K-9 puts the bite on burglar

A Winter Springs burglar met up with not only the long arm of the law Tuesday night, but the sharp teeth of a Seminole County Sheriff's office K-9 as well.

Winter Springs police lieutenant Jim Flannigan was on routine patrol Tuesday night when he spotted a vehicle traveling without its headlights on Seneca Boulevard. When Flannigan attempted to make a routine traffic stop, the driver of the vehicle took evasive action and drove to nearby Candice Court where he then fled on foot. The Winter Springs police department simultaneously received a call from a resident on Seneca Boulevard reporting that a theft had just occurred at the residence.

A Seminole County Sheriff's K-9 unit was dispatched to aid Flannigan. Police found the suspect hiding in nearby bushes, and after several unsuccessful attempts to coax him out, the K-9 was released.

The suspect, Eugene Cahoon, received bites on his arms and legs prior to apprehension. He was treated at South Seminole Hospital and then booked into the Seminole County jail.

Cahoon, 26, 605 David Street, Winter Springs, is charged with burglary to an occupied structure, grand theft, and resisting arrest without violence.

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Bush calls for end of racial set-asides

SANFORD — Governor Jeb Bush on Tuesday announced his One Florida Initiative to end racial preferences and set-asides in state contracting and university admissions.

The initiative would eliminate race and ethnicity as a factor in university admis-

sions. At the same time, the "Talented 20" component of the plan would guarantee state university admission to the top 20 percent of students in every Florida high school senior class.

"Even with the elimination of race and ethnicity as a factor in admissions, the Talented 20 Program will result in a net increase in minority enrollment in the state university system," Bush said.

The executive orders are effective immediately in the 13 state agencies under the Office of the Governor. Some changes in minority contracting require legislation. Some of Bush's education proposals require funding from the Legislature or approval of the Board of Regents.

Lyman student threatens to blow up school

15-year-old faces felony charges

LONGWOOD — A 15-year-old Lyman High School student faces second-degree felony charges after issuing a verbal threat Monday to blow up the school.

A Lyman employee told assistant principal Lowman Oliver that Thomas Giallanza, while sitting in the discipline office, made a verbal statement that he was going to blow the school up. Lyman staff member Jane Stachow, witnessed the

teen's statement according to the Longwood police department arrest record, and informed Oliver.

Giallanza was waiting to see an administrator on another disciplinary matter when he began using profanity and issued the threat. Stachow told police that based on Giallanza's previous discipline problems she felt the student was capable of carrying out the threat and immediately informed the assistant principal.

Oliver issued Giallanza two days of in-school suspension for using profane language and instructed the student to remain in the discipline office while he discussed the issue with the school's resource officer.

Giallanza left the building shortly thereafter and could not be located following a search of See Threat, Page 2A

Police searching for Lake Mary man

SANFORD— Investigators with the Seminole County Sheriff's office are seeking the public's assistance in trying to locate a missing and endangered Lake Mary adult.

David Christopher Clary, 25, has been missing since May 2 when he last spoke to a family member by phone.

Investigators said that during that conversation Clary threatened suicide and sounded depressed and possibly under the influence of alcohol and/or

drugs. Police said he has not been to his workplace, Phoenix International, located in Heathrow since April 30.

Authorities found his apartment abandoned in June and he has not been heard from or seen since the May 2 phone call.

Clary is described as a white male, 5'5", weighing about 150 pounds. He has brown eyes, brown hair, a light complexion and muscular build.

Investigator Neal Fowler said Clary has no previous criminal record but simply disappeared.

McLain balks at \$43.6 M for center

Club Juana owner files Harris claim

SANFORD — Commissioner Daryl McLain dropped his Stetson on the desk and for a couple of hours on Tuesday became the Lone Ranger in a losing effort to scrap the county's plans to spend \$43.6 million to build a Criminal Justice

Center and renovate the current Courthouse.

The Board of Commissioners voted 4-1 to move ahead with the project.

