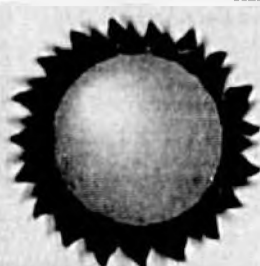

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# 13-year-old arrested for bomb threat

**CASSELBERRY** — A 13-year-old student at South Seminole Middle School was arrested Monday after telling other students she was going to blow up the school.

Chelsea Renee Christian told students she had the means and ability to blow up the school, and that she knew people who could help her make a device, according to Casselberry police. No bomb was found during a search of the campus.

## Student hated school, told friends she would blow it up

She said she made the threat because she hated school, according to police. Christian was charged with threatening to place or discharge a firearm on school grounds, a second degree felony. She was arrested at 3:26 p.m. Monday at the school, then transported to the

Juvenile Detention Center in Sanford. She was released to her mother's custody Tuesday night.

Rick Mossman, principal at South Seminole Middle School, said that the sixth-grader told other students she would blow up South Seminole on the

last day of school.

In cases similar to this, Mossman said that students receive an out-of-school suspension and recommendation for expulsion by the Seminole County School Board.

Mossman said he does not believe Christian had the means or ability to blow up the school.

Because she said the school would be blown up on the day classes end for the summer, Mossman said it is not likely that the threat is related to Thursday's

## Roseland residents clean up property

**SANFORD** — The Roseland community, located just east of Sanford, is taking steps to deal with abandoned property, a problem that can lead to increased crime in a community.

More than 50 people participated Saturday in a clean-up of the community, which has been plagued by illegal dumping and neglected property.

Community members worked alongside deputies from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and members of the State Attorney's Office from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. to clean-

up vacant properties and remove overgrown brush.

The Roseland Community Park will be dedicated in May as part of the community's beautification efforts.

Saturday marked the start of a two-month campaign in the Roseland community, located just east of Sanford. A house numbering and street lighting campaign will be included in the project. New street signs, speed limit signs and no dumping signs will be posted in the area. Another clean-up day will also be held this coming Saturday.

"There were a lot more people than we were expecting," said Lt. Tony Fannin of the Seminole County Sheriff's

Office, North Region Coordinator for the Community Justice Coalition. "It was overwhelming."

The project is aimed at reducing crime in the area.

"We recognize that when a neighborhood is in decline and there is apathy, that carries over into increased criminal activity," Fannin said. "We've seen some of those signs in the Roseland community."

Similar campaigns are also underway along 13th Street in Sanford and in the Altamonte Springs area. The 13th Street clean-up campaign is in the early stages. Dumpsters and trash are being picked up in preparation for landscaping efforts.

# Auto thief nabbed after 12-car pursuit

## Foot-chase ends when man stops for Gatorade

**SANFORD** — A 28-year-old Sanford man is in custody, and a second man remains on the loose, after the duo led police on a 45-minute chase that ended near Pine Crest Elementary School.

A dozen units responded, including Seminole County deputy sheriffs, Sanford police, a K-9 officer, and a helicopter belonging to the Sheriff's Office, as the two suspects ditched the stolen Cadillac near Pine Crest Elementary School and took off on foot.

Deputies said after spotting the stolen car they did not engage in pursuit while on the



road, but followed from a safe distance. Speeds never reached high levels.

Eric Curtis of 148 Academy Drive was captured at the corner of 27th Street and U.S. 17-92 in the parking lot of the Coastal Mart convenience store at 1:17 p.m., where he had stopped running to purchase Gatorade.

# School violence tragedies offer lessons for future

**Editor's Note:** This is the last of a three-part series. Today's article focuses on lessons that can be learned from the April 20, 1999 tragedy at Columbine High School in Littleton, Colo. Part two, which appeared Tuesday, addressed steps parents and schools can take to avoid violent incidents. The first article in the series examined concerns about rage violence and rampage killings in schools nationwide, and the impact in Seminole County.

