# Acupuncture Results In All Smiles For Woman In Pain

LOS ANGELES — A few years back, Janice Seaman of suburban Glendale hurt her hip when she took a bad fall during a judo demonstration.

Although the pain was agonizing, Mrs. Seaman turned down her doctor's suggestion that he give her a shot of Novocain to alleviate the pain.

After a few days of painful limping around, she took a friend's advice and went to a Chinese doctor for an acupuncture treatment — primarily because she'd been curious about acupuncture for some time and second because her hip hurt so much she figured she had nothing to lose.

A matter of minutes after treatment, Mrs. Seaman walked out of the office without a limp and with virtually no pain.

Today, she's learned enough about acupuncture to be qualified as an acupuncture technician — a title that isn't recognized as yet in this country where only Chinese physicians are allowed to administer acupuncture.

The only exception to this rule is the Western physician who might be studying acupuncture to find out what it's all about.

According to Mrs. Seaman, even the Chinese aren't quite sure what acupuncture's all about. But they do know it works and has worked for about 5,000 years.

"Acupuncture goes as far back in antiquity as about 3000 B.C.," Mrs. Seaman explained in an interview. "Five thousand years of existence is the age put on it by some Chinese themselves."

The basis for its discovery "probably was through injury, animal bites or accidents when it was discovered that there's a different pain factor in injuries at different body sites or points," she said.

In 1800 A.D., a European doctor with no previous knowledge of the subject stumbled upon a type of

acupuncture experience when he suffered a broken arm, was subsequently bitten on the arm by a mosquito and noticed that, as a result of the bite, the pain in his arm vanished, Mrs. Seaman said.

Acupuncture knowledge was expanded in China "when arrows were discovered. Arrow wounds in some places on the body caused no pain and seemed to relieve pain in other parts of the body," according to Mrs. Seaman.

She went on to say that "Do-in (Chinese massage) is based on Chinese acupuncture as a way to maintain health. This technique does not puncture the skin the way acupuncture does."

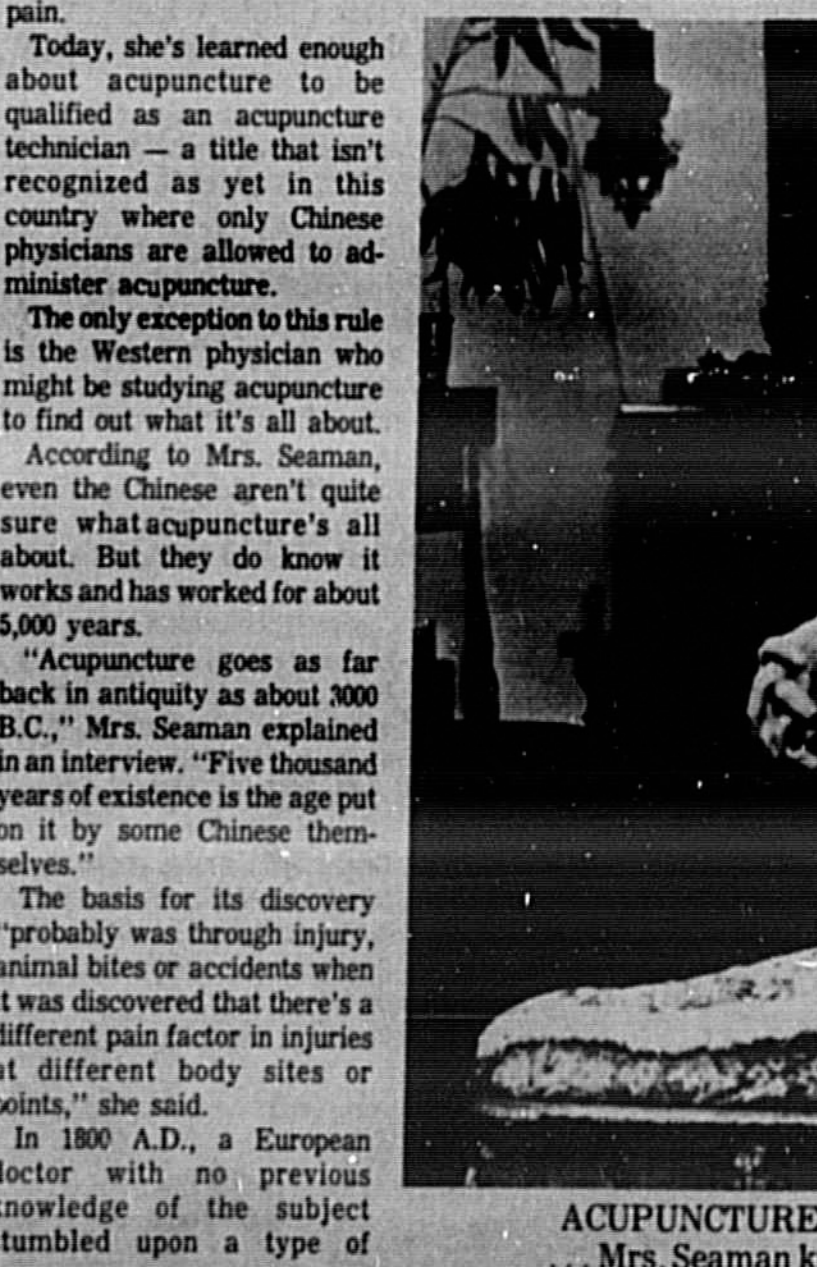
Furthermore, "the Chinese have used self-massage and therapeutic manipulation of the joints for hundreds of years." Traditionally, maintenance

