Bicycle

The increase in bicycle riding during the last few years has brought an increase in bicycle accidents and, though the latter, fortunately, has not kept pace with the former, still there were 43,000 bicyclists who sustained injuries in collisions with automobiles last year. And everyone will admit that this is too many.

With over 2,500,000 bicycles sold in the United States in the past two years, the total in actual use today is around 3,000,000 or some 600 percent more than there were seven years ago, and infinitely more than ever graced the highways in the Gay Nineties before the advent of the automobile made cycling a sport instead of a means of transportation.

A recent report from Connecticut shows that two-

of transportation.

A recent report from Connecticut shows that two-thirds of all bicycle accidents occur in the broad daylight, that most of them happen at street intersections and that usually traffic signals have been ignored by the rider. Failure to obey traffic signals, or to give hand signals, is almost universal among bicyclists and accounts for a large number of accidents.

In communities where ordinances require strict obeddience to all traffic regulations, and in addition prohibit riding four or five abreast in the streets or carrying "passengers" on the handle bars, while providing that all bicycles must be equipped with taillights, efficient brakes, horn or bell, and other safety features, the accident rate has been materially reduced.

The most effective measure, however, in reducing bi-

has been materially reduced.

The most effective measure, however, in reducing bicycle accidents, is a licensing ordinance with a special bicycle traffic code including fines of from \$2 to \$10. In the final analysis most bicycle accidents, like most other accidents, are the result of carelessness, and the most effective way of over-coming indifference on the part of the rider is to deprive him of his license, and hence his privilege to ride a bike, for a certain period of time.