Columbine killers felt that certain groups at the school received more favorable treatment than others.

"The main thing we can learn from Columbine is to do a better job of listening to our students," said Rick Mossman, principal of South Seminole Middle School. "We need to treat our kids fair and square, listen to their concerns, and discuss them in a rational manner."

Teachers in Seminole County schools have been encouraged to discuss the Columbine tragedy with students who say they are concerned. However, in discussing Columbine, there is a fine line between addressing concerns and raising nightmares.

"We have to make sure that everybody is sensitive," said Ron Pinnell, director of secondary education for the Seminole County school-district. "But, we don't want to over react. The anniversary of Columbine is a time to think

# SPD's Year 2000 badges reflect pride

**SANFORD** — On a ranking of 1 to 10, the 2000 Sanford Police Badge is an 11.

Since the first week of January, each of the members of the SPD has been wearing the colorful new badge recommended by Police Chief Brian Tooley.

"This is an officer's symbol of authority and symbol of the special trust the people have in the police department," Tooley said. "I want our officers to wear this badge with pride. At the end of the year, we'll give each officer the badge as a keep-

sake and return to the regular badge."

The 2000 badge contains a miniature of the regular SPD badge. Above this is the year 2000.

Tooley said he expected that the police badge itself traces to the time when Sir Robert (Bobby) Peel re-organized the London Police Force. Those first Bobbies wore their badge with honor and so have all police organizations since that time," Tooley said.

Whenever an officer has done something to discredit the department — or is being investigated for an alleged offense —

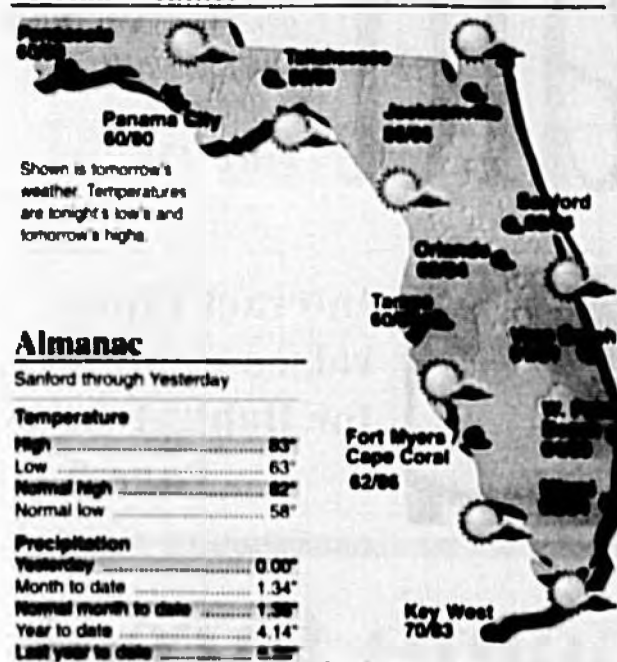
the first things the office must turn over to the department are his or her gun and his or her badge.

He was unarmed, carrying only a cellular telephone.

Curtis is charged with stealing a red 2000 Cadillac Eldorado the men were in. He may be linked to several other suspects who are involved in stealing cars in the Sanford area, said Steve Olson, spokesman for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

"This could lead to more arrests with regard to auto thefts in the Sanford area," Olson said.

Curtis has a lengthy criminal record including charges for withholding child support, possession of a controlled substance, and driving with a suspended license. He was booked into the Seminole County Jail for grand theft auto, with a \$1,000 bond. He bonded out of jail at 8:30 p.m.

"From the court system and judicial standpoint, the purpose of bond is to ensure that they show up for the trial process," Olson said. "But, for law enforcement it is frustrating when you arrest a guy for grand theft auto, he is fleeing from you, and by 8:30 at night he is back out on the street."

