Albert Teckel, a rookie right-hander, limited the Seminoles to five hits during the game, though Whitlock and Justice pounded out pairs of two-baggers, only to be out at bat, the most hits made by any Sanford player and Whitlock drove a double for his two runs at the plate.

In the seventh inning the local boys put on a drive, leading the game for a chance to come up and win the game but the Saints threw out the game and ended the inning.

Florida Amateur Golf Tournament Leads Off Today

Bill Stark, Former Champ, Enters But Carl Dann Is Out

ORLANDO, Apr. 23.—(AP)—Florida's leading amateur golfers Tuesday fired final practice rounds prior to the opening of the 27th annual Florida amateur golf tournament here at Dabedread Country Club today.

Bill Stark of Jacksonville, winner of the 1935 event at Miami, was scheduled to arrive Tuesday to compete. The Jacksonville shot-maker may be the only former champion on the scene unless Carl Dann, four times winner from Orlando, changes his mind at the last minute and enters.

Dann, however, for the last few years by an old wrist injury, announced Monday that he would not compete. He is undergoing medical treatment, however, and if the wrist responds he may enter the event by the time the first three-somes tee off tomorrow.

Defending champion George Boletta of Tampa will not compete. Boletta was inducted into the Army Tuesday under the provisions of the selective service act.

The team championship, won for the past two years by the Miami Billmore Country Club, will go under the title. The Miami club has entered only a two-man team of Earl Christiansen and William Stembler. Christiansen, a Miami policeman, is regarded as one of the prominent threats to win the title.

With the lower East Coast team out of the way, four-man teams from Ponte Vedra and Dabedread appeared to be principal bidders for the trophy. Personnel of neither team has yet been announced, but Jacksonville has five fine golfers in Stark, Stockton Rogers, a semi-finalist in 1935; Bobby Walker, Jacksonville city champion; Crawford Rainwater, also of Pensacola, and Dick Van Kleek.

Dabedread's team will be composed of Watis Gunn, former Southern amateur titleholder; Hugh Akerman, Jack Youtsey, and Dann, if Dann plays.

Signs Point Towards Hitting Year For National League Big Bats, Says Scribe

NEW YORK, Apr. 23.—(Special)—Signs point to a bat-barraging Spring in big league baseball, with homers hitting far and wide and the bases-patting turning every inning. Primed-up ace pitchers muffled the cannons somewhat in the season-opening series, but not for long.

Swearing was the Number One training season feature in the National League. The parrot circuit's boisterous barraging climaxed in one wild afternoon in which their collective clouting cleared 17 home runs and 5 American League clubs hit the bases-patting clean sweep of the inter-league exhibition game schedule.

In those 5 games the National League hits totaled 67, better than 12 per club. This is not mid-season form, if you mean last season. It's better! Old 1940 was a pitchers' year in the National. Outside of batting champion Debs Garms '35, the best average for a 100-game player was .310. Only 9 125-gamers made the 300 class. For the first time since 1919 nobody reached 200 in hit production.

This is another year. The music of ash against leather emanating from National League bat-piles prophesies that the senior circuit's twirlers will have a hard time tying last year's record of 82 shutouts. In 1940, the chuckers held a much heavier whip-hand over the bats than their American League counterparts, whose shutouts totalled only 61.

Those April 9 homers, triples, doubles, etc. can perhaps be discounted by the fact that they weren't facing National League pitching, in their free and fancy flailing which bowled over the 5 American League clubs. Against National League pitching, when the season is on, the history will be different, say those critics who believe the National League pitchers will again dominate the flag fight picture in the parent league.

The pitching supremacy of the National held true, however, in all of last year's inter-league tests, at every stage of the baseball year: the Florida All-Star Game in March, the July All-Star Game in St. Louis, and the world series. Especially was this true in the mid-season classic, when the 5-man National League staff—Derringer, Walters, Wyatt, French and Hubbell, representing 4 different clubs and thus reflecting the pitching level of the league as a whole—wrecked the shutout trick on the American League team, blanking the pick of the junior circuit's sloggers

Track Experts Pick 4 Horses To Win Derby

Our Boots, King Cole, Whirlaway Chosen

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Apr. 23.—(AP)—Bluegrass hardboots, those boys who know their horses like a banker know a counterfactual ten-buck bill, predict a 4-horse race in the \$75,000-added May 3 Kentucky Derby.

That doesn't mean that no more than four horses will start, but it does mean that they think the winner lies in a quartet.

The "smart" boys list these four:

- Porter's Cap
- Whirlaway
- Our Boots
- King Cole

Otherwise, say the hardboots, the more than a hundred nominated will be just so many also rans, if their owners send any of them against these four.

The leaders named by the hardboots represent, in the order listed, the far west, Kentucky, the mid-west and the east and that, they say, will be about the way the big money will be placed at the pari-mutuels. Each section supporting its entry.

Which of the four will take the roses appears to be entirely a matter of selecting a winner in a wide-open race which might develop a "dark horse" that even the hardboots haven't considered. Such things have happened.

