Second Reading On City Agenda

Budget Action Set Tonight

A second reading of Sanford's new \$3,829,709 budget, up \$94,882 but requiring 2.14 mills more than last year, is the second agenda item for tonight's regular city commission meeting which begins at 7 o'clock.

Each mill equals \$1 per \$1,000 of appraised property value and is used to determine property taxes.

The city's budget for the new year calls for a total 6.33 mills, which includes the certified 5.63 mills for the general operating budget and .70 mills towards paying off the \$1.7 million in general obligation bonds by 1977.

Last year's millage levy was 5.47 mills, which included 6.97 mills for the operating budget and 1.5 mills for debt service. The new budget has an overall five per cent "cost of living" increase for all employees.

This is figured by paying the five per cent pension payment for police and firemen and paying the four per cent state retirement contribution for all other city employees who have been given a one per cent salary increase, according to City Clerk and Finance Director Henry N. Tamm Jr.

Salaries in the city manager's budget increased from \$2,770 last year to \$31,709 in the new budget. Salaries in the city commission budget rose from \$14,700 last year to \$15,500.

A total of seven job positions were eliminated from the new budget at a savings of \$67,135 to the city, according to City

Manager Warren E. "Pete" Knowles.

These cutbacks include one of the four city building inspectors, two public works laborers and four library employees. The municipal library, which cost the city \$35,065 last year, is being taken

over and operated under the county commission.

Also on the agenda for tonight's meeting is a request from the Central Florida Zoological Society for putting up signs on public right-of-ways. Plans are to attach the signs, which are in the shape of

an elephant, to stop signs at all intersections, pointing the way to the new zoo.

A public hearing also is set to consider rezoning part of property north of 25th Street and between Yale Avenue and the Seaboard Coastline Railroad right-of-way to SR 1.

Social Agency Funds Pared

Commission May Draw Fire

County commissioners may come under fire from social agencies whose budget requests have been pared at the first public hearing Tuesday on the more than \$18-million budget.

"Some special agencies have been asking for money because subsidies have been reduced this year," Commissioner Dick Williams said today.

He said the agencies — which include senior citizens, drug action programs and Division of Family Services, among others — have been cut \$5.91 per \$1,000 of taxable property.

Last year, the same social agencies received about \$125,000.

Williams aid he thinks there will be "some changes" at Tuesday's 7 p.m. hearing at the Seminole County Courthouse.

Eleanor Anderson, budget analyst in the Office of Management Analysis and Evaluation (OMAE), said today the budget is within a half-mill of the 5.34 mills certified by the county's property appraiser.

Last year, the same social agencies received about \$125,000.

Commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr. said commissioners are "still looking" for ways to reduce the budget.

Already, the commission reduced budget requests from more than \$22-million to \$18,586,354.

Vihlen says "state, federal and local revenues" have been reduced because of "the recessionary trend — which is the sole problem."

Vihlen said departments have been "uniformly cut" and that no single department has been "crucified."

Meanwhile, Williams said this just "isn't the year" for funding social agencies.

Williams expects a some citizens to protest the millage. At the same time, social

agency chiefs are expected to protest cuts in their departments.

Mrs. Anderson said some agencies were held to last year's funding level. But some requests were drastically reduced.

For example a request for \$96,000 from the Seminole County Association for Retarded Children was reduced to \$20,000. A senior citizens group is budgeted for \$7,000 — half of what the group requested.

All in all Mrs. Anderson said budgets were reduced "equally."

Last year's county budget was slightly more than \$18-million.

Vihlen To Seek Approval Of Jail Safety Bids Tuesday

Seminole County Commission Chairman Sid Vihlen Jr. will ask commissioners Tuesday for approval to award bids for installation of safety features at the county jail — damaged in a fire that killed 10 inmates and a jailer.

The bids were presented to the commission last week, but the matter was referred to a committee until certain waivers could be obtained from state officials.

The commission chairman predicts the facility will reopen in three weeks. Doors closed after the June 9 fire, and inmates have been housed in surrounding jails at a cost of \$1,000 per day.

Vihlen met last week with Olin Greene, director of the state fire marshal's office, and Cecil Sewell, the chief prison inspector for the Department of Offender Rehabilitation.

At the Tallahassee meeting, Vihlen said, he was assured by both agencies that the county would not be required to construct a new jail within two years before reopening the present facility.

