EVACUATION U.S. Begins Rooftop Rescue Of Americans In Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. helicopters landed on Saigon rooftops and at Tan Son Nhut air base today and began evacuating all but a few of the remaining 800 to 900 Americans who fought off South Vietnamese desperately trying to flee before Communist-led forces take over. U.S. Marines and armed civilians used pistol and rifle bullets to smash the fingers of Vietnamese trying to claw their way over the 10-foot wall at the American Embassy as helicopters lifted off the roof. At the airport, angry Vietnamese guards fired at busloads of evacuees and shouted, "We want to go, too."

Some tried to jump over the wall at the embassy and landed on the barbed wire. A man and woman lay on the wire, bleeding. People held up their children, asking Americans to take them over the fence. At the same time, South Vietnamese air force men began a mass flight from their homeland. The Thai Foreign Ministry said 75 planes carried about 2,000 Vietnamese to Utopia air base in southern Thailand. Civilian officials of the South Vietnamese government were also reported fleeing as rumors spread that the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese would soon march into the city.

Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger said in Washington about 4,000 Americans and South Vietnamese were evacuated within the first three hours after the U.S. airlift began. The Pentagon declined to say how many Marines were involved in the operation. Mrs. Nancy Brunner, aide in U.S. Rep. Richard Kelly's office here, said she has been receiving inquiries by telephone and in person about what the government plans to do with the immigrants. Mrs. Brunner said none of those requesting information have shown bitterness, all expressed basically the same thing — "How is our government going to handle these people and absorb them, especially with the high unemployment rate? Who is going to support them?"

"They are only questioning just now," Mrs. Brunner said here at a political gathering last weekend, said as the South Vietnamese were being defeated and the Vietnamese orphans were arriving in California "a wave of emotionalism, human concern swept the nation." (Continued On Page 2-A)

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Casselberry To Spend \$500,000 On Unknown Land

CASSELBERRY — Council last night approved the expenditure of half-a-million dollars for two parcels of land — the only catch is council members claim they don't know where the land is located. The stranger than fiction approval was granted over strong objections by Councilman John Zacco, who said, "Council should know which parcels. Each of us should have a voice." But Zacco's fellow council members, who all claim no knowledge of where the land is, gave the green light to Mayor Bill Grier to begin negotiations on the parcels which will be used, presumably, for the location of a utility plant. However, certain "conditions" were placed on Grier. Namely, the mayor must have the city attorney and the city engineer study the contents of the package and reports must be made on percolation, zoning and the land must be appraised as to its fair value. If these "conditions" are met, Grier has the authorization to purchase the land.

"To do this on a 10-minute notice is total nonsense. Total nonsense. It's just not the way to do it," Zacco said. Councilman Charles Sizer said he saw some type of document, but he said he had a "head cold" and wasn't sure where the property in question is located. Council Chairman Edith Duerr said she had "an idea" where the land is, but the approval council's method of making the purchase. She felt the way council is making the purchase will save the taxpayers' money. Asked if he knew where the land is Councilman Sal Orlando replied, "No Sir, and I don't care." Orlando thought the issue would come before actual purchase, but Duerr assured him it wouldn't. Councilman Charles Glascock said he doesn't know where the mystery parcel is. "No, I don't," he said. He also said he didn't need to know. And Grier, who undoubtedly knows where the land is, declined to discuss the matter

in any depth. Grier said only that the "negotiators know where the land is." Grier did confirm that the purchase price is in the neighborhood of \$500,000. Whether individual council members know where the mystery parcel is located is a question mark. One thing for sure, however, the citizens they are elected to represent have no idea where the land is. Presumably, only the city attorney, Ken McIntosh, and Grier are "in" on the acquisition of land valued at half-a-million dollars.

Stenstrom Convinced City Hall Can't Be Renovated

Sanford City Commissioners are in the middle of what Mayor Lee Moore calls a "slow, agonizing process" as they begin taking on the job of studying how and what to do with the situation of the City Hall building. After the commission received a report from a team of architects and engineers on the feasibility of renovating the 50-year-old City Hall, Moore said, "Before any decision is made there's going to be a lot of discussion." The Commission decided to schedule a workshop session with the architect team to discuss the report. No date has been set for the meeting. The team did not make a formal recommendation on the feasibility of renovating the building, but the report did cast enough doubt to make at least one commissioner make up his mind on the matter. Commissioner Julian Stenstrom said that "up until the report, I was not convinced the building couldn't be renovated, but now I'm convinced the building can't be refurbished." Commissioner A. A. McClanahan said he had "mixed emotions," on

renovating the building and said that the problem facing the commission now was if renovating the building was "feasible or not feasible to rebuild City Hall if and when the funds are available." Another study on the feasibility of renovating City Hall has been prepared by the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees which recommends to the commission that it is not feasible to renovate the building for use as City Hall

the commission meeting. In the work notes from the team's meeting, Kelley said that City Hall is compared to the modern County Courthouse across the street and called the City Hall, "the wart on a pretty girl's face." The team found the building to be in violation of several electrical, safety and building codes. Also last night Bill Kirchhoff appeared before the Commission with a list of structural arguments against tearing down the City Hall building, but after listening to Kirchhoff, Moore pointed out that the meeting was not a public hearing and stopped any more discussion from Kirchhoff. City Manager Warren "Pete" Knowles, in recapitulating the team's report, said that a strong point in the report was that the building was originally a sound construction, "but the money hasn't been put into it to maintain it."

