10 arrested in fraud case

SANFORD - A Longwood man was arrested Friday along with nine associates in what state insurance investigators are describing as the largest case of workers' compensation fraud ever in Central Florida.

Florida Department of Insurance officers arrested Cedric Bodoh. 57, 311 Fox Valley Drive, Longwood on several counts of racketeering, workers' compensation insurance fraud, mail fraud and grand theft.

Bodoh is listed as the owner of Allied Temporaries Inc. with 17 offices in several Florida cities, Insurance officials allege Bodoh and his office managers lied about the type of work the employees performed in order to get lower insurance rates. Roofers and day laborers whose jobs have high insurance rates were allegedly described as low-risk clerical workers. Several insurance carriers notified the state insurance department of discrepancies in Allied audits. Charges were filed after a year-long investigation.

Marijuana seedlings found

SANFORD - Members of the City/County Investigative Dureau. CCIB, confiscated 95 marijuana plants Sunday.

Seminole County Sheriff's spokesman Ed McDonough said they were found growing in a field west of Sanford. A deputy reportedly found the pot plants while on patrol on Hickman Road. "Most of the plants were no more than six inches in height." McDonough explained.

"Some were only seedlings."

CCIB agents reportedly bundled the plants and took them to the CCIB office. An investigation is underway to determine who may have planted the marijuana.

Lease proposals to be aired by city today

SANFORD - The Holiday Inn will continue to operate on the Sanford lakefront. Getting paperwork approved for building ownership. however, is a lengthy and complicated situation.

The matter is scheduled to be discussed during today's meeting of the Sanford City Commission work session beginning at 4:30 p.m.

Resolution Trust Corp. (RTC), which took over ownership of the building last year, has now reportedly reached an agreement with Bernard Sandler, of Harborview Properties Development Company, which would allow Sandler to purchase the Holiday Inn.

The deal involves only the physical building. The land on which is is located is the property of the City of Sanford.

In a recent letter to City Manager Bill Simmons. Sandler wrote, "It is to our mutual advantage to

It is to our mutual advantage to work together to achieve success for the Holiday Inn property. The city would, after all, enjoy more tourism and employment of its residents should this transaction come to pass.

The matter has been under discussion during the past several months between Sandler and city

One controversy which must be settled is the difference between what Sandler wants and what the city would offer in a lease agreement regarding any other motel and/or restaurant which may be in the waterfront area.

Sandler has suggested that no fast food or cafeterial style restaurants are to be built or opened on the waterfront area, and no other hotel or motel may be built on the waterfront area.

Sanford City Manager Bill Stimmons is urging the city commission to consider that portion of the agreement closely. He has suggested the lease would need to contain a "not to compete" clause, perhaps including "no other motel" on the island. but clearly consistent with the overall objective of greater development along the waterfront and on the marina.

According to advance documents. Sandler is proposing a mutual cooperation venture with the city which includes several issues.

The students and the committment of the other teachers are her daily inspiration, she said.



Safety zone set at 500 meters

PENSACOLA - The Coast Guard has ordered boaters to stay at least 500 meters from a rig that will drill for natural gas off the Florida Panhandle because of fears that protesters would be a safety hazard.

The safety zone was requested by Chevron USA Inc., which last month received a permit to drill the exploratory well in the Gulf of Mexico 28 miles south of Pensacola.

'They need a 500-meter area they can quickly evacuate," said Coast Guard Lt. Verne Gifford, a marine and port safety

officer in New Orleans. Chevron officials were worried protesters would get in the way in case the rig had to be abandoned in an emergency, he

said. To his knowledge, Gifford said, this is the first time such a safety zone has been ordered in the gulf, although they are common off California's coast.

"We have to have the ability to protect our operation, our people and any people in the area." said Chevron environmental and safety engineer Sandi Fury in New Orleans. "So I think the request was a prudent one."

She said Chevron also sought the safety zone to prevent boats, fishing lines and nets from striking or snagging scientific equipment that will be in the water around the rig.

