

Costs swell for courthouse project

Expenses could run \$20 million higher than county expected

SANFORD — Seminole County Commissioners, expressing serious concern over rising cost projections for the county's Courthouse Expansion Program, sent county staff and architectural and engineering consultants back to the drawing board this week to sharpen their collective pencils.

shop on the courthouse project that illuminated for the board original cost estimates of \$43 million could climb as high as \$63 million if the facility is built to maximum options with all the bells and whistles attached.

"I have two serious concerns about reviewing what we have before us today," said Board Chairman Dick Van Der Wiede. "These figures are much larger than we anticipated, and I don't see us moving the existing courthouse out of Sanford."

"I have a lot of questions about the wisdom of spending \$13 million to renovate the existing courthouse," agreed commissioner Daryl McLain. "We need to take a microscope and take a look at the things that have been added into these costs."

Representative from HKS/ACI, the architectural and engineering firm contracted to provide the Board with design

I Pledge Allegiance ...

Friends and family watch as 214 people take the oath to become Americans

SANFORD — More than 200 people entered the Sanford Civic Center Thursday as citizens from various foreign countries but left an hour later as Americans.

An audience of friends and family members watched while 214 individuals from 40 different countries took the Oath of Allegiance to become citizens of the United States. For many, the naturalization ceremony was the final step in a journey that began with a dream.

Herode Guerrier of Haiti couldn't hear Immigration Officer-in-Charge Stella Jarina administer the Oath of Allegiance. However, through interpreters Vania Buckman and Ana Vega, he used sign language to pledge his support to the U.S. Constitution and renounce any foreign allegiance.

Guerrier came to Central Florida from Haiti five years ago hoping to find a better way of life. Due to his hearing impairment, it was hard for him to find a job and other



benefits he needed to survive. "In Haiti, there was nothing," Guerrier said. "Because I am deaf, it was hard to make a living. America provides the needs and benefits I need."

Guerrier, along with many others, traveled from Orlando to participate in the ceremony. However, the Pilot Club of Sanford began sponsoring the annual event so people living in Seminole didn't have to travel to Orange County to become citizens.

"The Pilot Club wanted to find a way to provide a community service to Seminole County," Pilot Club Chaplain Doris Stein said. "This was a way to do it."

"Why should future Seminole County residents have to go to Orange County?"

Stein said. "So, we decided to bring the ceremony to Seminole County." Stein herself had to travel to Orange County 54 years ago to

take the Oath Of Allegiance. A native of Germany, she came to the United States from Sweden

Sting nets baker's dozen

With more arrests, rates for Sanford hookers near \$100

SANFORD — The latest deployment of special Tactical Units by the Sanford Police Department continues to yield significant dents into criminal activity in the City.

During a Tactical Unit operation conducted to target street level prostitution in the area of 4th Street and Sanford Avenue, undercover Sanford Police officers arrested 13 suspects, including three juveniles, on charges of procuring for prostitution and offering or agreeing to secure for a lewd act. The sting took place the weekend of March 2-3.

The suspects offered undercover agents cash amounts ranging from \$20 to \$100 in exchange for sex.

"Prices are apparently up in Sanford," said Sanford Police Public Information Officer Cleo Cohen. "Normally our undercover officers are offered prices in the \$5 to \$10 to \$15 range."

Charged in the sting execution were: Michael P. Parrish, 59, 735 Silver Cloud Circle #107, Lake Mary; Bruce Lenard

Police seek citizens for patrol duty

SANFORD — City officials are testing a new initiative they hope will encourage citizens to get involved with their community.

The Citizens On Patrol (COP) program will allow city residents to "serve as the eyes and ears for the police department," said Chief Brian Tooley.

"We've done a couple of test runs and the response has been very positive," Tooley said.

Volunteer citizens will receive some basic training before they begin patrols. Tooley stressed the volunteers would be instructed not to take action, but rather

report any situations to on-duty officers.

"If they see something suspicious, or see a damaged sign or street light, they are to report it to us," Tooley said, adding he

hopes to have the program in place by June 1.

Dr. French recognized as founder of Orange City

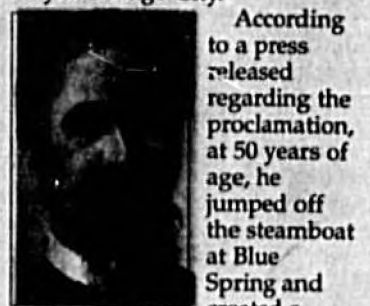
SANFORD — To many historians, Dr. Seth French is credited with being one of the founding fathers of the City of Sanford.

It is in his honor that French Avenue is named, and an appropriate plaque near Sanford Middle School pays him that honor.

In fact, historians will tell you that he personally hacked a path from his home in Sanford to the shore of Lake Monroe, which eventually became French Avenue. He was the first surgeon in the area, and his brother was the first Sanford Mayor.

Now, the focus is changing. Dr. Seth French is being

declared the founder of Orange City. A special observance has been called for and March 13, 2001 is to be Dr. Seth French Day in Orange City.

McCaskill nabbed for Post Office thefts 10 years after similar charge

SANFORD — U.S. Postal Inspectors nabbed a pair of Orlando men this week responsible for burglarizing 19 Postal vending machines in four counties, including one at the 221 N. Palmetto office in Sanford.

Since the middle of February the pair had broken into machines in Orange, Osceola,

Lake and Seminole counties, collecting several thousand dollars to feed their crack cocaine drug habits.

John McCaskill, 36, with a listed address of 6015 Forest City Road, Orlando, and William Howely, 20, with a listed address of 3219 Kelvington Dr., Orlando, are being held as federal prisoners in the Seminole County jail awaiting continuation of a hearing sched-

uled for Monday morning to determine if they will be released while awaiting a trial date. Postal Inspectors arrested the pair March 5 following an anonymous tip that they were holed up in an Altamonte Springs motel.

In making the arrests Inspector Ed Moffitt ran into an old nemesis. He helped arrest McCaskill 10 years ago on similar postal vending machine bur-

glary charges. "After the second burglary in February and multiple burglaries in one night it triggered a red flag," said Moffitt. "We pulled the file on McCaskill and started taking a hard look at him."

McCaskill served one-and-a-half years in prison and three years probation for his 1991 con-

It isn't about Swing, it's about benefits

This Sunday is the anniversary of the birth of band leader Lawrence Welk. He was born on March 11, 1903, (died May 17, 1992). He is considered to have had the longest-running program in television history.

After studying the accordion, he formed his first band at the age of 17 in Strasburg, N.D. After playing all over the Midwest, he moved to Los Angeles where, in 1955, began his nationwide television broadcast of "Champaign Music."

