Casselberry joins county in deciding adult clubs' fate

CASSELBERRY - It'll be up to the voters to decide in November the fate of adult clubs in the city as well as the county.

City commissioners on Monday unanimously approved an ordinance that would separate alcohol and nudity. The ordinance is aimed at banning the sale of alcohol in adult clubs, a combination city officials said is not permitted in other Seminole County cities with the exception of Winter Springs.

With three adult clubs in the city and three more just outside the boundary, Casselberry

has been trying to strengthen its existing adult ordinance. Adult businesses have been blamed for contributing to lower property values and having an adverse effect on community standards.

Mark George, a pastor of a Casselberry church and a candidate for the city commission, said the adult businesses contribute to the negative image of the U.S. Highway 17-92 corridor.

In June, George as leader of the Citizens For Decency, led a petition drive to place a decency ordinance on the November ballot, after county commissioners voted to not adopt it in favor of the current ordinance that permits nude dancing but severely restricts locations and outside appearances of adult businesses. More than 9,500 signatures were collected, but the validity of several was challenged by a lawsuit last month. County commissioners, to save the cost of a lawsuit, will reconsider the decency ordinance at a Sept. 22 public hearing.

"Adult entertainment with its alcohol, alcohol and nudity, nudity, nudity, is a major contributor to our blight and disinvestment," George said.

He cited statistics showing a high number of police and fire department responses for the three clubs and urged commissioners to listen to their constituents and not to the pornography lawyers.

"We have a right to establish community standards," he said.

Speaking in support of the ordinance, several residents urged commissioners to vote on the issue and not wait until the Nov. 3 referendum.

Nancy Ross, representing a Longwood citizens group, said, "We want you to vote tonight. I believe we have already spoken."

Vice Mayor David Henson said, as written, commissioners could not vote on the ordinance because it specified a Nov. 3 referendum vote. In order for the commission to vote, the issue

Business as usual in Lake Mary

LAKE MARY - It's business as usual in Lake Mary as the Lake Mary City Commission meets the final time in fiscal year 1997-98.

The second public hearing on the proposed millage rate and budget for the new fiscal year, which begins Oct. 1, tops the agenda for the Thursday city commission meeting.

As no one opposed the incumbents for the three commission seats up for election, Gary Brender, Thom Greene and Mayor David Meador will continue in their jobs for two more years.

A potentially heavy agenda for the commission has been whittled down, due to postponement of several items to Oct. 1.

The commission was to hear second readings on the annexation and land use change of approximately 17 acres of property on Emma Oaks Trail, in Seminole County.

Three parties have petitioned for the voluntary annexation into the city, in order to develop office/flex space. The property is contiguous with the city's municipal boundaries and Senior Planner Susan Delnes advised the commission, in the first reading on Sept. 3, that the annexation would be beneficial to the city and the applicants "to be able to develop this property under the city's land development regulations. The property owner will be assured of city utilities and services and the city will be assured of compatible development with surrounding uses."

The property is adjacent to Skyline Drive, where several commercial developments already exist.

Delnes requested the postponement of the second reading because of a 30-day moratorium on future land use amendments required by the

Future of Fort Mellon Park officially in hands of voters

SANFORD - The future of Fort Mellon Park is now in the hands of voters, city commissioners decided on Monday.

On Nov. 3, Sanford residents will speak out on whether the park should be part of a proposed site that will include a hotel and conference center. The city commission had previously given its stamp of approval to conceptual plans offered by the Connecticut-based developer Joe Pacitti.

The issue, however, has divided residents for the past year.

Members of the Society for

the Preservation of Fort Mellon Park, led by Doug Groselose, say they are not against economic development or progress. The group had asked the city to consider other sites and went as far as filing an injunction last month questioning the intent of an ordinance that would clear title on the park property.

The wording, the group contended, gave the city carte blanche in dealing with the developer and would render the November referendum moot. A judge earlier this month denied the request for an injunction.

The Society continues its protest through a letter writing campaign and signs. The group

also had launched a petition drive seeking 2,700 signatures to place the issue on the November ballot. Before the signatures were collected, however, Pacitti agreed to a referendum vote.