The Criminal Justice Center, to be located at Five Points, will cost \$29.2 million, renovations on the courthouse \$9.6 million. RFPs for design proposals and building contracts soon will go out from the county's purchasing department.

"Do we need something of this magnitude?" McLain asked. "We're doing this all backwards — spending on something we may not be able to afford. I'm

not willing to take this kind of foolhardy risk."

"It all makes sense to me," responded Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide. "It's a reasonable plan."

Chairman Carlton Henley agreed.

"I'm very comfortable with it. Now, we can proceed with the RFP," Henley said. "It's very important to move forward."

Commissioner Grant Maloy joined McLain on a vote against a \$1.9 purchase of 10.6 acres of land near the county jail that the county could use for additional See Center, Page 2A

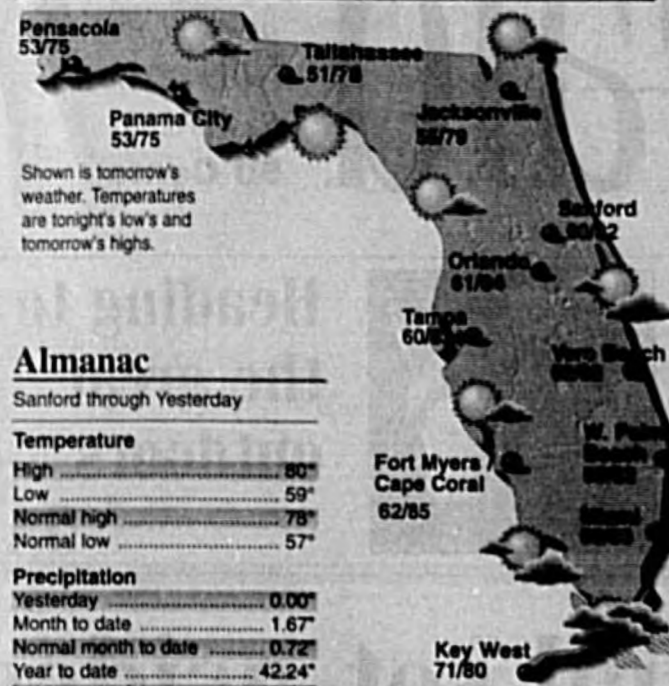

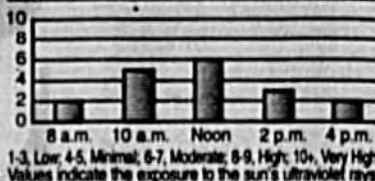

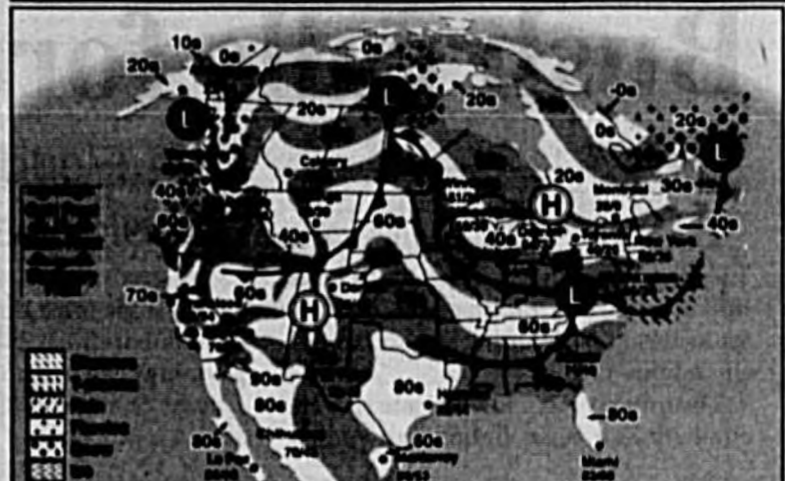

jail space or for courthouse or office space. Commissioner Randy Morris said, "This is a very good deal." Van Der Weide called it "a visionary move."

