

FRANCE WON'T ALTER STAND ON NAVY ISSUE

Declares She Will Remain Firm For Covenants Of League Of Nations At Meet

PARIS, Dec. 27.—(INS)—In the forthcoming five-power naval disarmament conference at London, France will stand firmly upon the covenants of the League of Nations.

This fact stood out clearly today following the publication of the text of the foreign office memorandum on naval policy which is now being studied by the other four powers who will be represented at the conference.

Although Foreign Minister Armand Briand with former Secretary of State Kellogg fostered the famous anti-war pact which bears both their names, France will oppose any cut in navies based solely on the pact.

The French attitude is that the Briand-Kellogg pact in its present state does not offer a sufficient guarantee of safety in the nation's contributing to it to furnish a basis for international disarmament.

The French naval memorandum contained four general ideas of policy, as opposed to the ideas heretofore emanating from Anglo-American sources.

While appreciating the efforts of Great Britain and the United States toward disarmament and subsequent universal peace, France wants all agreements reached at the London conference to be regarded as mere preliminaries which must be acceptable in a form as to be acceptable at a later League of Nations general disarmament conference.

The French memorandum stresses the value of the Briand-Kellogg anti-war pact but points out that it is based solely on the force of public opinion and therefore cannot adequately guarantee safety to nations which disarm upon the strength of it.

In discussing the various naval ratios which when definitely arrived at, at the conference, will be used as "yardsticks" for naval disarmament, the memorandum makes it clear that France's needs must be based upon the requirements of the "French Empire" and not upon the ratios reached at the Washington conference.

Here, it is pointed out that the Washington conference was a failure and it is implied that the pending conference will be no more of a success unless a general agreement for a better conference at Geneva is reached.

In urging the solution of the Mediterranean problem, the memorandum proposes a naval accord which should include Great Britain, Italy, France and Spain.

FRIGHTFUL TALE OF COLD, HUNGER AND DEATH TOLD

Mother And Young Son Die From Exposure; 2 Daughters Survive

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Dec. 27.—(INS)—Devised in their delirium by chimerical imagines of "our days" hunger and exposure in the frozen fastness of the Alabama hills country, Marie Marcum, 17, and her seven-year-old child, Pearl were near death today.

They are the survivors of a party of four which started from Huntsville Dec. 17 to spend the Christmas holidays on the slopes of Sharp's Mountain. The other members of the little band were Mrs. Frank Marcum and an infant son.

They began the 25-mile journey to their mountain home in an old automobile but at the base of the mountain they were forced to leave the machine and try to climb the icy slopes, and along the three-mile winding trail they became lost.

The path, submerged by huge drifts of snow—the first heavy fall of the year—became dim, and soon it was not distinguishable at all, and the whole landscape, once so familiar to all of them, was not recognizable.

And for three days—Thursday, Friday and Saturday—they wandered about in the scrub growth without food or shelter. The next morning the weary mother fell in the snow, exhausted. She could go no further, and soon she died from exposure. Later in the day the pangs of hunger and cold became insupportable for the baby, and the last spark of life left his numb body.

Then little Pearl became ill, and Minnie took the clothing from her dead mother and wrapped it around the little girl, and shielded her from the intensity of the cold. They played the bodies of their mother and baby brother in the hollow of a big log, and fought on through the snowdrifts. Two more days they wandered, making but slow progress. The cumulative sunshine melted some of the snow away, and they found the trail and reached the mountain shack, where they gasped out something of their story and collapsed.

A runner was despatched to Huntsville from the mountainside. He was the first person to make his way through the heavy drift of snow. Physicians and an ambulance were rushed to the mountain from Huntsville to administer to the girls, suffering incoherently of the horrors of the journey through the snowdrifts.

Physicians say the sisters are suffering from exposure and may recover. Frank Marcum, the father, retraced the girls' footsteps through the snow, and found the bodies of his wife and little son in the hollow log where they had been placed by Minnie and Pearl.

Mrs. McKenna, 80, Dies At Home Of Daughter

Mrs. E. A. McKenna, aged 80, and a resident of Sanford for the last 10 years died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George McCrum, on West First Street this morning at 2 o'clock. Prior to her death Mrs. McKenna had been in good health.

Mrs. McKenna was born in Middletown, England and at the age of 18 came to New York, where she lived during the greater part of her life. Before coming to Sanford to be with her daughter, she had lived in Cincinnati for several years.

The funeral services will be held from the Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. W. P. Hudson officiating. Interment will take place in the Lake View Cemetery.

Besides her daughter, Mrs. McCrum, the deceased is survived by a son, William McKenna, who resides in Rochester, N. Y.