Police recover baby stolen from hospital

MIAMI -- The mother had just finished feeding her 2-day-old son when a nurse came into her maternity ward room and told her it was time the newborn be returned to the nursery.

The nurse took the infant from his mother's arms - then fled from the hospital with the baby, one police say was meant as a replacement for the one she miscarried just weeks ago.

The infant was found safe early today at the south Dade County home of Carol Einhart Jordan, 45, who surrendered to police without incident, said Metro-Dade police Detective Patrick Brickman.

Jordan, a nurse who is on leave from her job at Cedars Medical Center, was charged with one count of false imprisonment, and several other charges are pending.

Brickman said. The mother, whose name was not being released, didn't think it unusual when Jordan asked for the child because he had just finished a nursing and is returned each night to Jackson Memorial Hospital's nursery, Brickman said. Jordan

was dressed as a nurse, he said. Jordan and the mother did not know each other, he said.

Minutes after she left with the baby, the real nurse came into the mother's room looking for him. When the mother said another nurse already had returned him to the nursery, the nurse checked with her partner. They quickly realized the baby had been kidnapped. Brickman said.

Clam clamor threatens abundant beds

PORT ST. JOHN - They roll in like fog. up to 300 clammers on busy days, to dig in the shallow waters of the Indian River Lagoon in Brevard County.

Since a rich bounty of clams was discovered in the protected waters inland of Cape Canaveral and Merritt Island in early 1992, an increasing number has invaded the area. Now many fear the masses will disperse only when the once-great bounty has been wiped out.

"I wonder when it is going to dry up," Bill Browning. environmental specialist for the state Department of Environmental Protection, said of the prime clamming area. "It's supposed to be the most productive on the East Coast, (but) a resource can only last so long."

Brevard's stretch of the Indian River Lagoon produces 90 percent of the state's clams and 15 percent of those harvested nationwide, according to the department.

In 1992, fishermen raked in more than 900,000 pounds of clams from Brevard's waters. Most came from an area about two miles north of the Port St. John ramp, which is near the middle of the northern half of the Brevard's portion of the tidal

Third party hears arguments on state employee pay raise

TALLAHASSEE - A third party will recommend what raises the state should pay employees who have gone without base salary increases for three years, union officials say.

A Public Employees Relations Commission special master also is considering mileage allowances, on-call pay and health benefits, American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees spokesman Mark Neimelser said Sunday.

The special master held a hearing Thursday after talks between state officials and representatives of 80,000 state employees stalled. Neimelser said.

He said the two sides will get a written report in about two weeks. Each side will decide whether to accept or reject the recommendations, and differences will be settled by the Legislature. Among the disputes:

The union asks for an 8-percent pay raise in July 1994. The state proposes either a 3-percent raise in October, or a 4-percent raise in December.

The union proposes a 28-cent mileage

allowance - the same as lawmakers get - for employees compelled to drive their own cars on state business, up from the current 20 cents a

• The employees seek on-call pay of \$2 an hour when required to wear beepers and be prepared to respond to a call within 15 minutes. The current \$1 rate has been in effect 10 years.



Marijuana cookie trouble for officer

ST. PETERSBURG - A police officer said his relatives didn't say anything about the recipe when he grabbed a cookie off the counter, but one ingredient got him in trouble

Kenneth Kokotek said he didn't know the chocolate chip cookle contained marijuana until he tested positive for the drug in a random police department screening four days later.

"This has been pretty embarrassing," Kokotek told the St. Petersburg Times for a story Sunday. "This has been a roller-coaster ride for the past month now. Im glad things worked out."

Kokotek's urine test report last month showed enough tetrahydrocannabinol for police Internal Affairs to launch an investigation.

The case ended when another urinalysis found no traces of THC, the chemical in marijuana that causes physiological effects. Experts ruled out the likelihood Kokotek was a frequent user because his system would have retained the THC longer.

Lt. Tim Story, head of Internal affairs, said tests couldn't confirm how marijuana got into Kokotek's system, but experts told investigators it is absorbed slower through the stomach than through the lungs. That made it possible for Kokotek to have a positive reading days

Kokotek told investigators he stopped by his in-laws' apartment Jan. 8 to drop off a jacket.

