Dr. Al at the vestibule of heaven

Dr. Al, 77, to realize dream of priesthood

SANFORD - Doctor Al will become Father Al on Saturday morning in a very special ordination at All Souls Catholic Church.

Come early if you want a seat. The friends and family of Al Fornace surely will fill the place to see Bishop Norbert M. Dorsey ordain Fornace to the priesthood at 10 in the morning.

CNN, CBS, ABC and NBC ought to be there, too.

After serving more than 50 years as a physician helping to save lives, Fornace will now try to help save souls as a Catholic priest.

A couple of weeks before he turns 78, he is beginning a life he felt called to six decades ago as a junior at St. Joseph's Prep Jesuit high school in Philadelphia.

Fornace said that a quarter of the boys in his class at St. Joseph's entered the priesthood and he wanted to be with them. "But I didn't think I was in their league," he said. "And I turned to medicine."

Now this same man who fathered eight

New Tribes delegation to testify in D.C. about missing missionaries

SANFORD - A delegation from New Tribes Mission in Sanford will be going to Washington, D.C. soon. Two of them will be testifying before a congressional committee regarding 3 men held captive in Columbia, South America for more than 5 years.

The 2 who will appear before the committee are Tania Rich, wife of one of the captives, and Dan Germann, a member of the Crisis Management Committee and the Executive Committee of New Tribes.

Public Affairs Manager Macon Hare said most of the other members of the Crisis Management Team will also be in attendance. "And the wives of the other 2 missing men, Nancy Mankins and Patti Tenenoff, are also going," he said.

The Committee on International Relations was scheduled to open hearings today at the Raburn House Office Building. The hearings, entitled "U.S. Narcotics Policy Toward Columbia" are not specifically aimed at the captives. The main focus is to investigate international drug trade and importation.

The Sanford connection was instigated by U.S. Congressman John Mica who asked committee Chairman Benjamin Gilman to include the New Tribes Mission representatives in the hearings. The committee is to turn its findings over to

the Iberian-American Conference on Human Rights, (IACHR), scheduled to be held in Venezuela next month. It will be attended by the heads of state from countries throughout the North, Central and South Americas as well as Spain and Portugal.

Mica has sent letters to members of the International Relations committee suggesting they hear the New Tribes Mission people regarding the kidnapping and turn its findings over to the Iberian-American hearings. Mica wants the IACHR to urge the Colombian guerrillas to release the missionaries.

Gilman has subsequently sent a letter to Tania Rich, wife of Mark Rich, one of the three New Tribes men being held by the guerrillas. She has been asked to address the hearings on March 31. "Your testimony regarding your experience since the kidnapping of your husband Mark Rich by the FARC (guerrillas) would be beneficial to and welcomed by the members of the committee," Mica wrote.

Germann is also expected to play an important part in the testimony. Hare said Germann was maintaining contact with the guerrilla leaders via radio for the first few years following the capture of the three missionaries. "He has only been back here in Sanford for about a year," Hare said, "but I'm sure he'll have some interesting information for the members of the congress- **Please See Missionaries, Page 3A**

State of the county includes partnership with business

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Not a disparaging word was uttered Thursday afternoon when the county's government and business leaders held a Team Seminole rally at the Hilton Orlando North.

County Commission Chairman Randy Morris gave an upbeat State of the County address that stressed the importance of partnerships and teamwork by the public and private sectors.

"There used to be lots of friction among the cities - a let's protect our own turf attitude," said Winter Springs Mayor Paul Partyka. "People didn't even want to talk to each other. The more we talk now the quicker we're find solutions to problems."

"I'm pleased by the tone of the chairman's address and the emphasis on operating as a team," said Lake Mary Mayor David Meador. "Our success is our neighbor's success and their success is ours. There are no more border wars."

Morris asked for a concentrated effort from the county, city and business leaders to redevelop 13 miles along U.S. Highway 17-92, which runs from the Orange County border to Lake Monroe in Sanford. The blighted road touches five of the county's seven cities. Four of the five have joined the redevelopment effort.

Casselberry Mayor Bruce Pronovost said the city was eager to do all it can in the 17-92 redevelopment. Residents of Casselberry and Fern

Park are begging elected officials to rid the area of the adult entertainment and sexually oriented businesses - most of them on 17-92.

"This is a very complicated matter," Pronovost said Thursday. "It is a land use issue, a Constitutional issue, an economical development issue. We're moving very slowly." Caselberry, he said, has not determined whether to have an interlocal agreement with the county as Sanford recently adopted.