The second suspect, described by deputies only as a black male who knows Curtis, was able to elude capture. Deputies are still attempting to determine which man was driving the Cadillac.

The Eldorado had been stolen April 3 from Don Mealey Cadillac-Oldsmobile, located at 3700 U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford. It is valued at \$45,000,

according to management at the dealership.

The two men were spotted in the stolen Cadillac at 12:29 p.m. at the corner of Airport Boulevard and U.S. Highway 17-92 by Seminole County deputy sheriffs. Deputies attempted to stop the Cadillac, but it fled away.

The Cadillac headed north to 27th Street, and parked next to Pine Crest Elementary School. The duo ran out of the car, jumped a fence to a shopping plaza, and ran away from pursuing deputies in the direction of U.S. 17-92.

School officials were alerted regarding the pursuit, but children attending Pine Crest Elementary were never placed in harms way, Olson said. No one was injured in the chase.

"The suspects wanted to get as far away from the scene as possible," Olson said. "We didn't believe that they were going to stick around in the area of the school."

A car of similar description is suspected as being involved in an attempted drive-by purse snatching last week at a Texaco gas station located at 5555 Red Bug Lake Road in Winter Springs. It is not known at this time whether Curtis was involved in the attempted purse snatching.

"The car drove by and the suspects tried to do a purse snatching," Olson said. "But, instead they grabbed only one bag containing diapers. No money was stolen."

macabre one-year anniversary of the Columbine High School massacre, in which two students killed 13 people, wounded 23, and committed suicide.

"I don't think Columbine played any role at all," Mossman said. "She never made mention of Columbine. I think it's really just a coincidence."

On Tuesday, Mossman addressed the student body on the school's Intercom about the danger of making threatening remarks. He asked students to treat others as they would like to be treated themselves.

Mossman said he did not refer to a student being arrested during the address. He was unsure how many students knew about the incident.

Students approached administration with concerns about a threat of violence, as also was the case in the April 7 arrest of 15-year-old June Nicole Whitney for creating a hit list with the names of students, teachers and administrators who she would kill.

"We ask students to come to us any time they have a concern about drugs or weapons," Mossman said. "The kids who came to us did the right thing,"

and reflect on the tragedy itself, as well as other friends we've lost."

Schools throughout the county are using this week as a time to reflect on the value of life and avoiding violent actions. In the meantime, administrators are also prepared for the possibility of a small number of students using the Columbine anniversary as an opportunity to disrupt classes.

"The biggest lesson of Columbine is that you can't let your guard down," said Boyd Karns, principal at Lake Mary High School. "Parents and the community play such a critical role in the school environment. You have got to reach out to work with families."

From an early age, students participate in violence prevention programs such as Keys To Your Character. The Keys To Your Character program stresses values such as trust, honesty and forgiveness to students from Kindergarten through the

12th grade.

"We hope to build strong character and instill the ability to resist violence from an early age," said Ron Nathan, principal at Goldsboro Elementary School. "In many cases, we have a better chance at reaching children when they are young."

Seminole County has avoided such tragedy. However, two middle school students in three weeks have been arrested on felony charges for making threats to commit violence. One made up a hit list, and asked "what if there were a Columbine here?" The other threatened to blow up the school when classes end for the summer.

Perhaps the most troubling aspect of Columbine is that it was not an isolated incident. Several killings on school grounds in the late 1990's preceded the Columbine massacre. A common factor in most of the killings is that warning signs went unnoticed.

• Before mass killings were

making headlines, in rural Giles County, Tenn., on Nov. 15, 1995, 17-year-old Jamie Rouse walked up to two teachers at his high school and shot them in the head with a .22 Remington Viper. One teacher was gravely wounded, and the other died.

He then aimed for the school's football coach, but instead killed a 16-year-old girl. Police say Rouse had told as many as five teenage friends how he planned to bring his rifle to school and start shooting, but none of them had called authorities for help.

