



# Keep The 'Clouds' Away

A \$5,000 increase in the homestead exemption for persons over 65 has been recommended by the State Tax Reform Commission.

The proposal, one of five constitutional changes recommended by the commission, was prompted by the fact that many retired persons with limited fixed incomes have been induced to purchase homes in Florida based on representations that the state grants tax exemptions on homesteads up to the value of \$5,000 and that real estate assessments were low.

In their report, the tax group pointed out that the proposed amendment would relieve the impact of the recent reassessment program which brought property tax assessments to 100 percent valuation.

The Commission feels the constitution should retain the regular \$5,000 homestead exemption for everyone and add another \$5,000 for senior citizens who own homes on or before Jan. 1, 1968.

Doubtless, the 100 percent property tax assessments have become burdensome on retirees with fixed incomes and if we are to keep many from becoming public charges some relief must be afforded property tax-wise.

## Dr. Crane's Worry Clinic

CASE B-540: Frank T., aged 52, is an athletic coach at high school.

"Dr. Crane," he began, "we know that regular exercise will make muscles enlarge."

"But just how does the human body accomplish this?"

"Since I teach a course in Hygiene, many of my athletes have asked me for the specific medical explanation."

Hypertrophy and Hyperplasia

There are two ways by which the muscle (as well as a gland) can enlarge.

One of these is hypertrophy, which means the individual cells in the muscle or gland actually grow larger.

The other usually occurs simultaneously and is hyperplasia, which means the cells divide and re-divide till there are actually many more muscle or glandular cells.

Then these new cells enlarge (hypertrophy).

Farm folks are aware of the fact that a young cow (heifer) does not give as much milk with her first calf as with the third or fourth.

For the nursing action of the first calf stimulates the cells in her udder till they enlarge and also multiply, as explained above.

Young wives experience this same effect if they nurse their babies.

With the first infant, such a mother may not have adequate breast milk, so it may require partial feeding from the bottle.

But by the second or third baby, such a mother may have ample milk to feed the later babies entirely at the breast.

Why? Hypertrophy and hyperplasia!

## Jurist Favors Vote For 18-Year-Olds

Circuit Judge Richard H. Cooper of Orange County, was principal speaker at the South Seminole Jayers' second annual Distinguished Service Awards banquet at the Trade-Winds Cafeteria.

He expressed concern about the smog in the thinking of the people, which is, in his opinion, a greater threat than either air or water pollution.

In reference to the "credibility" of the young voters, he said, "It is not clear thinking about the essentials of our way of life, and officials must not be afraid to face up to realities and tell the truth."

Judge Cooper also came out in favor of giving 18-year-olds the right to vote. "After graduating from high school, these days," he said, "the young people know a lot more about civic and government than we did at 21."

## Social Security Proposal Costly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Social Security Administration says a 20 per cent average increase in Social Security benefits as proposed by President Johnson would cost \$12 billion the first year.

It said that lifting the minimum monthly payment from \$44 to \$70 as Johnson suggested would cost about \$700 million.

Other items in the President's proposed \$4.1 billion Social Security increase package would be relatively inexpensive, officials said in answer to questions from Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del.

The agency did not say how it is proposed to finance the increases.

## Production Levels Off

WASHINGTON (AP) — Industrial production continued to level off in December, says the Federal Reserve Board.

Figures released Tuesday showed that the output of the nation's mines, mills and factories rose one-tenth of 1 per cent during December to 158.7 per cent of the 1957-59 base period. The December output was 1 per cent above December 1965.

The level was just short of October's record of 159.1. The index reflected the general economic slowdown experienced late last year.

## Charity Deductions Have Specific Limits

You may deduct any cash payments made during 1966 to any recognized charity. Contributions to needy individuals — no matter how worthy the cause — are never deductible.

Generally, deductible contributions will include your church, Red Cross, United Appeal and similar agencies. Pledges made to churches and similar organizations are not deductible, only the amount actually paid on them in the year covered by the return.

Deductible contributions must be within maximum limitations, although such limits rarely affect the average person. The limits are 20 per cent of adjusted gross income for contributions to private charitable foundations and 30 per cent of adjusted gross income if public charities got at least 10 per cent of your gifts.

While there can never be a deduction for the value of personal services performed in behalf of charity, in some instances out-of-pocket expenses in certain types of volunteer work are deductible. This would include expenses incurred while serving as an unpaid delegate to a church convention, attending meetings as a church choir member, serving as a (gray) Lady or hospital volunteer, or as a den mother to Cub Scouts, Brownie troops or similar organizations.

Such expenses might include transportation expenses (you may charge five cents a mile for the use of your car), parking charges, the cost of required uniforms which are not adaptable to ordinary wear and the cost of meals and lodging while performing such volunteer service. Attach a statement to your return detailing these expense items.

If you contributed works of art, clothing, furniture, home appliances to a charity, the fair market value of the item — what you would have received for it in cash on the open market — determines your deduction.

## Answers For Veterans

Q. What is the maximum net worth VA allows and still be entitled to pension benefits? — J. C. M.

A. VA's official position as to net worth is that there is no set limit. However, generally the net worth cut off point is about \$10,000. That is, if your assets such as property, stocks and bonds, savings, etc. (not including your home) were to exceed \$10,000, you probably would lose VA pension benefits unless your net worth fell below this amount. At such time as it did fall below the \$10,000 mark you could apply to have your benefits reinstated. Only half of the total value of real estate, stocks, bonds, savings, etc., that is jointly owned with another person would count as yours.