Mayor Larry Dale, an outspoken supporter of the lakefront development project, had committed on behalf of the city about \$2 million to park improvements, which included a fishing pier and boardwalks. At least six acres of the park would remain intact, Dale said.

Local merchants and residents formed a group and held a rally recently seeking residents' support for the proposed

would have to be readjusted and several public hearings would have to be scheduled.

Bob Fisher, an attorney representing Cabaret Internationale, Rachel's and Club Juana, offered his own set of statistics which compared police incident reports at two adult clubs and the local Denny's restaurant. In some cases, Fisher said, Denny's had more incidents than the two clubs com-

bined. He said there had been no drug or prostitution arrests at the clubs in the past 10 years.

Fisher also said the adult businesses contribute to the local and state economy.

"We have over 770 employees with an annual payroll of over \$3 million," he said.

Commissioner Al Clarke, however, noted that incidents in the third club and reports from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office were not in-

cluded in Fisher's report.

Fisher said he was presenting information from the Casselberry Police Department because the clubs were located in the city.

Erich Schuttauf, a representative from the American Association for Nude Recreation, said the ordinance would negatively impact nudist resorts

and clubs, which provide alcohol during social events. The AANR, Schuttauf said, is a growing family-oriented organization that brings positive dollars to communities and has a positive economic impact.

"Maybe the public does not have all the facts," he said.

Florida Department of Community Affairs after the adoption of the Evaluation and Appraisal Report. The EAR, which updates the city's comprehensive plan, was adopted effective Sept. 1.

If annexation is completed, it will be the first sizable growth of the city in several years, said City Manager John Litton. Litton said he expects that the city will take a more aggressive stance on annexation in the near future, as a build-out of available land approaches.

Other agenda items include an ordinance for the purchase of two lots for the downtown police station and a pay plan adjustment for several staff positions.

The pay plan adjustment would result in an increase of approximately \$80,000, in fiscal year 1999, for salary and merit increases.

The commission meeting begins at 7 p.m. Lake Mary City Hall is located at 100 N. Country Club Road.