Posse Is Searching For Prisoners Who Fled Alabama Jail

SPEIGNER, Ala., Dec. 27.—(INS)—A posse aided by bloodhounds scoured the vicinity of the state prison farm today for three prisoners who made a getaway last night in an attempted wholesale delivery in which three convicts were shot.

The dash for liberty occurred after a long line of prisoners were being transferred to the cotton mill of the prison for night duty. Seven of the men suddenly bolted from the line and rushed to the prison wall where an iron bar was used to loosen a large panel.

Pursuing guards opened fire when the convicts failed to heed their warnings to halt. Three of the prisoners, W. D. Cole, J. T. Caraway and Floyd Horton were shot and surrendered. A few minutes later a fourth, Ernest Hudgens, was recaptured.

Those still at liberty were Justus Winchester, Lee Hudgens, and John Douglas.

WIDE HUNT IS STARTED FOR LOST FLIERS NORRIS SCORES EFFORT OF DRY LAW BACKERS

Most Extensive Aerial Search In History Of Frozen Waste Is Getting Under Way

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 27.—(INS)—Preparations for one of the most extensive aerial searches in the history of the frozen Siberian wasteland were rushed today as 10 airplanes were summoned to hunt for Lieut. Carl Eickson and Earl Berland, his mechanic.

The two Alaska men have been lost since Nov. 9 when they disappeared somewhere between Tokel, Alaska and North Cape Siberia. They had supplies for two months.

Six Canadian airmen are to be fitted out here on their arrival from Seward.

Three crated Fairchild cabin planes assigned to the search were being uncrated here today upon their arrival aboard a special train.

Six pilots and two mechanics are fitting the planes together and may hop off tomorrow to join the search, according to Major Decker's plans.

Two planes piloted by Pilot James C. Cronson and C. M. Gilliam are grounded at North Cape awaiting their rescue flights.

Cronson is reported to have located the point where Eickson's plane was last sighted by native fishermen. The Russian plane is reported to be heading across Siberia to join the hunt.

Lowman Backs Up Coast Guardsmen Who Killed Youth

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—(INS)—The killing of Eugene Downey, young Buffalo man, by U. S. coast guardsmen when the boat in which he was riding failed to stop on order, was strongly defended today by Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, Lowman, in charge of prohibition administration.

The coast guard was proved under authority of Section 581 of the tariff act, which gives them full authority to stop any boat at any time in American waters for the purpose of inspection, said Lowman.

"No liquor was found" on the boat but this has no significance as there was plenty of time for it to be thrown overboard on the lake.

Lowman declared young Downey was at liberty on \$10,000 bail in another smuggling case, and asserted that the coast guardsmen were well within their rights in suspecting his boat was running liquor.

The whole matter, he said, had been placed in the hands of the U. S. attorney at Buffalo, and he will be given every assistance by the treasury department in the case. Lowman denied that the coast guardsmen intended to kill Downey. They fired, he said, in hopes of disabling the motor.

Man Wanted On Many Charges Held In Jail

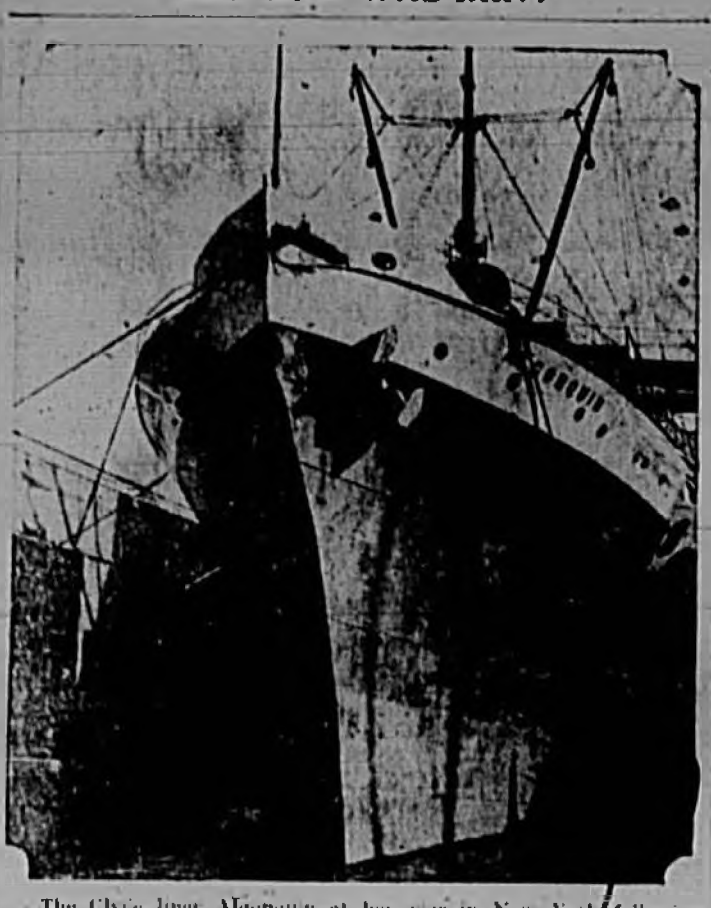

CHINA ADOPTS RESOLUTION TO ALTER COURTS

All Foreigners Living In China Will Now Be Forced To Seek Justice In Native Court

NANKING, Dec. 27.—(INS)—Carrying out a threat made early in the year, the state council of the Chinese nationalist government today announced adoption of a resolution abolishing extra-territoriality.