One of the more intriguing possibilities is that there will someday be an interchange constructed at the intersection of 17-92 and Route 436, the busiest intersection in the Orlando area. Such a construction might cause two or three adult clubs to move.

There are a number of road projects that will affect everyone who lives in Seminole County. Meador is excited about the widening of Rinchart Road in Lake Mary, and the construction of an I-4 interchange at County Road 46 A.

24 students injured in bus accident

WINTER SPRINGS - On the way to the Orlando Arena for the NBA Stay in School Jam, 24 Tuskawilla Middle School students suffered injuries as three school buses collided.

The accident occurred on the East-West Expressway as the lead bus driver overshot the exit onto Interstate-4; the other buses were following too close behind and rear ended each other. The wreck caused a 30-minute delay, and 6 ambulances were dispatched to transport the injured to Columbia Park Medical Center, Florida Hospital-Orlando, Orlando Regional Medical Center and Princeton Hospital.

The buses sustained \$30,000 in damage, and the drivers of bus 2 and 3 are being issued citations for careless driving. The accident happened around 10 a.m.

Sanford Main Street progresses: Should area be expanded?

SANFORD - A report on Sanford Main Street before the Sanford City Commission Monday afternoon, resulted in one commissioner questioning if the project might be expanded to include merchants in the Goldsboro area.

The question arose following presentations by Main Street coordinator Jennifer Singelsen and President Elect Michael Skat at a commission work session.

Their quarterly report painted an extremely bright picture regarding the future of downtown Sanford. The focus of their comments dealt with what is being accomplished as the result of previous committee appointments, formulations and activities.

Singelsen explained that

there were a number of committees presently operating. "Right now, our Economic Restructuring Committee is compiling an assessment of vacant downtown buildings," she said. "From that we will be looking at what might be leased as is, or improved to make them leasable and up to city code requirements."

She continued, "From that point on, we'll be making recommendations to property owners about what we believe might be necessary to make their buildings more available." She added that this year, the committee plans to expand efforts on this to include vacant buildings in the historical downtown residential area as well.

couldn't it be expanded to include the Goldsboro area?"

Williams said the Goldsboro area merchants were willing to do whatever they could to help bring about a revitalization to that district, but she was curious about the possibility of having it included in the Main Street scope.

While the present Sanford Main Street project does include some of the Sanford Avenue area, City Manager Bill Simmons explained that under the original establishment of the organization, the downtown area was the only section included.

"But if the Goldsboro area merchants wanted to," Simmons suggested, "they could band together and contact the National and State Main Street programs, and find out about having their own Main Street established. If they could get that approval, there would be funds available from the state to help get improvements underway."

Simmons cautioned however, that an attempt to be declared a Main Street project would place any group into competition with others across the entire state. "Anytime," he said, "it's getting more and more difficult to get that approval."

