Truman Pledges Full Resources To Feed Millions

President Applauds UNRRA Work At 4th Annual Convention In Atlantic City

ATLANTIC CITY, Mar. 15.—(AP)—President Truman pledged today that the full resources of the United States would be used to feed starving millions of areas freed from war—but not from dire hunger. Mr. Truman sent a message to the fourth annual convention of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Agency, meeting in Atlantic City.

The chief executive hailed the work of UNRRA as evidence that cooperation for peaceful ends is possible among nations. Delegates from 47 Allied nations are meeting to discuss the urgent task of feeding an estimated 500,000 persons facing starvation overseas. Said Mr. Truman:

"In this country, our efforts are now fully being put into an emergency program intended to produce as large as possible a proportion of our food supplies for export to the starving peoples of the world."

The president declared he was taking every possible means to make certain the United States does not fall behind other supplying nations in providing hungry people with sufficient food to tide the starving abroad.

Speaking of the work of UNRRA, Mr. Truman declared in conclusion:

"I trust that the high achievements of UNRRA will encourage the united nations to regard UNRRA and the other international organizations as an integral part of the machinery of the peace we are striving to ensure for the world."

Pioneer Night To Be Held In Lake Mary On Thursday

No invitations will be sent out this year, according to Mr. Evans, but all residents 60 years of age and over are cordially invited to attend, as the program will be given in their honor. The younger folks are also invited and are requested to help get the older people there.

Prizes, however, are requested from that of the older people. Five orange wood canes, beautifully carved by Pioneer J. B. Mees of Geneva, will be given to the five oldest men present. Two canes and three pieces of sterling silver will be presented to the five oldest ladies present.

Mr. Evans has not yet announced his entertainment program, but it is certain, judging from that of previous years, that he will round up a number of fine entertainers.

Miami Visitor Dies In 13-story Plunge

MIAMI, Mar. 15.—(AP)—An elderly man fell 13 stories to his death from an upper floor of Technical High School in downtown Miami. He crashed through a skylight into a classroom crowded with students.

Detective Sergeant G. E. Baldwin has identified the dead man as John Burger, formerly of Cleveland, O., who came to Miami Beach last May. He was about 65 years old.

Students of the photographic class on the second floor of the building saw the body tear through metal cross bars of the skylight and land at the feet of their instructor.

Officials at a Miami Beach hotel where Burger has been staying say he lived alone and was retired.

Attlee Asserts India Has Right To Independence

Minister Warns That No Great Nation Can Stand Alone

LONDON, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Prime Minister Clement Attlee has expressed the view in the House of Commons that if India chooses full independence from Britain, she has a right to do so.

The Prime Minister made his statement during a debate on the mission of three cabinet members who are going to India. The ministers will take up the problem of self-government for India.

Attlee told Commons that it will be for the British to make the transition to Indian independence as free and easy as possible. He then expressed the hope that the Indian people may elect to remain within the British Commonwealth. Said Attlee:

"If the people do not wish to remain within the Commonwealth and Empire, they are bound together by chains of external compulsion."

The Prime Minister said that Britain, in making a final treaty with India, is not going to hold out anything to the advantage of the British that would be to the disadvantage of India. Attlee added that he thought India would find great advantages within the Commonwealth and warned that no nation can stand alone today.

Goering Takes Witness Stand For Third Time

Says Low Countries Invaded Because Belgium Approved French Occupation

HEREFORD, Germany, Mar. 15. (AP)—German Field Marshal Walther Von Goering was disclosed today by British intelligence officers to have committed suicide. Goering has been hunted since the crushing of his army in the Ruhr trap a year ago. British officers say Goering had shot himself out of fear that, if he surrendered himself he would be turned over to the Russians as a war criminal.

NUENBURG, Mar. 15. (AP)—Heinrich Himmler, German Goering asserted today that Germany invaded the low countries because the French General Staff had received permission from the Brussels government to occupy Belgium. The former chief of the German Luftwaffe also declared that Berlin did not believe the Netherlands would maintain neutrality against alleged pressure from Great Britain.

While on the witness stand in his own defense for the third consecutive day at the International War Crimes trial of 22 high ranking Nazis, Goering said that as far as Adolf Hitler and the rest of Nazism was concerned, the neutrality of the low countries always had been in doubt. This Goering explained, was due to the fact that war planes were flying over both countries.

The court recessed in mid-morning after another involved argument on the doctrine of reprisals under international law. The argument was between United States prosecutor Robert Packard and attorneys for Goering and virtually the entire defense staff.

This marked the third time the question has come before the tribunal. However, no definite ruling has been made, although the court has reached several compromises on the subject.

Professor Gave Explosive Data To Soviet Russia

OTTAWA, Mar. 15. (AP)—The Royal Commission investigating the Canadian spy case disclosed today that Dr. Raymond B. Ross, a professor of chemistry at McGill University transmitted full information on his secret work in explosives to Soviet Russia.

