

Guardian Defends Decision

To Authorize Transfusion

PENSACOLA (AP) - "Her emotions are getting in the way of her logic," said a court-appointed guardian after the mother of a premature infant claimed the baby died because of a blood transfusion.

Denita Ivey charged Sunday that the death of 6-day-old Julia, born three months premature, was caused by a blood transfusion given with guardian Joel Cohen's authorization. Denita's twin, Karol, was reported in critical but stable

condition early today at Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola. She also was given a transfusion. "Our baby was taken away from us by the Welfare Department and given this blood, which literally killed her," said Mrs. Ivey, a member of the Jehovah's Wit-

nesses sect. She and her husband, Ron, objected to the treatment on religious grounds.

Nine Killed In Accidents By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

At least nine persons were killed in Florida traffic acci dents during the weekend, including two elderly women in a two-car collision in Mount Dora, state troopers said today.

The Saturday accident took the lives of Alice McKenney Anderson, 71, and Rachel Coward Cox, 71, both of Eustis, troopers said. The two were passengers in a car that turned into the path of an oncoming vehicle on State Road 500 in Mount Dora, officers said.

Two persons died early Saturday when a speeding motorist trying to elude police clipped another vehicle and threw both cars out of control, officials said.



Strikes Spoiling 'The Big Apple'

New York City likes to regard itself as the "Big Apple" of America. The chaos which that city has endured in its great financial crisis cannot spoil other apples in the barrel - American cities that are still more or less solvent - but it can certainly be a lesson to them.

When striking sanitation men threatened to bury New York in rotting garbage over the Fourth RAY CROMLEY of July weekend, Mayor Abraham Beame responded in a predictable way. He persuaded the state legislature to give the city power to tax its citizens by another \$330 million so he could promise to rehire some of the garbage collectors who had been laid off because there was not enough money to pay them. Protesting policemen and firemen whose ranks had been thinned with economy layoffs are also being appeased.

So the New York taxpayer is once again taking it on the chin. The New York experience should not be lost on Americans in other states and cities where public employe unions are clamoring for more collective bargaining power, up to and including the right to strike.

New York City has been a laboratory for public employe unionism. While Mayor Beame is taking the heat in the current financial debacle, the responsbility goes back through previous administrations that knuckled under to combined labor and political forces that produced contracts which now see the city payroll swollen out of reason. Sanitation men earning \$16,000 a year and member and his staff with regular automatic policemen whose pay and fringe benefits average cost of living increases from here on out - so \$22,000 a year refused to forego a scheduled pay increase or a reduced work week that would have reduced the need for lav-offs.



While driving about Sanford the past few days, we've noticed many drivers have a definite tendency to be a bit impatient - especially when they are forced (by law) to stop for a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

-

Granted, none of us like to lose those precious few moments, but consider the number of children who must ride these school buses and the fact that they must be given every opportunity to proceed to and from these buses secure in the knowledge they can do so with every degree of safety. These school children are our most priceless cargo and must be kept safe at all costs.

The law making it mandatory that all vehicles stop for a stopped school bus was designed to protect the lives of our youngsters when traveling to and from school.

And, all buses are clearly marked with signal lights both front and rear to warn other drivers. Yellow flashing lights indicate the bus is slowing down and red flashing lights with the red arm extended from the bus is the signal for other motorists to stop while the children load or unload.

When that stop signal is displayed, Florida law requires all drivers going in the same direction to stop. Traffic moving in the opposite direction must stop unless the highway is divided with unpaved space at least five feet wide of a physical barrier. Too, school buses are required to stop at railroad school area.



DON OAKLEY Each Action Causes Its Reaction "We can never do merely one thing," says

University of California biologist Garrett Hardin, formulating another of those "laws" our more and more complex society seems to be colliding with more and more frequently.

Hardin refers specifically to the dire social consequences he foresees should a constitutional prohibition of abortion ever be adopted. While the scientist's position on this question is a matter of much dispute, there is little doubt about the validity of his "law" when it comes to the consequences of a whole list of other human activities, particularly in regard to the en-

Consider the Environmental Protection Agency's attempts to solve the automobile pollution problem.

Over the years, a number of devices were mandated on new cars. Though they helped the emissions problem, gasoline economy suffered. The solution to this was seen in the catalytic converter, which scavenged emissions aft of the engine. But because the lead in gasoline "poisoned" the platinum in the catalysts, the oil industry was required to gear up to produce higher cost lead-free gasoline.

Beginning with the 1975 model year. automobiles coming off the assembly lines were equipped with catalysts designed to change the carbon monoxide and hydrocarbons in exhaust fumes into carbon dioxide and water.

Unfortunately, evidence soon began to accumulate that, along with harmless C02 and H20, the catalysts were also producing sulfuric acid. To meet this new and unlooked-for threat to the environment, it was suggested that sulfur be removed from gasoline at the refinery - at an additional cost to the consumer. Now comes a warning from three scientists

with Bell Laboratories in Murray Hill, N.J., that to do this could create yet another major problem - deadly hydrogen cyanide gas. In the presence of sulfur dioxide, the formation
