New Charter School

UCP (United Cerebral Palsy) Child Development Centers recently had their application approved to turn their pre-school program into a Charter School in Seminole County.

A Charter School is a public school operated by a private non-profit agency. Although it is held accountable to the local School Boards for programmatic and fiscal performance, a Charter School is afforded flexibility on how they deliver program. Becoming a Charter School will allow UCP to offer enhanced programs, such as music and dance therapy and pre-school classrooms for students up to the age of five.

The UCP Seminole Child Development Center Charter School will be located at First Presbyterian Church on Oak Street, in Sanford. There will be three classrooms - young toddlers, toddlers, and 3-5 year old pre-school class. There will also be Home Early Intervention and Extended Day Care offered.

The purpose of the Charter School will be to provide learning opportunities for young children with disabilities, at the earliest possible age.

In addition, the program will be open to children without disabilities, on a private fee basis, allowing children to learn and play together at a young age.

Commission receptive to condo proposal

SANFORD — City Commissioners are receptive to a plan to build a 169-unit condominium/retail complex along Lake Monroe. The million-dollar question, literally, is who pays the impact fees.

Local developer Rami Yosefian wants to build a 169-unit condominium complex on city land next to the Seminole County Courthouse. In addition to the condos, the development would house a four-story parking structure for 500 vehicles, and 40,000 square feet of retail space, which could include a 26,000-square-foot grocery store.

Yosefian has asked the city to pay the estimated \$1 million in impact fees for him noting his company is assuming 100 per-

cent of the risk for a project which could become a boon in tax revenue and kick start infill redevelopment in downtown Sanford.

"We're doing something that has never been done before in Seminole County," Yosefian said. "The numbers are tight. We might just break even, and that's a hell of a risk for a developer to take. If I had to pay for the impact fees, it would be impossible for us to do."

Commissioners made no decision on whether to pay the fees and requested a special meeting with Yosefian and City Manager Tony VanDerworp to negotiate further on the details of who pays the impact fees; how much public parking will be available in the parking and who will pay for it and maintain it; and should the city

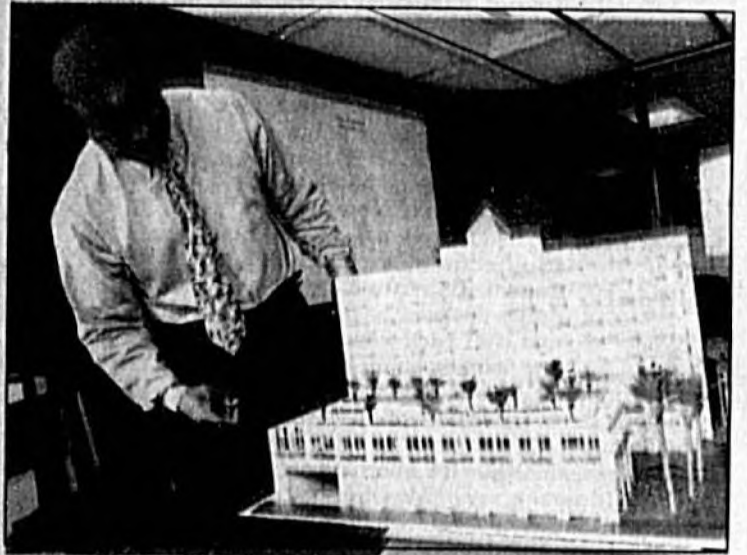
donate or sell the land to Yosefian.

"I've never seen a developer yet who came to the table with their best offer right off the bat," said Mayor Brady Lessard. "I don't think this is an etched in stone proposal."

The proposed site currently provides parking for the courthouse and much of Monday's meeting focused on how to handle parking issues. Two floors of the parking garage would be available for public parking, with the remainder available only for residents of the complex. Yosefian's proposal would allow 188 spaces for public parking. The site currently provides 289 spaces.