Vihlen said a letter from Greene "completely approved the county's proposal for additional items for the jail."

The jail was damaged by fire and smoke.

And prisoners were moved from the Sanford facility to jails in surrounding counties.

Sims Charges County School Budget Padded

One of the board members claims the new \$50.2 million Seminole County School budget calling for an 8.6 millage levy is "padded."

Board member Davie E. Sims, who cast one of the two dissenting votes last week to advertise the 8.6 millage to support the new \$39.3 million operational and \$12 million debt service budgets, said the budget contains "contingencies on contingencies."

Each mill equals \$1 per \$1,000 of appraised property value and is used to determine property taxes.

Sims said the eight mills requested for the operational budget could easily be reduced to seven mills.

"For years, we've been robbing our operating budget and putting the money in what he termed 'padding' of about \$1.3 million that was in operating budgets that is now in the \$6.8 million capital outlay budget, having been 'carried over' from previous years.

"There are many things that could be delayed for a year with our present economic situation," said Sims.

He said the new budget contains a \$1 million "contingency fund," in addition to what he termed "padding" of \$250,000 in the utility budget for anticipated increases in electrical expenses, and \$100,000 for fuel expenses.

Sims said these and other "high estimates" have resulted in heavy padding of the school budget.

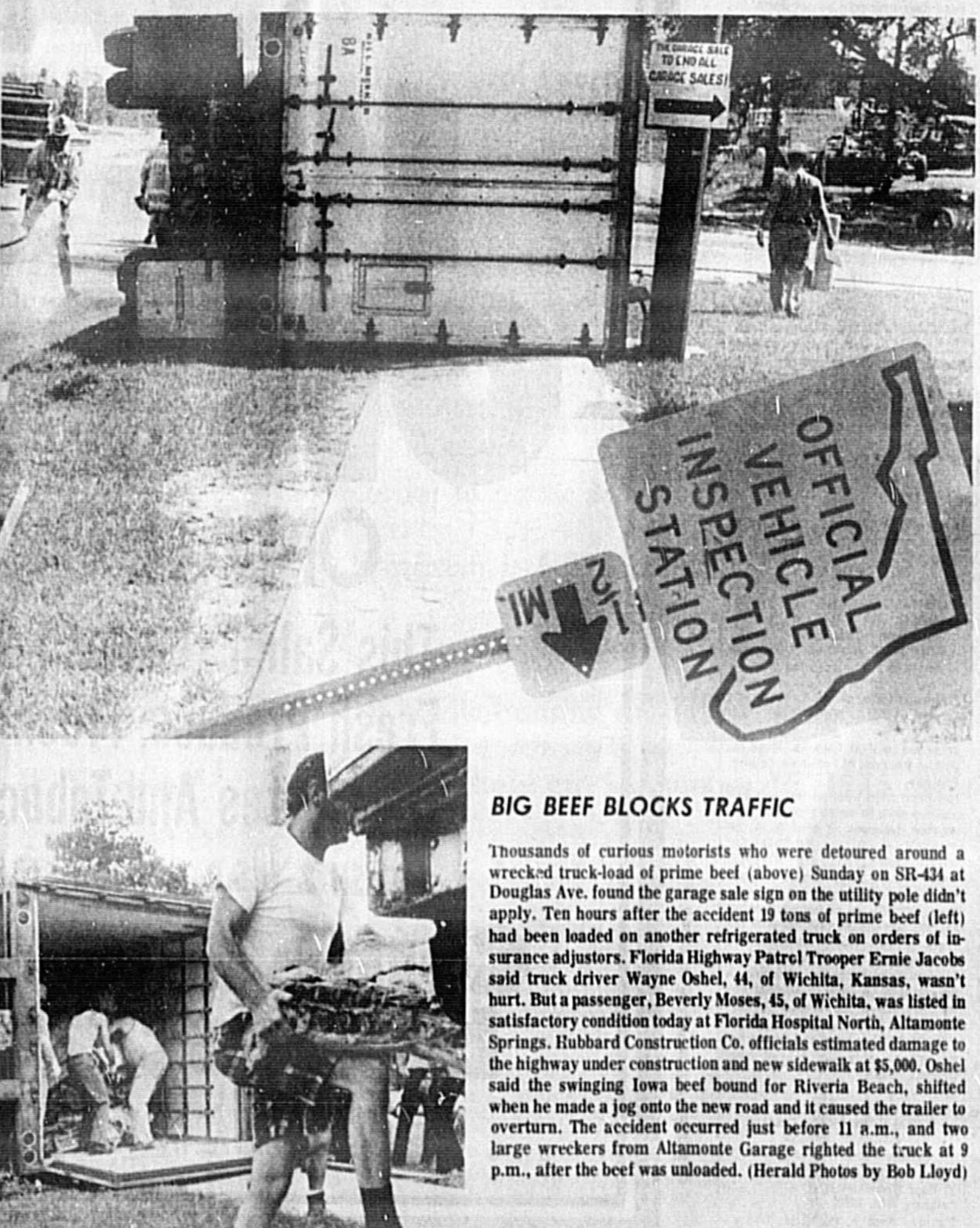

Shevin Opinion Sought

State Rep. Robert Hattaway (D-Altamonte Springs) asked Attorney General Robert Shevin today what effect a July opinion from Shevin's office will have on the continued use of the Altamonte-Casselberry Chamber of Commerce of a municipally-owned building.

According to news articles published Friday, Hattaway said in a letter to Shevin, the chamber may lose its Altamonte Springs office.

The opinion, made available to the cities in Seminole in digest form, says, "Assuming the Chamber of Commerce would not be charged a rent of full market value, it is not a proper public purpose for the city to allow the Chamber of Commerce to utilize a portion or all of a municipally owned building."

Winter Springs To Consider Budget, Church Applications

WINTER SPRINGS—Three public hearings are scheduled for tonight's 7:30 Winter Springs Council meeting.

The first will be on the city's proposed 1975-76 fiscal budget which totals \$458,267.15. Included in the budget is an overall five per cent cost of living raise for city employees, which amounts to \$9,885.49.

The certified millage for the city's property tax is 2.43 mills, or \$2.43 for every \$1,000 of appraised property value.

