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Cone Puts Foot On More Taxes; Says 'Not Needed'

Governor Estimates State Collection Will Total 48 Million In This Year

'Be Economical' Advice Of Fred

New Assessments Are Hinderance To Florida Progress

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 2.—(AP)—The collection of \$48,000,000 by Florida's Government this year was predicted by Governor Cone today.

He said this morning: "We don't need any new taxes; we don't need any sales taxes or any taxes on every item you buy. We are having prosperity."

"Times are better now than they were last year. That's the time when we ought to think about cutting taxes instead of putting on new taxes. The only pet hobby I have is keeping off new taxes, because new taxes will hurt Florida more than all the good you could do with advertising."

He said the forecast—up nearly \$4,000,000 from the past fiscal year—is based on reports showing increased returns from nearly all sources, including gasoline taxes and licenses.

"We will have plenty of money if we will be reasonably economical, rigorously—just reasonably economical."

Coroner's Jury To Probe Negro Death In Afternoon Meet

James "Shorty" Johnson, negro, was arrested yesterday afternoon by City police as the third person involved in the suspicious death of Ernestine Rouch, negro woman who succumbed yesterday morning after she was found half dressed and unconscious on the front porch of her home.

Johnson joined Jacob Dorgan, and Willie Mae White, both negroes, in the County jail where they are being held.

A coroner's jury yesterday examined to view the body of the dead negro but adjourned immediately. It was scheduled to have re-convened at 3 o'clock this afternoon with Judge J. C. Roberts presiding.

The jury is composed of Sid Rice, E. M. Marshall, Clarence Brown, G. V. Stewart, James O. Huff and Bert Long. Deputy Carl Williams is handling the case for the County. Police Chief Roy Williams and Lt. Charlie Shaffer represent the City.

Retired Dentist Is Dead After Illness Of 1 Week

Funeral services for Dr. Ruben M. Mason Sr., who died early today at his home, 608 Palmetto Avenue, will be held at 3 p. m. Saturday from the First Methodist Church. The Rev. A. H. Cole is to officiate.

Dr. Mason succumbed after an illness of about one week. He was 73 years old and had been a resident of the Sanford vicinity for about 50 years.

He came to Florida at the age of 17 years, living for some time in Arcadia before moving to Sanford. While his parents resided here, he attended dental college from which he was graduated.

Dr. Mason practiced dentistry for 34 years, retiring eight years ago.

He resumed his residence here, broken by his term of college, 42 years ago.

Dr. Mason was born in Wrightsville, Ga. He was a member of the Masonic Order and former member of the old Sanford City Council.

Copper, Steel Is Too Costly, President Says

Asserts Government Should Cease Encouraging Purchase Of Metals

WASHINGTON, Apr. 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt told his press conference today the price of durable goods such as steel and copper is too high.

He added the time had come for the Government to discourage federal expenditures for such goods and encourage expenditures for consumer goods. The stock market took quick cognizance of the criticism with a wave of selling which forced prices down by front \$1 to \$5 in a few minutes.

The President said he had told five House Democrats who called on him yesterday that future PWA expenditures should go, not for steel bridges and other such permanent structures, but for channel dredging and earthen dams

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Chattanooga Defeats Washington Senators Here

Thrilling Finish Marks Lookouts' 5-4 Victory Over Visiting Combine

Joe Kubel, Nat's First Hitter, Outstanding At Bat; Dee Miles Is Chattanooga Leader

Fighting an uphill battle practically all the way, Cal Griffith's Chattanooga Lookouts staged a thrilling last inning finish to shatter a 4-4 victory over Clark Griffith's Washington Senators in a hard-fought contest which took place yesterday afternoon at the local ball park.

Scoring three runs in the third inning, the Senators had what seemed an insurmountable lead in the fourth to cut the advantage to two runs. Insurgent Campaign In North Spain Believed Crucial

Two of the bitterest, bloodiest, most important battles of the Spanish Civil War raged on widely separated fronts today.

In the northern sector near Bilbao, the Spanish Government rushed mobilization of all available fighting men to repel a big Insurgent advance and sent its militiamen up a 4,000-foot mountain peak to block one segment of the assault.

Far to the South in Cordoba Province, opposing armies still locked were in a furious struggle for possession of the rich mining country. But here, Insurgents won on the defensive.

The success or failure of the Insurgent drive in Northern Spain is construed in many quarters as likely to have a decisive effect on the future of Generalissimo Francisco Franco's Insurgent cause, particularly in view of recent losses in the Guadalajara sector, northeast of Madrid.

Seminole Schools Receive \$31,982 From State Source

County School Superintendent T. W. Lawton today reported the receipt of \$31,982.53 from State Comptroller J. M. Lee, assuring Seminole County teachers of full salaries for the complete 1936-37 school term.

Mr. Lawton said there were indications that this County may receive an additional allocation of cash, although he added that this was yet uncertain.

Normally, the Seminole school system receives approximately \$17,000 per month for operating expenses. However, a new interpretation of the State disbursement law has revised the method so that eight payments are now made each year instead of the original nine distributions.

Superintendent Lawton declared that in any event—whether or not more funds are to be received—there will be sufficient cash on hand to finish the year in fine shape.