VanDerworp said one way to gain more parking spaces is to

Mission to Mars a success

Schools allows students to simulate Space Shuttle missions

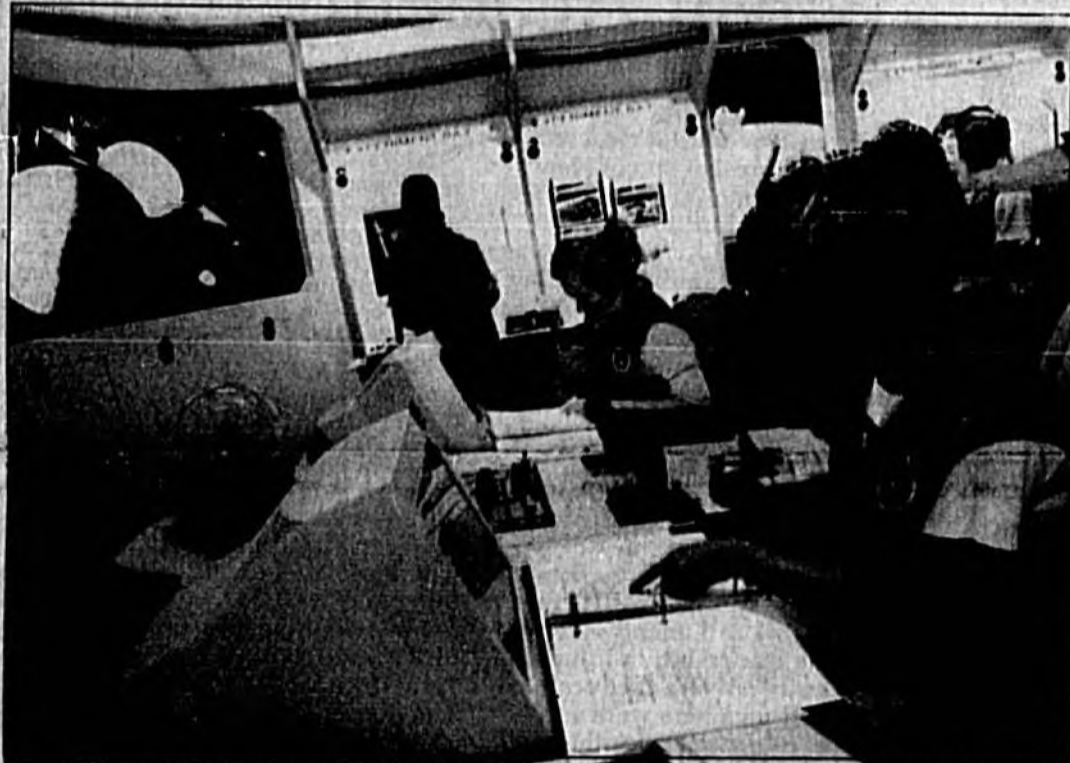
SANFORD — Taylor Pierce didn't let a little adversity get in her way Monday. Even though an electrical glitch shut down her computer, the Space Shuttle pilot safely maneuvered her craft back to Earth following a three-hour space mission.

Pierce was one of about 20 Goldsboro Elementary School fifth-graders who participated in Monday's mission to Mars simulation at the Kids Space Center. It was the last of five simulated space trips taken to the Red Planet by fifth-graders during the past week.

"It was our first go around at something like this," Goldsboro Principal Sherry O'Leary said. "It is part of the regular curriculum the children have been working on all year. The mission to Mars is a culmination of that."

O'Leary said all five mission went well, although she thinks future simulated trips to Mars will include shorter scripts compared to this year's 100-page guidebook.

The script was used by students at Mission Control, aboard the shuttle and in the lunar lander to help guide them through the mission.

Goldsboro is the only public elementary school in the nation that includes a simulated Mission Control Center, space shuttle, lunar lander and lunar landscape.

Each group, however, was required to calculate measurements, read charts and graphs or perform various science experiments in order for the trip into space to be a success.

"The research is not scripted," Goldsboro Curriculum Specialist Laurie Host said. "Some people might think the space center is a big Game Boy. But, it isn't a Game Boy."

What's on the computer screen during the simulation is exactly what would be on NASA's screen during a launch.

The students bring the skills they learn in the classroom to the space center to see how the applications relate to outer space, Host said. Sometimes, it's not as easy as it appears.

Ashton Scarlett found this out when he tried to operate

the shuttle's robotic arm. At first, the fifth-grader had difficulty lifting and moving objects using the state of the art machinery. By the end of the mission, however, he was performing the experiments with ease.

