Top Positions In Men's Division Go To Miami Players

Dorothy Powell is rated fourth ranking badminton player in the state for the coming badminton tournament scheduled to be played here May 16-17, according to the calculations of Miss Eleanor Morrison, tournament director, on the basis of the records of the first annual tourney held at Miami last year.

In the men's singles group, four Miami players take the seeded places ranking from first to fourth. In the order of their rankings they are Stanley Tinter, Austin Youns, Joe Downs and Jerry Tom. Frank White, of Jacksonville, is the top player in the women's singles bracket and second according to the results of the tourney last year. J. M. Lubell and Bill Wofford team to take first place in the seeded flat with Stanley Tinter, first ranking singles player, and Howard Taylor in the second place. The two Jacksonville teams in their order of rank are Harrington Daryl and Bill Barfield, and W. E. "Ted" Arnold and Bob Dow, Jr.

Miami and Miami Beach teams take all of the four seeded places in the women's doubles with Jane Smith and Bobby LaPan of Miami Beach, the favorites. Second seeded team is Marian Wood and Ginger Dannel of the same address. Miami produces the third ranking team of Mickey Cobb and Bernice Stamford while the fourth seeded couple are Jackie Lynn and Elsie Miller of Miami Beach.

Derby Night At Longwood Will See Match Of 8 Best Greyhounds On Track

Second choice will probably be Gunter Laddie, owned and trained by Claude Smith. Gunter Laddie has given Grand Son two close and thrilling races in their last two meetings and will probably go to the post at 7 to 2.

Third choice, curiously enough, will be Rambling Nora, the track record holder for the 3-8th mile distance. Grand Son has never come within two-fifths of a second of her great time established last racing season, but Grand Son will be rated the favorite over the champion because of his consistency. Rambling Nora is an in-and-outer. When she's right, she's right. When she's bad, she's very bad.

From there, the odds will range up to as high as 60 to 1 on favorites as Convin' Alone, British Train, Imperial Laddie, Extra Special and Guy Johnny. Each is a great dog in his own right, but the brilliance of the other three has clouded their ability.

CAIRO, Apr. 9.—(AP)—British troops have occupied Massau, the chief seaport of Eritrea, in virtually complete conquest of Italian East Africa, the Middle East Command announced today. With the fall of Massau, the Italians have been routed from all their main bases along the Red Sea and Indian Ocean coasts and the capitals of Mussolini's three East African colonies are in British hands.

Germany's Troops Capture Salonika; Greeks Are Split

(Continued From Page One)
Several generals, were reported captured.
London reported that it was learned that British troops had not yet gone into battle in the Balkans.
Greek and British forces are falling back hastily under a smashing German drive down the Vardar Valley to within about 25 miles of strategic Salonika after collapse of Yugoslav resistance on the Greek left flank, it was stated early today.
Greece's main army of the north fell back to form a new defense line west of the Vardar, abandoning Salonika, while shock troops battled savagely to stem the furious assault of Nazi panzer forces around Kikis, 23 miles north and slightly west of Salonika.
Falling back to escape entrapment in the narrow "finger" of Thrace east of Salonika, the Greek army of Macedonia was said to be frantically collecting its war materials and supplies for abandonment of all Greece stretching 200 miles eastward to Turkey at the top of the Aegean Sea.
The Germans drove upon Salonika early today in a three-

Morality and infancy legislation that for seven years gave federal aid to states to cut down the mortality of births.
His imposing tenure of office in the House and Senate—well over a quarter of a century long—brought him few personal enemies. His popularity at home was grounded deep in service to his constituents, which he gave without stint.
Through it all he was notably a political champion of beliefs he preached and practiced with moral zeal. Friends pointed to him as one of the most eminent examples in his day of the Christian reformer in public office. He was polite but persistent in broadening his principles and attacking his opponents with vigor.
His rise to power in his party. Important committee assignments came his way. He was the democratic whip of the Senate for the seventy-first Congress.
Extra-politically, he was held high by the fraternal insurance organization, Woodmen of the World. The group selected him sovereign banker, or national treasurer, in 1899, and retained him permanently.
While he was growing up his father, John L. Sheppard, moved the family of seven children from Wheatville to Daingerfield, to Pittsburg and, finally, to Texarkana. These were the years in which prohibition sentiment was becoming articulate in local debating—one of the earliest memories the senator retained.
Saloons were everywhere, he said. "Drinking was practically universal. The treating habit was vicious—people would linger, and so the brawl would start. Liquor was a menace to the peace."
It was in this atmosphere that he had formed his first opinions for the eradication of alcohol, which he later called "the heart of the prohibition matter—a habit-forming drug, like opium, destructive to human health, morals and character, a menace to society."
For him there was only one side to the question. In his ideology prohibition of liquor was the best of possible social reforms.
Working as a night watchman in the state capitol in Austin, young Sheppard helped himself through his last years at the University of Texas, where he received an academic and a law degree. He borrowed money to attend the Yale law school. Graduated in 1908, he went into his father's law firm.
The older Sheppard, serving his third year as United States representative, died in 1902. The son was called upon to take his place. He was elected for a full term as well as that unexpired, and remained in the House for 10 years. Then Senator Joseph W. Bailey resigned and the Texas