It was also revealed that Fred Rose, a member of parliament, has been taken into custody. Rose is known as the first and only communist ever elected to the Canadian parliament.

At Montreal, Superintendent Joseph Brunet of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police says that Rose faces arraignment on charges most definitely connected with Canadian espionage investigation. Rose is understood to be on his way to Montreal for formal booking on the charges.

The Royal Commission, which made the announcement concerning Dr. Ross, says that three other scientific workers engaged in secret research for the Canadian government during the war have given Soviet Russia highly confidential data.

SHINHOLSER URGES CITIZENS TO VOTE AT LIONS MEETING

Attorney Points Out Grave Dangers To Good Government

Potential dangers to good government by reason of failure of citizens to register and vote in elections, was today pointed out by Edwin Shinholser, attorney and veteran, who in behalf of the Junior Chamber of Commerce appeared before the citizens at their meeting today.

More unrest exists than ever before, he declared, and if the wrong candidate is elected the man who put the ballot in the box has a right to complain; the man who doesn't has no right to object.

The dangers that threaten good government, he said, come from minorities which obtain their membership through coercive action and which have as a rule, large caucuses. The Political Action Committee of the CIO, he pointed out, deals only with the influencing of legislation and of elections.

"Their success depends upon the laxity of the common voter," he said and called attention to the fact that in the last Sanford election there were only about 100 voters, whereas in a contested election there are from 700 to 800. Under such circumstances an agitator could come in with 11 registered voters, write in his own ballot and put his own party in a city of 12,500 people. He added that out of the 25,000 people in Seminole County there are only about 7,000 registered voters.

He told of the rise of Hitler to power, starting as an agitator with a minority following of three.

Britain Awaits Moscow Reply On Activity In Iran

Australia Regards Russia's Policy As Defensive One

LONDON, Mar. 15. (AP)—A British Foreign Office spokesman said today that Britain is awaiting word from Moscow before judging whether Soviet policy in the Middle East is aggressive or defensive. The Foreign Office is waiting for a reply to its note asking the Russians about their intentions in Iran.

A dispatch from Canberra notes a high Australian government official is saying that the British have concurred in a view expressed by the Australian Minister of External Affairs, Herbert Evatt. The External Affairs minister told the Australian Parliament that Australia regards Russia's policy as defensive.

However, the British Foreign Office spokesman said that he would not go beyond the public statements of Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin in the United Nations Security Council and in the House of Commons.

At the London meeting of the British Commonwealth Heads of State, Deputy Foreign Commissioner that important proposals from Russia was stirring up trouble. In the House of Commons the Foreign Secretary said that he had offered Russia a 10-year extension of the Soviet-British friendship treaty. Bevin also said in Commons that he believed the Russian Foreign Commission's statement that Russia had no intention of going to war with Iran.

TAMPA, Mar. 15. (AP)—Compulsory military training for young Americans was called for by National American Legion Commander John Steele today in Tampa. The national leader has been touring Florida.

Steele said that in the 25th time in 25 years that the American Legion has asked Congress to enact a universal military training law. It is a request based on the existence of the two most horrible wars in history.

Steele said this time the Legion has sent the resolution to Congress with a special committee of service men and women.

At the same time, Steele urged that surplus soldiers in Florida be used as veterans' rehabilitation centers.

The national commander said the Florida route would be of great value to the nation in the need for medical treatment. He added such a plan probably would save millions of dollars in permanent hospital construction. He said he intends to urge General Omar Bradley, head of the Veterans Administration, to urge him to "use surplus soldiers in Florida as rehabilitation centers."

Entire World Is Awaiting Former Prime Minister's Address Tonight

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS) Winston Churchill rode through the streets of New York City today to the accompaniment of cheers, but there were also demonstrations against the former British Prime Minister that resulted in the arrests of at least 20 persons for disorderly conduct. They refused to cease demonstrating and shouting when ordered to do so. Those arrested were described as communists by police.

The principal anti-Churchill demonstration was at City Hall Plaza where several thousand people gathered. As Churchill arrived, about 75 persons raised placards and set up a lusty chorus of boos. There were the only boos heard. The placards carried such phrases as "The English people kicked Churchill out of America; should reject him."

In the meantime, the entire world awaited Churchill's speech tonight at 10:30 o'clock Eastern Standard Time. The former British Prime Minister is expected to answer criticism of his recent speech at Fulton, Mo., where Churchill had said that the United States has a greater measure of power, a greater measure of world regard and esteem, she marches in state and majesty which has not been seen in this world since the fall of the ancient capital of the Roman empire.

Churchill continued, "With your great power are also the great responsibilities. The world looks to you for guidance if we are to achieve the purposes for which so many sacrifices were made. He added that the United States is "at the summit of human affairs."