• In 1997, 14-year-old Michael Corneal, a freshman at a high school in Paducah, Ky. killed three and wounded five. He then laid down his gun and said "I'm sorry." Previously, he had discussed shooting into a student prayer group with friends.

• That same year, spectators gathered on the mezzanine when 16-year-old Evan Ramsey walked into the lobby of his high school in Bethel, Alaska, and shot a popular basketball

player in the stomach. Two people died. A pair of students had been involved in planning the shooting, and one showed him how to load the shotgun.

• On May 20, 1998, after being suspended from school in Springfield, Ore., 15-year-old Kip Kinkel shot his father and then his mother. The next day, he shot 24 people in the school cafeteria, killing two students. Previously, Kinkel had complained about hearing voices inside his head.

The lesson of not only Columbine, but other school shootings, is to not ignore warning signs of potential violence. The first ones to spot warning signs, school officials say, are often friends and family members.

"Our biggest source of information about potential activity is from other kids," said Sam Momary, principal of Lyman High School. "They hold the key to helping us stop or minimize an incident."

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# Magic may have won more if their pants weren't so long

I'm an ex-pro basketball fanatic. I liked the game much more when the players wore their shorts above the ankle.

My favorite player was Nat "Sweetwater" Clifton, who was one of the first blacks to come into the NBA. Sweetwater, who had played for the Harlem Globetrotters, could almost hide the basketball in his enormous hands. As a New York Knickerbocker, he made no more than \$12,500 in a single season.

Not long after he was through as a player, Nat "Sweetwater" Clifton was a cab driver in Chicago. He died one night on the job.

The old NBA played in antiquated gymnasiums in places like Fort Wayne, Syracuse and Sheboygan. Players often wore T-shirts under their jerseys because of the cold. The long-gone Washington Capitals played games at Uline Arena — an ice packing plant.

As kids, we used to emulate the shots of the old NBA play-

ers — the Bob Cousy one-handed push and around-the-back pass, the Neil Johnston hook, the Clyde Lovellette under-handed free throw.

By the late 1950s, pro basketball began to take off. Bill Russell's arrival changed the game. There had been a number of seven-footers like Walt Duke and Ray Felix but none were as dominant as Wilt "The Stilt" Chamberlain. Wilt vs. Russell was the deal.

For a fellow who covered 400 or more NBA games from the 1940s through the 1990s, I suppose I have had my fill. The last time I went to a Magic game it was because Michael Jordan was playing. The arena — or Waterhut — turns me off. The p.a. announcer is obnoxious, the music is too loud, the hot dogs and cokes cost too much.

I'm told the clock ran out on the Magic. That the team will not be in the NBA playoffs — not even after shuffling several hundred players on and off the

roster. The ones who finished are emotionally spent and probably won't be around next year when better players are bought or brought to the Watershed, or whatever it is.

"I don't know if I've ever felt worse for a group of guys," said the Magic coach Doc Rivers, whose 40-41 record is considered something of a miracle around the NBA. The 41st defeat was an 85-83 home court setback Monday night to Milwaukee.

Much depends now on whether the Magic can sign free agent Tim Duncan or another outstanding player who could be lured to Orlando. I would expect that the team will have a joint announcement should Duncan be signed, informing us of another increase in ticket prices.

The satisfying part of not watching much of the Magic this year is not having to feel sorry about their coming up short.

They may have won five more games if their pants weren't so long.

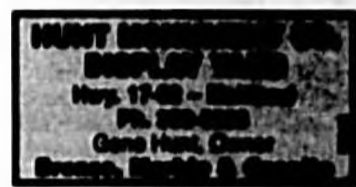

## Jerry Falwell's second coming

At a time when the Christian world is focusing on the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth and the meaning of those events, Rev. Jerry Falwell is again focusing on politics.