James Fowler, married to Kokotek's mother-in-law, was cooking, and a batch of cookies was cooling on the kitchen counter.

Fowler told investigators he'd had an urge to bake chocolatechip cookies. Looking through a box for recipes, he found a stash of marijuana he considered a harmless ingredient for a Saturday afternoon snack reminiscent of decades gone by.

Fowler said he had removed his dozen cookies from the oven when Kokotek knocked on the door. Kokotek, who stayed no longer than 10 minutes, snatched one of the cookies as he was leaving.

"He did say, you know, the chocolate-chip cookie was good," Fowler told investigators. "He didn't say nothing about, yeah, this is good with the pot in

Fowler was unsure what to do. He queried: How do you tell a police officer that he's just eaten marijuana? Police said they doubted Fowler would be investigated for drug use.

Atter Kokotek's test results were positive for THC, he was placed on administrative leave until the second test found his system clean.

Kokotek, an 11-year police veteran, told investigators he never felt the effects of the marijuana cookie.

Some people prefer eating marijuana to smoking it, said Donegal Pearce, business manager for the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws in Washington, D.C. "The high is more of a valtum-codeine effect as opposed to smoking."

The band presented a special concert the following July Fourth at the Sanford House. The band broke up sometime after that but was reorganized in 1918 when the United States entered World War I. This time the force behind the band was Joe Reisenstein.

He was the same fellow who established the "Smoke House" drugstore Jan. 1, 1926. The Sanford Band made its radio brandcast debut Jan. 15, 1926 over WDBO, Orlando, Letters were received by Mayor Lake's office from fisteners as far away as California and Michigan. Man faces charges of killing dad grandmother, wounding mom

FORT PIERCE - A man fatally stabbed his father and grandmother and wounded his mother just hours before a neighbor shot to death his wife in a suicide pact gone awry, police said.

Weinberg described the Lakewood Park area where the unrelated killings occurred as a quiet residential area several miles north of Fort Pierce.

Tamiami Trail dredge named as national historic landmark

NAPLES - The machine which clawed its way through alligator-infested terrain to make the first road through the Everglades is now in a class with the rocket which first blazed men to the moon.

The "walking dredge" worked through muck and limestone in 1927 to dig the Tamiami Trail. connecting Miami to Tampa. On Thursday, it will be designated as a national historic landmark by the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

The Saturn V rocket, which thrust Apollo 11 toward the moon in 1969 and is now enshrined at the John F. Kennedy Space Center at Cape Canaveral, was given the same

honor in 1980. The dredge is credited with shoes.

helping pave the way for commerce, agriculture and land speculation in isolated southwest Florida by digging the 245-mile stretch, which opened after 13 years of work in 1928.

The dredge "was an ingenious piece of mechanical engineering that played an important role in history," said society spokesman John Varrast. "Even today. there's nothing like it."

Now rusting and silent, the dredge sits at the Collier-Seminole State Park east of Naples.

In its heyday, it trudged forward 10 feet at a time, devouring 10 to 16 feet of wetlands every minute. It "walked" with help from cables and pulleys that shifted the machine's 20 tons back and forth between huge wooden

Not everyone is eager to recognize the work of walking dredge No. 489, built in 1924 in Bay City, Mich., for light duty on Midwestern farms.

Joe Podgor, executive director of Friends of the Everglades, said the machine played a role in a construction project that wreaked havoc on a treasured biosphere.

"The Society of Engineers honoring that machine is like the American College of Surgeons honoring the French guillotine for its contributions to humanity and medicine," Podgor said. "The machine is a monument only to misguided human endeavors.

Meece Ellis, 90, operated the machine nine hours a day, six days a week to dig the 10-mile stretch of the Trail from the state park to Naples

When bookstores ban books

bookstores have not had the eachet of an independent, homespun pink building that proudly has called itself The Remarkable Bookshop. Many of the writers in town go there. but the work of one author was banned at that shop three years ago - Richard Nixon's memoirs published by Simon & Schuster.