The Lawrence Welk Show played each Saturday on ABC from 1955 until 1971, when it was dropped because network executives said his audience was too old. Welk however, kept the show running on over 250 independent stations, for 11 more years. It can still be seen on reruns. Thus, in actual performances, his show lasted for 27 years.

I knew a trombone player in Orlando, Kenny Trimbell, who played at a number of nightclubs, many on Orange Blossom Trail, for a number of years with mostly small combos. "I'm leaving Orlando," he announced during one dance. "I'm going to California. I have a job with Lawrence Welk."

"But you're a swinger," we told him. "Welk is a square. You can't be happy working for him."

Keep in mind, this was before Orlando had the attractions with regular work for musicians. Trimbell explained that, in Orlando, (at that time), he was playing job-to-job, whenever and wherever he got a booking. "With Welk," he said, "I'll not only have a regular job, but they have hospitalization and medical care, and give paid vacations. What better job could I ask for."

Trimbell lasted for over 20 years as Welk's lead trombonist, and is still featured in his old re-runs with a stupendous slide solo.

Enough of Welk. Let's focus on Trimbell. His decision is one that many young folks today should keep in mind. Naturally, folks will tell you the best job you could ever have is one you enjoy doing. But in selecting a profession and where you will work, keep in mind the benefits. Kenny joined the Welk organization because he could still do what he liked (play music) but would have paid vacations and health benefits, which he never could have had working as he was with this combo and that combo.

While many newcomers to the job market may wish to go out on their own and establish their own business, the benefits must also be taken into consideration. There are jobs where, if you miss work because you are sick, or for some other reason — you simply don't get paid.

And once with Welk, Trimbell found he could swing just like in the old days, and is probably responsible for helping Welk in some of his arrangements. He not only succeeded in his career, but ended up doing what he loved and getting the perks of employment that too many in the younger generation today are missing.

Good luck at job hunting — but look beyond a salary. Doing what you enjoy may be fun, but finding yourself out of work suddenly because you happened to get sick or had to leave for one reason or another, should be a major concern, and avoided if possible.

With age comes wisdom—and five bucks. *Seminole Herald* scribe Nick Pfeifauf, by far the senior member of the newsroom, put the paper's younger news pups to shame in claiming the office pool by most accurately predicting Sanford municipal election outcomes this week. Pfeifauf's picks were eerily on the mark as he called for Brady Lessard to claim the Mayor's race with 53.9 percent of the vote. Lessard won the contest with 54 percent. He was also close to the mark on the runner up spot. Nick predicted Kerry Lyons would finish with 31 percent of the vote. Lyons finished with 35 percent. Nice job, Nick. Lunch is on us.

Speaking of age. The demographics that showed up to vote in District 1 resembled more of an AARP gathering than a representative cross section of voters in the District. The absence of younger voters was widely reflected in the abysmal turnout citywide — a paltry 13.5 percent.

Polar bear polling. Chilly election day temperatures and day long gusty winds took a physical toll on all candidates by day's end. In District 1 Art Woodruff and Linda Kuhn both donned gloves to buffer against

the frigid outside conditions. Most of the candidates hovered at the Supervisor of Elections office shortly after 7 p.m. awaiting official outcomes — all had cherry red faces and Bozo red noses from 12 hours of wind burn.

Road block and bottle neck. A number of District 1 voters who cast their ballots at the Sanford Civic Center expressed anger and frustration at the physical layout for voting day. Poll workers set up two lines for voters—one marked A-L and the other M-Z. After lengthy waits many ballot-casters were told two more lines had to be formed because of a limited number of voter registration books available. Compounding the traffic jam was the fact once voters marked their ballots, they had to cut back across four lines of voter traffic to get to the ballot machine. At least there were no butterfly ballots or pregnant chads to contend with.

The Marshall Plan. It may not matter who won or lost the city election if one is to believe current mayor Larry Dale. With just a handful of days left in Dale's term, he jokingly claims he may put the city under Marshall Law. "It's the only power I haven't used during my term as mayor," he says with a grin. "I figure the

city charter says the mayor sets the time for certifying the election. I may just push it back until August." He's got the beard and cigars, now all he needs is a uniform and little Elian.

Checking for a pulse. There appeared to be no signs of life on election day in District 4. A miniscule 291 out of 3,536 registered voters bothered to cast ballots. Bet they won't hesitate to whine in large numbers before the City Commission if a development issue comes up that impacts District 4.

Paw Park phone home. Overheard this week on WDBO's Paul Harvey News comes this story. A businessman went to bed this week only to awaken the next morning to discover his cell phone missing. After a complete household search for the instrument, he did what most cell phone users resort to—he used a regular phone to dial his cell phone to see if he could hear it ringing somewhere in the house. Altamonte Springs Robbery

Two black males reportedly robbed the Walgreen's store on Hunt Club Blvd. in Apopka Tuesday night. reported seeing the men drive off in a gray Ford Ranger, which deputies later recovered behind the Walgreen's store. The vehicle is believed to have been carjacked at a woman's home in Altamonte Springs earlier in the day.

A Texaco Express Mart on Bedford Road near Sanford was literally broken into this past weekend. According to a surveillance tape, a suspect drove his vehicle through the front door of the establishment, entered the store, took approximately 65 assorted lottery tickets and 15 packs of cigarettes, then drove off.



Some of the cigarettes and tickets were found by officers on the floor of the business. Investigators say the same store had been burglarized three times in the previous 10 days.

James reflects on most recent school shooting

To the editor:

As is to be expected the platitudinizing and exculpating has begun, following the latest in the series of students killing students; "how could he do it; he was a good boy; he was picked on because he was the scrawniest boy in the class; we never expected him to do it; what made him snap."

All this is familiar nonsense. It will not explain the reasons or the reason for Charles Andrew Williams shooting 15 of his classmates, two fatally, last Monday at his School, Santana High in San Diego, Calif., will not explain other such killings in the past and it will not prevent them in the future.

But it will suggest that the teen-age murderer was a good boy, and that being harassed at school is a rational reason for picking up a gun and killing. In addition of course to directing blame where it doesn't belong.

And the platitudinous and exculpatory nonsense burns when it comes from people who should know better: "I know in your minds is the overriding question why; the suspect has made statements. I will not share the contents of the statements with you, but there is no real answer. I am not sure in any real way we know why", the Associated Press news agency quoted Paul Pfingst, San Diego District Attorney as saying on Monday, after the shooting.

But many of us know and the reasons why are as painful to learn, as painful as eliminating them will be if we must stop the madness.