Late Tuesday, the county received notification that Mike Pinter, the owner of Club Juana, had filed a Bert Harris Act damages claim, demanding that the county and the city of Casselberry pay \$3,487,064.00 for loss of business.

Once the county and city's ordinances prevented nude dancing at adult clubs, Club Juana claims it lost nearly

\$220,000 in the eight-month period that ended July 31. The focus of Club Juana's claim is property rights. Pinter claims the new ordinances sharply reduced the value of his land and building.

County Manager Kevin Grace said that he received a 700-page claim late Tuesday. Casselberry officials earlier had received the claim.

"We've turned it over to County Attorney Bob McMillan," Grace said.

Casselberry Attorney Donna McIntosh said that the city would aggressively defend its

rights to regulate the sale of alcohol and the display of nudity in Casselberry.

Thieves abscond with cable equipment

SANFORD — Time Warner cable subscribers at the Lake Howell Condominiums, 522 Georgetown Drive in Casselberry, have become the latest victims of cable amplifier theft.

A total of six amplifiers that serve the complex were stolen sometime late Sunday night or Monday morning, Time Warner discovered, the thefts Monday

morning while checking into complaints by some subscribers that their service was out Monday morning.

Time Warner officials indicate they have had several hundred of the cable amplifiers stolen over the summer months in Seminole, Orange, and Osceola counties. The cable amplifiers are used to boost and strengthen cable signals. Each amplifier can serve up to 15 subscribers.

Thieves appear to have a key, which opens weatherproof

boxes that house the amplifiers. Cable officials suspect the culprits are familiar with the cable industry and equipment used, and may have found a black-market for the amplifiers. They apparently target condominiums and apartment complexes.

college admissions at 10 percent of total enrollment and eventually phase them out. Last year, 11.6 percent of the state's college freshmen were admitted to the state university system using some form of preference, such as race, ethnicity, athletic or artistic ability.

Florida already has a ballot initiative to end race and ethnic preferences in state employment, contracting and higher education before the state Supreme Court. The Court will decide whether the four petitions of the initiative are constitutional and can go before the voters.

Larry Furlong, chairman of the Seminole County School Board, said that he favors the elimination of racial preferences and set-asides in state contracting and university admissions.

"I'm against discrimination in any form," Furlong said. "To admit student X and turn down student Y because of race, I don't see how that's ever fair regardless of what was done in the past."

However, Furlong opposes guaranteed admission to the university system for the top 20 percent of students in the state's high schools because it would lessen the importance of the Scholastic Achievement Test.

Critics claim the SAT is racially biased because of gaps in scores between African-Americans and whites.

"Frankly I would prefer that universities set their own admissions policies," Furlong said. "The grade-point average can be far more subjective from school to school than a nationally prepared test."

Bush is proposing \$1.6 million in funding to make the Preliminary Scholastic Achievement Test available to all Florida tenth-graders so that the state's eleventh-graders will be better prepared to take the SAT.

The initiative also includes proposed funding for a 43 percent increase in need-based financial aid of \$20 million.

The plan would include components to increase the availability of Advanced Placement courses taken for college credit in low performing high schools. The plan also would call for a partnership with the College Board to improve college preparation for students at low performing schools.

Schools that offer AP courses receive about \$850 for every student who scores at least a three out of five on the AP test. Bush is recommending that AP teachers receive 20 percent of the additional funds, and that in D and F schools teachers receive 30 percent of the funds.

There would be \$2.4 million available to expand Florida's On-Line High School to target students in Florida's 65 D and F high schools, \$10 million for the Governor's Mentoring Initiative,

and a \$1 million increase in funding for the College Reach-Out Program.

An additional portion of the plan calls for the creation of the Equity in Educational Opportunity Task Force to make recommendations on eliminating inequities in the K-12 educational system.

The state-contracting component of the One Florida Initiative includes plans for:

- The elimination of racial set-asides and racial price preferences.
- Seminole County does not have racial set-asides or racial price preferences in its contracting.
- Reform of the procurement process to encourage the pursuit of diversity by making the state's procurement agents more accountable for their purchasing decisions. Procurement officers will report directly to the Governor and their positions will be reclassified from career service to select exempt status.
- Reduction of the red tape in the minority certification process to encourage more minority businesses to become certified.
- Enhancement of minority business development through financial and technical assistance programs that target the development needs of emerging minority businesses, minority construction firms and minority franchises.