Draft Registration Stopped By President's Proclamation. The backs of members of the news media stiffen with indignation when politicians take it upon themselves to be critical of the fourth estate and choruses of "false" are heard when reporters are accused of authoring misleading stories. But, a dramatic story published in a national periodical two weeks ago set mothers in the Central Florida area to worrying. The Selective Service Law is dependent on proclamations issued by the president. On March 29, President Ford issued a proclamation saying that 18 year olds no longer have to register for the draft within 10 days of their birthday. U.S. Rep. Richard Kelly's (R-Holiday) local office in Altamonte Springs got the answers for us. So, you worrying mothers take note. One of the mothers in Seminole County, Mrs. F. J. Bartlinki of Longwood, noting her son Peter celebrated his 18th birthday this month immediately sent him to Orlando to register. Peter returned home saying the selective service office would not permit him to sign up and Mrs. Bartlinki telephoned The Herald off-ee for an explanation. At this point, 18 year olds are not required to, nor are they permitted to, register. President Ford has indicated he will issue another proclamation soon requiring all 18 years old who have not registered to do so at a given time after the first of the new year, Kelly's office said. An announcement will be made in due time, informing young men of the new rules and register.

CIA Assesses On Chiang Told

The Herald Services WASHINGTON - President Nguyen Van Thieu is out in South Vietnam, and Lon Nol in Cambodia. President Ngou Dinh Diem, Thieu's predecessor, was assassinated, reportedly with Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) connivance. This should give pause to chiefs of state who make the mistake of being pro-American.

But now hear this. In the early fifties, the State Department and CIA were warring wroth over the "true national interests" of President Chiang Kai-Shek, then reestablishing the CIA Republic of China on the island of Taiwan. To teach him Chiang instructed his counter-intelligence chief to keep our operatives under constant surveillance so as to discover what disloyal elements were operating with them. In time, the \$5 million was spent. Two CIA agents were arrested. As a Chinese general officer was shot. The arrests and the execution were reported in the Chinese press with little explanation. How many others on Taiwan, implicated in the plot, were also arrested is not known.

I first heard this story, though only in schematic form, from Harold Lavine, one of the country's finest and toughest reporters, when his desk and mine were back to back during our Newswark days. I seemed unbelievable - one of those hair-raisers which are impossible to check out. But I did report it to Vice President Richard Nixon, asking if it was true. The two of us were sitting in his hideaway capitol office, and he had his feet upon the desk. His face came down with a bang.

"Sure, it's true," he said. "It's the same thing with Sanyuan Rhe" "That nothing would be gained by writing the story, if indeed anyone would publish it."

That CIA tried to assassinate President Rhee of Korea is no longer a secret. One of my sources described the bitterness with which Rhee would use one CIA attempt. 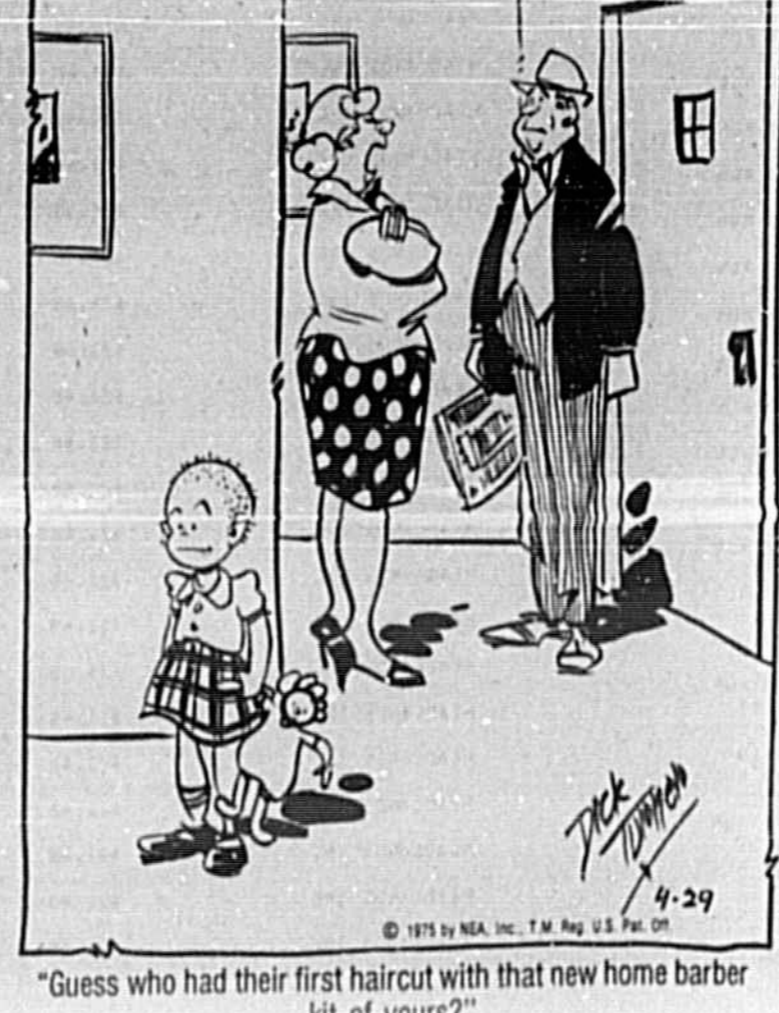
