# Second baby dies; driver arrested

SANFORD - The Sanford man who ran a red light and caused the death of twins a woman was carrying when he struck her car on Rhinehart Road in Lake Mary on Monday has two prior DUI convictions. a number of charges for drug possession, and has lost his li-

cense six times. Kenneth Hinson, 48, is in custody on two counts of ve-hicular homicide, following the death of Violetta Bernauer's twins a little more than 24 hours after the accident.

"He said he kind of took his rie said he kind of took his eyes off the road, and by the time he saw the light it was too late." Lake Mary Police Department Lt. David Guildford said. "He showed remorse. He was sorry for what happened." happened."

Hinson surrendered peace-fully at about 5 p.m. Tuesday when police received a tip that he was staying at a friend's it 705 wiley Ave. in

We think he was kind of hiding out there. Quildford

Police say Hinson has been

in seven traffic accidents, and his last DUI was in 1986. Police at the scene did not be-lieve he was intoxicated in Monday's accident, although the results of the blood tests are not yet available.

Hinson's criminal record includes charges for cultivating marijuana, possession of co-caine, and multiple charges for forging drug prescriptions, police said.

Police traced the phone number of the house on Wiley Avenue with help from a WKMG, channel six reporter who had been interviewing Hinson's son.

Hinson struck Bernauer's 1991 Honda Prelude in the driver's side door Monday when he ran a red light in his 1984 full-sized Dodge pickup. Bernauer, 30, had a green light as she was turning onto Rhinehart Road at 10:57 a.m. from the Manderley Subdivision, police said. sion, police said.

It took rescue workers about 30 minutes to remove Bernauer's car roof so she could be airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center. She suffered a ruptured uterus and lacerations to her test arm and left leg. Bernauer was about 28

"She's recovering well." Brown said. "She'll probably

This was the first pregnancy for Violetta and David Bernauer of Samantha Lane in Lake Mary, who have been married for a year and a half. Brown said.


"Everybody (in the family) was obviously quite concerned and upset." Brown said. There's no way to measure what's going on in the heart and mind."

Hinson was interviewed at the Lake Mary Police Department Tuesday before being transported to the John B. Polk Correctional Facility. He is being held without bond. Hinson is scheduled to make

# Suber wants trial in Orlando

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The trek to Fort Myers for the Joyce Suber vs. Seminole County trial may not be necessary. Suber's attorney has filed an emergency motion to re-consider location. If the motion is successful, the trial most likely would be held in Orlando.

Conway's full schedule prompted a change of venue to Fort Myers. "We're taking the emergency motion at its face

value," Groot said Tuesday. We have not taken a position on the motion that would re-turn the trial to Orlando. We're discussing the issue and awaiting Judge Conway's deci-

Suber's motion begged the court to allow for the abrupt decision on March 10 to change the site where the motion was filed to a site more than 150 miles away and to begin in less than three weeks'

# Winter Springs will develop Town Center over 900 acres

WINTER SPRINGS - After five years of planning for a Town Center on about 200 acres of property, the Winter Springs Commission entered into an agreement with a developer to conduct feasibility studies for developing 900 acres.

The agreement with Joshi and Associates of Florida for the "New Millenium Development Project" will include the Winter Springs Town Center and other properties along State Road 434 between Cen-tral Winds Park and the GreeneWay.

The project is planned to include dining, retail, office, residential and entertainment


Developer Rohit Joshi said the project will include hotels. city offices, libraries, park areas, retail development, and residential development for single families and multiple families.

We want to be with the Winter Parks of Central Florida," Winter Springs Mayor Paul Partyka said. "Right now many people don't know where Winter Springs is. That won't be the case 10 years from now."

I was in the grocery store the other day, picking up some chips, kidney beans, lean ground round, Mexican beer and cheese - you know, representatives of the essential food groups. Grocery stores have little oblong bars that you use to separate your items from the person in front of you. You know, that little black rubberized

I know it's not something you generally think about. It's one of those anonymous items that you take for granted in the modern world - like staples, those little rings in the bottom of blenders and bloated software. But the other day, as I took my place in the "12 Items Or Less" lane, I picked up the bar to place between my little pile and the sugar-free canned fruits and green beans of the little old lady in front of me. I noticed that the bar, instead of being one solid color and covered with the nicks and fingerprints of the generations of consumers that had stood in line before me, was gleaming, white and laminated. And it had a little picture on it. Picking it up, I discovered that the little bar was, in fact, an advertisement for a movie currently showing at a theater near me. Essentially, it was a banner ad, a miniaturized version of a billboard. Of course, you had to rotate the bar and squint to see what movie it was pushing, which kind of diminished its promotional effect. Was this supposed to induce me to drop my groceries, dash down to the multiplex and see this movie immediately, chili and beer be damned? Was that really going to happen? I don't think so. So who came up with this idea? Didn't advertising used to have an actual effect? One had a product, and one picked the advertising campaign that would convince the maximum amount of consumers to buy it. The strategy now seems to be to achieve desired results through massive incrementalism. Any blank surface is a canvas upon which advertisers can splatter copy. Match-books, municipal buses, the sides of blimps, walls, Web pages, refrigerator magnets, unblemished foreheads — all

are sites for messages.