School Daze

The American Federation of Teachers is sponsoring a television commercial that suggests concern over the quality of public schools once may have been legitimate, but conditions are better now. Are they?

In Cleveland last week, four white students were arrested and seven others questioned in what authorities say was a racially motivated plan to shoot up a predominately black high school. Police say the planned assault was patterned after last spring's Columbine High School massacre in Colorado.

In Detroit, as many as eight girls have been sexually assaulted over the past two months while walking to school.

In Chicago, ABC News found that the public school system owns 24 cemetery plots to be used as needed when one of their students dies from gunshot wounds.

In Joplin, Mo., an elementary school teacher said she was only being funny when she taped a bag containing cat feces to the desk of a misbehaving student. The teacher was responding to the 11-year-old student, who reportedly told school classmates to "suck a turd."

But it is in heavily Baptist and conservative San Antonio, Texas, that the continued failure of public schools to shape character and improve minds became personal. My daughter and son-in-law recently moved to San Antonio with their four children. Since 1980, no child or grandchild of mine has attended a public school. Because they arrived near the end of October, the private schools were filled. The children were forced to attend public schools. Some cried over the prospect.

This note from my 13-year-old grandson, Chris, shows why our family decision in favor of private education has been correct: "Public school was very uncomfortable my first day. The first thing I heard out of someone's mouth was profanity. I'm not saying I never heard it being used in a private school, because these days anything can happen anywhere I asked someone in the school if they were ever under the threat of bombs and he said yes, just this year! So I went along to gym class and one of the kids opened up the locker and there was gunpowder. He took it to the coach and the coach said absolutely nothing. He threw it in the trash and told the kid to go and sit

down. "The other issue is that the teachers use profanity and I am not comfortable with that."

Indeed one might expect teachers to model not only the things that are true — but also the things that are virtuous and promote civil discourse.

Chris concluded: "I still feel a lot safer in private school, knowing that (here) any second, any hour or any day someone can come in and kill us all."

This young man has such a well-developed sense of right and wrong that when an adult asked

him this past summer if he and his classmates had discussed the tragedy at Columbine, he said, "Yes, ma'am, and we concluded that the two boys were personally responsible for their actions and could not blame anyone else."

At a public elementary school, a younger grandson told his mother that during calisthenics his classmates appeared to be making mantra-like sounds to pagan gods.

Thankfully, slots in private schools opened up for all of them the following day, prompting expressions of relief from the adults and a note expressing love and gratitude from Chris.

The Democratic presidential candidates want to trap kids in public schools because they are beholden to the teachers unions and the cash that fuels their campaigns. Republicans are right to make education choice a part of their campaigns for the White House. No child should be in fear of his or her life while in school. No teacher should be allowed to use profanity in class.

The television commercial is designed to distract us from what is occurring in public schools. But news reports and one shocking personal experience in one school system for one day are enough to convince me that all of the money we've sunk into private education is working.

President Bill Clinton and Vice President Al Gore claim to support public education. But when confronted with a choice, they chose private schools for their children while continuing to deny an equal opportunity to parents of lesser means and influence. Aren't Democrats supposed to care for the little guy?

Clinton's transformation into Backroom Bill

Unlit cigar clenched in his jaw, Bill Clinton is working his national political machine for Al Gore.

Labor. Teachers. Environmentalists. Gays. Seniors. All the usual suspects of Democratic party power are being dragooned into the great, all-out war for 2000.

The man calling these regiments into battle is a commander-in-chief who, like Ronald Reagan before him, won the White House twice in his own name and yearns for a valedictory victory by his hand-picked successor. William Jefferson Clinton does not wish to enter 21st-century history books as a seat-warmer between two presidents named George Bush.

