just been published, simplicity of administration and teaching.

"The weaknesses included failure to allow for individual differences, loss of a year to the child 'failed,' and its method of dealing with both the slow and the fast child.

"The nongraded school, an attempt to break the 'lockstep' of graded schools, is based on the concept of two movements, progress by two movements, individual differences, and the child's own level of readiness, develops a better attitude, slow starters are not penalized, some material presented to all children but different levels expected in the work.

"Syllabi subjects include reading, spelling, arithmetic, while content subjects are those such as science, social studies, etc.," the speaker concluded.

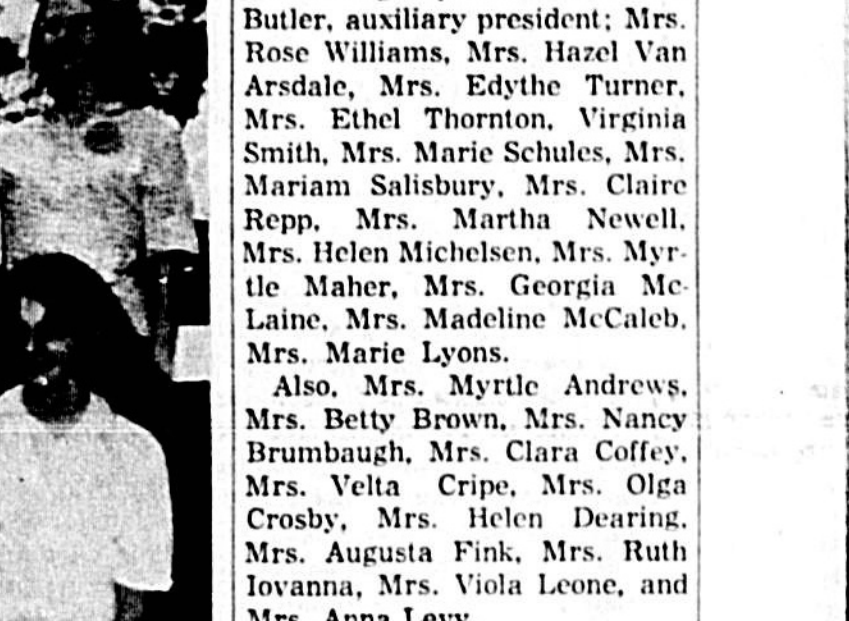

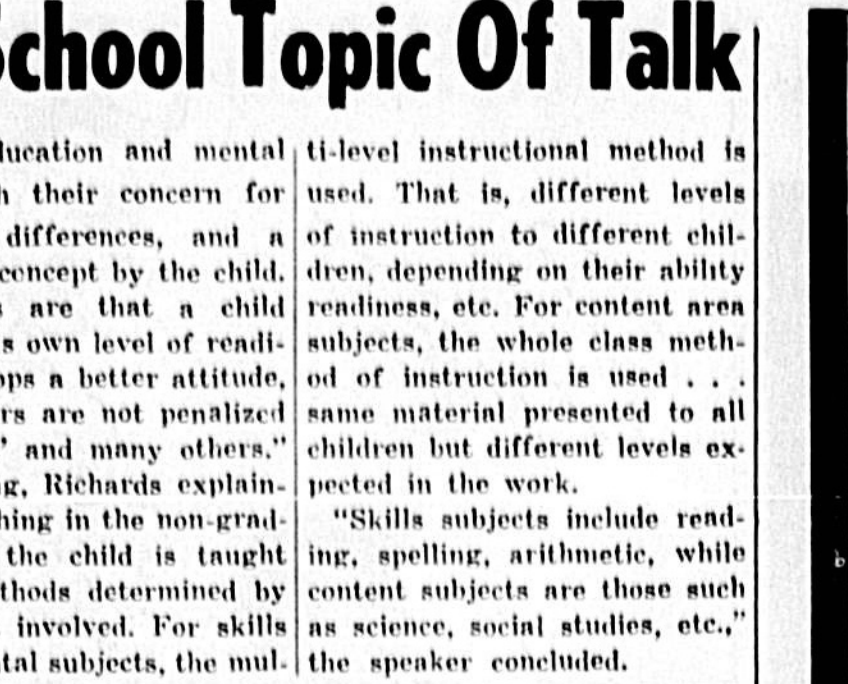

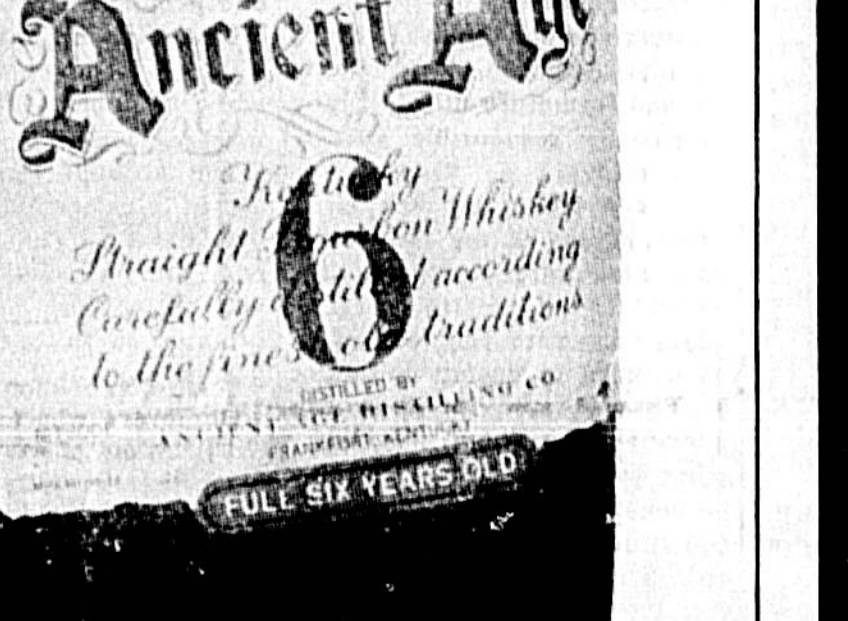

How Brewer Won Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—"Only great golfers win the Masters," said Bobby Jones to Gay Brewer. "That's why I'm happy you won it—you're a great golfer."

"I'm choking up," said Brewer with this tournament, "said Jones, the immortal Grand Slammer who founded this tournament and designed the Augusta National course."

He was right. Brewer didn't choke. Dubbed "the man who will never come back," he had lived for a year with the nightmare of a hanging put that never fell.

He wiped out that dreadful memory Sunday in a sweeping charge over the lush green acres of Augusta National, coming from two strokes back, climbing over three men and winning the 31st Masters with a brilliant, five-under-par 67 for 286.

"I may be the happiest man in history to win the Masters," the gray-haired, 35-year-old tournament regular said after he had broken the seven-year stranglehold of the Big Three—Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player—on the prestigious event.

Nicklaus, three-time champion and winner of two in a row, failed to make the cut for the last two rounds. Palmer, a four-time champion, finished with 69 for 285 and fourth place, who won in 1961, finished with 71 for 287 and a share of sixth.

Needling only a par to win, he three-putted from 46 feet, leaving a five-foot putt par—the one that would have won him—hanging on the lip of the cup.

Nicklaus and Tommy Jacobs tied him and when they went to play off, Brewer finished third at 287.

"He'll never come back," most observers said.

"I don't remember things like that," said Brewer. But history indicated otherwise. He didn't win another tournament that year, but finished second three times, twice losing in playoffs.