"The robotic arm is very difficult to use," Host said. "At

Eckstein issues harsh warning to airport board

Commissioner upset with lack of communication; eyes board ouster

SANFORD — Commissioner Whitey Eckstein promised to remove members of Sanford's voluntary boards and commissions if they didn't provide more information about their activities to City Commission.

Eckstein's comments were aimed primarily at Sanford Airport Authority board members, who voted last week to reorganize the top management of the airport. However, his criticism was also seen as a general warning to the city's other boards, particularly in light of the controversies surrounding the Sanford Housing Authority.

Eckstein zeroed in on the

airport's reorganization plan. The reorganization, which proposes to hire former Sanford Mayor Larry Dale as the top executive, occurred without prior notice on the board's agenda. A memo about the proposal was leaked to the media three days before the board meeting.

"I'm sending a message right now that I will get rid of them one by one unless they make a commitment to communicate better with the commission," Eckstein said. "I'm very taken aback that the Airport Authority would give a memo about reorganization to the press before they would

Enrich yourself, visit a museum

The other day, someone asked me how long I have lived in the Sanford area. I replied, "I came here in the Navy in 1952." The response was surprising to me. "Why would you come to Sanford in the Navy — what's Sanford got to do with it?"

Although this person has lived in Sanford for several years, he was unaware that this city was once home of the Sanford Naval Air Station. It got me to wondering how many others may not know of this.

Then too, telling someone that "Sanford was once the Celery Capital of the World" often draws disbelief, as does the fact that WAY back when, Sanford was actually larger in size than

Orlando, or that there was a train, and a trolley car running down the middle of First Street.

This Friday is International Museum Day. The sponsoring organization, the International Council of Museums says, "Museums are an important means of cultural exchange, enrichment of cultures and development of mutual understanding."

Locally, we are very richly endowed with two excellent public museums, the Seminole County Historical Museum located at 300 Bush Boulevard in southern Sanford, and the Sanford Museum at 520 East First Street in downtown Sanford. Each of these has exhibits and displays that will be of interest to everyone.

The museums have things designed to interest farmers, business leaders, people who live in the historical district, merchants and many others.

Sports enthusiasts may be surprised to learn of the connection Sanford has had with such stars as Babe Ruth, "Bullet" Bob Hayes, Red Barber, Jackie Robinson, Willie Mays and dozens of others in the past.

The Seminole County Historical Museum is open Tuesday through Friday from 9 a.m. until noon, and 1 until 4 p.m. Saturdays it's open from 1 until 4 p.m. It is undergoing a restoration period right now, but one display that may be of interest is information on the three forts in the area's history, Fort Melon, Fort Reid, and Fort Lane (in the Geneva area).