Meanwhile, the Communist newspaper Pravda lashed out again today in a new criticism of Churchill by declaring that any so-called "author of new race theories" would suffer the same fate as that which befell the Nazis if the Soviet Union is threatened.

Pravda emphasized Premier Stalin's attack Wednesday on Churchill for advocating the Stalin term "Hitler like race theories." The newspaper continued, "The German fascist who chases his ideological weapon and hated by men—race theory—was totally crushed in his own country. A similar fate will befall the author of new race theories if they dare raise their sword against freedom and independence of our country."

In London, the organ of the British Labor Party, the London Daily Herald, also criticized Churchill and suggests he continue his speech-making to harm less themes. The British newspaper asserted, "If the British people had wanted him in their apostleship in peace time they would have voted for him in July, 1945."

Sharp Decrease In Marriages Is Noted

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Figures compiled by the state board of health indicate a sharp decrease in the number of marriages in Florida soon after the new three-day waiting and health test laws were put in effect.

At the same time, Georgia and Alabama towns bordering north Florida have experienced a marriage boom as impatient couples flock to county judges and justices of the peace across the state line.

Florida's new three-day waiting law became effective last May while the law requiring health tests went into effect last October.



Women Writers Outnumber Men

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)
On the little shelf where I segregated what seemed to me the last year's most worthwhile novels, there are more women writers than men.

Of course there are men, and one of two of them should go at the top of a 12-month fiction list; but the general level is higher on the distaff side. You may want to make up your own reasons, but here are some suggestions women, despite the tradition of Jane Austen, are never at novels and take them more seriously; they have been less distracted by the war; not always expecting to make a living at it, they are freer to write what matters to them; they are just naturally more subtle, discriminating and painstaking.

At any rate, as far as this crop is concerned, their writing is more distinguished, their judgment more worthy and their observations more relevant to the fundamental human issues of our times. The best ones were "Poor Child" (Harper), "Anne Patish" (Harper), "And the Field is the World" (Scribner), "Dola de Jong" ("The Friendly Persuasion" (Harcourt, Brace), "Jessamyn Wet" ("The Street" (Houghton Mifflin), "Ann Peary" ("Wildwood" (Harper), "Sincere" ("A Winter in Geneva" (Appleton-Century), "Josephine Lawrence" and two by Englishwomen, "Take Three Tenses" (Little, Brown), "Rumer Godden" and "The Ballad and the Source" (Harcourt & Brace), "Rosamond Lehman."







Coal Operators Deny Accusations By Lewis

100,000 Electrical Workers Return To General Electric Plants In 16 States

(BY ASSOCIATED PRESS)
Dituminous coal operators gave a point-by-point reply today to the charges of John L. Lewis in Washington and accused the union of using inaccurate statistics in charging the industry with responsibility for the death and injury of thousands of miners. The owners called it an attempt by Lewis to make a false case to support his demand for a health and welfare fund. Operators asserted the industry already is paying more than \$50,000,000 a year in social security and welfare taxes. The operators proposed overtime pay after 40 hours instead of 35 hours of work a week, and asked for a union guarantee against wildcat strikes and slowdowns. Approximately 100,000 CIO electrical workers today returned to plants in 16 states and a similar back to work movement got underway by in General Motors. However, the GM return to work movement will not be completed until local issues are settled in a number of plants.

During the weekend, 30 units of the CIO Auto Workers Union voted on the national agreement made with General Motors and only one, located in Baltimore, turned it down. The union decided not to return to work until local grievances have been straightened out.

In Akron the rubber industry's "big four" wage and hour agreement now has been ratified by 32 of the 41 local unions involved. Members of the CIO United Rubber Workers at two of the three large Akron plants have given almost unanimous approval to the settlement. They are employed by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber and B.F. Goodrich companies. Negotiations over local issues are still in progress between the union and the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company which has the third large Akron local. The other member of the "big four" is U.S. Rubber.

The agreement was reached in a series of Washington conferences in the settlement. They are expected to be in effect by the end of the month.

At present, the number of persons idle in labor disputes across the country is 558 thousand. The total was brought down in that figure by the general electric workers, machinists in San Francisco and employees of the Timken Roller Bearing company and the Oliver Corporation.

Caldwell Terms Youth Problems Most Important

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 18. (AP)—In Tallahassee today, Governor Caldwell termed juvenile delinquency the "most important social problem of the state." He urged delegates to his conference on the subject to bring out "practical, forward looking recommendations" by which they can get some action toward solving the problem. He spoke to more than 100 churchmen, state and county officials and representatives of social agencies conferring in the capital city.