One reason is that America's children worship at the altar of self, where they are number one, where they must put themselves first, where what they do isn't right or wrong, but is their or other people's values. All this is a recipe for destroying others and finally themselves.

Classmates said Charles Andrew Williams, over the weekend, "was joking that he

was going to come to school and shoot people; witnesses said he smiled on Monday as he pulled the trigger. Afterward he simply dropped the gun and surrendered to school officers saying, "I acted alone." No remorse — no compunction. For to him the murder of two students and the wounding of 13 others was the just punishment for being picked on in class.

Pure selfishness. All over the world, school children are taunted and harassed by their fellow-students daily, but they do not turn on them with guns as American children turn on their fellow-students; because they do not worship themselves.

The altar of self at which America's students worship was raised for them by the society, and by their parents. Indeed society and parents are so selfish that they sometimes regard children as a hindrance to career, romantic and monetary goals and so they abandon children in their pursuit of these goals with the result that children are lonely, unloved and undisciplined. Charles Andrew Williams lived with his father only, his mother living in another State.

It is this worship of self, which expelled discipline from the classroom; for if the individual is supreme, what he does isn't right or wrong, but preferential. Children aren't spanked for misbehaving. Instead they are put in special classes and medicated with Ritalin as having chemical instead of moral problems.

If the murder of students by students must stop, America must demolish the altar raised to the worship of self, and erect in its place, one raised to the love of neighbor, which means sometimes putting the neighbor's interests above your own, and at all times, seeing yourself not as a number one.

The universal principles of right and wrong must replace the doctrine of relativism in the government, the church and the school.

The school itself can begin by suspending every child under 10 years old who comes to school with a gun, and expelling older ones who do. And government can help by punishing with fines and long imprisonment, parents

of students who bring guns to school.

If this seems tough, ask yourself, how much tougher must our children become with each other and with us before we do something.

Dear Mayor Elect Lessard, Congratulations on your recent election to serve as Sanford's Mayor for the next four years.

You ran a very well financed campaign, with 54 percent of those voting expressing their confidence in your experience and ability to serve. Though many of your contributions were from large monied interests, you were elected to serve all of the citizens of Sanford.

As compared to larger cities, Sanford's type of government is unique in that our city charter provides for a "strong city manager" type of government. As stated in the city charter under Section 2.03, "The Mayor shall be elected for a four year term;

shall be a member of the commission; shall preside at meetings of the commission; shall be recognized as head of the city government for all ceremonial purposes, and by the Governor, for the purposes of military law; but shall have no administrative duties. This last line in this section of the charter makes it clear that the city manager is the administrative head of the city. This points out very clearly what your duties are and are not.

Also, I would hope that since the Mayor's duties are ceremonial and not administrative, you would see fit to eliminate the need for a Mayor's office in city hall and the expense of staffing, same. In this time of electronic wizardry, the Mayor and commissioners could be easily notified of any urgent matters.

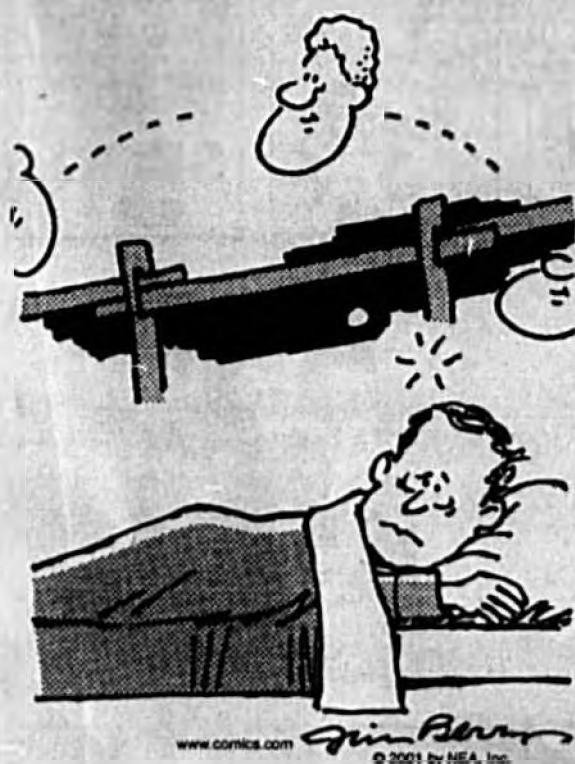

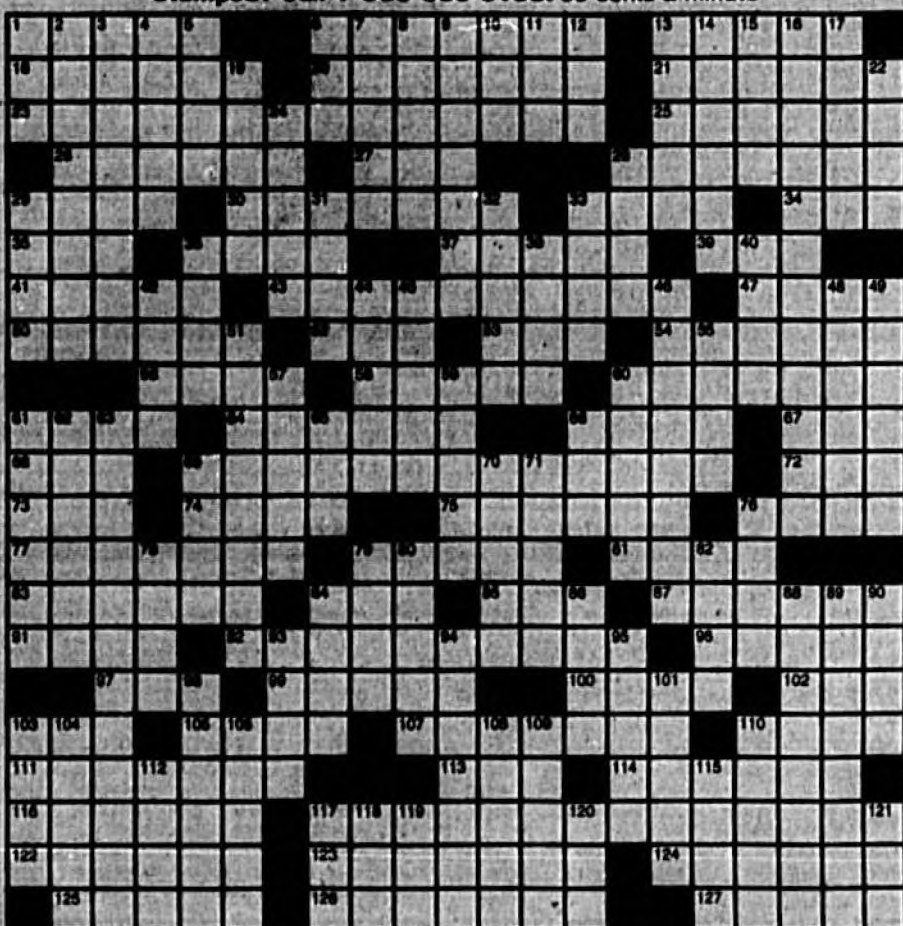

The official proclamation, to be read by Orange City Mayor Albert T. Erwin states:

WHEREAS, Dr. Seth French first came to Volusia County in 1874 and purchased 8,000 acres of land, and

WHEREAS, Dr. French founded Orange City by encouraging his neighbors from Eau Claire, Wisconsin to join him here, and

WHEREAS, Dr. French organized Orange City's school, the first public school in Volusia County and chaired its board of trustees, and

WHEREAS, Dr. French was elected to the Florida Legislature in 1879, and

WHEREAS, In 1881, the Governor appointed Dr. French as Commissioner of Immigration (see note below), and

WHEREAS, The State of Florida has recognized Dr. Seth French as one of the Great Floridians 2000.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Albert

T. Erwin, Mayor of the City of Orange City, Florida, do hereby proclaim March 13, 2001, in conjunction with ceremonies honoring him as DR. SETH FRENCH DAY.

viction.

"We got some good surveillance video from one of the post offices in Oviedo and after looking at the film we knew it was him," Moffitt said.

He added that both suspects were cooperative during the motel bust and made statements indicating they were responsible for the rash of burglaries.

Other post office lobby vendors, such as copy machine operators were also victimized by the pair and had equipment damaged during the burglaries.

"To repair or replace the front door of each of these vending machines costs between \$3,000 and \$5,000," Moffitt said. "The various local police departments will be handling any charges filed regarding private business vendors."

McCaskill and Howely face 19 possible felony charges, each carry maximum prison terms of 10 years and or additional fines.

They will be charged under Title 18 of the U.S. Code, section 641, dealing with the theft public money and property.

Cell phones users beware: 911 may be out of reach

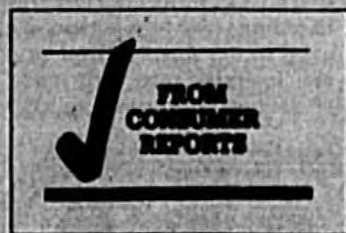
According to a nationally representative survey we conducted last fall, most people (at least initially) sign up for cellular-phone service for use in the event of an emergency.

Of course, the cellular industry has done well by those emergency-minded subscribers who, smitten with the take-it-anywhere convenience of a cell phone, elevate calls home from the grocery store to the level of crisis.

But how well do cellular service providers actually fulfill their objective of being there in a pinch? Here's a rundown:

Americans call 911 from cell phones 118,000 times a day, and while most emergency calls get through, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) cannot say how many do not.

One problem lies with the providers. Most new cellular subscribers sign up for digital service, which offers better security against eavesdroppers than the older analog system, and makes possible amenities such as instant messaging and the Internet. Unfortunately, in many instances, digital service's popularity has outpaced providers' ability to support the demand. As a consequence, some calls can be blocked when the digital circuits in a cell



site — the area a transmission tower covers — all happen to be in use. (Carriers aren't required to clear congested circuits to make way for emergency calls.)

A 911 call can also disappear in the "dead spots" that dot a provider's service area. The cellular companies monitor their territories in search of these pockets, but their findings are closely guarded secrets, withheld even from the FCC.

You can better the chances of your 911 call getting through by using a dual-mode or tri-mode handset. Dual-mode handsets operate only in the traditional 800-megahertz (MHz) cellular band on one or the other of the two incompatible digital formats used by most carriers (TDMA and CDMA). They also operate in analog mode, which — despite digital's booming popularity — is still more prevalent across the United States. When you roam

from your home coverage area into one served by a carrier with an incompatible digital format, many dual-mode phones will switch to analog automatically, even in the middle of a call. That's a boon.

Tri-mode models are even more versatile. Whichever digital format your carrier uses, these phones can handle calls in both the 800-MHz and the higher 1,900-MHz personal communication service (PCS) bands, providing increased relief from crowded airwaves. And they talk in analog, too.

High-scoring tri-mode phones from our recent tests include the Audiovox CDM-9000, a CDMA handset costing \$150, and the Ericsson R280LX, a TDMA model costing \$100. (Prices are what we paid to purchase the handsets through retail outlets. Cell phones typically come "bundled" with service contracts at reduced — or sometimes no — cost.)

Among top-rated dual-mode phones, the CDMA-supported Motorola Timeport P8160 (\$300) is easy to use and scored "very good" for battery life, while the Motorola StarTac ST7790 (\$300) is a good choice for TDMA-format carriers.

Sanford Airport. Central Florida Regional Hospital is a 256 acute care hospital, serving residents of Seminole and Osceola Counties. The hospital, located in

