HAD HARD LUCK Of National Guard To Hold Practice **DESPITE SUCCESS**

Has Lost But 2 Games

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 6 .-(A)-The University of Tennessee has the most amazing seven-year record of any major football team in the nation, and yet lays claim to the "hard luck" crown.

In the seven seasons since Robert R. Neyland became coach, the orange-shirted volunteers have won 61 games, lost but two and tied five. No representative eleven can approach that performance.

But this marvelous string of successes has not brought Tennessee an unchallenged Southern conference championship. The joker is hidden in those five deadlocked contests.

Four different years Tennesses teams came rushing into November with colors flying only to have their hopes wrecked by ties near the end of the season.

Three times the Kentucky Wildcats brought their downfall and this year Vanderbilt spoiled the Vola' ambitions with a scoreless

But this time Tennessee's dreams were not entirely shattered, for in the wild confusion unding the Dixie championship this season, a majority of the experts favor the Vols over Auburn and Louislana State Univer- 14.

All of the Florida elegation voted for the measure. Ruth Bryan Owen, desated in the Fourth District last June, also voted for it But 44 other Democrats, despite the party platform, voted against it, as did 100 Republicans,

As for the 44 Democrats who failed to carry out their party pledge of straight prohibition repeal, little application be offered. Of course eleven of them were "lame disclar" and they may have felt that as they had been repudiated by their constituents nothing more was owed to them. These Congressmen could vote as they pleased. But there were 33 Democrats, elected on the party platform, who roted against the repeal. Any three of them could have tarried the resolution.

One hundred Republicans also voted against the measure, probably motivated as much by the fact that the resoluion was sponsored by the Democratic Speaker of the House as by any other reason. But in addition the Republicans were playing a shrewd game of politics. They know that if anything is likely to necessitate a special session of Congress immediately after the inauguration of Roosevelt next March, it will be a still unsettled prohibition question.