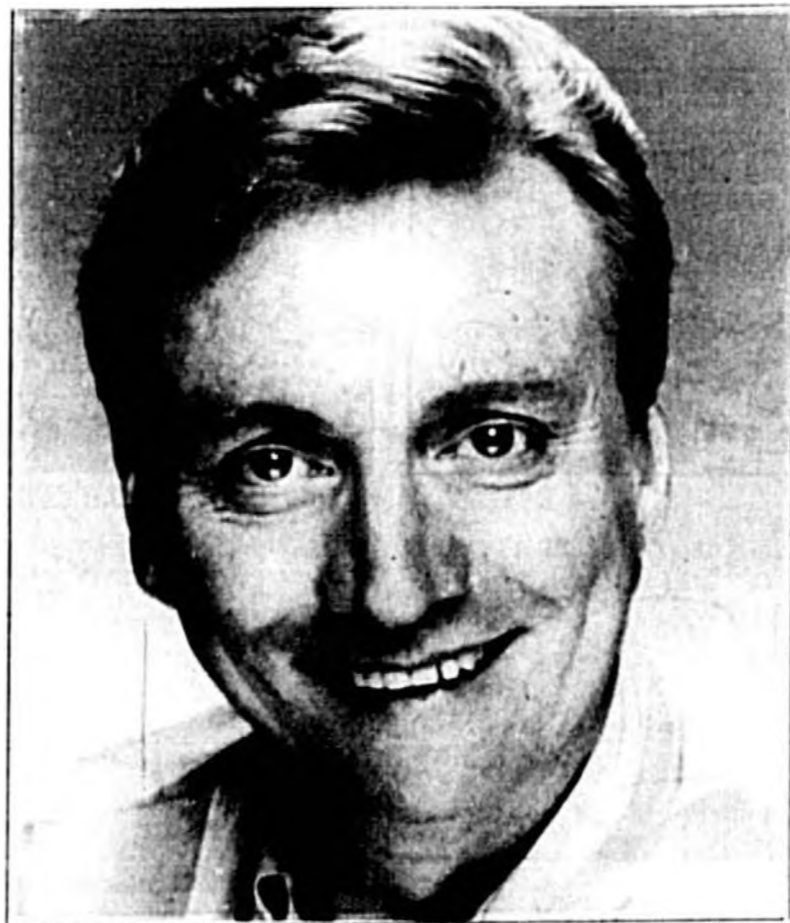

"Challenged" Lake Mary softball team blanks Seminole

Sowards is one of three aces on the Lake Mary staff, along with

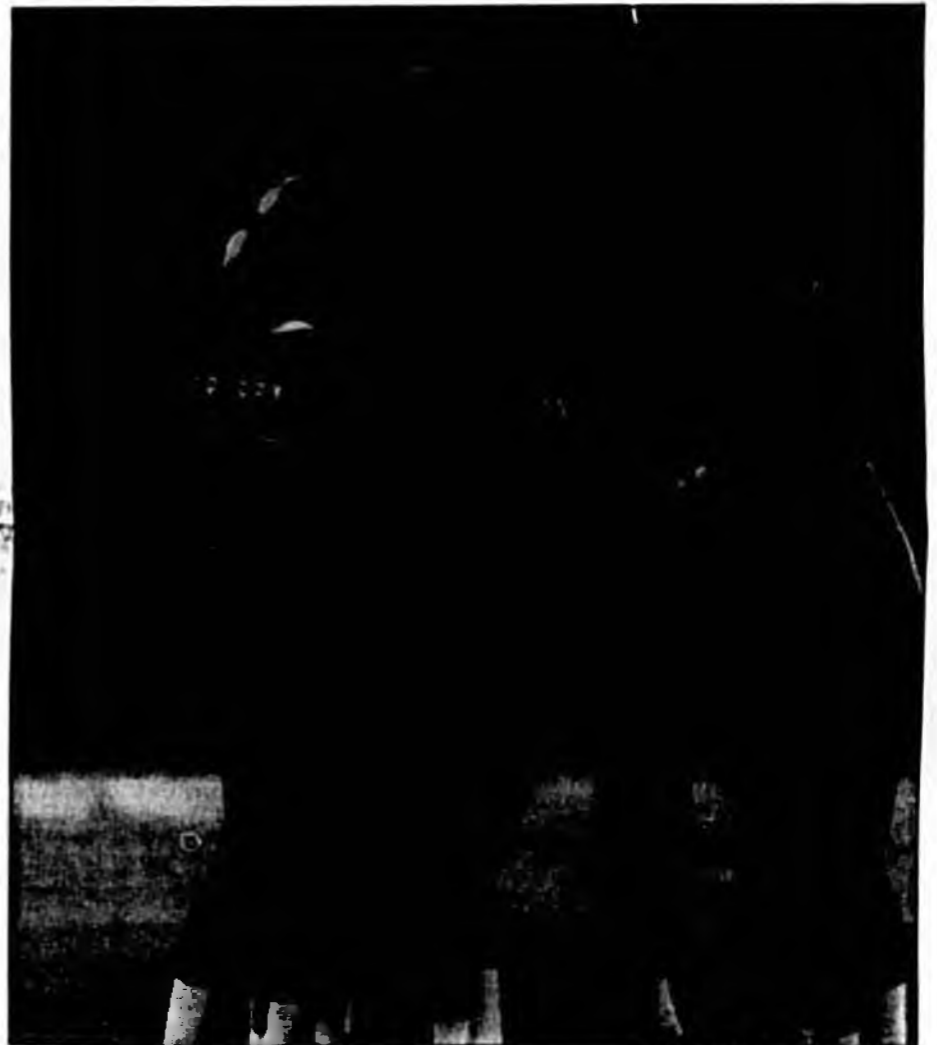
Sarah Smith and Kelly Harbour, goes every night but it's rare to find a staff as deep as the Rams.

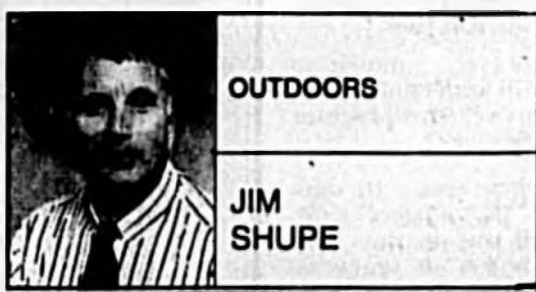
GFC restructures fisheries rule

SANFORD - The Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, today approved a thorough restructuring of fisheries rules, proposed by the agency's staff in an effort to harness the latest technology in fisheries management.