of health was utmost importance to a Chinese physician since he was paid only so long as he did just that. His fees ceased the minute his patient became ill.

"The doctors constantly study their patients to know what each individual's pulses are like when he's healthy and, when a pulse is off, the physician knows that something is wrong with the patient's internal energy supply.

"Imbalance of the energy means that some body system is under-supplied while something else is over-supplied," Mrs. Seaman explained.

Taking all these pulses takes as long as a half-hour, and so sensitive is the Chinese physician to his patient's body that, when a pulse is off "he knows which points in the body are depressed or over-supplied with energy and he finds which

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# Nancy's Newsnotes

## WINTER SPRINGS

Misunderstanding and misinformation seem to be the order of the day regarding Winter Springs Elementary School, now being built on SR 436.

In order to clear up the situation and come up with some facts, I spent an afternoon with David Sawyer, principal of the Idlewild Elementary School in Sanford. Sawyer has been assigned to the Winter Springs Elementary School as it's first principal.

Opening date in the Winter Springs School has been set for January, 1975. Until then children in grades 1 through 5, now attending the Longwood Elementary School from Winter Springs will be assigned to Red Bug Elementary School. All Winter Springs children will be double sessions in the afternoons at Red Bug till they can attend their new school.

Kindergarten age children from Winter Springs can register in either the Longwood, Casselberry or Red Bug Elementary schools. Registration times for the kindergarten are from 9 A.M. to 3:30 P.M. Monday through Friday.

On a tour of the Idlewild School Sawyer explained that, with very few variations, the Winter Springs School will be a duplicate of Idlewild, which is a Pod.

The Pod is an "open space" concept which designed for flexibility, color, and a better use of space. It could be compared to a wheel.

The "media center," a large open area utilized as a library and assembly room, is at the core. The spokes or Pods branch out from that center.

Each Pod contains approximately four instructional stations or classrooms with no walls or partitions separating them. One or more teachers are assigned to each station depending on the amount of pupils. Teacher's aides are also utilized.

Each Pod has portable partitions which can be set up overnight to make any section a self-contained unit. This is beneficial for special projects or those pupils who cannot adapt readily to the open space concept.

A Pod does not contain a conventional cafeteria. Lunches are handled by what is described as a satellite program. Lunches are prepared at another school, put on styrofoam trays and transported to the designated school. Lunches will be prepared at the Longwood Elementary School cafeteria. Each child picks up a tray and carries it back to his desk. According to statistics, this method actually takes much less time for the distribution of food than a conventional lunchroom.

Facts pertinent to the Winter Springs school in particular, may be of some interest. The school has been designed to house 720 students. Provisions can be made for another 10 per cent, if necessary. It will have, on staff, a principal, a full-time special, a guidance counselor and approximately 26 instructional units. Special Education programs will consist of a speech, later, programs designed to give special instruction to those Building.

students who range from the slow learners to the gifted and all special problem children will be put into effect.

There will be two covered areas for the picking up of the students, one for buses and one for parents.

I spoke to Mrs. Edna Roberts, a teacher at Idlewild, who has taught in both the Pod and conventional classrooms for many years. She explained that, in her opinion, the arrangement gives children a better opportunity to learn self-control, but pointed out that not all children are able to adjust to the open concept. For those children, they have the self-contained units.

She stressed that each instructional unit works as a team exchanging ideas and problems, which results in a better educational atmosphere for the students. A very important part of the "team concept" are the teacher's aides. Each aide is required to have a high school diploma and works with the teacher, after training, at the teacher's instruction.

"Owl' Author Doesn't Give A Hoot For Fame

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — "When 'I Heard the Owl Call My Name' appeared on TV before Christmas last year, Margaret Craven's name was seen in millions of American households.

Only then did the book start disappearing from the bookshelves, but, of course, this was part of the program.