Sidney Kramer, co-owner of the store and a member of the American Civil Liberties Union. recently told Martin Petersen of Publishers Weekly: "We thought (Nixon) was a rascal and didn't deserve to have our efforts help him sell books." The bookstore is closing soon, but this memory of it will live on

Richard Nixon is hardly the only writer whose work is banned from some bookstores. Although Rush Limbaugh's "The Way Things Ought to Be" has had huge sales, there were booksellers around the country who would not stock it or who placed the book face down on remote shelves

The ex cathedra pronouncements of Limbaugh are not to be found, for example, at the Haverford College Bookstore in Haverford, Pa. As-Publishers Weekly reports, Julie Summerfield. Brock's "The Real Antta Hill" and Robert Bork's The Tempting of America.



This is not a First Amendment issue, Bookstores are privately owned. They cannot and should not - be sued for treating their customers as people whose reading needs supervision. But since the product being sold is ideas, the spirit of the First Amendment has certainly been squelched in such bookstores.

Lift arms embargo on Bosnia

The United States took a vote last month that should have made front-page headlines across the nation, but didn't. With only nine dissenting votes, the senators called on the United States to break the arms embargo on Bosnia. The non-binding resolution, offered by Senate Minority Leader Robert Dole, was an overdue but emphatic assertion that the U.N. Charter and common sense establish that the victim of aggression has a right to defend itself and other nations have a moral obligation to

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynthan of New York encapsulated what is at stake in his floor remarks before the vote:

"What we have allowed to happen so far is indefensible. We have suborned violations of international law, in the first instance by standing by while the Serbian army invaded Bosnia. And then compounding that violation of the (U.N.) Charter by denying the Bosnian government the means of self-defense. We have helped create a caricature of what the United Nations was meant to be.

As Moynihan and the other senators made clear, more is at issue in the struggle over Bosnia's future than its continued survival as a viable nation, though that is the issue of most critical, immediate importance. The multiethnic state of Bosnia-Herzegovina came into being in April 1992 and was promptly accepted as a member of the United Nations and recognized by the United States. It was immediately attacked from across the border by regular Serbian forces and from within by Serbian irregulars armed and supplied by Serbia. It has been fighting for its life ever since, internal and external Croatian forces having also joined in the effort to strangle the new nation at birth.

Few people outside of Serbian and Croatian official circles bother to contest these bare bones of fact. The U.N. General Assembly has so voted, the United States Joining the overwhelming majority. NATO has so asserted, at various times threatening specific action against the Serbs if relief supplies for encircled Bosnian cities were not let through or if U.N. relief forces were attacked. President Clinton, first as nominee and then as president, has spoken eloquently of Bosnia's status as victim

and America's obligation to help it survive. But words have not been translated into meaningful deeds. NATO, a 44-year-old assertion of Western solidarity against the threat of Soviet expansionism, has dithered and dodged in the face of Serbian aggression. The United Nations, a 49-year-old statement of mankind's hopes for collective security and territorial integrity, has averted its eyes from the fact of aggression while trying to deal with the effects.

And the United States, whose president knows better and whose history demands better, has become engaged in an osientatious display of handwashing that would have made Pontius Pilate proud. As Sen. Moynihan put it. "Everything that the United States has stood for in the international order... from the time of Woodrow Wilson is at stake

This is no hidden monstrosity, a Holocaust carried out behind a barbed-wire curtain by a totalitarian regime intent on secrecy. "Ethnic

cleansing" and rape camps are facts of life documented by print and television reporters month after month. The Serbian siege of the Bosnian capital Sarajevo is a systematic war on men, women and children, civilians all, in full view of the cameras. What is afoot is genocide, and we have so voted in the United Nations us

But votes and statements and anguished sentiments are all so much irrelevant verbiage if, at day's

end, nothing is done. There is no legal impediment to action. Under Article 51 of the U.N. Charter, a member state has the right to resist aggression by all available means if the United Nations itself does not protect it. That right clearly supersedes all others, the preservation of its security and sovereignty being fundamental to a nation's purpose. Equally to the point, under Article 51, member states have the right to respond to a call for assistance from a nation under attack.