To achieve the victory and avoid the humiliation, the man in the Oval Office is running a quiet, relentless campaign to galvanize the Democratic party's most loyal legions into a rabid fighting force for Vice

President Gore. He's energizing environmentalists with his decision to save 40 million acres of national forest from the developers.

He's leading labor's fight for a higher minimum wage, while taking the edge off NAFTA by talking up a "human face" on economic globalization.

He's pushing Congress for those 100,000 new teachers. He's reminding gays and lesbians of the frustrated fight for their open service in the American military.

He's pushing for the government to buy free prescription drugs for seniors while offering no painful prescriptions for either reforming Medicare or protecting the solvency of Social Security as the Baby Boom generation heads toward 65. "We ought to change but we ought to build on what we've done to reach for the stars," Clinton said recently, "not take a U-

turn and get us back to the same trouble we were in in 1992."

In each case, he's energizing a unit of the Democratic army, ginning up its fighting spirit, reminding his old ally of the stakes. Rather than bragging about past accomplishments, he's hyping what still needs to be done in the future, and what promises to get done if the White House is kept in activist Democratic hands.

In this new role as old-style political boss, Clinton can maximize his immense popularity among the Democratic and liberal loyalists without alerting those independents and independent-minded Democrats who want a clear break from the Clinton-Gore era. By working the usual suspects he avoids energizing those who still find Clinton himself somewhat suspect.

My encounter with Nathaniel of East Sanford

I met Nathaniel early Friday morning. Dashing out the front door on my way to work, I saw him crossing the intersection of Magnolia Ave. and 8th Street headed my way. I didn't jump into my car and lock the door. Instead, I waited as he approached and shook his hand when he introduced himself.

Since moving into our home last June, my husband and I have met many like Nathaniel. Mostly, they are good-natured and harmless, though my husband has debated this with me numerous times, insisting I not open the door when he isn't at home. At first, we gave them a few dollars. But we learned quickly that a single five-dollar bill has repercussions. The recipients come back and knock on the door. Persistently, undeterred by the sound of our dogs' barking. The news travels. They offer to pull weeds in our postage stamp-sized front yard. They tell us they only need another \$4 to pay for diapers or \$4.50 to help them make the utility bill. It is never an amount divisible by 5.

Friday, Nathaniel asked for "a couple of dollars." I knew I only had a twenty and I felt pretty confident that Nathaniel wouldn't have change. What to do? My journalistic instincts kicked in.

"Where do you live?" I asked, although it was pretty plain that Nathaniel was not

sleeping on a Sealy Posturpedic with clean sheets. "East side of town," he replied, waving his arm to include the neighborhood.

"Me, too," I responded feebly. "What do you do?" I asked.

"Yard work, mostly," he said. "We don't have much of a yard," I told him, pointing at the house. "And we do our own yard work," I added, recalling pulling potato vines off what remains of our anemic shrubbery a few weeks ago when the weather finally cooled. "Are you looking for a job? I'll do what I can to help you find one."

"No, ma'am. Can't do that every day. Can't promise no one to be nowhere every day like that."

"Well, what about day labor," I suggested, since Nathaniel obviously had a problem with long-term commitments.

"No, ma'am. Can't do that either. I have a problem," Nathaniel told me, hanging his head. "Problem with drugs."

"Are you getting help?" "From the Lord. I have faith in the Lord." I told Nathaniel where I work and suggested he come by the newspaper and we'd put him in touch with folks who could try to help.

"No, ma'am, I can't promise to do that." It was clear that Nathaniel is a man who doesn't make promises.

Since I wasn't handing over any cash and Nathaniel wanted nothing else, our conversation ended there. I shook Nathaniel's hand once again, noting it was missing a thumb. I wished him well, told him to keep the faith. He thanked me profusely, although I'd given him nothing outside of a few minutes of my time. He was walking north on Magnolia as I drove away.

