The police said the students opened fire on them without provocation. The students had tried first to demonstrate in a downtown plaza, but were prevented by police patrols. They were reassemblisg at the university when the shooting began.

It was Panama's second straight ight of violence since Daniel Chanis resigned the presidency last Sunday under police pressure and was succeeded by Vice President Roberto Chiari.



Tariff Exception

The theory that the work of the United Nations Educational, Cultural and Scientific Orangization, called for convenience UNESCO, might be expedited by a free flow of needed materials among countries is back of a proposal deliberated on by the Trade and Tariff conference at Annecy, France.

The agreement which is now being worked out would involve duty-free international movement of books and other publications, works of art, and aids to visual and auditory education. It would be closely scrutinized by tariff experts before its submission to the UNESCO conference in Florence next May, and will then be offered to the governments for signature.

As a subsidiary of the United Nations Organization, UNESCO has productive accomplishments to show for its effort. It should not be hamstrung by tariffs which add to its expenses and slow up the process of transportation. The governments to whom the proposal is submitted will be likely to see the matter in this light. But it will be only fair to make sure that objects thus transported duty-free are used for their intended purpose and that UNESCO be spared from being used for non-educational purposes.





This Christmas, give your child "not one great slather of carelessly bought toys but a balanced diet of adequate tools of play," urges Laird S. Goldsborough in a report to consumers in the December Reader's Digest.