The other public hearings will be to reconsider controversial conditional use applications by Seminole Baptist Temple and Jehovah's Witnesses for adjacent lots on Hayes Road in the Ranchlands.

The original applications approved on July 21 by the council permitting construction of the churches in the residentially zoned area, brought protests from many residents. Council later, on Aug. 4, voted to rescind the approval and suspended a building permit issued July 30 to Seminole Baptist Temple.

The Baptists, seeking an injunction against the council, served summonses on the councilmen and mayor last Monday night. When a second hearing did not ask for a hearing, council authorized tonight's public hearing.

When some members of the council and audience expressed dissatisfaction with the report of Planning and Zoning Commissioner Irwin Hunter, who said he could not find any im-

propriety, Mayor Troy Piland promised to bring the matter up again this week.

The council voted 3-2 against a motion to investigate the whole conduct and operation of the building office over the past year. Piland then said if the council failed to authorize a permit under the city charter, he would do so himself.

Also under discussion will be the streets and sidewalks ordinances. At last week's council meeting, Bradshaw had asked for instructions as to whether council wanted strict enforcement of the ordinance prohibiting signs on the right-of-way. He asked if the council wished this to include garage sales, sale of personal articles and directions to new houses.

At 12:30 p.m. the group will adjourn for lunch and the trip to Zellwood. At 2:30 p.m. tours will be on soybean research on organic soils.

A Central Florida Soybean field day and tour will be held Sept. 18 at the Agricultural Research and Education Center (AREC) at Sanford and that agency's farm at Zellwood.

Guardian Defends Decision To Authorize Transfusion

PENSACOLA (AP) — "Her emotions are getting in the way of her logic," said a court-appointed guardian after the mother of a premature infant claimed the baby died because of a blood transfusion.

Denita Ivey charged Sunday that the death of 6-day-old Julia, born three months premature, was caused by a blood transfusion given with guardian Joel Cohen's authorization.

Denita's twin, Karol, was reported in critical but stable condition early today at Sacred Heart Hospital in Pensacola. She also was given a transfusion.

"Our baby was taken away from us by the Welfare Department and given that blood, which literally killed her," said Mrs. Ivey, a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses sect. She and her husband, Ron, objected to the treatment on religious grounds.

The Saturday accident took the lives of Alice McKenney Anderson, 71, and Rachel Coward Cox, 71, both of Eustis, troopers said. The two were passengers in a car that turned into the path of an oncoming vehicle on State Road 500 in Mount Dora, officers said.