Q. What part of my VA compensation is taxable? — L. F. T.

A. No VA benefits are taxable, nor should they be reported.

Q. Is counseling available from VA to help me decide on a course of instruction for the new G.I. bill? — E. H. S.

A. Yes.

Q. How can I find out what schools are approved for training under the new G.I. bill? — S. J. S.

A. Generally, all schools that have state approval would also have VA approval. Most schools are aware of which courses they offer that are VA approved. If you are interested in a course but can't determine if it is an approved course, simply apply to VA and they will make a determination and advise you.

## Homemaker's Corner

**APPLE ORANGE TEA BREAD**  
2 large oranges  
1/2 cup seedless raisins  
1 cup canned apple sauce  
2 cups sifted flour  
2 tps. baking powder  
1 tps. soda  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 tps. salt  
1/2 cup nuts  
1 egg  
2 tps. melted butter or margarine  
Squeeze juice from oranges. Put through food chopper with raisins. Add orange juice, rind and raisins to apple sauce. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, sugar and salt; add apple sauce mixture and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Beat egg, add with melted butter or margarine, stirring until thoroughly blended. Pour into greased loaf pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 70-80 minutes. Remove from pan; cool on wire rack. The bread will slice better if allowed to stand 12 hours.

**BAKED BEANS 'N' APPLE SAUCE**  
1 lb. 2 oz. can baked beans  
2 cups canned apple sauce  
1/2 cup chili sauce  
1/2 cup minced onion  
1/2 cup brown sugar

1 tps. Worcestershire sauce  
1 lb. frankfurters  
Canned baked beans, apple sauce, chili sauce, onion, brown sugar and Worcestershire sauce. Pour into casserole. Place frankfurters on top. Cover, bake in 325 degree oven, 30 minutes. Serve 4-6.

**HAMBURGER BISCUIT PUFFS**  
This one is easy because you do not have to heat the oven. The meat and biscuits cook all in one skillet.

1 lb. ground beef  
1 egg, slightly beaten  
1/2 cup orange juice  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 tps. Wesson oil  
2 canned biscuits  
1/2 tsp. oregano  
1 tsp. paprika  
1 green pepper, chopped  
1 onion, chopped  
Mix the meat with egg, salt and pepper; shape into 12 small balls. Brown in hot oil. While meat is browning, shape biscuits into small balls and roll in oregano and paprika. When meat is browned, add green pepper and onion, stir a bit to brown, browned bits. Arrange biscuits on top of hamburgers. Cover tightly. Cook over medium heat about 20 minutes, until biscuits are done. Serve 4.

**TROPICAL MUFFINS**  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/4 tps. baking soda  
1 tps. salt  
1/2 cup shredded coconut  
1 cup shortening, melted  
1 egg, well beaten  
1 cup mashed ripe bananas  
1/2 cup orange juice  
1 tps. grated orange rind  
Sift together, in a bowl, the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add coconut, shortening, egg, bananas, orange juice and orange rind. Add dry ingredients, stir quickly with a fork until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon batter into greased muffin pans filling each half. Bake in a moderate oven (325 degrees) for 25-30 minutes. Makes 12-18 muffins.

**LAMB DILLIES**  
1 1/2 lb. ground lamb  
3 slices bacon  
2 tps. grated onion  
2 tps. prepared mustard  
1 tps. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
3 to 4 dill pickles  
Dice bacon and cook until crisp. Drain and combine the bacon and onion and add onion, mustard, salt and pepper. Mix well. Pat into pan. Place a row of whole dill pickles end to end on top of meat mixture. Roll meat as for a jelly roll. Cut into 12 one-inch slices. Place slices on broiler pan and rack. Cut side down. 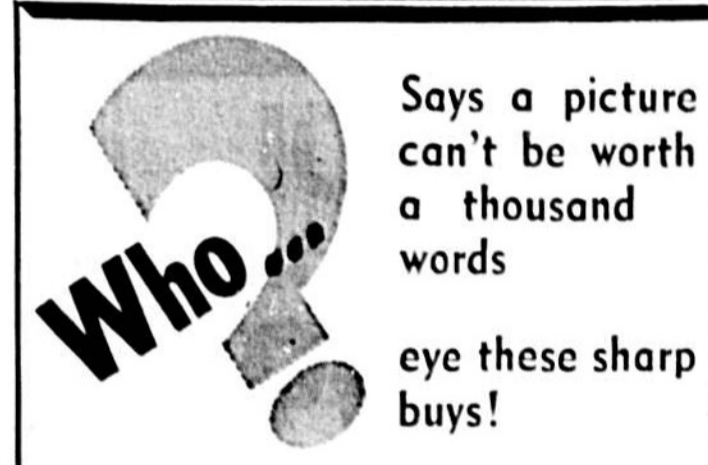

Thursday started out.  
Note on the AP teletype: "Memo to all telegraph offices. McNamara will have an announcement at 3 p.m. about more base closings."  
Reporter: "WDBO radio said last night there is no truth to the rumor about the Base. Said the Pentagon disallows 'leaks' of confidential information and especially dislikes getting leaks before they can make an official announcement."  
Call from Herlong: "McNamara is going to make an announcement about other base closings. Pentagon says nothing new 'em all. Maybe he'll announce it next week."  
Editor: "Write a little story - false alarm."