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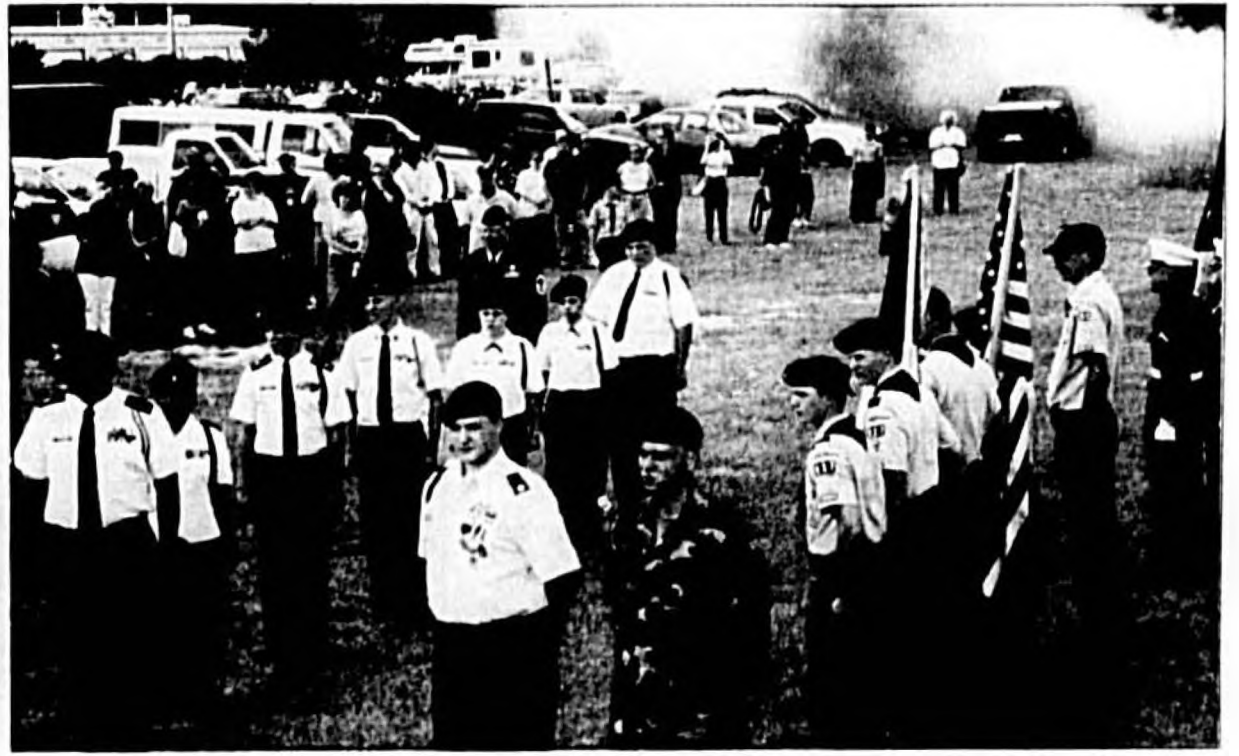
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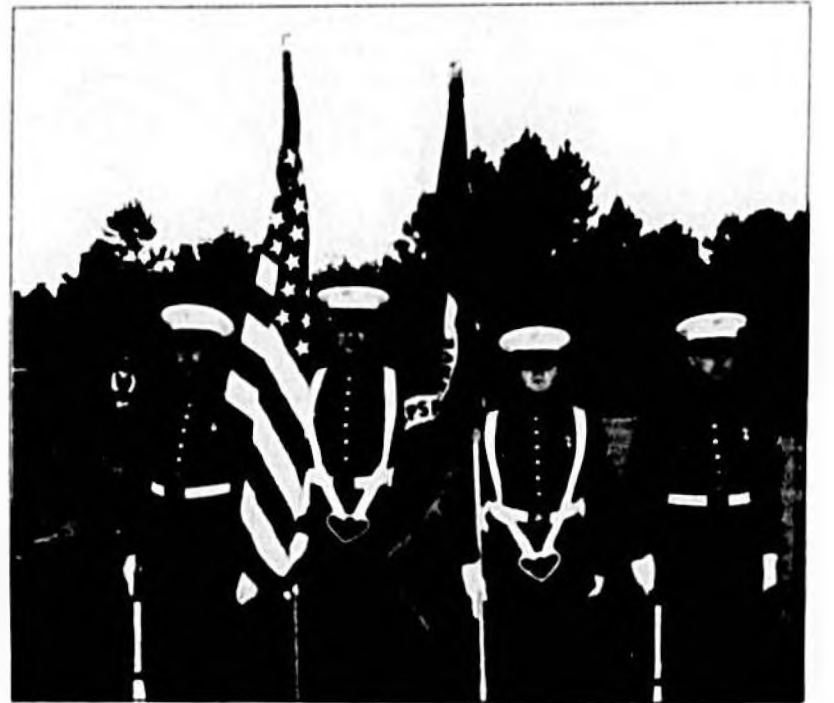

Do desserts aid metabolism?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is it true that sugary desserts metabolize blood more efficiently if they're eaten with every meal? Would elderly people become diabetic if they ate in this manner?

DEAR READER: I don't know where you heard this myth, but it's totally incorrect.

Cakes, cookies and other desserts do not aid metabolism. They are foods in their own right and contain flour (which is nourishing), refined sugar (which isn't), fats (often cholesterol from butter and eggs), and small amounts of protein. Therefore, patients with diabetes and high cholesterol should restrict their consumption of sugary desserts.

Many elderly people develop diabetes as they age. This is thought to be caused by a gradual wearing out of the pancreas, the gland that produces insulin. Hence, older people must be prudent in eating well-balanced diets.

Cake, cookies and ice cream will not cause diabetes. Nonetheless, they will certainly accelerate a diabetic tendency, if one is already present. For this reason, an older person who consumes sugary desserts with every meal may be setting himself up for a problem. In addition, many seniors develop decreased appetite, lack of interest in food and a tendency to eat what's easiest. Eventually, they may cut down on "real food," virtually live on cookies, and develop malnutrition. That's a bad habit, best avoided. My advice? Reduce baked goods and eat more natural foods, such as fruit.