I can tell you that Nathaniel struck me as a good man, a man who would not do others harm, a man with a good heart who could still feel pain at his loss of dignity. A man whose eyes showed shame of an addiction he could not control. I recognized that look. A lifetime ago I knew someone with eyes like that. Someone whom I could not save and whose destruction I could not bear to witness. Someone I finally had to walk away from. Someone I loved.

It is human nature to want to fix every problem we encounter. In the real world, however, I have learned that some problems have no solutions, that you cannot "help" anyone who doesn't wish to accept it.

Nathaniel — and those like him in every town and every city — is one of those who doesn't want help. He wants cash. And when we meet him, we tend to have one of two reactions: either we pretend that he does not exist or we attempt to banish him to someone else's backyard.

I am not comfortable with either of those choices.

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Win at Bridge

Take care for success

If you were sitting South in today's deal, you would probably congratulate yourself on the excellent bidding. You did well to overcome East's pre-emptive opening. However, after winning trick one with dummy's diamond ace, you play off your two top trumps and learn that you must lose a spade trick. Twelve easy tricks have suddenly disappeared. In addition to the trump trick, you are also faced with a diamond loser, and there's the club finesse to consider. How would you continue?
As the advancer of South's takeout double, North cue-bid to show a suitable hand for game. In addition, he wanted South to suggest a major. South jumped to five spades both to show his extra strength and to try to indicate that he had two fast diamond losers.

Getting the message, North went on to six.
Note that six spades is the right spot: six hearts must fail here.
After the diamond ace and two top trumps, it is time to switch to hearts. And when West shows up with four of them, you can discard your diamond loser. Now you can avoid relying on the club finesse as long as you ruff dummy's diamond loser. (This is wrong only if East started with eight diamonds, but then he probably would have opened four diamonds, not three.) You continue with a trump to dummy's queen, then you call for the last heart, discarding a club. If West ruffs, he must lead a club away from the King.
So, let's assume he discards. However, that only delays the evil moment. You exit with dummy's final trump, discarding another club from hand. West is endplayed for sure now.

Milk allergy may cause symptoms

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from explosive diarrhea if I consume milk or cream. I don't have a problem if I steam the milk, and I have no symptoms from eating cheese, chocolate milk, Lactaid or buttermilk. My doctor says this is due to lactose intolerance, but this doesn't seem plausible. Can you sort this out?
DEAR READER: Lactose intolerance (diarrhea and bloating after eating products that contain the milk sugar lactose) is a common disorder, especially in seniors. The problem stems from an inadequate supply of the enzyme (lactase) that digests milk. People with this annoying but harmless affliction quickly discover that milk products in any form initiate symptoms. Thus, if you have lactose intolerance, it is a very unusual case — otherwise you

would experience diarrhea after eating cheese, ice cream and so forth.
The easiest way to solve the diagnostic dilemma is to have a hydrogen breath test. This simple and inexpensive procedure will tell immediately if you are, indeed, lactose intolerant.
If, as you and I suspect, the problem isn't lactose, your next step should be to see an allergist, who will test you for milk allergies, a different condition. For example, you could be reacting to a milk protein that is denatured by heating and processing.
DEAR DR. GOTT: In a two-week interval last year, I had 10 chest X-rays, an abdominal film, and a CT scan of the abdomen and pelvis. Could this X-ray exposure have damaged my internal organs?
DEAR READER: The effects of radiation are cumulative, as a general rule. Therefore, while you received a whole of a lot of diagnostic radiation within a short time, this

amount is actually averaged out over your life span. Moreover, modern X-ray machines expose patients to far less radiation than was previously the case.
I share your concern that excessive medical radiation can, in some instances, cause harm — such as leukemia, cancer and thyroid problems. This is why I encourage patients (and readers) to examine the risk/benefit ratio of diagnostic testing. Your doctors were apparently searching for an illness that needed treatment. The risks of not receiving treatment probably exceeded the small risk of radiation damage. Therefore, you probably underwent appropriate testing (I say "probably" because I am not familiar with your medical history or the reasons you were tested.) Although I encourage you to avoid exposure to unnecessary radiation in the future, I doubt that your testing last year will have a harmful effect on your health.

