Reds Claim End Of Germany's "Invincibility"

Nazis Suffer Tremendous Losses As They Are Routed From Rostov Area

Russian Gain May Be Turning Point

Hitler's Troops In South Russia Get Their Worst Blow

(By Associated Press) The Soviets declared today the German retreat from Rostov is now a rout putting an end to tales about the invincibility of the German Army. On the central front, the Germans announced their forces have penetrated deep into Moscow's defense system, but a Soviet spokesman said the Germans can register so far only tremendous losses in all directions.

The German Armies of Southern Russia, already having suffered the greatest defeat ever to befall Nazi troops, still were retreating back last night under savage punishment in a spreading disaster that might well make an important turn in the whole course of the war.

His dream of a quick seizure of Caucasian oil fields and broken by the Egyptian forces fighting for their very lives in north Africa, the Fuehrer is now actually suffering his loss toward Britain and the United States in time with the retreat from Rostov—all this brought to Hitler's attention the day after the Russian capture of the city.

An urgent need of some victory, he sent his lieutenant, Reichsmarshal Goering, the top German airman, to a conference at St. Florin in France to demand gain of conquered Vichy—perhaps African air bases, and perhaps even more although this was only speculation—more "collaboration."

The Russians reported last night that they not only were still driving the Germans before them back to the west from Rostov, the Don River entrance to the Caucasus, but that a second Red counter-offensive from the north was heating down oblivious toward the sea and thus threatening the Nazi rear guard with annihilation.

State Forest Fire Losses Rated High

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 2.—(Special)—Florida stands second among 10 southern states in the number of forest fires thus far reported in the calendar year, according to figures just released by the Regional Office of the U. S. Forest Service, Alabama, with approximately 5,700 fires in the first nine months of the year, has lost 23,813 acres and had 2.2 percent of its protected forest acreage burned. However, only 63 fires were reported by that state for the month of September.

Florida, with 4,984 fires, had lost 2,813 acres and had 2.2 percent of its protected forest acreage burned on October 1 and had 186 fires during the month of September.

10,000 British Are Claimed Captured As Nazis Advance In Tobruk Battle

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(AP)—Informal sources predicted today that British declarations of war against Finland, Rumania, and Hungary would come toward the end of this week and said Finland had been given its last chance to cease attacking Russia.

On the North African front the British admitted today that the Germans had succeeded in consolidating their divided Armies in the Libyan desert after bitter fighting. Axis commands suggested the capture of more than 10,000 British and Nazi sources said the Tobruk battle had taken a favorable turn for the Axis.

In the rising clamor of the fighting the decision was yet to fall. The British command acknowledged during the day that Nazi infantry supported by German armor had thrust into the Imperial positions, after earlier attacks had been beaten off with heavy losses, but subsequent official information reported that counter-attacks had driven the Germans back and re-established the British line.

German assaults from the east by troops brought up from their broken positions near the Egyptian frontier zone were simultaneously in progress, but in much less strength.

From the west, the German Commander Gen. Erwin Rommel was throwing the last ounce of his shock power forward to avert the disaster which had threatened him by the reported destruction of the Italian Ariete division.

Strike Called Off

The great American railroad brotherhoods have set a splendid example for John L. Lewis and his CIO unions in how to obtain benefits for employees and settle disputes between capital and labor without resorting to strikes and without interfering with the defense program or the orderly conduct of the nation's business. Railroad labor and management have agreed to a settlement and the threatened strike scheduled for December 7 has been called off.

The dispute was not an easy one to settle. For over six months the brotherhoods have been trying to get a raise in pay for their men commensurate with the increase in the cost of living. Originally they asked for a 30 percent increase for the operating brotherhoods and a 30 cents an hour raise for maintenance men, brakemen and other workmen.

Direct discussions between labor and management got nowhere as the railroads contended such an increase would run operating costs up by over \$800,000,000 and could not be met without a drastic increase in freight rates which the public was not prepared to meet. The dispute was submitted to a fact finding board appointed by President Roosevelt which recommended a 7 1/2 percent pay boost.

This the carriers agreed to but the proposal was turned down by labor representatives who insisted that the brotherhoods had submitted to pay cuts during the depression which had not been fully restored and that the higher cost of living more than offset the gain from the proposed wage increase. This compromise was rejected and a strike date set.