DEAR DR. GOTT: The lymph node under my left armpit is much larger than the one on the right. Now one has turned dark. I'm 30, should I see a doctor?

DEAR READER: Without a doubt Swollen lymph glands can indicate chronic infection or serious diseases, such as cancer. The fact that the lymph node under your arm is darkening can be an ominous warning. See a doctor immediately.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've been diagnosed as having a Baker's cyst in my knee. What is this, and is surgery necessary?

DEAR READER: Each joint is covered by a thin, tough membrane called a synovium. The knee is no exception. However, at the back of the knee (the popliteal space), the syn-

ovial membrane is naturally weak. In some people, it can rupture or herniate, causing a squishy lump — called a Baker's cyst — that may or may not be painful. If the cyst is uncomfortable

or so large that it interrupts blood return through the veins, it may have to be surgically removed. The operation is routine for orthopedic specialists. Not all Baker's cysts require surgery, but you may wish to consider an operation if the condition causes you to have symptoms.

I had so much fun reading Donald Parson's "Fall of the Cards" (Little, Brown, 1959) that I am going to show you another of his deals. (I wrote this column on Bastille Day, so was tempted to give the squeeze deal in which West had to keep a king to stop dummy's four from becoming high. Parson added, "And thus is proved the truth of the old adage that even a quatre may look a king.")

For this deal, check out all quatre hands. How should South play in three no-trump? Why was the contract defeated? West led the diamond jack.

North is right to raise to three no-trump. Five clubs is a long way off, and if his suit can be utilized, three no-

trump should coast home. Since there are four tricks outside clubs, it looks easy to cash the club king, then to duck a club. Assuming clubs aren't 4-0, you must rake in at least nine tricks.

However, that doesn't allow for West. Miss Manhattan. She was playing with Mr. Masters. The thought of partnering an expert so unnerved her that she deemed it necessary to have a couple of stiff drinks before the game. Then, after South had cashed the club king and continued with the jack, Miss Manhattan played not the queen, but her 10! Disbelieving anyone would do that voluntarily, South was convinced the clubs were splitting 2-2. He called for dummy's ace and went three down.

Mr. Masters was most impressed. "That was such a silky smooth play, partner. And the Chinese make wonderful silk garments. Do you have any Chinese in your blood?"

"No, Scotch."

It's time for the Jaguars to become a team for all of Florida

JACKSONVILLE - Hey Jacksonville Jaguars, come on down.

Did you notice the 3,500 empty seats at Sunday's game against the Kansas City Chiefs? It was only a preview to the AFC championship game, that's all.

You're getting a little arrogant up there in Jacksonville.

Let's recap: When Jacksonville was rewarded with an NFL franchise in 1993, the city promised to sell out the first three seasons of play. Season tickets were sold on a three-year contract, guaranteeing sellouts for the first three seasons.

But, when WKMG-Channel 6 ran a poll to allow voters to pick the game of their choice to televise last weekend, Orlandoids chose a lame Miami-Buffalo game over the biggest game of the weekend.

In fact, the entire country, except Orlando, got to watch the Jaguars and Chiefs.

And the vote wasn't even close. It ended up 9,500 to 2,500 in favor of the Dolphins, even though the Jags are closer by half to Orlando than Miami.

What's the problem?

Sure the Dolphins have more tradition and have a long sense of loyalty in Orlando, but the Jags are as close as Tampa and everyone you see these days is wearing a Buccaneer jersey. You never see anyone wearing a Mark Brunell shirt.

The problem is that the Jaguars have become arrogant. North Florida, which is really an extension of South Georgia, is different from the rest of the state. It isn't tourist-friendly and you're more likely to see gun racks on a car than an out-of-state license plate.

The Jaguars like their little cocoon in North Florida, but they also had to notice the empty seats Sunday for the biggest game in the country.

Tampa Bay started to sell-out last year. Granted, the Bucs had a winning record, but they also recruited Central Florida. There are still billboards and advertisements all over the place for season tickets for the new Sombrero or whatever it's called.

The Bucs even played a pre-season in Orlando two years ago, although it drew under 20,000 people.

Tampa Bay has become Orlando's team and it's the Jaguars' fault.