Instead, as Sen. Dole pointed out, "the world has said, 'We will not defend you and we will not let you defend yourself. Your only option is to surrender

Good and sincere people argue that to give arms to Bosnia will only expand the fighting and prolong the slaughter. As four former U.S. secretaries of state seemed to agree in a recent television interview. Bosnia is a lost cause. Consequently, our task should be to force the Bosnian government to accept inevitable partition and the permanent loss of over two-thirds of its land.

It is a wretched, shameful retreat from principle, an acceptance of a new "peace in our time" similar to that forced on Czechoslovakia in 1938. Its consequences would be no less far-reaching. If NATO and the United Nations cannot deal with the relatively straightforward case of Bosnia, what of the larger and more complex ones in the former Soviet Union?

Budget amendment going down to the wire

WASHINGTON - Twice in the last 18 months. Bill Clinton has dodged the thorny issue of the constitutional amendment to balance the budget. Both times, cold water was splashed on the idea before he could endorse one of the emptiest political gim-

micks in recent times First, in the midst of the presidential campaign, Clinton was sending strong hints that he might support a version of the politically popular amendment. But then the candidate got a phone call from the powerful chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., a sworn enemy of the amendment.

pleaded to Clinton. "Let's put it this way," Clinton responded,

"before I do (commit) — if I were to — I'll call you." That call never came.

Last fall, Clinton's flirtation with the amendment flared again, according to White House sources Budget Director Leon Panetta thought Clinton was being won over by pro-amendment advocates inside the administration. So Panetta phoned congressional allies asking them to lobby Clinton against the amendment. Late last year, Clinton finally wrote a letter rejecting the proposal.

"My impression was he is personally sympathetic, but obviously with the staff pulling him in two different directions, it is an awkward one for him," said Sen. Paul Simon, D-III., who leads the pro-amendment forces.

The choice may have been awkward, but the amendment has lots of political allure. Basically, it's a free lunch for politicians who fancy themselves fiscal conservatives, but spend money like drunken sailors on port call. The 308-word balanced budget amendment has a truth-in-advertising problem. because it doesn't cut a dime of spending nor does it promise abalanced budget probable.

Under the amendment, it would take a three-fifths vote, instead of simple majority, of both houses to pass a deficit budget. Moreover, the formulation of balanced budgets would be based on notoriously unreliable estimates of future revenues and spending.

Supporters from both sides of the political aisle have their own cynical agendas. Liberal supporters of the amendment believe it will strengthen their hand for higher taxes and deeper Pentagon cuts. Conservatives calculate that the brunt would be borne by cuts in social spending. The resulting stalemates would give gridlock a good name, as more and more political disputes would be settled by the courts. Byrd predicts the Supreme Court would become a "super OMB (Office of Management and Budget)."

This week, the battle heads for a climax as Byrd kicks off three days of hearings designed to puncture the pro-amendment arguments. 

There isn't any doubt

Greyhounds whip Winter Park for state crown

LONGWOOD - All debts are paid in full.

The Lyman High School girls' soccer team completed a quest that began last February with a 5-0 victory over the Winter Park Wildeats in the Class 5A state championship game Saturday night at the University of Tampa.

It was the third state title in four years for the Greyhounds and their fourth since girls' soccerbecame a varsity sport in 1982.

More importantly, the title completes a comeback of sorts for the Greyhounds, who had their reign as state champions interrupted last year by a loss to Lake Howell in the semifinals of the district tournament.

Since then, the Lyman girls have had one thing in mind and played like it all year long. Even while sweeping to the Burger King/Club Soccer

Conference championship, the Greyhounds kept their sight set on the state crown. Nothing else. mattered.

"It's a matter of pride," said Lyman coach Gary Barnett. "For the sentors, winning a state championship is where they started. They don't want to expect anything less.

As a result, Barnett and assistant coach Paul Holmes had to say little interms of motivating the Greyhounds.

"If someone was goofing off before a game, I wouldn't have to say something," said Barnett. "Or if I did say something, it was quickly picked up. The girls were self-monitoring. They understood very clearly that there was a mindset. they had to maintain if they were going to be state champions.