Miss Craven feels no bitterness or even enjoyment over the irony. She does not dwell on her criticism of the film's characters as lacking the humanity and humor of the book's and the film's overloading on religion that was not in the book.

She merely says, "Do not write anything that would hurt anyone."

Margaret Craven was groomed for the dignified fame she projects.

Her first agent and most revered editor—Erd Brandt, the late senior associate editor of The Saturday Evening Post—once told her:

"Margaret, when you write something that is good, you don't have to worry about selling it. In time, it will find its own market."

Repeating these words 40 years after she heard them produced a wistful smile.

"Dear Erd was always right, but I always knew it anyway," she said.

She also may be bearing up under the outpouring of reader appreciation better than a younger, first-time novelist because she has had her due of fame. (She calls it "fame on a quieter level.")

From the time she was 22, she wrote short stories.

"I'm very fortunate. To people who speculate Owl could become the next Seagull (Jonathan Livingston), I say this—I simply want it to be the next Owl."

"I don't want to be like anyone else. Fame? I really don't give a hoot. I just want people to read it and enjoy the village as much as I did. That's all."

It would be interesting to know how she felt eight years ago when she wrote her first novel—the very book that now tops best-seller charts.

Then, New York publishers weren't interested. The Owl was beautifully written, all right, but a bit odd and not dramatic enough.

It was logical that both Canadian and British publishing companies accepted the story, for it was situated in a remote parish called Kingcome in British Columbia.

It reportedly sold only about 48,000 copies in Canada.

As Time magazine put it, The Owl "became best-seller material" almost overnight and for the wrong reasons.