Bids Taken On Capitols

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Officials taking bids on construction of seven regional "little capitols" say they hope the state office buildings will save Florida millions of dollars in rent.

By occupying its own buildings, "the state is at least retaining the profit the landlord would normally get," says Marshall Harris, former House Appropriations Committee chairman. "It's got to be worth it."

Officials said final decisions have not been made on the state services that will be housed in the seven office buildings. Until such decisions are made, it is impossible to estimate the savings to the state.

Budget, First Tax Eyed

The Casselberry City Council, at 7:30 tonight, will consider the city's 1975-76 fiscal year general operation and utility budgets totaling \$2.46 million and calling for a property tax for the first time in the city's history.

The property tax level will be 1.75 mill, or \$1.75 per \$1,000 of real property tax valuation.

Defense Claims Witness Unavailable

Auto Inspection Bribe Trial Scheduled

The trial of a suspended county motor vehicle inspector charged with accepting a bribe to issue a safety inspection sticker for a defective auto is scheduled to get underway Tuesday at 9 a.m. before Circuit Court Judge Robert B. McGregor.

Anthony C. Troiano, 45, of Orlando, was arrested Aug. 9 on a warrant charging he accepted \$300 from Jerry Swartz, a member of the county's Casselberry MVI station.

When the case was called for trial today, defense attorney George Sprague announced his bid for Swartz, a Ferris Park auto dealer who has been convicted in a forgery case and sent to state prison, hasn't been available for questioning by the defense.

At the sounding of the 10-o'clock criminal trial docket before Judge McGregor today, Jimmy Ray Harty, 37, of Sanford, was charged on charges of larceny of a firearm and false report of commission of a crime.

Third case scheduled for trial is Willie George Banks, 27, of Orlando, accused of larceny of a boat from a Sanford bank parking lot.

Fred Willis Washington, 18-year-old former Seminole High School basketball star, and Allen Sikes, 18, also of Sanford are on the docket for trial on charges of entering without breaking with intent to commit a felony and grand larceny. The charges are in connection with the July 15 theft of band instruments from Lake Howell High School.

Washington and Silas weren't put in the trial lineup today after defense attorney Larry Horton indicated to the court that there has been plea bargaining with the State Attorney's office in the cases. Horton said both suspects had