Autumn brings delicious desserts made with the fruits of fall

I'm always a little sad when summer ends and takes all the great berries and melons, peaches and plums with it. After all, there goes "instant dessert."

But fall has its own rewards: apples, pears and certain squashes (such as pumpkins) all present great dessert possibilities. Another fall fruit that I have recently become enamored of is the persimmon, although I am told that the late November harvest is tastier than those available in earlier months.

Unlike summer fruits, which make transcendent desserts all on their own, fall fruits require a little more gussying up. (OK, there's nothing wrong with a plain apple or pear, but it's not what guests anticipate when you say the word "dessert.")

Below are three delicious autumnal treats. They include Tarte Tatin, a classic French upside-down pie that is usually made with apples but appears here (courtesy of the New England Culinary Institute in Montpelier, Vt.) with pears. The Apple Bread Pudding, made with challah (an egg bread which also makes killer French toast), is from my favorite dessert cookbook, "Classic Home Desserts," by the late Richard Sax (his book includes no less than 16 recipes for bread pudding). The persimmon "ice cream" — made in minutes in the food processor — is from Janet Fletcher's seasonal cooking guide, "Fresh From the Farmers' Market."

I guess each season really does have its own rewards. For example, I think of winter as the "chocolate season." I can hardly wait.

TARTE TATIN

For the crust:

- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar (optional)
- 9 tablespoons well-chilled butter

up to 5 tablespoons ice water

For the filling:

- 8 pears
- lemon juice
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup sugar

To make the crust: In a mixing bowl, or the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal blade, mix together the flour and salt and sugar (if using). If working by hand, cut in the butter with a pastry blender or

two knives or your fingers. If using a food processor, add the butter in pieces and pulse briefly between additions. The idea at this stage is to get the flour and butter mixture to feel grainy, like large oatmeal flakes. Add ice water, tablespoon by tablespoon, mixing or pulsing between additions, until the mixture forms a dough. Wrap in plastic and refrigerate while you make the rest of the dish.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees.

Peel, stem, slice and core the pears. You want slices about 1/8-inch thick. Sprinkle very lightly with lemon juice to prevent discoloration and set aside.

Set an ovenproof 9- or 10-inch skillet over medium-high heat.

••••• Add the sugar and water and cook, stirring, until sugar is dissolved and the syrup begins to turn amber. (Adjust the heat so the syrup does not burn.) Arrange the pears in an attractive pattern on top of the syrup. (Work carefully, the syrup is very hot.)

On a floured board, roll out the dough until it is slightly larger than your skillet. Place the dough on top of the pears, tucking in the edges to make a tight fit around the top. Cut a few slits in the crust for the steam to vent. Bake until golden brown, 30 to 40 minutes.

Remove pan from oven and allow to cool a little bit. Invert on an oversized platter; it will be pear-side up. The syrup will ooze over the edges. Slice and serve, scooping up some syrup for each portion. Best served warm, with ice cream or whipped cream, if desired. Yield: about 8 servings.

APPLE BREAD PUDDING

- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1-1/2 cups peeled, cored and coarsely chopped apples
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 3-1/2 cups (4 to 5 ounces) day-old challah or other egg bread, cubed
- 5 large eggs
- 2 large egg yolks
- 3 cups milk
- 2-1/2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup raisins or dried currants

In a large skillet, heat the butter over medium-high heat.

Add the apples and sprinkle with about 2 tablespoons of the sugar. Let sizzle for a few moments, then cook, tossing frequently, until the apples begin to brown, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and set aside.

Center a rack in the oven and preheat the oven to 375 degrees.

In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, yolks and remaining

sugar. Whisk in the milk and vanilla. Add the bread cubes, apples, and raisins or currants, and stir gently to combine without breaking up the bread.

Pour the mixture into a shallow, 2-quart baking dish. Set the dish in a roasting pan and place it in the oven. Pour enough hot tap water into the roasting pan to reach about halfway up the

sides of the baking dish.