Whereupon President Roosevelt again intervened and appointed a special mediation board, first urging both the brotherhoods and management to settle their controversy around the conference table in the interest of national welfare. This group reached a settlement yesterday which is reported to give the railroad workmen pay increases ranging from 70 cents to \$1 a day.

Naturally the whole country is relieved that the threatened railroad strike has been averted. Such a situation at this time would seriously cripple the nation's defense effort as well as paralyze industry everywhere. The controversy has brought clearly to the public mind how dependent we are, despite automobiles, trucks and line highways, upon the railroads and the railroad workmen.

It is indeed fortunate that the brotherhoods are blessed with the type of leadership that enables them to get a square deal for their men while at the same time serving the interests of the country.

Knox Says Navy Is Ready

Secretary Frank Knox announced today that the United States is now prepared to meet any emergency in the Atlantic or the Pacific or in both simultaneously. In a signed article in The American Magazine he states:

"The United States today has the greatest navy in the world. We are prepared to meet any emergency which may arise, on one or two oceans. With the powerful new accessions to our fleet, with the greater range of operations given by our new bases and our hundreds of new auxiliary vessels, and with the Panama Canal permitting strategic shifts of strength, we are able to handle all immediately possible threats in both oceans."

Pointing out that "for us, the shooting has begun in the Atlantic" and that "in the Pacific the situation trembles always on the verge of crisis," the Navy Secretary states that the American people are "entitled to a straightforward report on their Navy" and lists in detail the fighting ships now in service or under construction. "We have 17 battle-ships with 15 more building," he reports; "7 aircraft carriers and 11 more building; 37 cruisers with 84 more building; 172 destroyers with 192 more building; 113 submarines with 73 more building."

Concerning naval aviation, Secretary Knox reports that the Navy at present has some 5,800 planes, including trainers. He states that new combat planes of the finest design are "beginning to come along fast" and that the goal is 15,000 combat planes. The Secretary considers American Navy personnel the finest in the world in both morale and training and lays particular emphasis on its gunnery.

"The American Navy has always been noted for its seamanship," he writes. "To keep our supremacy in this we must have the help of our scientists in providing even better metal, explosives and instruments. We have the constant advantage of our intelligent and highly competitive personnel. And we strengthen this by more target practice than any other navy. That is expensive but worth it. One trouble with the poor Italian Navy was that it could not afford to waste powder in practice firing."

"It is a curious fact that the American Navy burnt up more ammunition during the first year of the war than did the British Navy. The reason of course, was that British vessels, on wartime patrol, might go for months without firing a shot, while our ships were busy with their peaceful target practice."

In answer to "those who think our aid-to-Britain has been a one-way affair" Secretary Knox points out that the lessons of actual modern naval warfare, made readily available to us by the British, have proved of immense value. "The British, by permitting our observers at our disposal," he states, "by permitting our observers to follow every action from plane, ship or submarine, have given us the priceless opportunity to learn thoroughly up-to-date in all the rapidly developing science of war."

From ten to twenty-reefers of berries daily will be available at the Plant City State Market, with large offerings of oranges, and light offerings of squash, potatoes, and tomatoes. Unlimited quantities of snap beans and Italian peppers and limited offerings of squash will be available at the Palmetto State Market.

At the Palmetto State Market supplies of tomatoes, peppers and eggplant will be heavy to liberal, with light offerings of yellow squash. A few cabbage and turnip sales greens will be available at the Palmetto State Market, with supply increasing by Dec. 15.

Churchill Is Denounced In Recent Stand

Lady Astor Declares Woman Conscript Plan Should Be More Advanced

Labor Party May Split Over Bill

Bill Was Announced To Take Married Women Of 20 To 30

LONDON, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Lady Nancy Astor criticized Prime Minister Churchill sharply today for not going further in his proposals to conscript womanpower in his House of Commons speech yesterday.

As the Labor party was reported threatened with a serious split over the bill, the American-born member of Parliament asserted that Mr. Churchill "had a blind eye where women are concerned" and urged that all women be treated alike. "If you don't conscript married women there will be great discontent," she said.

Mr. Churchill announced a bill yesterday to conscript unmarried women between the ages of 20 and 30 for the unformed services but restricting "lethal combat" duty to volunteers.

Churchill asked Parliament yesterday for power "to restrict women to serve in the uniform of the auxiliary services of the crown or civil defenses," but he said that "for some time to come" this compulsion would be applied only to unmarried women between the ages of 20 and 30.