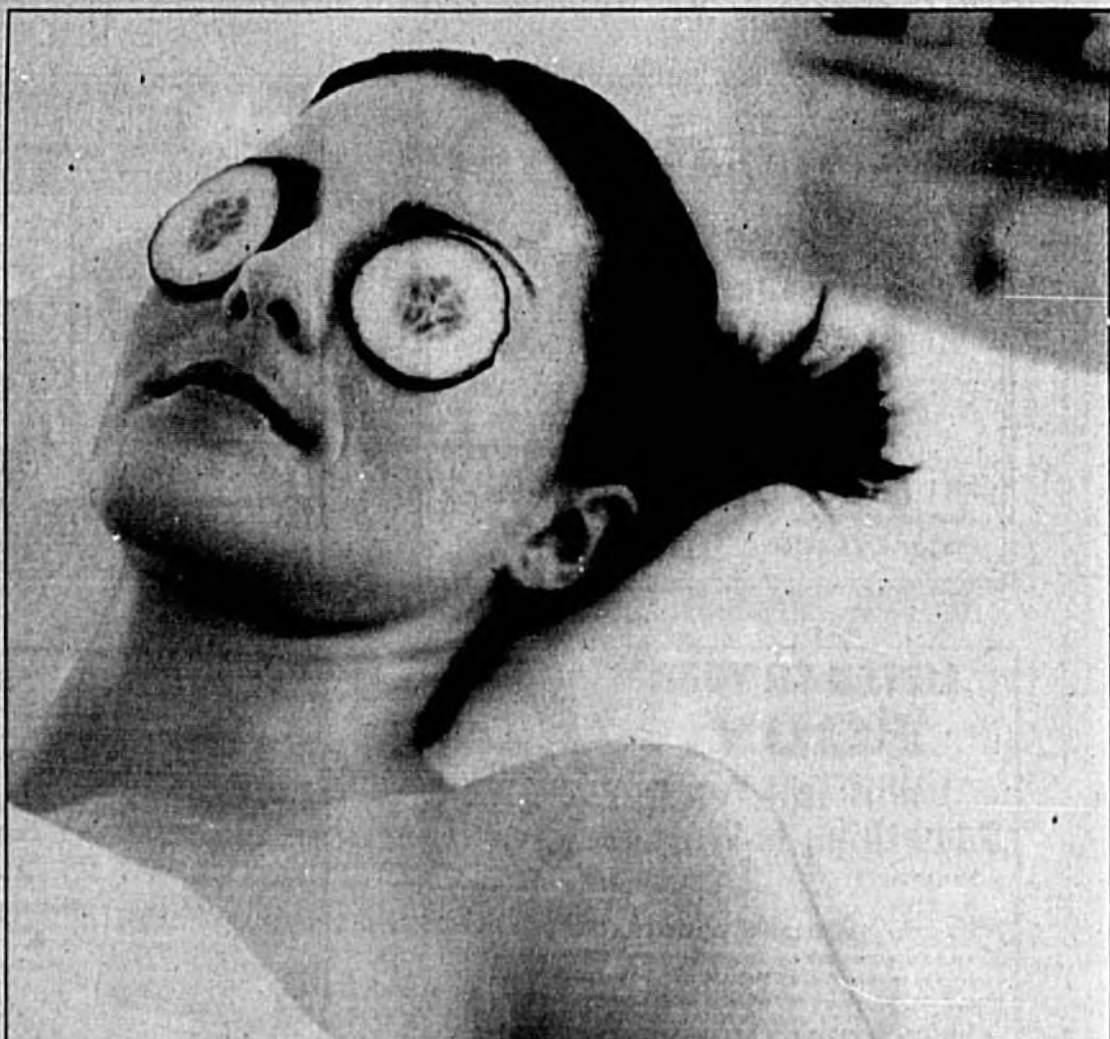

Continued from Page 1A and eventually settled in Central Florida.

"I became a citizen on March 6 — a day before my son was born," she said. "I was determined to become a citizen before I had him."

With help from Judge John Antoon Jr., the local Immigration Office and the city of Sanford, Stein and the Pilot Club sponsored Seminole County's first naturalization ceremony eight years ago. Each

March since then, between 200 and 400 candidates for citizenship from all over Central Florida have taken the Oath of Allegiance in the Sanford Civic Center.

During Thursday's ceremony, Monica Lavao watched her mother, Nancy of Casselberry, take the oath. It was the third time the Colombian native sat through the naturalization ceremony.

A year ago, Lavao was the first person in her family to

become a U.S. citizen. Last month, she watched her brother do the same, and in one more month, her father is scheduled to have his citizenship interview.

"It is very exciting to see my mother become a citizen," Lavao said. "It offers so many opportunities."

Even though the Oath of Allegiance takes only minutes to recite, the process of becoming a citizen can take years. It took Monica Lavao two years to

complete the process. However, it only took her mother six months — from applying for citizenship to having the interview — to become an American.

To become a United States citizen, an individual must be a legal permanent resident (a green card holder) for at least five years, or three years if married to a U.S. citizen. The candidate must also be a person of good moral character and be able to speak, read, write and understand ordinary English

words and phrases.

During the final stages of the process, an interview is scheduled to determine a candidate's knowledge and understanding of the fundamentals of U.S. history and principals of government. Questions during the interview can include:

- How many stripes are there in our flag, and what do the stripes on the flag mean?
- What country did we fight during the Revolutionary War?
- How many changes or amendments are there to the Constitution?
- What is the introduction to the Constitution called?
- Name one right guaranteed by the First Amendment.
- Who becomes president of the United States if the president and the vice president should die?
- Who is the chief justice of the U.S. Supreme Court?
- Which countries were our enemies during World War II?

• Who wrote the Star Spangled Banner?

• What kind of government does the United States have?

If the candidate passes the interview, he or she is then told to take the Oath of Allegiance to the United States. Each year, hundreds are asked to come to Sanford to participate in the March event.

After Thursday's naturalization ceremony, the 214 new Americans left the Sanford Civic Center with flags given to them by the Ladies Auxiliary American Legion Campbell-Lossing Unit No. 53, letters of welcome from the Pilot Club of Sanford, and patriotic literature given to them by Sallie Harrison Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution. They also left with smiles on their faces.

"Seeing their smiles — that's the pleasure in it," Pilot Club Chaplain Stein said. "That's why we do it."

services for the expansion project, presented the commission with three options detailing various phases of building and expansion of current facilities near the County Public Safety Building on Bush Boulevard, and various levels of remodeling the current courthouse in downtown Sanford.

Commissioners are trying to determine the most cost efficient process to construct court facilities to meet burgeoning demand through 2010. The core of all three proposals addresses the options of constructing enough square footage near the Bush Boulevard complex to accommodate future needs of the Civil Courts Division, the Criminal Courts Division and the State Attorney's office.

Should all of the new construction be located near Bush Boulevard, the county would need to purchase the property a ball bonds business sits on, as well as acquire adjacent land currently occupied by a property dealership to accommodate some 600 additional parking spaces. That land acquisition would further drive up the cost.

Totally consolidating all court processes would also call for the County to abandon the current downtown courthouse, a prospect few commissioners embraced at Thursday's workshop.

Original gross footage estimates for the expansion project were calculated at 188,000 square feet. The latest estimates call for construction of 219,000 square feet.

Original cost estimates for construction of a new Criminal Justice Center based on 188,000 square feet were approximately \$30 million exclusive of design, construction manager, and owner's representative fees.

Building a larger 219,000-square-foot building would add \$5.1 million to total building

costs, with another \$2.2 million escalation factor added to cover the time from the original cost to mid-point in construction.

The board was also wary of reconciled estimates for the renovation of the existing courthouse facility that could be used in the future for Civil Court functions only. The building currently has an estimated market value of between \$10 to 12 million. Suggestions were made to spend as much as \$13 million in renovating the facility.

"Common sense says you spend no more than 50 percent of market value to renovate any building," commented McLain. "It makes no sense to me to spend \$13 million on a building that is only worth \$10 to 12 million. We should build one building at one time at one place and do it right."

"We can't go back to square one, yet we can't move forward at this time until we have these cost estimates reconciled," said Commissioner Randy Morris.