'Nickel, Dime' Operators Subject Of Legislation

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—A new round of committee meetings started today as members of the busy 1967 Legislature met to consider a long list of state problems including crime, taxes and local government operations. The state tax reform commission is expected to report today. The bill would give the state attorney general the power to protect the public against "nickel and dime" operators. Senate President Verle Pope said yesterday that the legislature may have to find as much as \$400,000 in new tax money in order to meet its commitments. "If we do the kind of job we need to do, we have got to have more revenue—call it what you will," Pope said. The white-haired legislative leader said some \$200 million will be needed in addition to current revenues to finance the press, budget items and provide the promised \$5,000 minimum pay raise for teachers. Then, he said, the legislature will have to find some money to send to the counties for relief of property taxes. Although the amount will depend on the amount of relief granted, Pope pointed out that taking over half of the ad valorem school burden alone would run \$300 million. Ground Action On Upswing In War

SAIGON (AP)—The U.S. command today reported a sharp increase in ground actions throughout Vietnam with 315 Communist killed in the preceding 24 hours. The first wave of three B-52 bombers to be based in Thailand arrived there today from Guam after dropping 100,000 pounds of bombs on a suspected Communist camp only 21 miles from Saigon. Nine more B-52s will move to Utapao Air Base, in southern Thailand, later this month, out-lying their round-trip time for raids on South Vietnam from 12 hours to less than three. The ground action included sharp barrages of recoilless rifle shells on the U.S. 25th Infantry Division headquarters at Cu Chi, about 25 miles northwest of Saigon. The pre-dawn shelling, which killed three American soldiers and wounded 26, was the second in two days. The helicopter-borne U.S. 1st cavalry, 2nd Air Cavalry, and 11th Air Assault Division were hit Sunday. American pilots flew 96 missions over North Vietnam Sunday despite bad weather. All-weather jets hit the Thai Nguyen steel plant 25 miles from Hanoi and other raids struck an aircraft carrier, 30 miles from the Red capital. Heavy ground fighting near 20 miles southwest of Saigon after U.S. 9th Division soldiers flushed a major force of Viet Cong guerrillas in a running two-day fight.