Commissioners voted to establish a daily bag limit of 25 black crappie (speckled perch) statewide. Previously, black crappie counted in the daily bag limit of 50 panfish, but under the new rule, anglers will be able to catch the daily limit of 25 crappie in addition to the daily limit of 50 panfish (bream).

Also, the Commission adopted a staff proposal to eliminate the daily bag limits for chain and redfin pickerel.

Bag limits, size limits, slot limits and other regulations on fish management

areas, however, would differ considerably from these statewide rules. Anglers still would need to check rules for individual fish management areas before taking to the water.


Another new rule repeals the prohibition against use of gigs to take catfish and would authorize jigging at night for all nongame fish.

Commissioners also adopted an assortment of rule changes to set hunting dates, bag limits and other regulations on Type I and Type II wildlife management areas and on wildlife and environmental areas.

Other rule changes establish new procedures to make it easier for alligator trappers and alligator egg and hatching collectors to comply with regulations and reduce the cost of hide validation fees for nuisance-alligator trappers.

In addition, Commissioners recognized retired education specialist Rudy Howell for his 34 years of service and retired Wildlife Officer Tom Largent for his 31 years of service.

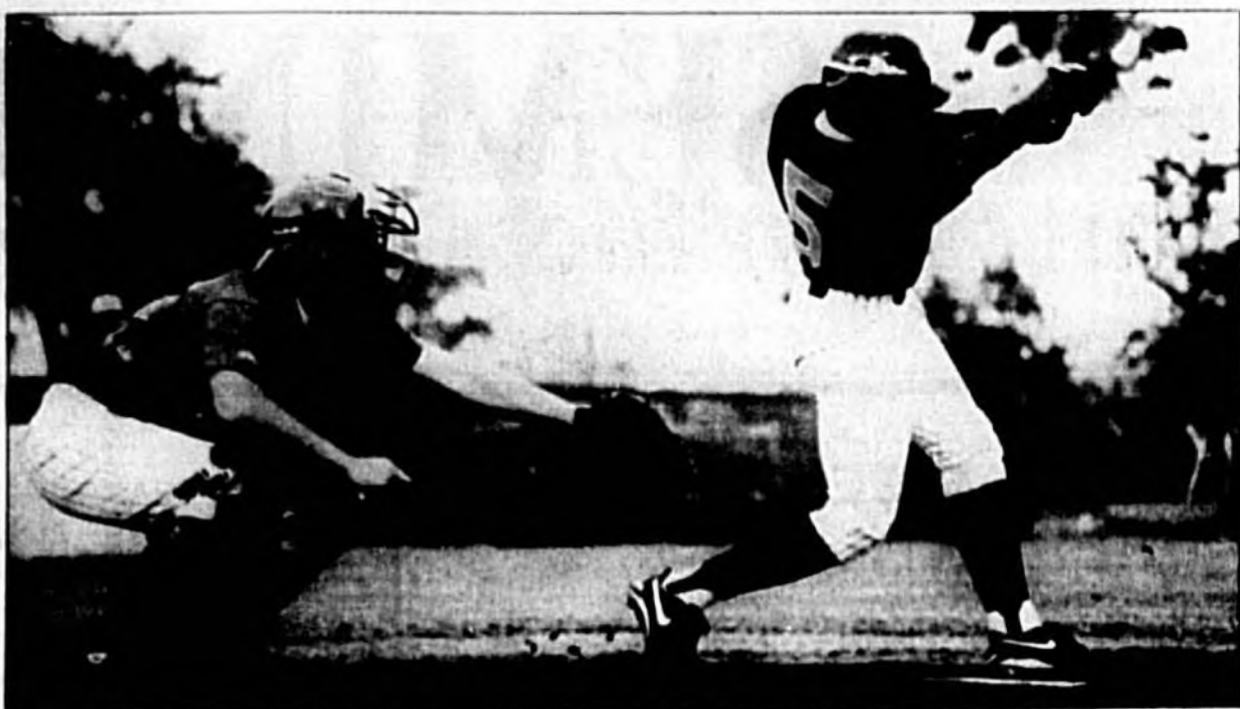

Nutrition facts aid thirsty juice lovers

Juice lovers thirsty for nutrition information will welcome the new "Nutrition Facts" panels, which are beginning to appear on food and drink products. The new food labels are required by law and regulated by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The food labels make it easier for you to make informed food choices. They serve as a guide to help you choose the foods that meet your needs.