The commission has already approved the County's hiring of an Owner's Representative for the project and expects to have that person on board within the next month. Groundbreaking on whatever construction and renovation option and phases the commission decides is scheduled for the first quarter of 2002.

"It's time to go back and come up with funding ideas based on revenue streams. Some heads need to get together on this," added County Manager Kevin Grace.

Grace said he anticipated another workshop would be held within the next 30 to 45 days to get a handle on costs and make concrete decisions about construction options, locations, phases, and bond issues to help finance the project.

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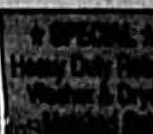
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Wayside Park boat ramp to close for renovations

SANFORD — One of Seminole County's most heavily used recreational facilities will be closed beginning March 19 for major renovations. The Lake Monroe Wayside Park boat ramp near the Volusia County line on State Highway 17/92 is scheduled to undergo a two week, \$98,000 facelift to replace sidewalk concrete ramps and repair one of the facilities three floating docks. Built in 1985-86, the Wayside

Park boat ramp is the county's fourth most heavily used recreational facility. Bob Chorvat, Parks and Recreation Manager for Seminole County said the Ocala based firm Randall G. Tedder Construction, Inc. will handle the project. The firm has done several similar boat ramp construction projects for the city of Orlando, Orange County, and at a number of state parks around Florida. "We anticipate the project will take two weeks to complete barring any unforeseen circumstances," said Chorvat.

"Normally the life span for a facility like this is 10 to 20 years so we're going on 15 years." Chorvat said the scope of the repair work will be to completely replace both sides of concrete ramps that run into the St. Johns River. Additionally, a middle floating dock recently damaged by a power boat launch will be replaced and other floating docks and stationary docks will be checked for structural soundness. As opposed to traditional poured concrete, prefabricated slabs of concrete will be used

and placed with a slightly deeper pitch into the water because of low water levels attributed to continuing drought conditions. The new process translates into extended life and greater handling capacity. "Water levels are the lowest I've seen them since I came on

board with the county in 1980," said Chorvat. He explained that traditional poured concrete ramps are designed to withstand 3,000 to 3,500 pounds per square inch of pressure while the new fabricated concrete slabs are designed to withstand 6,000 pounds per square inch of pres-

sure. "This project incorporates a new process for the county that should enable us to get a longer life out of the repair work." During the past year the Lake Monroe Wayside Park boat ramp has accommodated just under 60,000 vehicles for boat launching purposes.

Authorities searching for serial robber


Law enforcement agencies in Seminole and Orange counties are looking for a suspect who appears to be on a crime spree in Central Florida. The man has been identified as Roy Anthony Jones, 35, who has a criminal history from out-of-state. Jones is currently being sought by several local agencies in connection with strong-arm robberies to Service Merchandise, pawnshops and jewelry stores. Generally, Jones asks to see a

high priced ring or bracelet, then flees from the store taking the items with him, often getting into an altercation with employees during his escape. He has reportedly struck eight to nine times in Orange and Seminole Counties since February 26. His most recent target was a jewelry store in Orange County Tuesday afternoon. Representatives from law enforcement agencies are concerned about Jones' escalating violent tendencies. It is believed

he is using heroin. It is also believed he may often alter his appearance through hair color changes. Jones' current method of travel is unknown. He may be borrowing vehicles from friends. Jones was last seen in a white Olds Cutlass, license number A66 UZK. Anyone with information about Jones' whereabouts is asked to contact the nearest law enforcement agency. The number in Seminole County is 407-665-6650, Investigator Barbara Lense.

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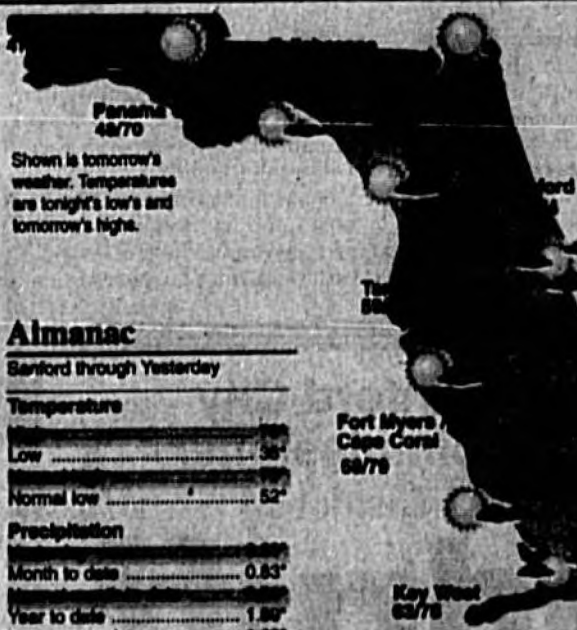


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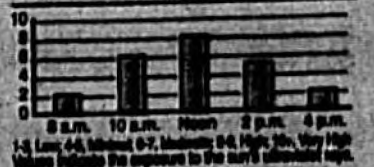

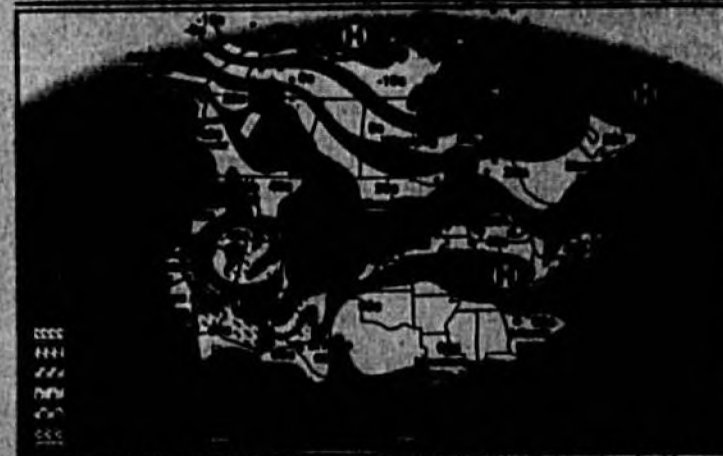

Lake Howell took a lead right away in the first inning when lead-off batter Christina Leasure opened the game with a double to left-center field.