A decade ago, after disbanding the Moral Majority (for which I toiled for five years), Falwell announced he was going back to preaching. People who heard him said his preaching became more powerful when he returned to his first love. But he has again succumbed to the temptation of politics and its illusion of power. At a news conference last week in Washington and on his "People of Faith 2000" Web page, Falwell announced a drive to register 10 million new voters in order to impose a moral code through government which most citizens, comfortable in their materialism, are not willing to impose on themselves.

Falwell will not register 10 million new voters who will vote as he wishes because there aren't that many unregistered. People who still believe the solution to moral decline lies in Washington registered to vote in the '80s and found that, even in the idealized Reagan era, not much changed. In fact, with the exception of a slight decline in abortions (due not to legislation but to the establishment of thousands of centers to help women with unplanned pregnancies), things have gotten worse. Many church members are following the ways of the world, divorcing and consuming pornography in increasing numbers, according to several surveys.

On his Web page, Falwell claims that "people of faith are persona non grata in the American political process." No, they're not. They just shouldn't expect to constantly run the Republican Party to which his wing of the church has attached itself. The lower kingdom (politics) is about compromise. The higher kingdom (the gospel) is about no compromise. Falwell is trying to apply the principles of the higher kingdom to the lower one. Such attempts are futile. Second, Falwell claims the "left-wing elite has been

engaged in a campaign to purge traditional Judeo-Christian values from public life in America." It doesn't speak well for God if a "left-wing elite" can erode His power and reach. But the real blame is laid at the church doorstep. Falwell accuses "the deafening silence of America's pulpits and religious leaders" for causing this values purge. Viewers who see ministers and non-ministers all over television don't believe these people have been silenced. Most preachers I know have chosen to concentrate on preaching the gospel and changing lives, not government. They have been unfairly slandered. They believe their call is from God; it is to Him they answer and no one else.

Culture can neither be spoiled nor cured by Washington. Its health is determined by millions of individual choices. Scripture forecasts its decline when people turn away from God. Falwell says he resents Christians being treated as "second-class citizens." But that is precisely what Jesus told His true followers they could expect. He said, "If they hated me, they'll hate you," and "if they persecuted me, they will persecute you," and "a servant is not greater than His master." If such people are truly living godly lives, they should expect to be persecuted. They are not commanded to form a political movement to stop it. They should instead increase their godly behavior.

On his Web page, Falwell says, "...it millions of people of faith vote — with prayer-filled hearts — I believe we can return America to moral sanity and reestablish this great country as 'one nation under God.'" Not through government they can't. Those who are putting at least partial faith in George W. Bush to turn the nation around will be disappointed. Consider some of the appointments Republican presidents have made to the Supreme Court: Dwight Eisenhower named the liberal Earl Warren; Richard Nixon gave us Harry Blackmun, author of *Roe vs. Wade*; Ronald Reagan selected Sandra Day O'Connor and Anthony Kennedy, who uphold *Roe*; George Bush delivered the ultra-liberal David Souter to the court.

"People of Faith 2000" will raise some money and make noise, but it will change little. The message of Easter can change everything.

### Gaipman says WISE is cutting violence in schools

To the editor:

As the (Columbine) tragedy will soon be replayed on the networks, the need for continued prevention and communication efforts is evident.

Two years before Columbine, a potential tragedy at League Middle School was avoided because a student came forward and "broke the code of silence." He told a teacher what he knew, and a student with a loaded .357 magnum pistol was apprehended. What would have happened if he didn't tell?

In almost every case of campus violence, including Columbine, other students knew in advance that there was a "risk" but did not communicate. The group Weapons In School Eliminated (WISE) encourages students to teach out and share information that can save lives of fellow classmates and teachers. WISE teaches that reporting weapons in school is an act of good citizenship and not snitching.

Participating students are provided a laminated card with the community prevention phone number on one side, and a colorful school logo on the other. The program had been initiated at Lake Brantley High School, Lyman High School, Spring Lake Elementary School, and Congregation Beth Am.