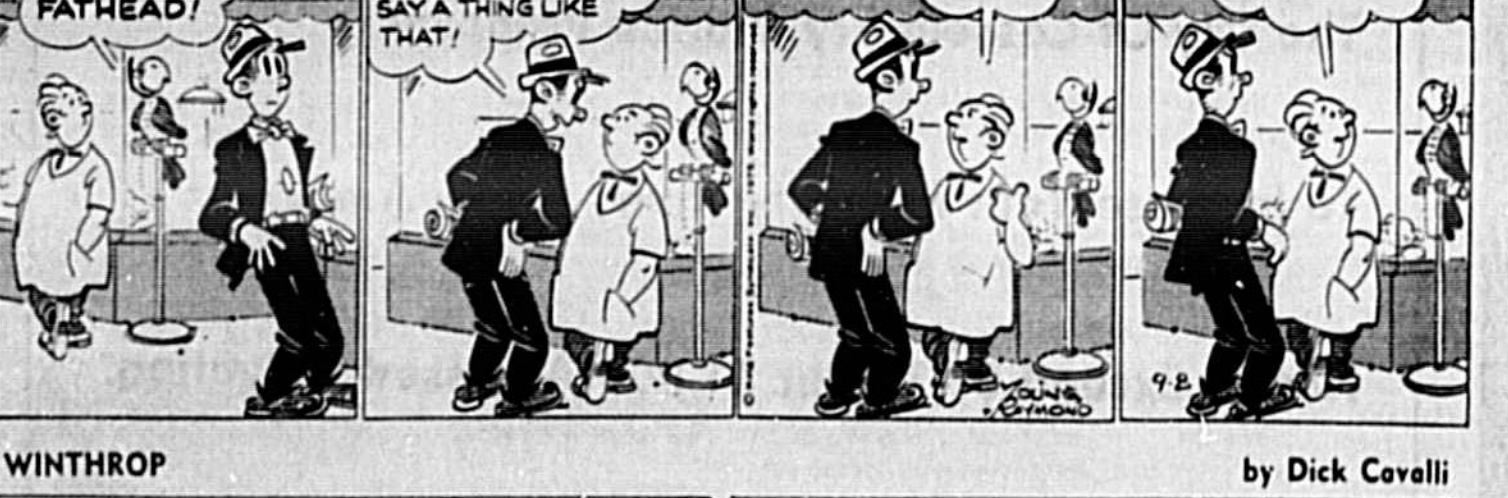

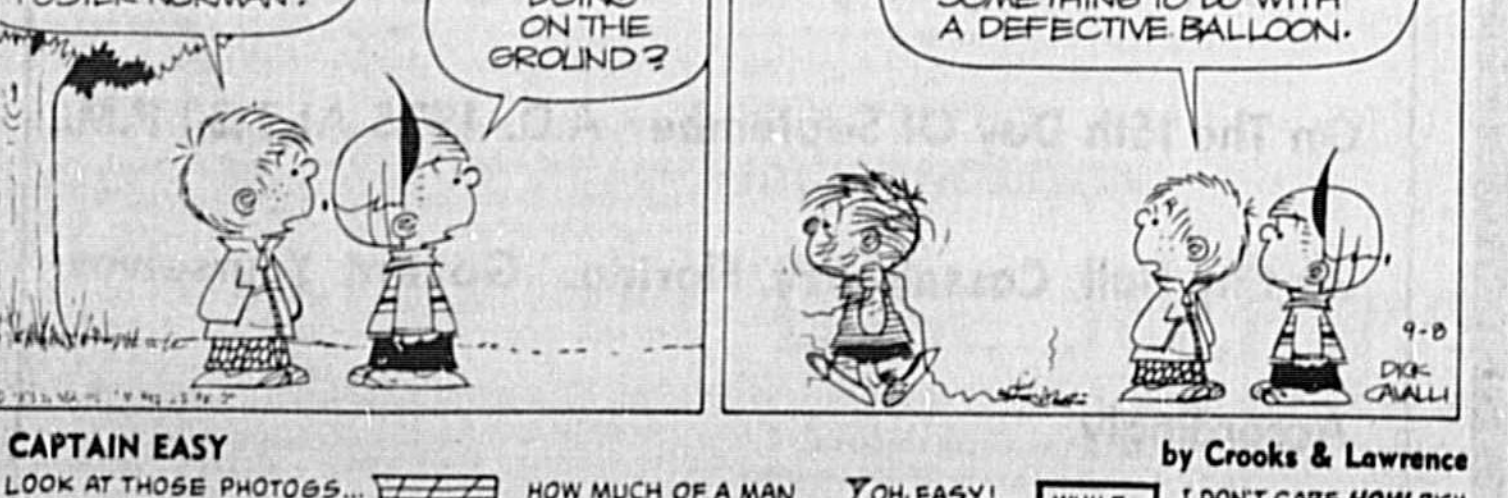

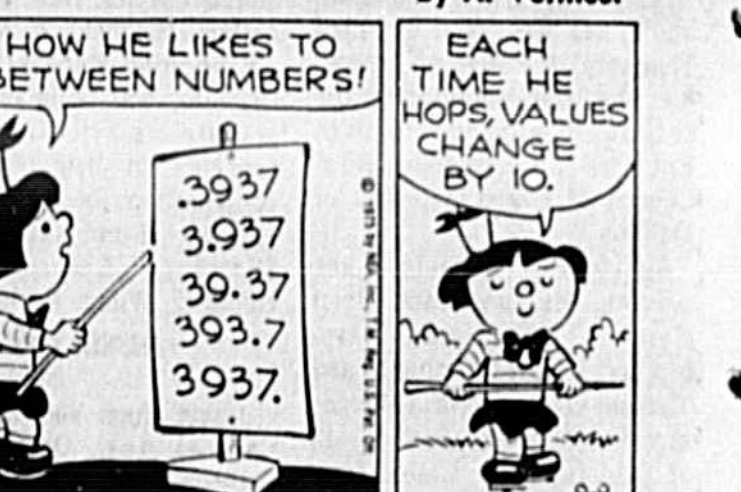

The only other area team in action was Northeast Louisiana, which made its major college debut with a 3-2 tie with University of Pacific.

Bowl games, of course, are a different story and the Bear's record of post-season self-denial, Kentucky, Texas A&M and Alabama are third on the all-time list and who sends the second-ranked Crimson Tide against Missouri tonight before an expected crowd of 65,000 plus a national television audience (ABC, 9 p.m., EDT).