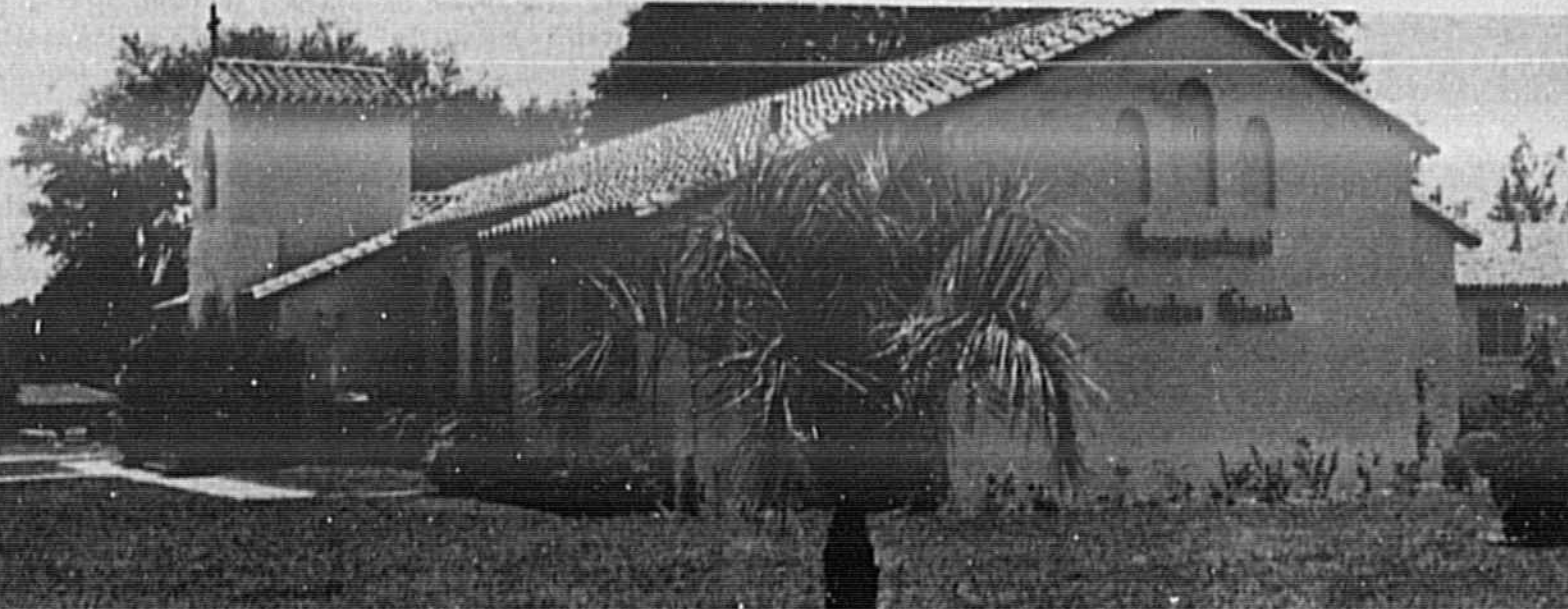

# Tourist Center Opens In Orlando

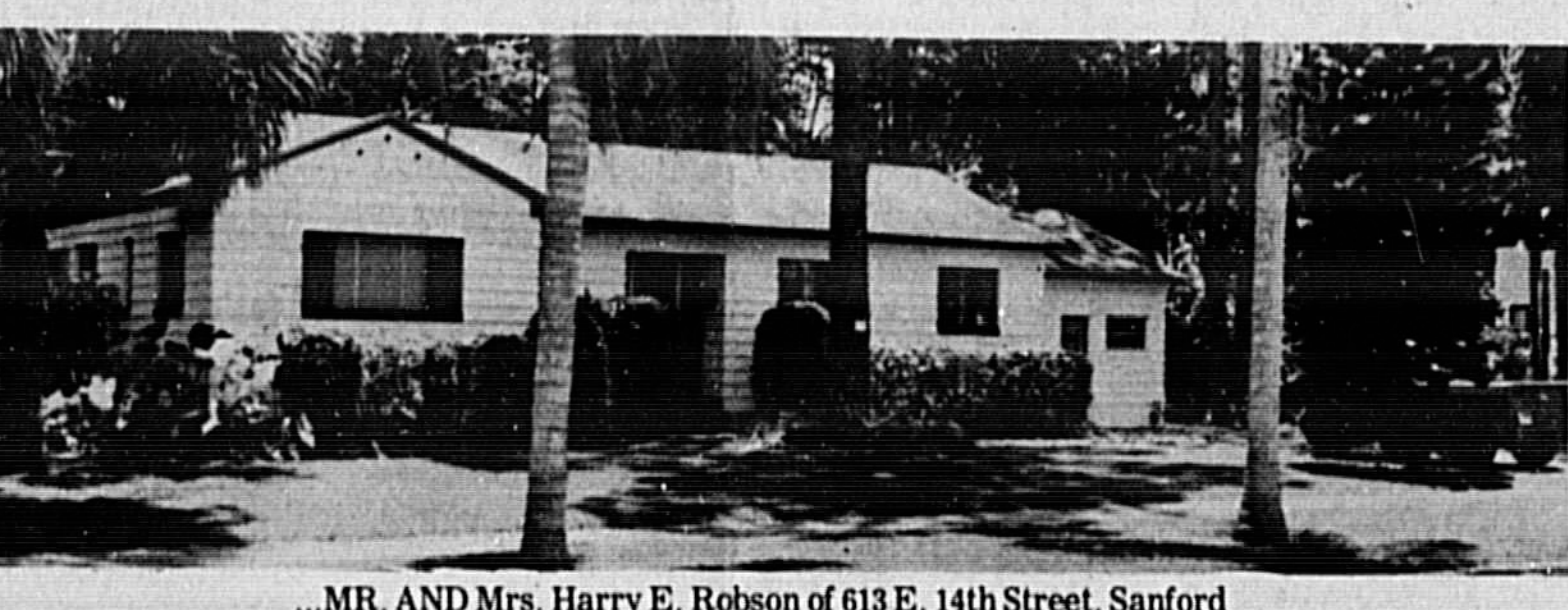

Free form residential designs and spot interest designs that have a focal point of interest seem to be the most popular. To express your own ideas of color and form, use nature forms which are easy and fun to collect. You can find dried flowers, weeds, pieces of wood and stones on hikes through the woods and on the beach. Be alert for exotic forms while you are on vacation. The ecology minded designer will be glad to know that there is beauty in cast off or junk forms. Cast off objects have shapes that aren't found in nature — often rest on metal pieces adds to the texture and beauty. Texture can add interest to some of your favorite things. Don't just display a piece of driftwood on a shelf or ledge. Try putting a layer of tiny pebbles on a shelf and then add the wood. Both will be enhanced by the combination. Common hardware can be put to use. You can create a successful texture design by winding yarn around nails of various sizes and heights. Use any stable form as a base for the nails. You can readily find many objects in your home. Look at your prepackaged food containers — some egg cartons are pressed forms made of styrofoam and plastic. In multiples, these containers can enrich a wall or form a folding screen, thereby losing their association with eggs. Textured plastic dividers from some commercial copies play with light and shadows to give unusual effects.