"This year, it was a relatively easy job of motivating girls to play."

Especially after Winter Park coach Israel Ramos was quoted in a newspaper article as saying he thought the Wildcats were the best team in the state.

"I never had to say a word," Barnett said, "I had girls calling me, asking me if I saw what he (Ramos) had said. I never had to say a word about it. But that was not the only thing that was the telling factor. The girls wanted to win a state championship. They wanted it, no matter what anybody said.

"All those little things together . . . the article, the state fifte, last year, it being the sentors' last year . . . because of all those factors, plus the girls being close as a team on and off the field. being focused wasn't a problem."

FHSAA defense of fines borders on indefensible

silent and be thought a fool than to open your mouth and remove all

Most months, the Florida High School Activities Association puls a newsletter of sorts - entitled FHSAA Today — to member schools and interested parties. In the current issue, "Time Out," a commentary column by FHSAA Director of Public Relations Jack E. Watford makes its debut.

This notable only because Watford chose the topic "Just who's to blame when a member school is fined?" for his maiden effort.

It seems that the oft repeated charge that the primary reason the FHSAA is handing out fines at such a frantic pace is to pay for their new building has reached the ever vigilant ears of the Association.

Watford responds to the churge: "That's funny, The FHSAA purchased the new building just this past summer. Yet the FHSAA has been fining its member schools for rules violations since before most of us were born.

"it's a gripe, not a valid argu-

nobody seems willing to admit it's nobody's fault but your own when your school is fined or penalized."

Speaking as someone who's paid his fair share of fines (I've been to traffic school twice). I have no problem owning up when I've either consciously or unwittingly done something deserving such a penalty and would like to believe that philosphy is shared by the majority.

But the growing problem with the FHSAA - and it's one that coincides with the Association purchasing a new building — is its assessing of fines for what appear to be slap-on-the-wrist offenses.

For example, in the listing of rules violations and fines in the current ment, and it stems from a truth that FHSAA Today, three schools were

fined \$100 each for "lack of cooperation" because of their "failure to submit photo of girls volleyball team for publication in official souvenir program for the 1993 FHSAA State Girls Volleyball Championships."

At a time when schools across the state are forced to stretch every penny as far as it will go, assessing a fine because a school doesn't turn in a photo borders on obscene.

Besides, as any coach will tell you, ignoring that task yields its own punishment in the form of upset parents who shell out the money to buy the program, only to find their team's picture is missing.

At the risk of being cynical, it seems that these fines are an attempt by the FHSAA, which receives the funds generated by program sales, to recoup any lost revenue from missed sales due to the lack of a team's photo.

Then there's the \$250 fine levied against Lake Mary High School because the boys' soccer team played in one too many tournament games this season, which should appear in the February edition of FHSAA Today.

Not only did the FHSAA show no

compassion for Lake Mary (which could just as easily have been Lake Brantley) for something that was beyond the Rams' responsibility. the decision to fine the school was made during the course of a phone call from the Edgewater High School stadium.

No discussion. No appeal. Pay us. I can appreciate the FHSAA's growing frustration with constant challenges to its authority in the form of lawsuits seeking injunctions by member schools. It would be easier if everyone just did as they were told, right?

The problem with that equation is that it doesn't balance; the FHSAA often falls short in upholding its half of the bargain by not providing reasonable due process. If it did, it wouldn't find its decisions challenged in (and overturned by)

the courts. Rather than settle for being an enforcement and collection agency. the FHSAA should strive to guide and support the efforts of its member schools. As we all know! it's difficult to do anything well when someone just waiting to leap on any mistake you make.

Termites arrive early this year

Use caution when purchasing pest control services

Termites are swarming a little early this year and our office has been "swarming" with telephone calls and visits from concerned residents. The welcomed, but unseasonably warm weather has encouraged the pests to become active sooner than usual. Since termites feed on wood, the mere sight of the intruder causes most homeowners to fear that their home will quickly be destroyed.