The Blue Grass stakes at Keeneland Thursday probably will determine whether Whirlaway's or Our Boots' odds drop in the pre-derby betting books. It will be a matter of a eighth of the longest distance run by these horses. This will be the fifth meeting between the two outstanding derby candidates. Our Boots defeated Whirlaway in two previous starts with Whirlaway carrying more weight. In the Belmont futurity. The only time they met at equal weights Whirlaway won. Our Boots ran second and Whirlaway third to Bold Irishman in the Pimlico futurity, the only time they met when neither won.

Valdina Groom and Bushwhacker, two others slated to go in the Bluegrass, also are derby candidates. The former showed considerable late speed in the Elmhurst at Keeneland last week although running fourth to Our Boots and may be a derby starter, if his showing proves outstanding Thursday. The same goes for Bushwhacker, although his training has been disappointed in his preparation so far.

The Bluegrass is the top race at Keeneland and will mark the closing day of the Spring season here. Saturday racing opens at Churchill Downs, the derby course here, with the Clark handicap the feature contest.

Weights in the Clark, announced today, give the top to Gallahadon, last year's derby victor, 120 pounds. Joe Schenck, Vascosity and Hault were assigned 116, from which point the weights fall off to 97 for Gay Lads.

 The United States Treasury has presented its plan for raising the \$3,500,000,000 in new taxes for defense spending. In addition to higher taxes on beer, tobacco and other so-called luxuries and increases in gift and estate taxes, there will be substantial increases in personal and corporate income taxes which strike the little fellow right in the pocketbook and from the very start have the public gasping for breath and holding on to the ropes.

Seek The Poor
 A new surtax rate would be applied to small incomes rising from 11 percent on the first \$2,000 of taxable income, to 14 percent on the second \$2,000, and so on until there isn't much left to tax. Under this plan a man who has been paying \$11 a year in income taxes would next year pay \$75 on the same income, while a man who this year paid \$110 on a \$5,000 income would be required to pay \$506.

Stunning as are these tax increases ranging from 300 to 600 percent, they seem little enough to ask as our contribution to the commendable cause of stopping Hitler while still on the other side of the Atlantic or of being fully prepared for him should he try to cross over to this side.

And yet we cannot pay it, we cannot give up some of the things which we have long regarded as necessities, without thinking back over the years at the enormous sums which have been carelessly wasted and recklessly spent by our government and because of which we now have a huge debt burden to carry as well as a defense program to finance. No one denies the necessity of the defense program, but how much better it would be if we were entering this national emergency with a previously well balanced budget, with a not already too high tax structure, with a reasonable bond debt.

Nothing is to be gained now, of course, by calling up the ghosts of the past. What is done is done. The trouble is that the wastefulness goes right on. We wonder if the defense spending today is being conducted on a business-like basis. We wonder if in the construction of naval bases, army camps and defense housing projects, men are being hired who are not needed. We wonder if the taxpayers are getting a dollar's worth of national defense for every dollar spent.

Borghum's Young Son Carries On Work Of Father
 RAPID CITY, S. D., Apr. 24 (AP)—Lincoln's youngest first son, Young Borghum, from the back of a pony while accompanying his father on a week-long tour of the Black Hills 17 years ago.

Young Borghum was 11 years old then. Today at the age of 25 he surveys the heights of Reamwood from scaffolds and swinging chairs as he directs the final touches to the gigantic Mountain Memorial his father decided upon as a result of that early horseback trip.

Gutson Borghum's dreams of 17 years ago began taking form three years later, when he started carving on the great granite uplift the faces of four American heroes, Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

The young man's father, a sculptor, had graduated from the day when the boy probably could give his father's dream with little more than curiosity as they rode the mountain trails together.

The father found the son an eager pupil, not only in the art of mountain carving, but in the whole field of sculpture.

As the work progressed they stepped naturally into the work of the father's death last March.

"Little work to be done to finish the work as father planned it," he said. "I want only to carry on as he wished."

Carving of the faces, 65 feet from chin to crown, was completed before the father died, and

Lighting In Home Discussed In Talk

Miss Colena Without, Home Economist for the Florida Power and Light Company spoke on "Better Lighting for the Home" at the meeting of the Civic Department of the Woman's Club yesterday afternoon.

Illustrating her talk with moving pictures, Miss Without compared the goose-necked lamps so often used in homes to the effect of going from the bright sunlight into a darkened theater, and of the time it takes to become adjusted to the darkness.

She explained the advantages of adding a few accessories such as lighter lamp shades and reflector bowls on the old lamps in order to diffuse the light and send it into all corners of the room, yet with the same amount of wattage being used, thereby giving more light at a minimum of cost.

England Losing War, Lindbergh Declares

NEW YORK, Apr. 24.—(AP)—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh told an "America First" rally last night "it is now obvious that England is losing the war" but has "only last desperate plan" to persuade the United States to send another American expeditionary force to Europe. He accused Britain of mismanaging the United States and other nations "concerning her state of preparation, her military strength, and the progress of the war." The rally was guarded by a special detail of uniformed and plain clothes policemen. Dr. L. M. Kirkhead, national director of the Friends of Democracy, Inc., had announced beforehand that it would be picketed by members of his organization, charging that it would be "the largest meeting of pro-Nazi and pro-Fascists in New York since the German-American Bund rallied in Madison Square Garden."