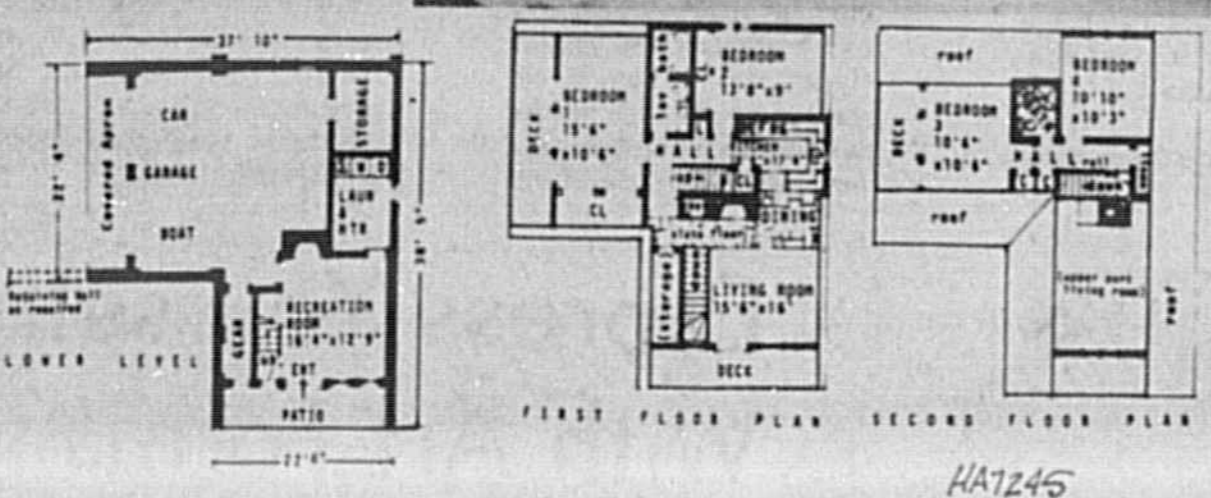

The suggested warning label would read: "Do Not Attempt to Operate This Oven Using Microwave Energy With: (a) object caught in door (b) door that does not close properly, (c) damaged door, hinge latch or sealing surface." A second proposed label would advise consumers not buy microwave ovens. The organization said it had found evidence of measurable radiation leakage from 15 brands of the most popular microwave ovens.

