## **Reckless** Driving

The increasing number of automobile accidents in San-ford raises the question if something shouldn't be done immediately to punish rackless driving and eliminate as far as possible traffic hazards. If the present trend continues, the number of killed and injured on city streets this year may establish a new record.

According to the Florida Safety Council, there have been over 200 people killed in highway accidents in Florida while over 5,000 were injured in some 7,500 accidents which also resulted in considerable property damage. At the rate we're going we'll soon be making mechanized war-fare seem time by comparison. "Carelesaness is a disease of the mind and must be

cured by either education or enforcement", says Asher Frank, Safety Council Director, If every individual will become his brother's keeper, if they will not drink and drive, if they will keep their car in good condition, and if they will not drive beyond the limits of their tires and their own mind, traffic accidents can be reduced.". In our own city accidents might well be reduced by improvements in traffic regulations. It might pay us to hire the services of a good safety or traffic engineer to figure out how regulations might be improved to make or greater public safety.

Florida Names

Foremost among the 47 ships maning names of the various cities, counties, rivers, sounds, places of historical interest and cities, islands, are the support carriers USS Suwanee, the Nassau and the Barnes, named for Florida sounds. Barnes, named for Florida sounds. Oustanding among these carriers was the Suwanee. Commissioned on Sept. 24, 1942, she participated in the North African invasion and then moved to the Pacific theater. During the Battle for Leytz Gulf the Suwanee was severely damaged by Jar bombers and ro-turned to Paget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Wash., for repairs. Throwing her weight into the Oktnawa campaign on invasion day, April I, 1945, her pitots and alicresmen flew 2,852 sorties with a record day of 68 on April 7. The catapult crew launched 2.873. planes and members of the ar-resting gear crew and flight-deck force landed 3,412 planes. After the assault phase at Oki-nawa she cruised along the coast, driving off enemy planes and sub-marines. The Suwanee steamed more than 30,000 miles during the operation. Along with the Suwanee, the nowerful cruisers USS Pensacola, Oustanding among these carriers

Named after counties in the state were the cargo ships USS Brevard, Luval, Flagler, Gadsden and Pinellas, and the attack cargo thips USS Seminole and Union. 