Central Florida should belong to Jacksonville, but until the Jaguars recognize it, they'll still be seen as ugly step-children, part of South Georgia.

The Jags had 3,500 empty seats against Kansas City Sunday.

Imagine what the number will be when the lame Ravens come to town this Sunday.

Hey, Jacksonville, come on down. We'd love to have you.

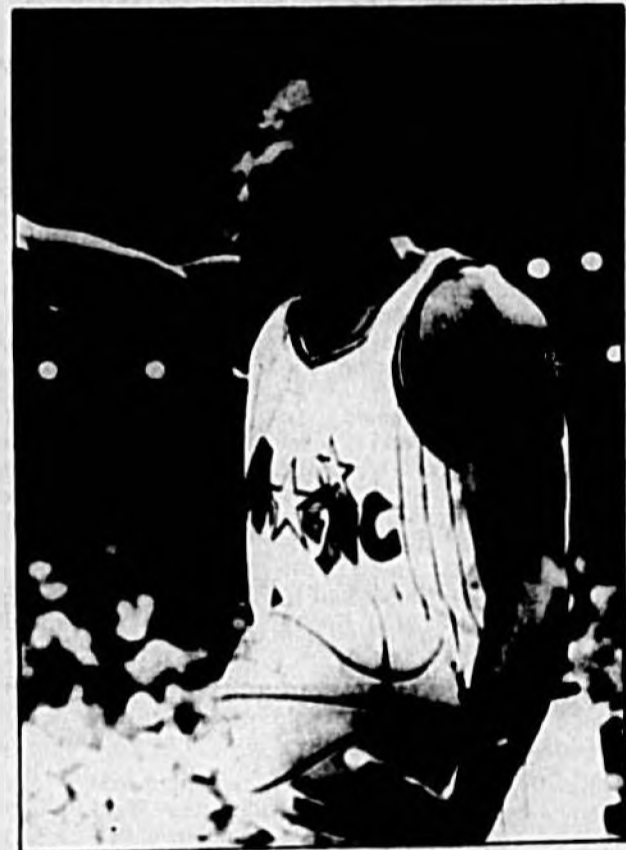

on ourselves," Van Looven said. "It's something we concentrate on and we've talked about it."

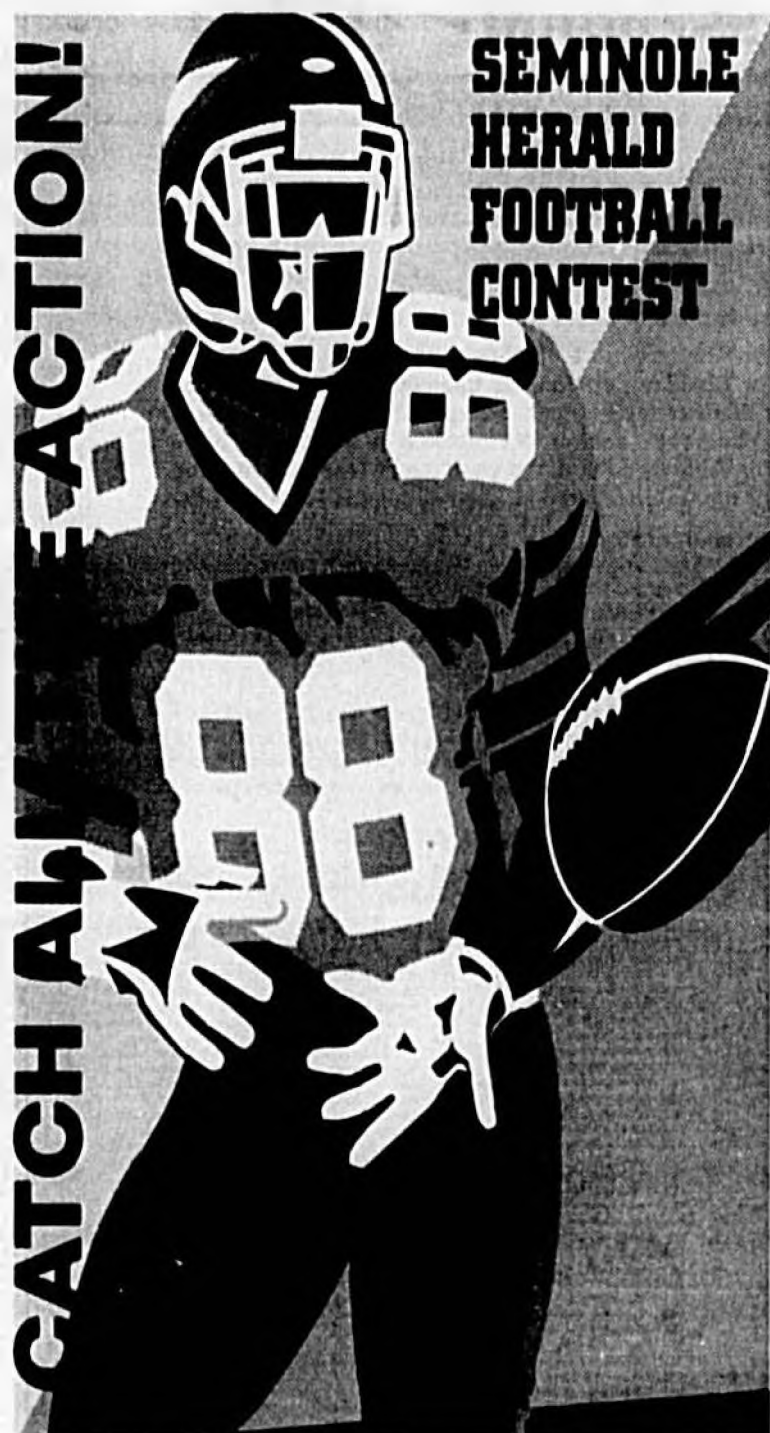
In soccer, it's a bit of a different story. Van Looven said the team has been talking repeat since walking off the field in Tallahassee last spring.