Does WISE work? At Lake Brantley, in the past three years, three weapons recovered, no loss of life, no injury. Posters in all traffic areas constantly remind students that "Authorities Advised Can Help Save Lives."

I have spoken to thousands of students at Lyman, Lake Brantley, Winter Springs, Seminole and Lake Howell High School. I've also addressed every student at Spring Lake Elementary. My message is the same: When it comes to saving lives, there is no code of silence.

Civic organizations, such as Rotary, and concerned parents from Markham Woods

My program works. The students comprehend and the business community supports it. I believe that it can save lives. Shouldn't your child be attending a WISE school, too?

## Black Panthers' violence haunts us still

Like many black middle-class parents of their generation, mine barely tolerated the Atro, couldn't stomach the militancy of black student leaders Stokely Carmichael and H. Rap Brown, and wanted nothing to do with a hard edged and exclusionary "black power." For them, Martin Luther King Jr. represented black aspirations with appropriate dignity and erudition, the Black Panthers were just another group of hoodlums.

But as a youngster growing up in Alabama under the lash of Jim Crow, with George Wallace standing in the schoolhouse door, I found the self-confidence and self-reliance of the Black Panthers appealing — from a safe distance, anyway. Clearly dangerous, they urged black Americans to take up arms against white violence in the turbulent 1960s.

Though the all-black arms didn't move me much even then, their social outreach to the black poor, which included free breakfasts for inner-city children, did. So did that poster of Black Panthers' leader Huey Newton, handsome and princely, sitting in a wicker chair, a spear in one hand and a shotgun in the other. It was a terribly romantic image of a young black revolutionary. Or so I thought at the time.

Thus all comes to mind because of the tragedy that has gripped Atlanta over the last several days: The shooting death of a sheriff's deputy and the wounding of another, with the subsequent arrest of Jamil Abdullah Al-Amin, the man once known as

H. Rap Brown. Police say Al-Amin opened fire as Fulton County deputies Richard Kinchen and Aldranon English were attempting to serve him with an arrest warrant. Kinchen was killed.

For those of us who kept the heady romanticism of "black power" wrapped up in a drawer of distant memory, to be summoned up from time to time for the self-confidence and pride it offered, Al-Amin's arrest is deeply disappointing. How sad it would be if Al-Amin were revealed to be nothing but a fraud, a criminal, a murderer.

The facade of self-sacrifice and valiant struggle had already been stripped away from so many of the Black Panthers. By the time I was in my early 20s, I could no longer countenance the rhetoric of Eldridge Cleaver, who bragged of countless rapes in his memoirs, "Soul on Ice." That was not revolution, just misogyny — a misogyny shared by many of his comrades-in-arms. Newton ended up a crack addict, murdered, apparently by drug dealers, in 1989.

Then, in 1994, Hugh Pearson wrote a devastating critique, "The Shadow of the Panther," detailing not only the petty criminality but also the fratricidal violence that characterized the group.

But even Pearson, who interviewed Al-Amin for the book, believed he was different. For two decades, Al-Amin had lived quietly — or so it seemed — in Atlanta's

West End, a Muslim prayer leader and shopkeeper trying to lift a deteriorating black neighborhood out of the grip of crime and poverty.

"I'm very impressed with him," Pearson said in a 1994 interview. "He is headed in another direction — a very, very intelligent man who quietly wants to lead his flock away from the limelight."

Though Al-Amin had a prison record, that didn't diminish his reputation as a

community leader. After all, his former run-ins with the law were associated with the highly charged racial atmosphere of the 1960s. If H. Rap Brown had learned to distrust white authority because of his early civil rights activism in Lowndes

County, Alabama, that was understandable. I know firsthand the harsh racism that characterized Lowndes County back then.