My ATM displays ads. I've heard commercials while on hold on the tele-phone. Once, while pumping gas at my local gas station, I heard a commercial over a loudspeaker at the pump, promoting the very gas station I was standing at. What was the point of that? I mean, I was already there, wasn't 1? Did they want me to drive around the block, and come back

What about stores that promote ments? You're already in the store, shopping, yet you're bombarded with audio messages telling you what a treat it is to shop in that store.

. And product placement. James Bond uses a certain brand of cell phone. Harrison Ford raises a Coke into the shot. Teens fighting aliens make sure that their Tommy jeans labels are clearly visible at all times. Jeff Goldblum and Tom Cruise save the world with Apples.

Cary Grant never ordered a Pepsi at the bar, and Garbo never appeared on screen in Calvin Kleins. If you want a classic, it has to have some timeless appeal. Who knows what products are even going to be around 10 years from now?

Tommy jeans, Pepsi or Nokia phones could be things of the past, making your ultra-modern up-to-date entertainment package look hopeless-ly old-fashioned. Besides, doesn't there seem to be something a little bit desperate about all this relentless adver-tising? There's a fine line between seizing a promotional opportunity and plastering your product on anything that moves. We've crossed that line.

I thought the free market had taken over everything. I thought capitalism was top dog. So why are the agents of our world-beating economic system acting like bratty little sweaty, needy children, tugging at our sleeves, drool-ing on our shoes, whining at us from every corner? Maybe capitalism needs a time-out. Just settle down, O.K.? A nap in the corner, maybe some Ritalin - don't make me come up there. I







oping 200 acres for a town center was around \$200 million. The cost of developing 900 acres would be considerably more, City Manager Ron McLemore said.

'You're looking at more than four times the scope of the original project." McLemore said.

Future studies will show how much money will need be invested in the project, and how many jobs will be created, Joshi and city officials said.

Final planning on the project is expected to be concluded by Jan. 1, 2000. The feasibility phase is expected to take about 90 days. Joshi said.





What better way to greet Easter morning than with some traditional Easter breads? Home-baked bread is always a treat, and with Easter breads you can link your meal to the centuries old traditions with which Christians around the world have marked the holiday.

#### **GREEK EASTER BREAD**

3/4 cup packed light-brown sugar

2 tablespoons active dry yeast 3 cups unbleached, all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons olive oil 3 to 3-1/2 cups unbleached pastry

1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons warm

5 large eggs plus 1 egg yolk juice of 1/2 an orange (about 1/4

1-1/2 tablespoons orange extract 1/2 teespoon vanilla extract

1 teaspoon fine-grained sea salt 4 tablespoons unsalted builter, 4 to 6 hard-boiled Easter eggs for decorating the bread, dyed with

food coloring and rubbed with a bit of olive oil 1 tablespoon honey

1/4 cup sesame seeds or 1/2 cup blanched slivered almonds

In a small bowl, dissolve I teaspoon of the brown sugar in the warm water and sprinkle yeast on it. Set aside in a warm place until foamy, about 10 minutes.

In a large bowl, sift 2 cups of the allpurpose flour. Make a well in the center, and pour in the yeast mixture. Mix and gradually add the 1/2 cup warm milk. Flour a work surface with some of the remaining cup of the allpurpose flour, and knead, working in the rest of that remaining cup, for 10 minutes, until firm and elastic. Brush a bowl and the dough with olive oil and set the dough in the bowl. Cover with a clean, warm, damp kitchen towel and set aside in a warm, draft-free place for about 1 hour, or until doubled in

Beat 5 eggs in a bowl until light and frothy, and beat in the remaining brown sugar, the orange juice, the orange extract, vanilla and salt. Add this mixture to the dough with 3 ta-blespoons of the melted butter, and mix in enough of the pastry flour to make a soft dough. Transfer to a floured surface and kneed 3 m working in any remaining flour to: make a slightly stiff dough.

Divide the dough into 6 pieces. With piece into a 9- or 10-inch rope. Brush a large, heavy baking sheet with the remaining tablespoon of melted butter.

# Wayne is Wildlife Officer of the Year

SANFORD - The Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (GFC) has selected Wildlife Officer Stephen D. Wayne as the state's 1999 Wildlife Officer of the Year. Wayne, 31, lives in Lake County and works in the OFC's 12-county Central Region.

Wayne was born and raised in Hollywood, Fla., and graduated from South Broward High School in 1985. He was 15 years old when he decided he wanted to be a wildlife officer. The revelation came at a remote lake in South Florida during a fishing trip with his

and Fresh Water Fish Commission," Wayne said. Wayne will be the GFC's last Wildlife Officer of the Year for part of the new Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Wayne joined the GFC in 1991 after being accepted to the Commission's 21st Wildlife Officer Training Academy. He attended the academy after carning an associate of arts in liberal arts, an associate of science in law enforcement from Broward Community College and a bachelor of science in criminology from Florida State University.