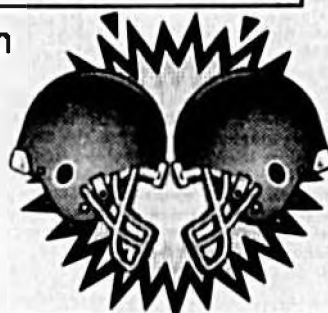

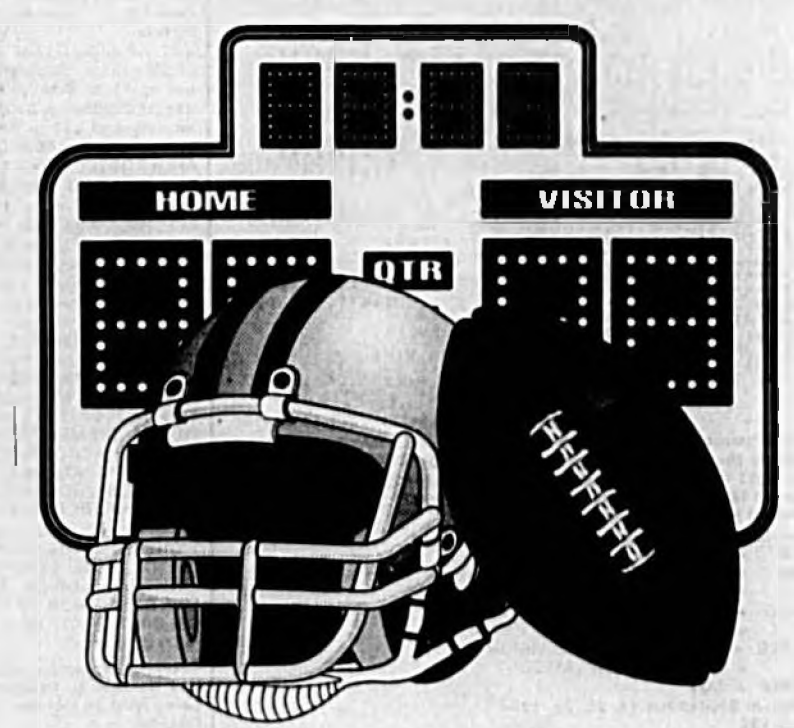