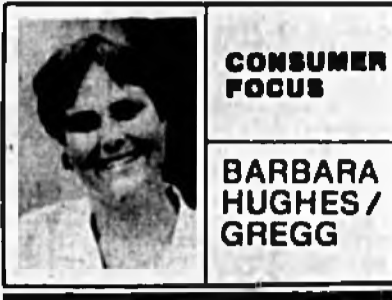
Here are four features of the food label:

- The heading "Nutrition Facts" signals the new food label.
- Serving size is based on a typical amount eaten and is listed in household measures.
- The Percent Daily Value tells you how much of the recommended daily amount of each nutrient is in a serving of the food or beverage.

• The Percent Daily Values for vitamins A and C, calcium and iron will appear on all labels. Percent Daily Values for other vitamins or minerals may also be listed if that nutrient has been added to the food.

When you look at the new Nutrition Facts panel on juices and juice drinks, you'll notice that it states the percentage of juice in the product. Like many customers, you may believe that 10 percent juices are nutritionally superior. However, the percentage of juice has little bearing on nutrition value. Here's how to use the new Nutrition Facts panel to compare the nutrition value of juices and juice drinks.

Read the Nutrition Facts panel for vitamin C content. You will find that many 100 percent juices contain less than 100 percent of the recommended Daily Value of vita-

min C. See the graph for Percent Daily Value information on vitamin C.

Note the Nutrition Facts panel does not distinguish between natural and added sugars—both are listed under Sugars. That's because nutritionally, there is no difference between fructose (fruit sugar) found naturally in fruits, and added sugars such as high fructose corn syrup. Scientific evidence shows our bodies

cannot distinguish between naturally occurring and added sugars. That means regardless of whether a juice or juice drink is naturally sweet or is sweetened, the sugars are used by the body the same way.

Don't be concerned if you see water and sugar listed on the ingredients section of the panel. All juice products contain water and sugar. Since 100 percent juices like orange juice are made from fruits naturally high in sugar and water, the sugar and water aren't listed separately as ingredients. Other juices or juice drinks, such as cranberry, are made from fruits with a naturally concentrated tart taste that requires a sweetener. These juices are blended with water and sweeteners to make them palatable. In the end, all juices and juice drinks have about the same amount of fruit

solids, water and sweeteners.

Remember, the key to good nutrition is balance—eating a variety of foods in amounts that are right for your lifestyle.

Some tips for taking mastery tests

Dear Parents,

It's hard to believe we are in the last quarter of this school year. During the remainder of the year, students will be expected to prove mastery of a lot of material through tests. They will also likely be required to take standardized tests indicating grade equivalent achievement using national norms. High school students are expected to take even more tests, with a standard high school diploma being contingent on passing the High School Competence Test (HSCT).

With so much importance placed on test results, we want our children to get the best possible score on each one. One of the biggest problems some kids face is their fear of taking tests. So, as parents we

need to help our children overcome their anxiety. It is important that your child knows that you love him or her regardless of how they do on any test. Of course, you expect them to do the best they can, but regardless of the test's outcome, your love and acceptance remain unchanged. Then let them know that there are specific skills that will help them do better on tests.

1. Be sure to read the directions carefully. If there is something you don't understand about the directions—ASK!
2. Skim over the test quickly to plan how much time you need to allot to each section. It's usually smart to answer the easiest questions first, then go back and spend more time on the harder questions.
3. If you come to a question you don't know, skip it. Answer all the questions you do know, then go back and either try to do the ones you're not sure of or guess if there is no penalty for wrong answers.
4. Look for "clue words" on true-false questions. When you see words such as "all", "every",

"none" or "always", you can probably eliminate that choice as the right answer.

5. Finally, always check your work before turning the test in. Be sure you followed the directions and didn't make any careless errors. On tests which will be scored electronically, be sure that there are no pencil marks in areas other than where you have marked your answers.

These tips will help your child gain test-taking confidence and improve performance on these all-important tests.

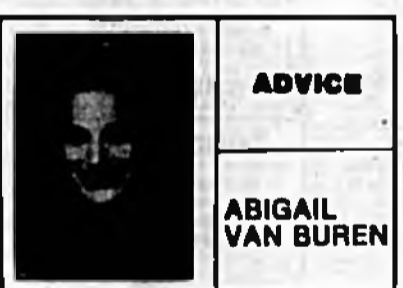
Abby, I hope your readers will take what I've said to heart. After all, any one of them could be next.