Bake until pudding is just set in the center, usually about 1 hour. (Timing varies depending on depth of the baking dish). Carefully remove the baking dish from the water bath and cool to lukewarm on a wire rack. Chill until very cold, about 2 hours. Remove from the refrigerator about 10 minutes before serving. Yield: 6 servings.

QUICK PERSIMMON "ICE CREAM"

2 ripe Hachiya persimmons (about 1 pound total), fully ripened and frozen hard (see note)

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup buttermilk or half-and-half
- 2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

Without allowing the persimmons to thaw even slightly, cut them with a heavy knife into quarters. Remove stems and any seeds. Halve each quarter crosswise.

Put the chunks into a bowl of a food processor fitted with a

metal blade. Add the sugar and process until persimmon is broken up into small pieces. With the motor running, add the vanilla and the buttermilk or half-and-half. Puree until smooth, stopping to scrape down the sides of the bowl once or twice.

Add lemon juice to taste and serve immediately. Ginger snaps make a nice accompaniment.

Note: Hachiya persimmons — also called "Japanese persimmons" — are the ones most commonly sold in this country (the others are Fuyu persimmons). They are heart-shaped (Fuyus are rounder) and must be soft before you can eat them (otherwise they are sour). Ripen them at room temperature before freezing. Freeze them unwrapped until very hard, then toss into a plastic bag for longer-term storage. It's nice to buy a batch and do this when you find them at a good price. Yield: 4 servings.

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UCF draws Furman in first round of NCAA Women's Soccer tourney

ORLANDO - Trans America Athletic Conference champions, the University of Central Florida (15-5-1), will begin the first round of the NCAA Women's Soccer Tournament with a match-up against Furman (20-2), in Greenville, S.C., this evening (Wednesday) at 7 p.m.

UCF, which recently cracked the NSCAA Southeast region rankings at 10th, earned its seventh trip to the big dance after downing Jacksonville University 4-1 for the TAAC Championship and the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. Furman, ranked 7th in the Southeast, upset Davidson 2-1 in overtime to win the Southern Conference Championship and its first trip to the NCAA tournament.

If the Golden Knights can hold off Furman, they will meet the University of North Carolina, ranked #2 in the nation, Saturday, Nov. 13th, at 2 p.m. in Chapel Hill, N.C. It would mark the third time UCF and UNC have converged on the soccer field in the national championship tournament.

"The women's soccer championship has always been dominated by the teams who were supposed to win," said UCF first season head coach Amanda Cromwell (35-20-2). "It's time for a Cinderella team to take over."

The Golden Knights enter the tournament on a nine-game unbeaten streak, the 10th longest in the nation. The team, which boasts nine All-TAAC performers has outshot its opponents 413 to 216 so far this season, and has forced 12 shutouts, the ninth best in the nation.

Furman has hopes of its own, entering the tournament on an 11-game winning streak, including a stunning 1-0 victory over #23 Iowa. Furman placed seven members on the first and second All-SoCon teams and has outshot its opponents 365 to 193.

UCF is looking to improve on its performance in the 1998 NCAA tournament, after a 1-0 loss to Wisconsin in the first round. A win against Furman would be UCF's seventh in NCAA tournament play.

UCF'S STEWART NAMED PRE-SEASON ALL TAAC IN MEN'S BASKETBALL

ORLANDO - University of Central Florida guard D'Quarius Stewart has been named Trans Atlantic Athletic Conference Preseason All-Conference in men's basketball.

The senior, who as a junior averaged 13.9 points and 3.3 rebounds per game, is UCF's leading returning scorer.

In addition the Golden Knights are picked to finish third, behind returning champion Samford and Georgia State in the preseason TAAC poll.

UCF received two first place votes and 166 points to Samford's 213 points and GSU's 178. Samford received 17 first place votes and GSU had one.

The Golden Knights will take the court again next Sunday (Nov. 14) for their final exhibition of the year against Latvia Select, before opening up the season hosting the 12th ranked Miami Hurricanes on Friday Nov. 19.