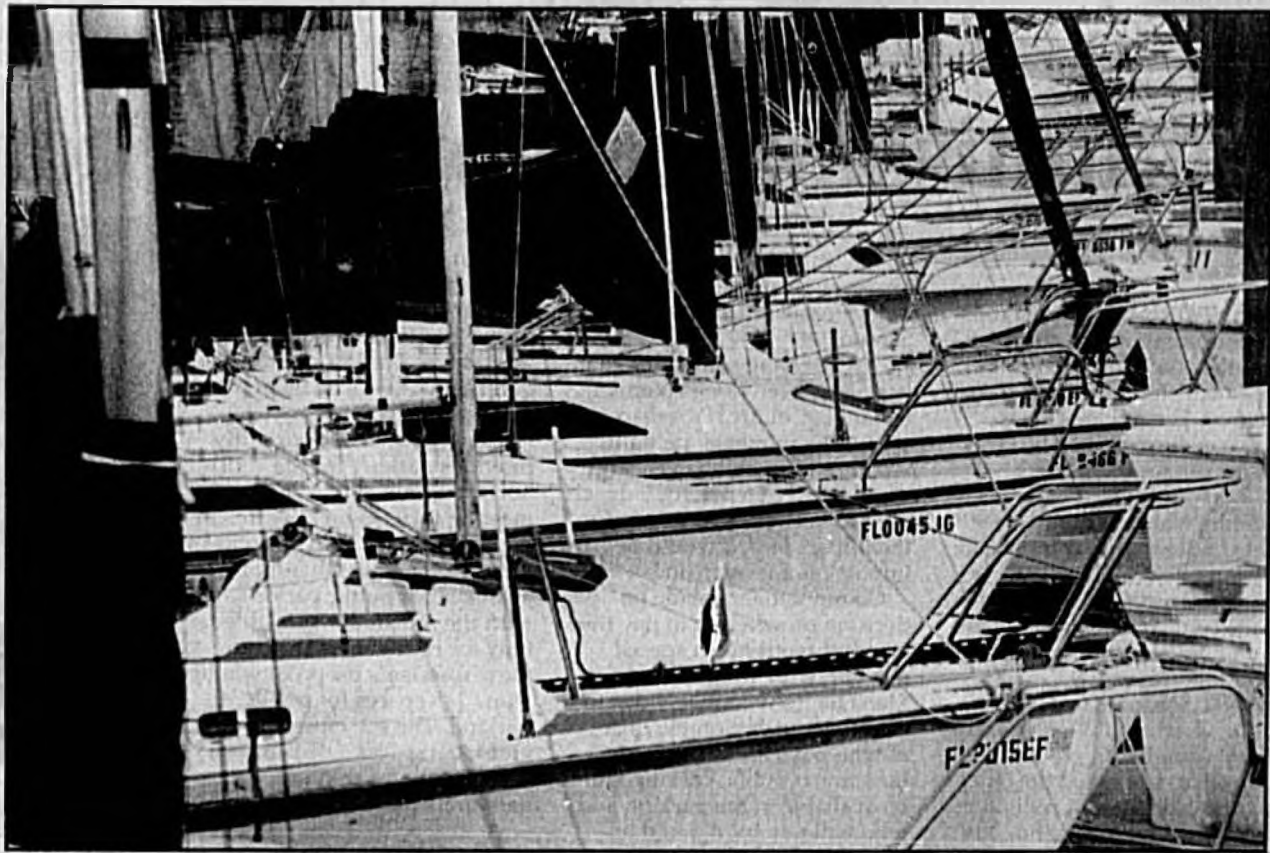
It is suggested people look up the county's web site at www.co.seminole.fl.us, then scroll down to the "museum." It's updated each month. Right now there is an item on the cost of the ferry ride on the Wee Wee River. Interesting.

The Sanford Museum is open Tuesday through Friday from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturdays from 1 until 4 p.m. Two of my favorite exhibits are the Navy exhibit and the special room for General Henry Sanford, for whom the city is named.

There is another museum which is of local interest, the Student Museum, at 301 West 7th Street in Sanford. It is open from 1:30 until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Of prime interest are the photographic displays, but there are also displays of old classrooms, Indian relics and others.

Make it a goal for this week. Newcomers or longtime residents will benefit from learning more about our history. Take the small children along and do some explaining, or ask questions of the staff. It will be an event you will enjoy.

From 1967 until it closed in 1976, the present site of New Tribes Mission on East First Street in Sanford, was the Sanford Naval Academy. It was a private preparatory boarding school, offering private personal education with small classes, with the focal point being true learning experiences.

Students enrolled in the school were from various parts of the United States, as well as some from Central and South America, Mexico and Canada.

Many of the staff members were retired military personnel, giving the students a structured learning environment while offering leadership training as well as an advanced education. The staff members were excellent as role models for the midshipmen and stood as examples of leadership and service to their country from the late 60s to early 70s.

Some of the instructors, many local area residents from Daytona Beach to Orlando, not only served as educators, but as

Living coward Fitting punishment would be to keep McVeigh alive

Clinging desperately to his delusions, Timothy McVeigh fancies himself a martyr to his cause. According to acquaintances, he sees himself as a foot soldier who successfully carried out a distasteful but necessary assignment.

"It was just another military mission in his mind,"

David Dilly, one of McVeigh's Army buddies, told The Washington Post. "He was not worried about casualties. ... He's still in the military 'the ends justify the means' mode."