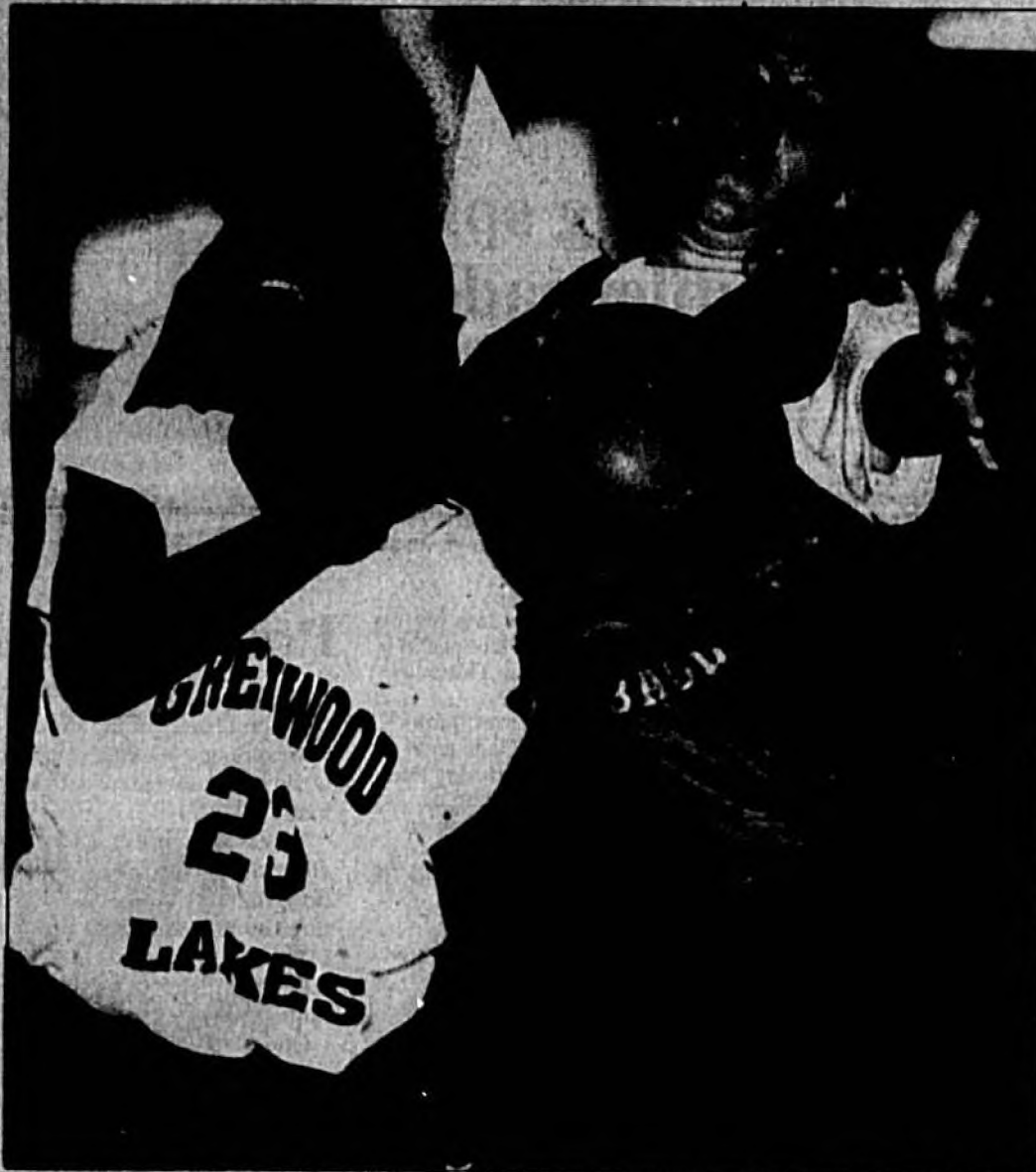
With Jill Clater at bat, Leasure was stealing third when Clater hit the ball that Seminole errored on and Leasure came on around to score.

display of history projects they had recently put together. Students were also volunteering as photographers. Children visiting the museum could try on costumes from the late 1800s and have their picture made by the high school students.

The living history part of Olde Lake Mary Days has expanded. This year, the festival was fortunate to have the Talako Indian Band in attendance. Talako is the Choctaw word for "Eagle." The band is not a tribe, but a group of people from many tribes who wish to preserve dance as an art form for generations to come. Everyone enjoyed watching the various dances that were performed. For the children, the last dance was the best. It was the Friendship Dance. Dancers

invited people from the audience to join in. Children as well as adults got into the act.

Another new addition this year was the 3rd Rhode Island Artillery, Battery C. The festival has been very fortunate to have the 37th Alabama, Company H in attendance for the last several years. It was the 37th Alabama group that invited the 3rd Rhode Island Artillery to join the festival this year. After seeing the original instruments used on wounded men, everyone was grateful for the advances medicine has made in the last century.

Besides the living history groups attending, there were four new individuals attending with their living history displays. Jo Anne Pegler brought her teepee with authentic artifacts. Children loved visiting this display because they could actually walk into the teepee. Terrell Hendrix, wearing Seminole Indian clothing, brought his Seminole hut and his Seminole history display. Seminole huts were made of thatch or bark. Graysmoke came with his Cherokee Indian history display. Among his artifacts were authentic weapons. Cattle were a big industry in Florida many years ago. Legend has it that the name Cracker comes from the cowboys cracking

DEAR ABBY: The answer to being solicited to death by charities is simple — send money orders. You have a copy for your tax records, and the charity doesn't have enough information to put you on a donor list. I've done it for years. It works like a charm.

NO-LONGER BOMBARDED IN FLORIDA

DEAR NO LONGER BOMBARDED: Clever idea. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I feel for "Not a Millionaire." In an effort to solve this problem, I tried an experiment in the first six months of last year. My system worked and continues to work. My "unwanted mail" has been reduced by 80 percent to 90 percent.

(1) Purchase a rubber stamp that says, "Please remove this name and address from your mailing list." Approximate size: 1 inch by 1/2 inch. Approximate cost: \$7.

Some funerals no longer provide personal touch

A friend of mine called the other day complaining that a funeral service he had attended "didn't even mention the name of the deceased." He found the service unsatisfying.

I know how he felt. A funeral service does not have to be a three-hanky affair, but I am afraid some churches go to the opposite extreme. Sometimes, at an Episcopal service — with which I am most acquainted — people aren't even aware that someone has died.

This is not an oversight on the part of the Episcopalians. It is the way that they want it. Like the British from whom their church is descended, they tend to view any show of emotion as a bit vulgar.

Dignity is what the burial service in the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer strives for. And to be sure, there is great dignity in the printed words, although much of the dignity can be lost if the reader does not read well.

That is partly what was wrong with a recent Episcopal funeral that I attended. It should have been an imposing service — the man who died had been a distinguished churchman — but it wasn't.

Here again, however, the Episcopalians pride themselves on the fact that the humblest member of the church gets the same service read at his funeral as the Queen of England will get at hers. Worldly status makes no difference. This, of course, is as it should be.