The attack on Yugoslavia—the President described the German invasion as "unprovoked and ruthless aggression."
Expressing the hope that the resistance would be successful, he said the people and government of the United States were "witnessing with admiration the courageous self-defense of the Yugoslav people which constitutes one more shining example of their traditional bravery."
"As I have assured your majesty's government," he said, "the United States will speedily furnish all material assistance possible in accordance with its existing statutes."
This implied that American aid would be supplied under the Lend Lease Act on the same terms as that being given or planned for Great Britain, Greece and China.
Disrupted communications in the Balkans may delay for days formal delivery of the President's message but short-wave radio was expected to carry it speedily to the young monarch and his government, now directing resistance to the Germans at an unspecified place removed from the capital at Belgrade.

The Greek High Command blamed the German breakthrough on the collapse of the Yugoslav front. In Berlin, reacting to the Vardar but said that "despite intense German pressure in western Thrace and Macedonia the enemy failed to attain its objective."
Unconfirmed Budapest reports said the Germans had captured both Nish and Skoplje, about 80 miles inside Yugoslavia's frontier with Bulgaria, placing the Nazis outside the vital railroad forming the main route of communication between Yugoslavia and Greece and dominating the Vardar Valley.
British bombing planes, cooperating with veteran Greek mountain warriors, struggled to prevent the Germans from opening down through the Ghevghell Pass in force to join the Germans battling the Greeks at Kikis.
Ghevghell Pass is along the Vardar Valley and main railroad just across the Yugoslav border and about 80 miles north of Kikis.

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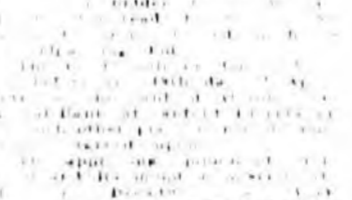

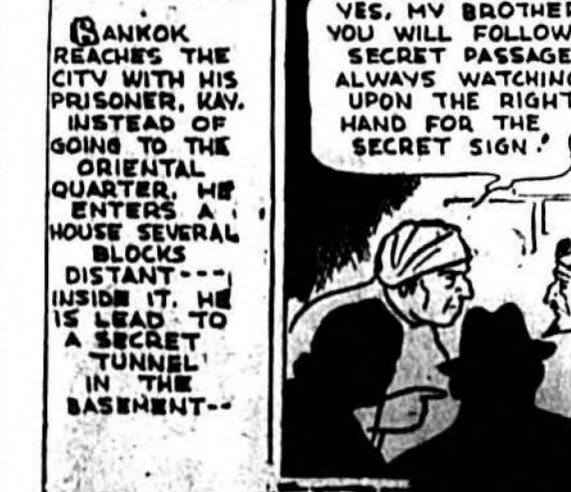

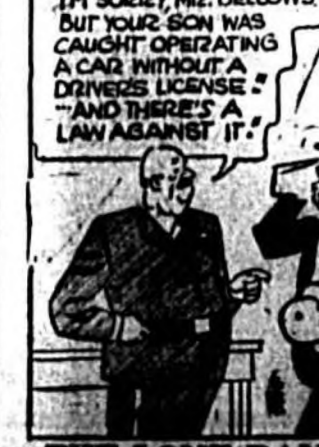

British In Greece Head Northward To Battle Nazi Force

Showdown In Balkans Is Believed Near; English Send Tanks And Armored Cars
Germany's Troops Said In Belgrade
Berlin Assaulted In 3-Hour Attack By R. A. F. Warplanes

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The Turkish government announced today it had "found it advisable" to withdraw a considerable portion of Istanbul's population. The action was regarded as an indication of how serious Turkey considers the threat of war to Istanbul on the European side of the Bosphorus, less than 100 miles from Nazi-occupied Bulgaria, and 150 miles from the section of Greece now in German hands.