State Prison Superintendent L. F. Chapman joined several other speakers in pointing to improper parental guidance as one of the major causes of juvenile delinquency. Chapman said "no government or social organization can give" training in discipline and usefulness as well as proper and conscientious parents and he suggested that it might be necessary to require parents to give their children proper attention.

The president of the Florida Congress of Parents and Teachers—Mrs. Walter Beckham of Miami—advocated more training officials for work with young people, more community activities and greater efforts to correct delinquency before it reaches the courts.

Duval County's juvenile judge—W. S. Griswell—recommended more social workers for state correctional institutions and segregation of older teen age boys and girls in schools of reform.

A Federal prison inspector—Edgar Gerlach—told the gathering that gaining the confidence of "bad boys" is essential to efforts at reform.

NAM Against Continuation Of Price Panel

NAM Asserts Price Controls Fostering Inflation, Slowdown Production

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18. (AP)—President Robert Wason of the National Association of Manufacturers says his organization opposes a continuation of OPA's another year beyond June 30. The NAM has prepared a statement for the House Banking Committee outlining its views on the subject.

The manufacturers call upon Congress to end price controls of all manufactured goods. The NAM statement asserts that these price controls are, as the association put it, "fostering inflation, enabling black markets to flourish and slowing down production."

Wason terms as "false" the Administration assertion that the OPA stands between the nation and what is called "disastrous inflation."

Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles earlier anticipated the NAM attack and charged before the House committee that the manufacturers' association was what Bowles called an "irresponsible pressure group." Wason says now the NAM speaks for 15,000 manufacturers who produce 85 percent of all the goods manufactured in the United States.

Iran Will Negotiate Oil Concessions With Russia If Soviet Troops Evacuate

Showdown Expected This Week In Iran Crisis By Diplomats In Washington

LONDON, Mar. 18. (AP)—Officials of the Iranian Embassy in London say that Iran is prepared to negotiate oil concessions with Russia. They stress that Iran will negotiate the oil concession question only if Soviet troops leave the country.

An Embassy spokesman says he is unable to confirm—or deny—stories that Premier Qavam now is negotiating with the Russians in Tehran. He declares that this, in his words, highly improbable in view of an Iranian law which bars oil talks until the withdrawal of foreign troops. He declares: "We do not believe that the Premier would dare to breach this law."

The spokesman adds that since the parliament has been dissolved, Qavam is the virtual ruler of Iran. However, he points out, that the premier would have to answer to the new parliament when it is elected.

A showdown is expected this week in the Iranian crisis. That is the view today of informed diplomats in Washington who are watching each new development in Iran with increasing concern. These diplomats have their view mainly on the fact that the UNO security council is scheduled to meet in New York City a week from today.

Before that time, it is believed either Russia or Iran will have resolved their differences—one way or another, or the Tehran government will present its case again to the UNO council.

There is little in the way of authentic news reaching the outside world from Iran because of the tight lid of secrecy which has been clamped over that middle eastern country. One dispatch—forwarded officially to Washington—has come to light. It says that the ranking Russian diplomat in Tehran—a charge d'affaires—has said he would Iranian Premier Qavam Es-Saltaneh against reopening of Iran's case before the UNO Security Council. The Soviet diplomat has said he would consider such action to be an unfriendly move.

As a result, diplomat sources in Washington are speculating on what they believe are two possible courses open to the Russians. These diplomats say Moscow may try to break Qavam's resistance, or stage a coup d'etat.

Mr. Touhy called attention to a recent news item in which John Steele, naval commander of the American Legion, pointed out that for the 25th time in 25 years, the American Legion has come out in favor of compulsory military training.

Mr. Touhy said that the May bill for the enactment of such training will be acted upon within the next few months and suggested that the people should study its provisions and make up their minds on the matter. He said it provides for one year of military training for all boys in the country between the ages of 17 and 21.

USDA Study Spotlights Plant City, Miami For Air Concentration Points

State Market Director Feels That Volume Production In Sanford Area Would Also Justify Establishment Of Air Point

JACKSONVILLE, March 18.—Some very interesting facts relative to the air transport of Florida perishables are given emphasis in a factual study just issued by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture, said William I. Wilson, director of Florida State Farmers' Markets today.

That study spotlights Miami and Plant City as among the best present locations for concentration points for perishables to be shipped by air. These designations of course are based on current production of various crops, and do not at all preclude the possibility for the location of concentration points in other areas. I feel, indeed, that volume production in the Fort Myers, Sanford and other sections would be entirely adequate to justify establishment of concentration points, as air services are made available and expanding demand in other parts of the country warrants.

Two major points which must be considered with regard to an transport of perishables are the greatly expanded population area which we may serve, and the improved quality of products which may be delivered to the consumer. This latter fact is pointed up by the survey referred to in a comment on the present possibility of retailing products in such centers as New York City within 24 hours of the time they are harvested in (Continued on Page Six)