McVeigh's crime is his responsibility, but the nation must share blame for propping up his fantasies. Without the stir that has accompanied his planned execution, McVeigh would be languishing in a federal prison cell, all but forgotten. The U.S. government's shortsighted insistence on putting

him to death simply fuels his sense of martyrdom.

McVeigh does not deserve the attention he is getting. With the latest development in the case, the Justice Department has been handed the chance to shut down this sickening melodrama. Because of the FBI's 11th-hour revelation of previously undisclosed documents, Attorney General John Ashcroft has delayed McVeigh's execution, previously scheduled for May 16, until June 11.

If prosecutors in the criminal division of the U.S. Department of Justice had an iota of courage and common sense, they would use the documents as a rationale for putting off McVeigh's death indefinitely — next year, next decade, never. After all, news that the FBI failed to turn over boxes of relevant reports and interviews to McVeigh's defense attorney is just the sort of thing that feeds his fevered paranoia.

Legal experts say it is unlikely that the documents, which FBI spokesmen contend were overlooked during McVeigh's trial, will matter in the long run. McVeigh has now admitted — indeed, proudly proclaimed — his guilt. Nevertheless, the Justice Department need not be in a hurry to put McVeigh to death in June. He's not going anywhere.

Besides, postponing the execution a month simply gives McVeigh more time to vamp. Refusing to show remorse or offer an apology to the families of his 168 victims, McVeigh has deepened his parents' heartbreak and horrified longtime friends. His mother, according to published reports, has suffered psychiatric problems since McVeigh blew up the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City in 1995. His sister, Jennifer, once his staunchest supporter, has changed her name.

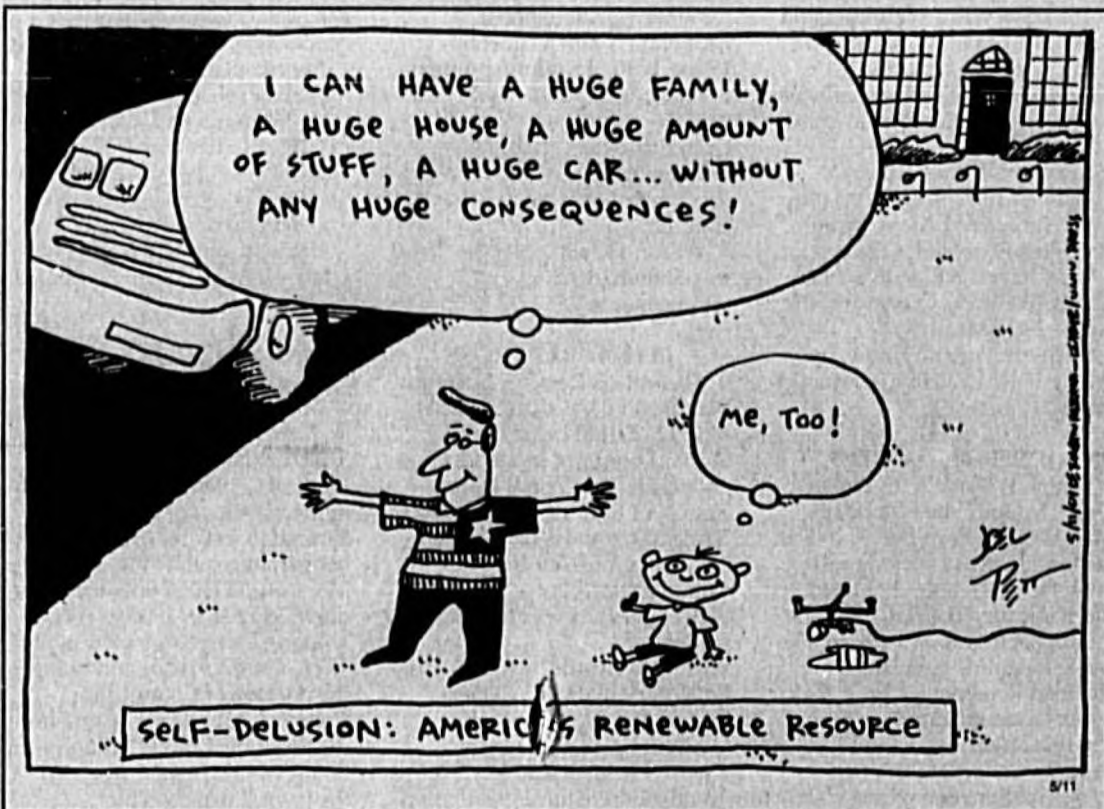
Meanwhile, he conducts himself as if he leaves a grand legacy. He has given interviews to journalists, made secret arrangements for his burial and invited witnesses for his execution. He records his thoughts for posterity, as if future generations might care how he became the devil's own.