Battalions of British flame-throwers, tanks and armored cars, newly arrived from Africa, were reported rushing north today from Piræus, the port of Athens, for a decisive battle with Adolf Hitler's blitzkrieg legions.

As the flanking battle of the Balkans nears a showdown, unconfirmed reports stipulated by Budapest that the German panzer corps had been ordered by Nazi troops.

German press reports indicated that a British expeditionary force—estimated at 300,000 men—is massed in the vicinity of Mount Olympus, 60 miles northwest of Salonika.

Other reports said the British are completing a new defense line stretching across the Greek peninsula from the point of Salonika to the Albanian port of Corfu.

The British R. A. F. raiders unleashed a three-hour assault on Berlin, showing quantities of "powerful high explosive bombs" on the height of the Nazi capital and destroying Hitler's favorite theater—the State Opera House of Unter Den Linden on Berlin's downtown Broadway.

From Moscow, meanwhile, came a cryptic declaration of the Red Star, Soviet army organ, asserting the Russo-Yugoslav friendship pact signed just before the Balkan outbreak "is all the more valuable" under the new conditions because Russia "always fulfills its international pledges."

Greek troops trapped east of the Vardar River by the German capture of Salonika were reported by Berlin to have annihilated.

U. S. Announces Plans To Build Greenland Bases

WASHINGTON, Apr. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt asked Congress today for broad statutory authority to take over any "foreign-owned vessels lying idle in our ports" subject to the payment of a just compensation.

Informed persons predicted Congress would grant the request, and that soon thereafter the President would use the acquired ships in some form helpful to the British.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The United States will establish air bases in Greenland for the "protection of Greenland" and of the Western Hemisphere under an American-Danish agreement announced today.

The War Department meanwhile disclosed that all Army passenger and freight transports have been diverted to move troops and supplies between the United States overseas possessions.

Most Successful Season Closes At Dog Track

Attendance Increase 100 Per Night Above Last Year

Greyhounds will run the last race of the season tonight at the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club closing the most successful season the track has had in the six years the races have been running.

Over \$1,000,000 has been handled during the mutual windows during the 90 day season, exceeding the amount bet during the season two years ago which was \$800,000.

Part of the reason for such a good season is that the weather has been good most of the time. We had a few rainy nights at the beginning of the season but most of the time it has been good.

Mr. Connolly said he believed the dogs were more evenly matched this year, producing more interesting races. Most of the credit for that goes to E. M. Meete, racing secretary at the track, he added.

Having no exact figures of attendance on hand, Mr. Connolly estimated the attendance to average about 700 persons a night during the season, making an increase of about 100 persons a night over last year. Though it is the smallest track in the state the people of Seminole County and Central Florida have shown a great amount of interest in the races, he said.

Almost all of the approximate 100 employees at the track are from Seminole County and the payroll and purses amount to over \$1,000 a day. Since the dog owners live here during the season they use this community for most of their buying, Mr. Connolly stated.

Speaking of the dogs Mr. Connolly said that during the outstanding season the track though Orondo led runs the best race in the future distance. The remainder of the 90 dogs are usually evenly matched, he said.

The plant halfway between Sanford and Orlando was built at a cost of about \$1,000,000 six years ago. Since then the management has been making improvements by the construction of the new plant.

The whole plant was dismantled and rebuilt in the last few years. The new building was built on the site of the old plant and is a modern building.

The plant is now producing about 200,000 dogs a year. The plant is a very successful one and is a very important part of the Sanford economy.