After completing the academy, Wayne was assigned to Okcechobee County as a fulltime water patrol officer on Lake Okeechobee and the Kissimmece River. During his nearly five years in that position, he became a leader in boating safety enforcement, commercial fishing

enforcement, boating accident investigations, and search and rescue details. He also took advantage of any opportunity to make major resource cases on land.

# Hornets rally, deal Lions first loss

# Lyman rallies, Lake Mary rolls in Paul Mikler-Reebok Classic

OVIEDO - One of the captivating qualities of baseball is that there's no time clock to kill and, as a result, no way to stall to try and protect a lead. As Bill Veeck once said, you have to throw the ball up there and let the other guys take their hacks.

The Oviedo Lions, leading 8-I in the top of the third inning. had to do just that.

And the Bishop Moore Hornets, on the short end of that score, did just that.

The result was an astonishing 12-8 come-from-behind victory by the once-beaten Hornets (15-1) in Tuesday's nightcap of the second day of the Paul Mikler-Reebok Classic being played at Oviedo High School's Mikier Field.

It was the first loss of the season for Oviedo (12-1). In other games Tuesday, both the Lyman Oreyhounds and the Lake Mary Rams rebounded from extra-inning losses Monday to score wins. Lyman scraped by the Boone Braves, 4-3. in eight innings before Lake Mary held off the Colonial Grenadiers, 10-7.

With two-thirds of the tournament complete, Bishop Moore (2-0) is the sole undefeated team while Oviedo, Lake Mary, Lyman, and Boone are all 1-1 in tournament play. Colonial has lost both of its games.



# This way or that?

Most finesses are simple in theory: If a key opponent has the missing high honor, you gain an extra trick. But sometimes you will be faced with a two-way finesse, one you can take through either opponent. Then, you must either use the available information — perhaps an opponent entered the auction — or guess well.

Take today's deal as an example. You cruise into four spades. West begins the defense by cashing the club ace-king; then, in answer to a come-out signal, he plays a third round to East's queen. Back comes a heart. You need the rest of the tricks. So, along with requiring the diamond finesse to succeed, you must decide which opponent holds the trump queen. Whom will you


pick? Why?

pick? Why?

North's raise to two spades doesn't guarantee four trumps. With a minimum opening and 3-4-5-1 distribution, you should raise partner, not rebid two diamonds. (Never rebid in a five-card suit unless you have absolutely nothing else to do.) Even with 3-1-5-4, it is better to raise partner than to rebid two clubs. So, South's jump to three no-trump describes a balanced hand with same values and only four hand with game values and only four spades. North, with four-card support, retreats to the major-suit game.

The key clue is West's initial pass. He has produced the club ace-king, and you must assume he has the dia-mond king. So, if he has the spade queen as well, he started with 12 high-card points. These days, most players open with that count. True, it's not a certainty, but it's better than nothing. Play East for the spade queen.

# Migraines and sex

DEAR DR. GOTT: I read with interest your column about a woman who suffered migraine headaches whenever she had sex. The reverse is true for

I often suffer from cluster-type and tension headaches that are invariably relieved by orgasm. My supportive husband is always quite willing to give me my "therapy." I wonder if my solu-tion to a headache problem is unique. What do you think?

DEAR READER: Most cases of severe headache, including migraine, are not cured by having sex, with one exception: Tension headache. In this instance, stress causes the shoulder, neck and scalp muscles to contract; headache is a common consequence. Obviously, any stress-relieving tech-nique — be it mild tranquilisers, hot packs, massage or orgasm — can get rid of the headache by releasing mus-cle spasm. Your situation is not unique but your solution won't work for everyone.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Why would any doctor in his right mind operate on an \$5-year-old woman to remove her spleen? The organ was supposedly manufacturing too many blood cells,

but the patient didn't survive the surgery.

DEAR READER: Without more information, I cannot form an opinion about this difficult situation. Tragically, the patient did not survive the procedure. However, if she had been active, alert and independent, the operation may have been appropriate. She might have had a form of leukemia, called a lymphoproliferative disorder, from which she would have died if her spieen weren't removed. Sometimes these decisions are diffi-

cult to judge, even in retrospect. Nonetheless, I am sure that the patient's doctor would be willing to discuss, with family members, the reasons for the surgery, as well as the reasons why she died.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 62-year-old woman who was troubled with consti-pation since childhood. I began using 2 tablespoons of a fast-acting antacid for stomach gas, and that solved the problem. Why would an antacid work?

DEAR READER: Because aluminum hydroxide (the active ingredient in many antacid preparations) is extremely constinating, most manufacturers add a mild laxative (such as



magnesium carbonate) to their prod-ucts to overcome this obstacle. Your intestine is probably reacting to the magnesium. If your constipation prob-lem has been solved, you will not harm yourself by using small am of the product on a regular basis.
