

Cards Down Braves As Dodgers Win, Maintaining 3½ Game Lead

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 2. (AP)—Mort Cooper pitched his 18th victory of the season last night as the tattered Cardinals trimmed the Boston Braves, 4 to 3, in a seesaw game which saw the Cards come from behind twice. The triumph showed the Brooklyn Dodger lead to 3 1/2 games.

It was the first defeat for Al Javerry, the Boston ace, in the last seven starts, and for a time it looked like he had the seventh successive decision stowed in his hip pocket. The Braves nickel Cooper for a run in the first of three singles, then grabbed another in the fourth on a hit and an error.

The Cards were getting hits, meantime, but couldn't count until the fourth when Cooper scratched a single and pushed two across.

The Braves took the lead again with one marker in the sixth on two singles and a long fly, but the Red Birds came back with one run in the seventh and another in the eighth, the winning run counting on a long fly after the single.

Mort Cooper still played along with his pet superstition, wearing shirt 18 as he sought his 18th triumph, which gave the Cards 20 victories in the last 23 games. Enos Slaughter crept up on Pete Reiser of Brooklyn in the National League batting race with two hits, one a double, in three times at the plate.

Ted Williams Is Headed For Batting Triple

NEW YORK, Sept. 1. (WW)—Baseball's greatest offensive prize, the batting triple seems headed this year for Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox, perhaps the game's most remarkable youngster.

Unless he stumbles somewhere along the short stretch that remains of this campaign, Ted appears fairly certain to lead the American League in home runs batted in and batting average.

He's out front in each of these departments by a little more than five weeks to go.

Williams has a big edge over DiMaggio in runs batted in, and a thinner advantage over Chet Laabs and Charley Keller in homers.

Only four players two in each major league have ever won the triple since the three-way competition began in 1920, when records were first kept on runs knocked across the plate. They are Harry Heilmann in 1923 and Lou Gehrig in 1931, Chuck Klein in 1933 and Rogers Hornsby in 1922 and 1925.

And Williams will be the youngest ever and in service in the league ever to win the triple. Ted is only 23 and this is his fourth semester in the big time.

Babe Ruth won two of the

three crowns five times. Bob Meusel, Simmons, Greenberg (twice), Paul Waner, Jim Bottomley, Mel Ott, Wally Berger, Dolph Camilli, Medwick and Johnny Mize (twice) won two but couldn't snag the third.

Ted's has been a spectacular career. He was the only freshman ever to lead in runs batted in.

A year ago, in his third season, Williams became the youngest player and the first American Leaguer since 1923 to hit better than .400. Furthermore, he topped the home run as well as the batting average championship. And Ted was only five runs behind DiMaggio, the winner, RBI.

This may well be his last year, for he's due for military service soon and there may be no career for him after the war. Of modern-day players, no one except Joe DiMaggio can boast of a better all-around offensive record during his first four seasons.

Reiser of Brooklyn won the batting crown as a freshman and seems likely to repeat, but Pete Reiser isn't in Ted's class as home run hitter or a run producer.



•British Armies Lash Out At Axis Forces In Desert Campaign

U.S. And RAF Planes Sweep Battle Area In Record-Breaking Assault On Rommel

WITH UNITED STATES FORCES NEAR CAIRO Sept. 3, (AP)—Wendell Willkie told American troops today, "I just want to say I'm damned glad to see you. God bless you and give you hell. He is on his mission to tell other countries of America's war effort."

LEOPOLIS, BELGIUM, Sept. 3, (AP)—American Army combat forces arrived at this Belgian Congo capital today after started their drive in a camp named Roosevelt, apparently in preparation for further troop drives.

(See Associated Press) Britain's desert armies bashed out today at Axis forces massed in the southern sector, 35 miles from the El Alamein front, and 80 miles west of Alexandria, countering Rommel's new four-day offensive.

Rommel's mechanized armies were subjected to a record-breaking bombardment yesterday, with American and RAF planes sweeping the battle area from dawn till nightfall. With still no sign of a breakthrough it began to appear the Axis chieftain met stiff opposition than expected and his hopes of a lightning drive to the Nile and Suez Canal will be difficult to sustain.

As the desert artillery kept up steady cannonading on the southern, and most critical, part of the front and Allied planes shuttled on bomb missions over the battle-field, Lt. Gen. B. E. Montgomery, field commander,

"In no place and in no part of the eighth army area have the enemy penetrated our organized defense zone."

Planes were carrying a heavy share of the fighting, both on the principal battlefield and the auxiliary fields supplying the Axis troops.





Rommel's Columns, Blasted Heavily By U. S. And British Warplanes, Retreat To West

(By Associated Press) Marshall Rommel's armored columns, blitzed by terrific Allied firepower are reported to have fallen back in a battle of Egypt today under another record-breaker in aerial warfare. The German Afrika Korps retreated westward after forces retreated westward the British said.

The Egyptian situation presents a much brighter picture as British forces continued to exert strong pressure on the enemy on the El Alamein 100 miles front. Rommel received a vast amount of supplies, including enough gasoline for 10 days of hard fighting. Allied planes constantly are bombing gasoline dumps. British experts warned Germans under optimistic over Rommel's withdrawal. British tanks, taking advantage of the German withdrawal, tightened their hold on German armored columns which now are gripped in a tightening vice moving in from three sides.

Reports from the battlefield and the German left nine destroyers and tanks. Two were unaccounted for.

Over Kweilin, in Chekiang province, "sky dragons" U. S. Army

dropped five Japanese planes yesterday in a spectacular air battle. The raids were made supporting the defense of Nanchang, main Japanese base in Kiangsi, and at Kinko, air base from which Americans could bomb Japan.

Renewal of the action in the Solomons was reported in an evening communiqué which said bombardment American planes had scored several hits on Jap vessels engaged in the operations there.

The Japs also sent over a fighter-escorted fleet of 10 bombers which attacked installations on American-held Guadalcanal island.

Eight of these planes—three bombers and five fighters—were shot down, bringing to 119 the number of Jap planes bagged by American fliers and anti-aircraft gunners since the United States offensive against the Solomons opened Aug. 7.

Dangerous American positions were described as "shambles."

The news gave reassuring word that "In spite of the periodic attacks by enemy aircraft our positions in the Guadalcanal-Tu-pan area are steadily holding."

Meanwhile, it was disclosed that a U.S. army flying fortress on patrol off the west coast of Santa Isabel Island northwest of Tulagi—bombed and damaged an enemy tanker or sea-plane tender which was left burning.

This raised to at least 19 the number of Jap ships and auxiliaries sunk or damaged in the Solomons action alone.

The American submarine actions in far eastern waters were apart from the Solomons operations and cost the Japs five ships and three damaged. This is the last thrust against the length of Japanese supply lines represented one of the biggest "catches" of the war by American underseas fighters now have sunk or damaged 99 enemy ships in the Pacific.

The report on the Solomons was the first since Sunday when it was announced that seven Jap planes had been shot down during a futile enemy attack on Guadalcanal of an important airfield which was developed by the Chinese in the Solomons campaign.