The government, it was announced, is now drafting a mandate setting forth the terms of the abolition. This will be dispatched to the United States, and the other foreign powers which up until now have enjoyed extra-territoriality in China.

Extra-territoriality permits foreigners residing in China to seek justice in their own courts in civil or criminal legal actions arising in this country.

When the Nanking government announced several months ago that it would seek to abolish the principle of extra-territoriality, there were strong protests by the various foreign governments represented here, and it is a question whether today's declaration will be recognized by the foreign powers.

The United States has made known that it considers that extra-territoriality should be abolished but that it does not believe the time is yet ripe for such a step.

While the Chinese government remains in its present state, the United States feels that foreign residents should not be subjected to Chinese legal proceedings, and should be protected to the extent of obtaining justice in their own courts.

The mandate which will be sent to the powers embodies a code covering all classes of lawsuits between Chinese and foreigners. Whether the terms of this code will be found satisfactory to the foreign powers is a moot question.

The principle of extra-territoriality for all foreign residents in China has been a bitterly discussed issue of years, the Chinese holding it is inimical to Chinese interests, while the foreign powers equally emphatic in supporting it as the only means of protection for their nationals in this country.

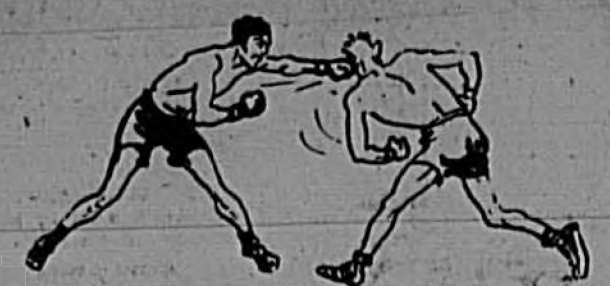

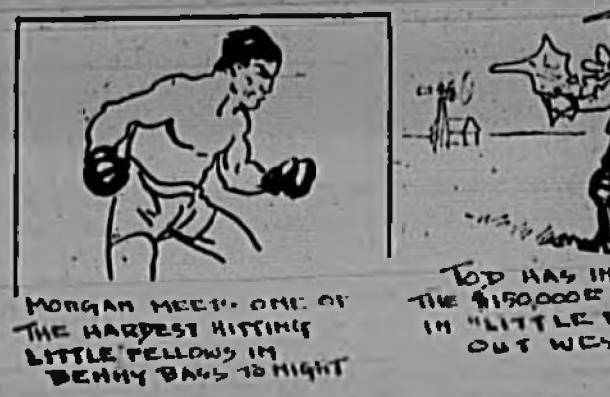

However, we shall wait till New Year's before we make any final conclusions. The booze bounds may have lucked out on Christmas. If they can get by New Year's with equal success, we will believe that liquor is getting better, but may be they can't.

An Air Mail Deficit

The air mail service of the United States cost the country something like seven million dollars over and above its gross income last year. There will be many who will doubtless contend that air mail is impractical and that this enormous expense should be curtailed, if not eliminated altogether.

"Recently an air express line, operating from St. Louis into the Southwest," says the Louisville Courier-Journal, "announced the reduction of its passenger rates to 5 cent a mile, which is down to a point that enables airplanes to compete with trains."

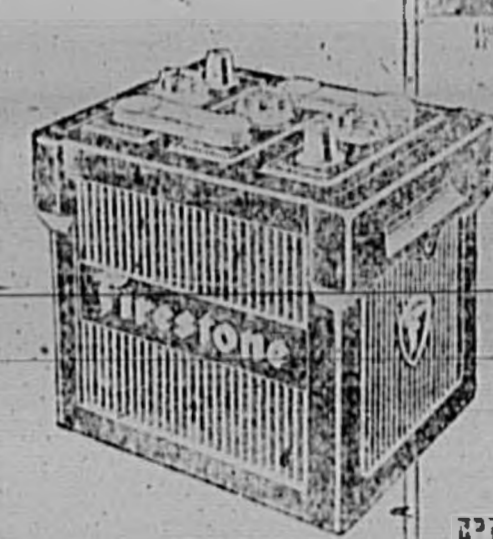