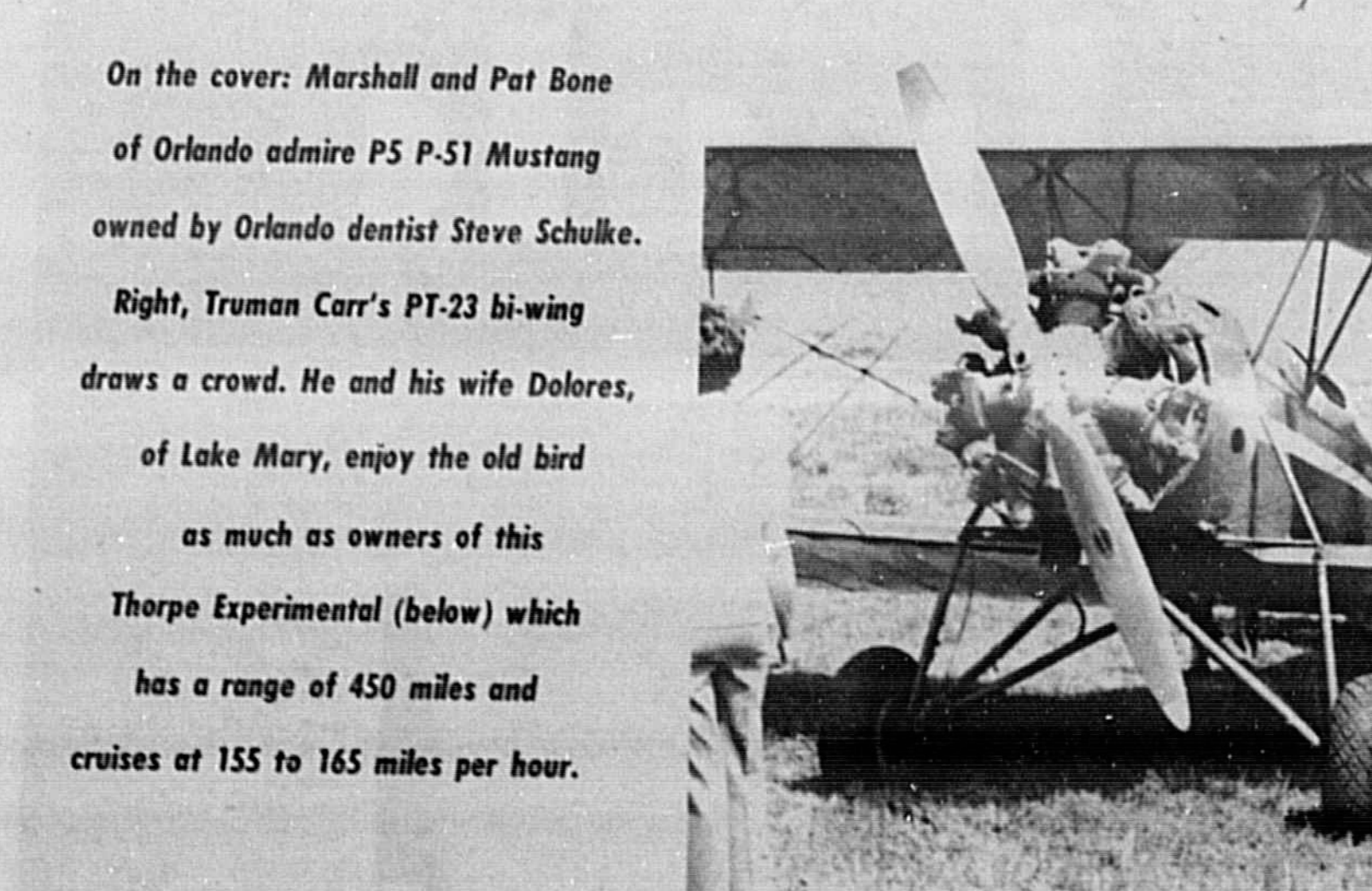

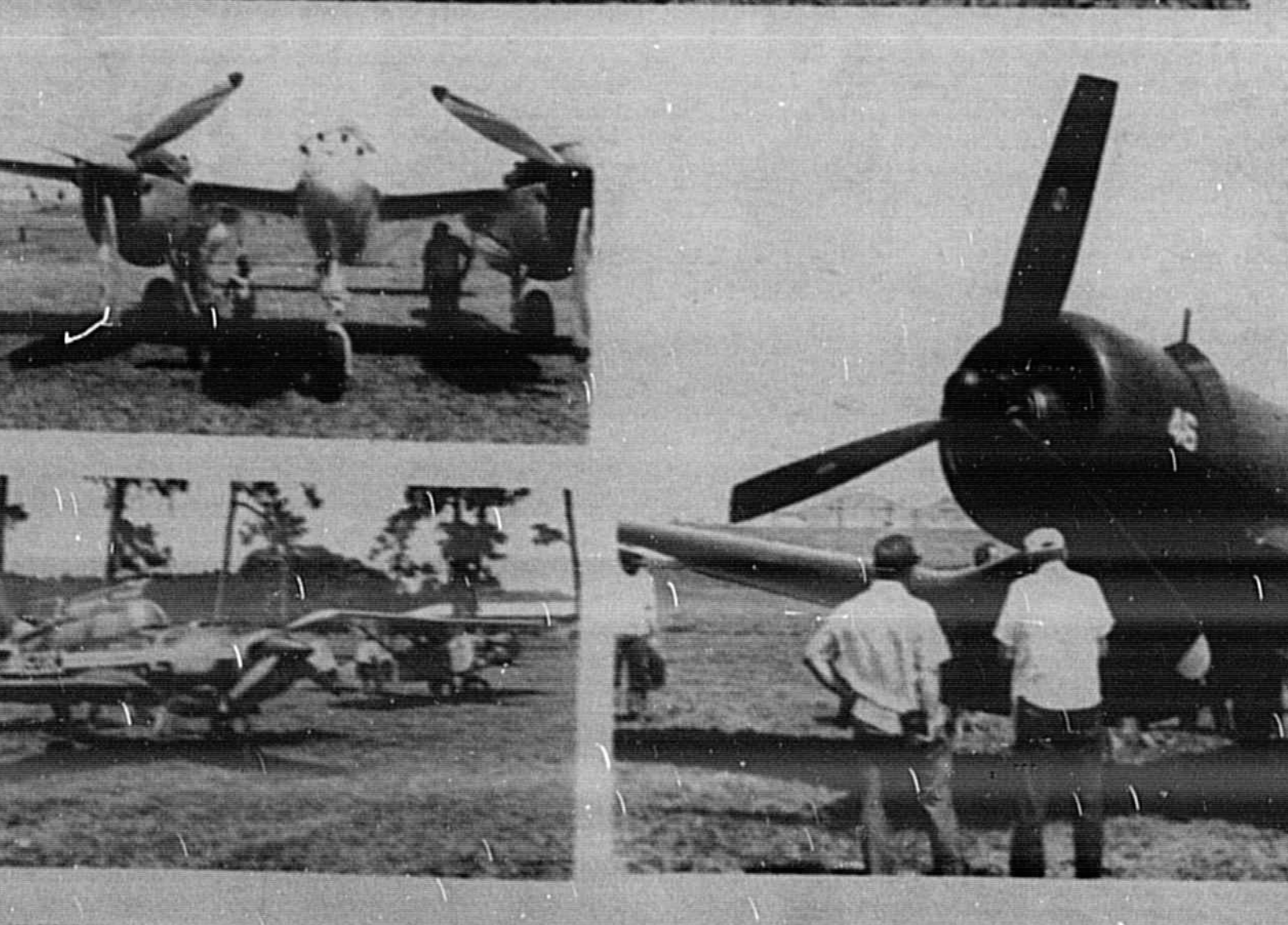

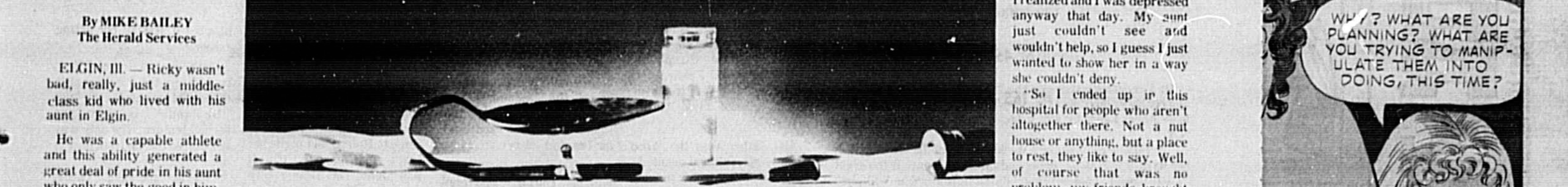
### Ricky Wasn't Bad, Just A Junkie

"I just tried it, I don't know. But I liked it."

"It has a different effect on everyone and mine was super. I saw patterns and trails and everything moved in like slow motion. Like if I waved my hand in front of my face, I saw

Of the four classes of drugs, one group is subject to abuse which exacts the most serious and frightening consequences. It would take more than luck to abuse this group for any length of time and be left unharmed. It would take a miracle.

These drugs, not usually used by teen-agers, are the last step in the drug culture; the most difficult to reverse.

Their effects when prolonged can be gradual, but can include total deterioration of the body, mind and spirit.

Opiates are derived from the unripened seed pod of the opium poppy. They include opium, heroin, morphines and cocaine.

By far the most abused is heroin, which accounts for its many names—H, horse, white