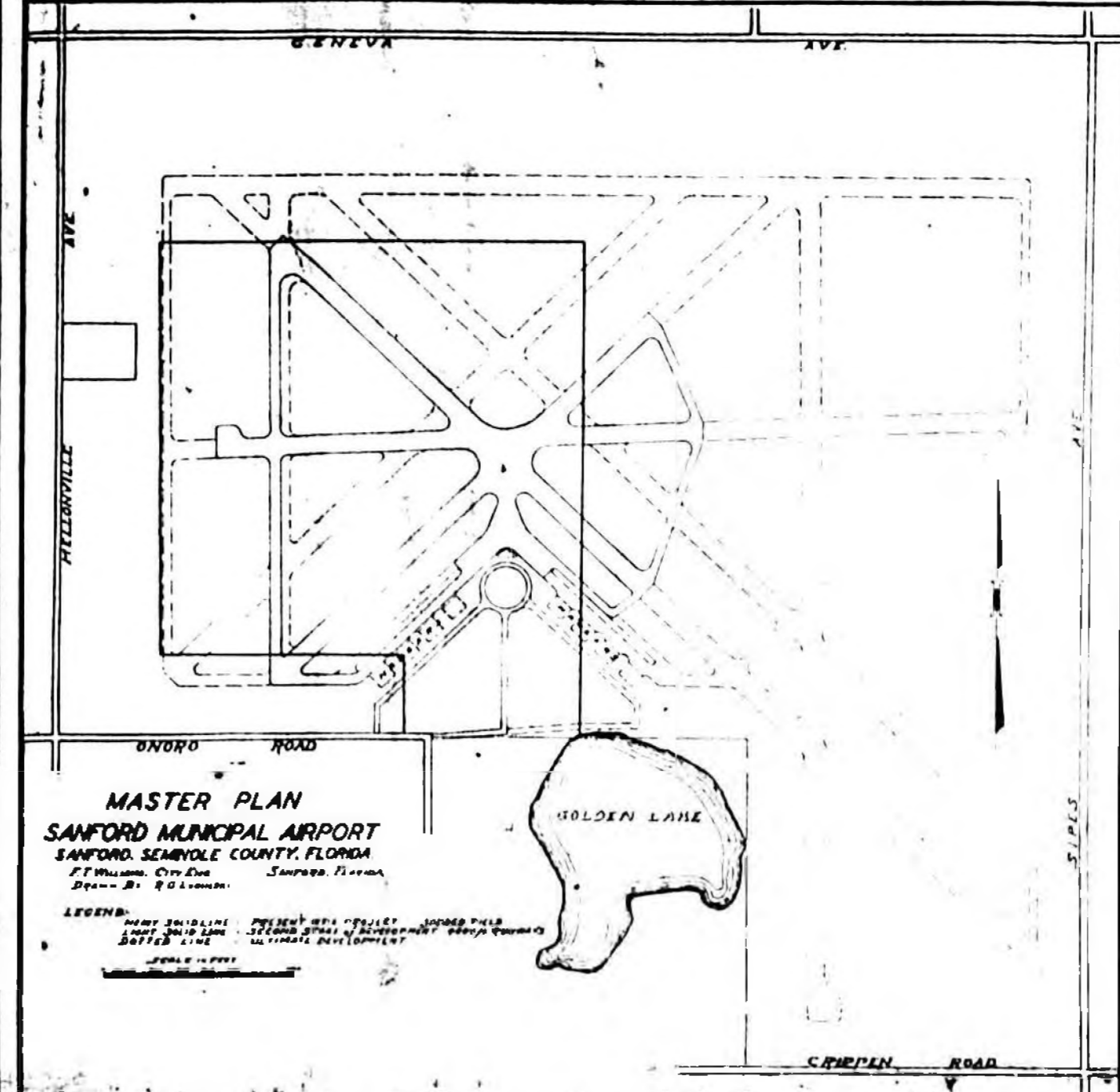
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MASTER PLAN FOR NEW SANFORD AIRPORT

Three-cent Levy Upon Cigarettes Proposed In Bill

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The Florida House received a proposal today that the State levy a tax of three cents on each package of 20 cigarettes.

Rep. Overstreet of Dade county, who is in the grocery business, said the tax would bring in \$3,500,000 to \$3,000,000 a year for public schools and would take the place of the gross receipts tax which the Legislature is expected to repeal.

While the House pushed ahead at an unprecedented speed, the Senate tangled over proposed stricter rules of procedure and agreed to meet tomorrow on Good Friday to finish this detail and get ready for the introduction of bills.

The new Senate rules proposed that the 33 senators should be limited to 200 attaches against the 400 employed two years ago. Senate President Beacham said in his opening address Tuesday that the attaché situation was "nothing short of a state scandal."

Rep. Lewis of Gulf county proposed that the State's general fund should be increased.

Crew Of Men Begins Work On New Municipal Airport

Work began this morning on Sanford's new \$115,000 WPA airport, with a crew of 120 men under W. G. Healy, foreman, clearing the tract of 270 acres. When the plot has been cleared, drainage ditches will be dug, the land will be graded, and grass will be planted.

J. M. Goggans, supervisor of the WPA in Orlando, said that the project has been mechanized to a large extent, and two big La Tourette power scrapers will be used in the grading.

The City has advanced additional sponsor's funds to rent a "bull dozer", or heavy tractor for clearing. A drainage will also be used to excavate muck for placing on the field.

Because of the mechanized equipment employed, the field should be well on the way to being finished in about 90 days, Mr. Goggans said.