The insects or their wings are being found inside on window sills and outside as they emerge from the ground. Adult termites can be distinguised from true flying ants by their thick waists; ants have an indented or "wasp waist." If you are unsure if you have termites or ants, bring a sample to the Cooperative Extension Office for identification.

At certain times of the year, usually in the spring during the daylight hours, large numbers of winged adults emerge from colonies. This is usually when termites are first noticed. Mating occurs during these flights and new colonies are started. A sighting of winged termites in the house canindicate infestation, although individuals sometimes come in from outside. Termite wings break off shortly after flight, and even though the actual swarming is not observed. the presence of discarded wings indicates that a colony is nearby. Since termites are attracted to light, their wings are often on the floor beneath doors or windows. Peak swarming periods for termites occur January through May in Florida, depending on the temperature. Winged subterranean termites emerging from the ground near the house does not necessarily mean the house is infested but is is a good reason to check further. Termites that infest homes or



buildings usually come from colonies already established in the soil. Termites

Drywood and furniture [powder-post] termites do not require contact with the soil for moisture. You may notice coffee ground sized pellets under old furniture or around baseboards or other wood trim indoors where they have been feeding. Damaged wood often goes unnoticed; exterior surfaces usually must be removed to see the damage. However, galleries can be detected by tapping the wood every few inches with a screwdriver handle. Damaged wood sounds hollow, and the handle may even break through into the galleries.

Subterranean termites can be prevented by using approved pesticides on the soil around and under the home. This treatment is required on all new construction, but unfortunately is not always done adequately. Contractors must have the soil under concrete slabs treated but often overlook the permimeter of the home after the backfill is

pushed up to the walls.

Drywood termites must be destroyed by removing the wood they infest, or in extreme cases, tenting the home.

Drywood and subterranean termites require completely different control methods; therefore, it's important to know which pest you are dealing with. If in doubt, we have containers available for sending specimens to the University of Florida lab for positive identification; the fee is \$8. Termites will not eat the house overnight. You will have time to have them identified and evaluate various control methods, but don't wait too long. Use caution when purchasing pest control services. Shop around and take time to make a wise consumer decision. Get several free estimates. Have the salesman show you actual live termites and damage on your property. Simply seeing the damage does not indicate that there are live termites active now. Damage could have been caused previously and past treatment may have killed the colony. Have the salesman certify in writing that the premise or structure is infested, listing the type of pest and that a treatment is required. Read the proposed contract carefully and ask the sdalesman to explain parts that are unclear. Ask for a coy of the label of the pesticide used and a copy of the Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDA) for your records. If you are still concerned. consult your attorney regarding what is actually covered. Some contracts cover free re-treatment if the same type of pest re-occurs and causes damage.



Kiss this tooth decay theory a final goodbye

there are various ways of fighting tooth decay other than simply brushing. Examples are drinking green tea, kissing, eating cashew nuts, drinking through a straw, munching on Gouda cheeses, and chewing on an Indian evergreen tree leaf. Your comments?

DEAR READER: Wow. If kissing retards tooth decay, this in the best news since Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo, I don't believe it. Nor do I believe that the other methods you mention will help much either.

You should ask your dentist about this, but it's my understanding that tooth decay can best be conquered by fluoridation (or using fluoride toothpaste), brushing after every meal, flossing regularly, going easy on sweets, and following a program of regular dental check-ups and hygiene, such as that promulgated by the American Dental Association.

If your dentist endorses kissing as a decay-preventive, let me know. But I must say that It hasn't particularly helped me. yet. Does it matter whom you

DEAR DR. GOTT: What causes eyelid twitching?

DEAR READER: Nervousness. usually. Called a "tic," eyelid twitching is often associated with high auxiety states, fatigue and stress. The condition is ordinarily harmless and will resolve in a few days, although it may return as stress levels rise. No treatment is required.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What are the chances of a vasectomy being reversed? I've had the procedure and regret it already.

DEAR READER: Vasectomy, a form of contraception in which the tubes from the testicles are tled off and cut, is reversible with microsurgical techniques. However, the operation is diffleult and, even in the best experts' hands, the success rate is less than 50 percent.