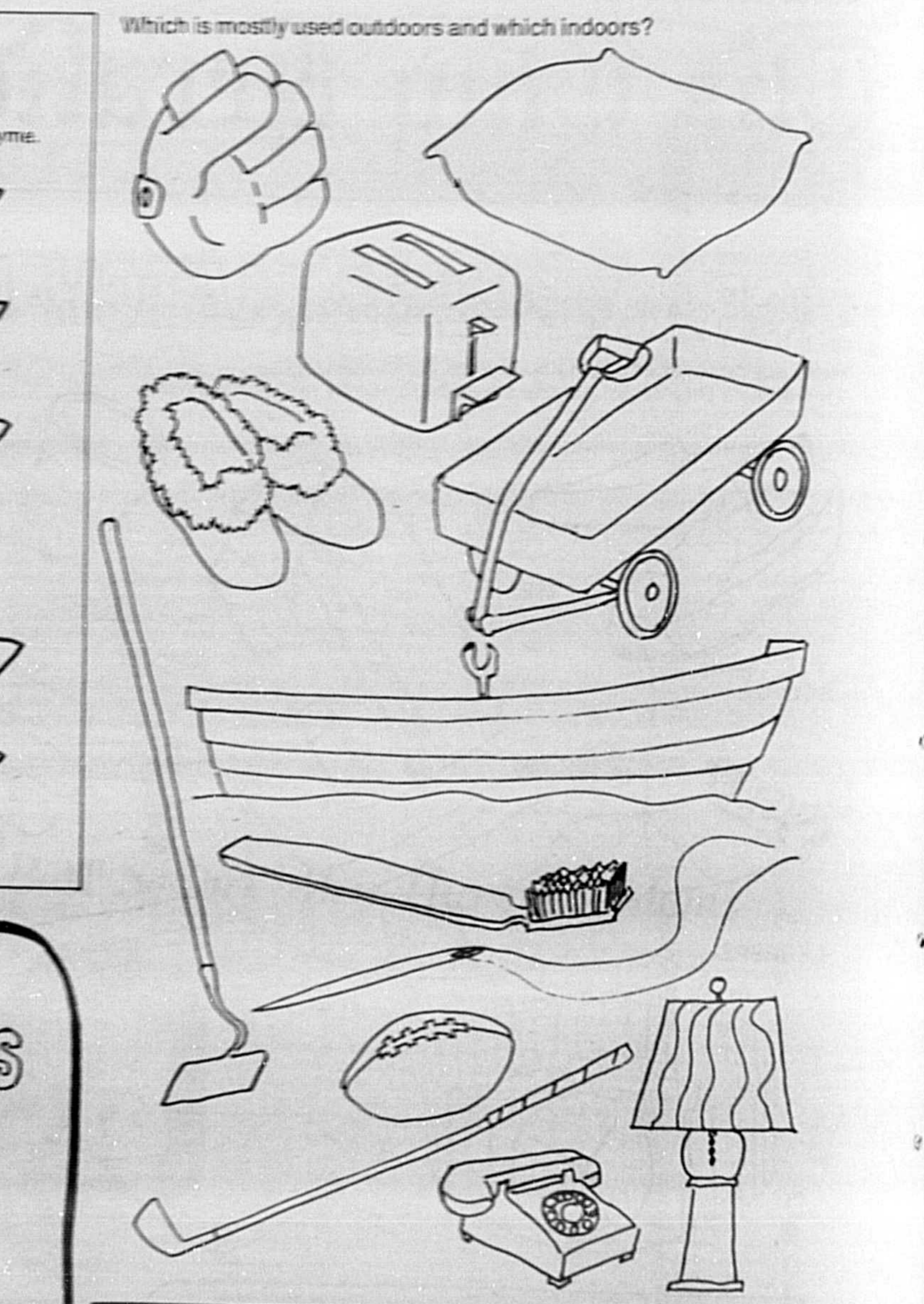

## Famous People in History

James Fenimore Cooper was a well known American novelist. He was born in New Jersey in 1789 and was educated at Yale. He served several years in the U.S. Navy. Cooper lived the life of a country gentleman and became a writer quite by chance. He mentioned to his wife that he could write a book better than the one he was reading and proceeded to do so. Although his first book was unsuccessful, his next, *The Spy*, was a great success. He then wrote *The Last of the Mohicans*, *The Prairie*, *The Red Rover*, *The Water Witch* and others. During his later life, he traveled in Europe and became critical of Americans and their culture, causing him a severe loss in popularity. He continued writing during this period and published 2 of his most well known novels, *The Pathfinder* and *The Deerslayer*. Cooper died in 1851 and was elected to the American Hall of Fame in 1910.

## Polly Has Learned To Live For Herself

**HOLLYWOOD**—Polly Bergen wears no bra or girdle and is letting her hair, girly since 16, show through for the first time. At home she wears T-shirts, jeans and slouchy barefoot. She warns the kids about a storm when she feels nervous, angry or "itchy."

It represents a change in the actress, singer and president of a cosmetic company. She has stopped living for other people and calls herself a different person.

"Until the last few years my entire identity was a reflection of how other people thought about me," she said in an interview. "I had no standards of my own. That is probably why I became a performer."

Not that Miss Bergen has become unkempt.

On the contrary, she is striking in a knit business dress with matching briefcase, jewelry and long red fingernails.

Instead, her change is within—something that she, her friends and children notice. It is expressed in small ways in her appearance. But she believes many women experience the trouble she had in identifying and ex-

pressing their own personalities.

"A lot of women live their lives without ever considering themselves and how they feel about something," she explained. "I was beautiful if other people wanted me to be, smart if they wanted me to be, that I spent my life performing for other people, but no more."

She wants to share discoveries about herself with other women similarly troubled. Women more often than men subdue their personalities for others, she believes.

"I want women to ask themselves before they start every single thing, 'Will this make me feel good about myself?'" she explained.

The woman should ask this question before she telephones her man the morning after he stands her up for dinner. She should ask herself before she decides to wear a skirt as her friends advise, although the pantsuit feels better. She should ask before she loses or gains weight, despite advice from everybody else, Miss Bergen said.

"I know women who won't buy a dress unless it has a certain label. They are so insecure they depend on that recognizable name although it

should express personalities in clothing and activities without regard to the opinions of others.

"Every woman has a specialness and there are many definitions of beauty. First she has to start thinking of herself as beautiful. Beauty can be in the soul, a sense of humor, the ability to love and be loved, a beautiful hand, a leg, beautiful breasts, a nose, a beautiful head of hair," she explained.

Miss Bergen noticed herself changing two years ago when she separated from her husband and started writing: "Polly's Principles" published by Wyden.

"After we separated, I found that very little of what I was really was me. Now, I rarely do anything that I don't want to do. I have stopped going to parties where I felt I had to be seen. At first my daughter was threatened by it."

Written over several months, her book shows a personal change to a more self-aware individual through the chapters, she said. Still there is not a radical, honest self-assertion.

Miss Bergen said she feels dishonest that some chapters were cut "to preserve the image the publisher of me."

"I was reared in a tight, lower-class situation with all the taboos associated with that. Only in the last two or three years I overcame about 80 per cent of those taboos. It is frightening when you consider my age."

The physical evidence of a new Miss Bergen, she describes as "looser and less put together. Three years ago I was wearing a bra and a girdle."