But the trouble with these Episcopal funerals I am talking about is not that they are too dignified or that the service is the same for everyone, but that they are too impersonal. A funeral should be personal. I am not suggesting that every funeral should

have a maudlin eulogy. By personal I mean that the words spoken must speak vividly and personally about the momentous matters of life and death that cannot fail to be on everyone's minds.

The members of the bereaved family, already experiencing "the constant missing of what used to be always here," wonder whether they have lost their departed loved one forever. What shall we tell them?

"When the blow fell, that was the one and only thought that kept beating like a hammer in my brain," said Arthur Gossip, the great Scottish preacher, when his wife died. "I felt I had lost her forever."

Gossip could have given an answer to St. Paul who asked, "Oh death, where is thy sting?"

"I can tell him where death's sting lies," said the Scottish preacher. "Ah, it is the bitter grudging every second of the dear body to the senseless earth — anything, nothing, and the old overwhelming pain is back again."

But ultimately, it was his realization that love is eternal that made him sure he had not lost her. That knowledge filled the emptiness her death had brought.

There was something else. "When we are young," he said in the sermon he preached the Sunday after his wife's death, "heaven is a vague and nebulous place. But, as our friends gather there, more and more it gains body and vividness."

"And when your dearest have passed yonder, how real and evident it grows, how near it is, how often we steal yonder. Never again will I give out that stupid lie, 'There is a happy land, far, far away.' It is not far. They are quite near."

Eggs served with style

Recently, we had the first guests from Great Britain at the bed and breakfast, a young family of four. They were starting their vacation with visiting Sanford first, then Blue Springs to see the manatees, and then heading to Disney.

Although a complimentary breakfast is included in the room's rate, I decided to offer them a real substantial meal that included soft boiled eggs, scones with cream and jellies, homemade breads, muffins, teas and hot chocolate for the kids. In the middle of the table, I placed a tall crystal pitcher with fresh squeezed orange juice.

I wished them bon appetite and withdrew from the dining room to allow them to enjoy their time together.

After a few more minutes, I went back to check. The little girl thought she found something in the orange juice so, she excused herself, got up and went to her father to show him her glass.

"Oh my dear," he said, "this is the pulp from the fresh orange juice, you never had that before, and it is absolutely delicious isn't it?"

The lady just couldn't agree more. Peeling her egg in the small side plate I had on the table she then asked, "Are we doing the right thing with the eggs? Because in England we have what you call egg cups."

"You are doing just fine," I said, and I thought, "Hey, how come I didn't think of this before."

Being in the antique business for so long and having the tea room, I have a dozen of every thing: butter pads, open salts, ramekins, large dishes, small round or square, even pie birds. You name it, I have it. Yet, I just never thought of egg cups.

So, you know what I will be looking for in my next outing.

Soft Cooked Eggs
Place cold eggs in a single layer in a saucepan. Cover with at least 1-inch cold water over the top of the eggs.

Cover saucepan and bring quickly to a boil over high heat. Immediately remove pan from heat to stop boiling. Let eggs stand in water two to five minutes or until cooked as desired. Remove eggs and rinse under cold water. Cut off larger end with a sharp knife. Place in egg cups and season with salt and pepper.

Eggs cooked in the shell are commonly referred to as "boiled," but they should never be boiled. Cooking and accurate timing are the secrets to perfect soft-cooked eggs.

Serving Suggestions

For these serving suggestions, eggs should be cooked for at least four minutes and cooled slightly before peeling. Spread toasted, split bagel with cheese and top with slices of peeled, soft-cooked, eggs. Top



toasted waffle with fork-mashed, peeled, soft-cooked eggs and drizzle with maple syrup. Place slices of peeled, soft-cooked eggs onto warm flour tortilla, garnish with shredded cheese, roll up and serve.

Preparation: five minutes
Cooking: 12 minutes
Put the eggs in the oven, pour the orange juice, and then pop the bread in the toaster so everything is ready to serve together. If you want to treat Mom to breakfast in bed, ask someone older to carry the tray.
4 Slices Black Forest ham or smoked turkey or beef salami
4 1/2 cup Chopped sweet green pepper
4 Eggs
4 1/4 teaspoons Pepper
1/3 cup shredded cheddar or mozzarella cheese

Place oven rack in center of oven. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. With pastry brush or small piece of waxed paper dipped in butter or shortening, grease four 3-inch oven-proof ceramic ramekins or custard cups, or spray with

nonstick baking spray; set aside.

On cutting board, stack ham slices one on top of the other. With small knife and using cookie cutter or jar as guide, cut ham into 5-inch circles. Press one slice onto bottom and up side of each ramekin. Cut ham scraps into small pieces; set aside.

Sprinkle one-quarter of the green pepper into each ramekin. Break one of the eggs into separate small bowl; pour on top of green pepper in one ramekin. Repeat with remaining eggs and ramekins.

Sprinkle ham pieces, pepper and cheese on top.

Place ramekins on baking sheet. Bake for about 15 minutes or until whites are set, yolks are still runny and cheese is bubbly. Wearing oven mitts, remove baking sheet from oven; place on wire cooling rack. Let cool for five minutes.

Makes four servings.

Maple Egg Cups

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Cook several slices of bacon until crisp. Pat dry and then chop or crumble it. You'll need a fat teaspoonful of crumbled bacon for each egg.

With a rolling pin or straight sided bottle, roll out two slices of bread per person, assuming each person wants two eggs.

Make the bread as thin as you can without breaking it. I use whole wheat or multi-grain bread from Pepperidge Farm or Arnold. Bakery breads tend to crumble since they are rolled. White bread is truly uninteresting.

With a very sharp knife, cut the crusts off the bread, leaving as much bread as possible. You want largish squares or of crustless bread.

Melt equal portions of butter and maple syrup together. I used about 1/4 cup of each for eight pieces of bread. Brush the butter/syrup mixture onto the bread, covering right out to the edges.

Butter muffin tins sufficient for each piece of bread. Carefully fit each slice of bread into a muffin cup, folding three or four pleats into

the sides to make the bread fit nicely. If you're really artistic and the bread is pliable, you'll get the four corners pointed up around each cup. If you find there's a hole somewhere, patch it with a little piece pinched off the crusts. Don't worry if they're not as pretty as you'd like, they taste great anyway!

Put about a teaspoonful of the crumbled bacon into the bottom of each cup. Carefully crack an egg into each cup.

salt and pepper lightly. Bake for 14 to 18 minutes until the whites are opaque and the yolks are still soft. Time depends upon the size of your eggs and desired hardness of the yolks. Enjoy!