Mr. Higgins, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, who worked with the City in securing the allocation of funds for the airport, asserted today he had reason to believe the field will be certified for national defense funds, in which case it will be made available for an advanced flying school or an Army squadron.

Plans and specifications, together with an application to enlarge the airport, are now in the hands of the Secretary of War and other interested government officials in the nation's capital, Mr. Higgins explained.

If the field is certified for national defense funds, a tract several times larger than the initial development will be graded and paved and runways will be built.

The present project calls for developing 270 acres, but the City owns about 800 acres in the tract which can be used for future development.

In the brief which is now before government officials in Washington, the strategic location of the airport and its advantages are pointed out. The site is one and three-quarters miles from Lake Monroe at the southern terminal of the navigable St. Johns River, and one and one-half miles from the highway to Lake George. The site is one of the best in the State for an airport, Sanford's new field.

Auxiliary Head Is Asked To Attend Defense Meeting

Mrs. C. F. Proctor, president of the American Legion Auxiliary of Campbell-Lossing, has been invited by Governor Spessard L. Holland to attend a preliminary organization meeting of the State Defense Council in Orlando Monday afternoon.

Representatives from cities and counties in the fifth congressional district will attend the meeting, which will be held on the roof of the Argelitt Hotel at 2:00 P. M.

According to a letter received from Governor Holland by Mrs. Proctor, the purpose of the meeting is to assist in the formation of county and local defense councils.

In Tallahassee yesterday, the House of Representatives passed a bill to create a State Defense Council, and prompt action was pledged on the measure by the Senate.

Organization of these councils is in compliance with the President's request for total all-out preparedness. Governor Holland declared. George L. Burr, Jr., executive secretary of the Council.

Supervisor And Pupils Needed For Craft Class

Lack of a supervisor from the NYA arts and crafts project and the fact that no applications have been received from persons interested in the work are holding up Sanford's chances of having the project and its accompanying payroll of about \$300 a month, R. A. Goadspeed, NYA supervisor, said today.

Application of persons interested in employment in the classes at \$14.04 a month for a monthly 78-hour work period can be made at the NYA office at the Court House, Mr. Goadspeed revealed. Young men and women between the ages of 16 and 25 years are eligible for the classes aimed at teaching young people a trade.

Included in the instruction is practical work in such fields as commercial art, decorative art, handicraft and designing. Use of natural resources such as palm motto fans, pine needles and other things are taught in the class.

According to information received from the district NYA office at Orlando, Daytona Beach and Sanford are under consideration as a location for the project and the interest shown by the young people in Sanford will decide whether the project will be located.

Edward Higgins said this morning he is certain a place can be found to house the project if it is brought to Sanford and suggested the Recreation Hall on the lake front.

British Tactician Is Taken Prisoner

LONDON, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The British acknowledged today that one of the air generals captured by the Nazi-German forces in Italy was Gen. Sir Hugh G. Gurney, one of the most experienced in the British army and regarded with a high regard by the British public.

Gen. Gurney was captured in the battle of the Gothic line in Italy. He was taken prisoner by the Germans in the town of San Marino. He was held in a prisoner of war camp in Germany.

Greeks Remain Intact To Hit Blow At Nazis

Fate Of Troops Cut Off By Germany's Drive To Salonika Is Still Obscure

Military Heads Are Confident Support From Allies Is Counted Upon For Decisive Move

ATHENS, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The Greek army remains intact "to deal a decisive blow at the German invader with Allied support," despite the entrapment of some forces in eastern Greece, Greek military sources declared today.

The fate of the forces cut off by the swift Nazi drive to Salonika remained obscure, but they were reported holding out late last night.

The main Greek army will strike at the right time and the right place," military informants asserted confidently.

Trunks containing that Germany may at any moment invade Russia, Turkey or the British Isles, Prime Minister Churchill asserted yesterday that British forces "blasted" unless the Atlantic sea lanes are kept open for a flood of war supplies from the United States.

"Everything turns upon the battle of the Atlantic which is proceeding with growing intensity on both sides," Churchill told the House of Commons in a speech more sober than any he has made since Dunkerque and the collapse of France.

Churchill's aid to Britain, there must be a full scale American effort in shipping aid equaling that made by the United States in 1918," Churchill asserted.

Only the full resources of American shipbuilding industry can enable Britain to carry on full scale warfare into 1943, he said.

The battle of the Atlantic, he asserted, stands out above all other actions in the war—after every other victory in the Balkans, the push of Indo-German panzer forces across North Africa to threaten Egypt and even the capture of Sicily and the capture of Rome—stands out as the most important of the war.