But if Al-Amin is guilty of this heinous crime, there can be no excuses for him. As my parents' values have come to be my own, it is men such as Kinchen, the murdered deputy, who earn my respect and admiration — strong, God-fearing black men who work hard, respect the law, and love their wives and children. Black America moves forward because of them, not because of the foolish excesses of outlaws.

## Lamb: Cute, and tasty, too

I consider lamb-eating the litmus test of the true carnivore. "Beef" and "veal" are not called "cow" and "calf," which allows the consumer to pretend there's a difference between dinner and the animal on the hoof. In the same way, "pork" can be separated, in our minds, from "pig." But the lamb that appears on the plate has the same name as the indescribably cute bit of fluff one sees — if one lives in a rural area, as I do — bouncing about the pastures in springtime.

I love seeing those comical little bits of fluff. And — I admit it — I love eating them, too. I guess I'm a carnivore, through and through.

I know a lot of people who are put off by lamb — some because they associate it with the baby animal, and some because of a gamy or "lamb-y" taste. But this lack of popularity has an upside. According to Mark Bittman, who wrote the encyclopedic cookbook "How to Cook Everything," demand for lamb has never been high, giving farmers no incentive to raise the animals in factory-like conditions, as they do beef and pork. As a result, writes Bittman, lamb is "the closest to 'natural' meat you can buy in the supermarket."

Bittman touts lamb's intense flavor, and points out that lamb is so small that many cuts contain several muscles, imparting a variety of different tastes and textures.

Bittman recommends serving most lamb rare, but not quite as rare as beef. He also notes that it can be delicious cooked to medium and even well-done, because lamb "has the flavor and juiciness to handle it." That's probably another reason why I like lamb — carnivore though I am, I don't like my meat bloody. Another great thing about lamb is that, like the best beef, it needs little more than salt but can stand up to some serious sauces.

Below are two recipes with some "serious" sauces — one from the estimable "Dean & DeLuca Cookbook," by David Rosengarten, and one from the Weber Grill cookbook, "The Art of the Grill." I have also included a much simpler recipe from Bittman's book.

### DOUBLE-CUT LAMB CHOPS WITH CUCUMBER YOGURT SAUCE

For the sauce:  
3-inch piece seedless cucumber, peeled and cut into 1/4-inch dice  
4 green onions, white parts only, minced  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice  
1 cup plain yogurt, nonfat if desired  
1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil  
1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh dill  
1/8 teaspoon paprika  
kosher salt  
freshly ground black pepper  
For the lamb chops:  
1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice  
3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil  
2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh oregano  
2 teaspoons minced garlic  
1/2 teaspoon kosher salt  
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper  
8 double-cut rib lamb chops, 1 to 1-1/4-inches thick, trimmed of nearly all fat (see note)

To make the sauce: In a medium bowl, combine all of the sauce ingredients, stirring and seasoning to taste with salt and pepper.

To make the chops: In a small

bowl, whisk together the lemon juice, olive oil, oregano, garlic, salt and pepper. Brush the lamb chops with this mixture and allow to marinate, at room temperature, for 10 minutes.

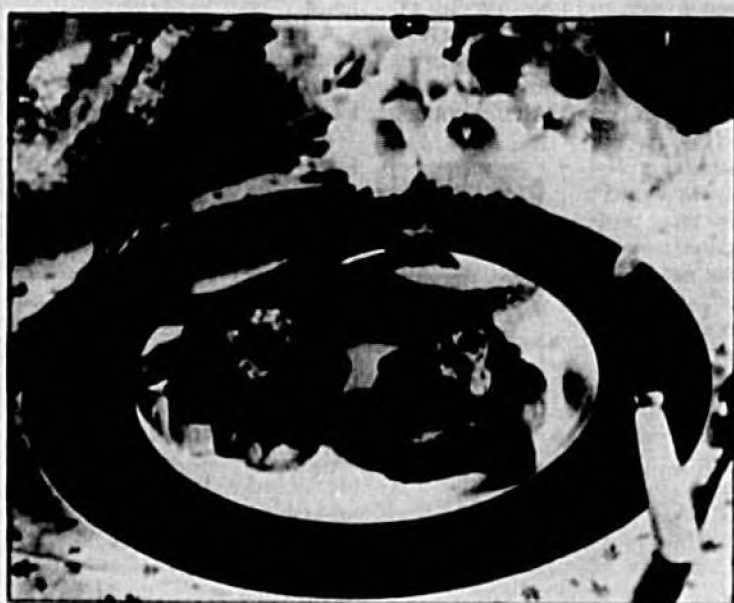
Grill the lamb chops directly over medium heat, turning once. The chops will take about 10 minutes to reach medium rare. Serve warm, with the sauce. Yield: 4 servings.

