

CASTING SKILL PAYS OFF

Experienced anglers haver hesitate to cast to

Good casting technique is important, and the fishing experts at Mercury outboards have put together a few basic casting tips which will help improve your fishing.

Always have a target when you cast. Pick out a clump of weeds a tree, rock or some other feature. Then make your cast as accurate as possible. Distance isn't as important as accuracy, and time spent practicing on the lawn at bome will make a difference in the number of correct casts and probably in the number of fish taken.

Another important casting tip is to halt the flight of the lure just before it hits the waer. There are three good reasons for learning this technique: it improves accuracy; you'll have less backlash because the reel won't tend to overrun; and the lure will actually be headed back toward you when it hits the water, which simulates natural swimming action.

When fishing among lijy pads, try to cast the lure so that it lands atop a pad. Then slide it gently into the water and begin a normal retrieve. This imitates the action of frogs, some pads. Make them more effective by parting more action to the lure.



Area Jaycees Live It Up With The Governor


