

Yank Jets Blast Commie Convoy

SAIGON (UPI) — U. S. Air Force planes on one of 57 missions over Communist North Vietnam caught a 36-truck convoy moving down the peninsula. Ten trucks were destroyed and 21 damaged with a barrage of bombs and rockets.

An American F-111F spokesman said today the successful attack took place 60 miles south of Vinh. The trucks, camouflaged with green canvas, were believed carrying ammunition since pilots sighted secondary explosions.

U. S. Marines in the south chased the Communist troops on two fronts today. Leathernecks in Operation Texas, under way in the scrub coastal plains and scrub brush country 220 miles north of Saigon, have killed 100 Viet Cong since the weekend.

Marine Corps jets have been pouring napalm and bombs on the fleeing Communists in Quang Ngai province. At Shinh Hoa, a low-level napalm run struck a tree today but the pilot managed to eject and was rescued by ground forces. A UH1H helicopter was shot down in the same region but there were no injuries to the crew.

Marine forces also continued small unit patrols in Operation Chick, under way 12 miles north of Hue, 450 miles northwest of Saigon. Little contact was reported today.

A company of the Army's 25th (Tropic Lightning) Division killed four Viet Cong in an ambush today during Operation Garfield, 25 miles north of Han Thoi in the Central Highlands.

Viet Cong units today attacked the airport at Long-Son.

LAKELAND (UPI) — Scott Kelly promised to push for a broad concept of interest law that would make "government immorality difficult if not impossible" if he is elected governor of Florida.

Kelly, a former state senator who makes his home here, said the law would incorporate the best features of conflict of interest laws already in force in other states.

"But I am seeking and what I think Florida citizens and most public officials would like to see is a bill to insure that public office is not used for private gain beyond that provided by law," Kelly said.

"It is going to be my position as governor that we should take every possible executive, legislative and judicial step to make government immorality difficult if not impossible," he added.

Behind a machinegun and a sandbag barricade, former Dominican President Juan Bosch lives in fear he will be assassinated before the June 1 elections by which he hopes to return to power.

To insure that this and other decisions are translated into operating policy, the House subcommittee plans to hold a series of public hearings on the Dominican Republic.

In December, 1962, Bosch won election as the Dominican Republic's first freely elected president in more than 30 years.

He had spent 24 years in political exile and was of the non-Communist, left-center group favored by the United States in recent years as a counter-balance between the extreme right Latin American dictatorship and the Fi-