Note: Double-cut lamb chops are not double-thick. They're called double-cut because they have two ribs. Ask your butcher to cut them for you. You can also make this recipe with regular, single-rib chops.

### PAN-FRIED DOUBLE-THICK LAMB CHOPS WITH OLIVE-ANCHOVY-ORANGE BUTTER

For the butter:  
3 tablespoons minced shallots  
2 teaspoons balsamic vinegar  
2 teaspoons water  
1/4 cup unsalted butter, softened  
1-1/2 tablespoons finely chopped Mediterranean black olives  
5 anchovy fillets, drained and minced  
1 teaspoon minced fresh rosemary  
3/4 teaspoon minced orange

zest  
salt and pepper to taste  
For the lamb chops:  
1/4 cup vegetable oil  
2 tablespoons butter  
4 double-thick loin lamb chops, trimmed and brought to room temperature (see note)  
salt and pepper to taste  
small rosemary sprigs for garnish (optional)

Make the olive-anchovy-orange butter: Cook together the shallots, balsamic vinegar and water in a small frying pan over moderate heat, stirring, until dry, about 3 minutes. Set aside to cool slightly. In a bowl, stir the shallot mixture with the butter, olives, anchovies, rosemary, orange zest, salt and pepper with a fork until well-combined. In a piece of wax paper or plas-

tic wrap, shape the mixture into a 1-inch-wide log and refrigerate until firm enough to slice.

Make the lamb chops: In a large, heavy skillet, heat the oil and butter over moderately high heat until hot but not smoking. Season the chops generously with salt and pepper and cook, turning occasionally with tongs, to desired doneness, about 15 minutes total for medium rare.

To serve, arrange each chop in the center of a plate. Slice the olive-anchovy-orange butter into 8 discs, and arrange 2 discs on each chop. Garnish with a small rosemary sprig, if desired. Yield: 4 servings.

Note: Ask the person at the meat counter to cut double-thick lamb chops. They should be about 2 inches thick and weigh 1/2 pound each. Or, you can make this recipe with regular loin lamb chops (1-inch thick, about 1/4 pound each). Allow two per serving and adjust cooking time to your liking. I found the thinner chops easier to cook to my taste.

### BROILED OR GRILLED LAMB CHOPS, ITALIAN STYLE

1 tablespoon olive oil  
1 clove garlic, peeled

2 or more anchovy fillets  
1/2 cup fresh parsley leaves, or a mixture of parsley and other fresh herbs

1 tablespoon freshly squeezed lemon juice  
freshly ground black pepper, to taste  
4 (3/4-inch thick) shoulder lamb chops, trimmed of excess fat  
lemon wedges, for serving

Combine all the ingredients except the lamb and lemon wedges in a food processor, and puree them. Rub the chops with half this mixture and let them sit for one hour (see note).

Prepare a grill or broiler. The fire should be moderately hot and the rack about 4 inches from the heat source.

Grill or broil the chops, basting frequently with the remaining herb mixture, until nicely brown on both sides, a total of 6 to 8 minutes. Serve with lemon wedges. Yield: 4 servings.

Note: If time is short, just use the herb mixture for basting as you cook.