A loner and a loser, McVeigh is the sort who needs a scapegoat to cover his personal failures. Despite an above-average intellect, he never amounted to much. He couldn't hold a decent job, couldn't manage long-term intimate relationships. When he washed out of training for the Army's Special Forces, or Green Berets, he was already beginning to construct a convenient excuse for his shortcomings: It was the federal government's fault.

That sort of lunacy has found a foothold, here and there, among small groups of working-class people with bleak economic prospects. Looking around for suspects to blame for their dimming expectations, they pile up their resentments toward professional women and people of color, and toward the federal government they believe has boosted those groups. Among McVeigh's reading material was "The Turner Diaries," a racist, anti-government novel that predicts a race war.

McVeigh wants to be executed so he can maintain his romantic self-image as a brave warrior who went down fighting. A more fitting punishment would be to force him to live with his cowardice.

Since I no

Judge Freeman, like all judges, are paid to make decisions and all of us in a society of laws are bound to follow those decisions or appeal them if we don't like them. Regardless of the ultimate outcome we are bound by the decisions rendered and to accept otherwise is nothing but anarchy.

I frankly find the Department's "back door" approach to getting decisions they want to be appalling. Obviously, they feel that since they are a state agency that they are above the rules and

Look who some Brits are calling stupid

The stereotype about President George W. Bush being dumb has traveled the Atlantic and has taken hold in some of the British press and in the minds of some British and Irish citizens. People ask me if Bush is as dumb as they've been told he is. When I mention his Yale and Harvard degrees, they are surprised. When I speak of his inherent decency in contrast to they-know-who, most nod appreciatively.

Early post-election commentary in several British publications follows the line of people who cannot defeat someone's argument. They prefer to smear him as an ignorant lout, if only to avoid having to discuss the weakness of their own political ideas. But the most liberal American commentator has nothing on some British publications, which are characterizing Bush as having an IQ that is a few crumpets short of a proper tea.

Perhaps they suffer from empire-envy? Writing in a recent London Times magazine, Kate Muir tells of her visit to the exhibit at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American

History, "The American Presidency: A Glorious Burden." Muir, who is photographed before the statue of Lincoln in his Memorial (doesn't she know that he preserved a union that her British forebears sought to prevent and later tried to destroy?), doesn't like it that Bush refuses to treat the job he is about to assume as a burden. She quotes approvingly Lyndon Johnson's view of the presidency as making whoever occupies the White House "bigger than he was, and no matter how big, not big enough for its demands." Muir apparently is too young, or skipped this class, to recall how the Vietnam War reduced Johnson's political size, while adding considerably, and unnecessarily, to the nation's burden.

Revisiting the rap on Ronald Reagan, who she also dismisses as intellectually unworthy, Muir says that Bush is not only "anti-work, but anti-work." There is a secret to the presidency that the successful presidents have understood. It is hiring experienced people who wind up making the president look good. No president can, or

should, be expected to know everything. And many who give the impression of knowing a lot lack the one component that trumps intelligence every time: wisdom.

President Bush is wise enough to have surrounded himself with people who know what they are doing. Many have been there before and will require no on-the-job training. This is about running a government, not pleasing commentators who can freely float their opinions without being held accountable for them. Bush is so secure in his own skin that he can afford to hire gifted, experienced and wise people for his Cabinet and staff.

The president is also wisely ignoring adversaries who had wanted him to construct a coalition government that would include people who oppose his policies. Instead, Bush plans to act as if he won the election, which is highly unusual in Republican circles. Could it be that Bush will lead Republicans out of the loser mentality that afflicts them even when they win? Might Bush show Republicans that power is to be used, not negotiated away to the losing side? The ability to make wise decisions is far more important

than conquering books on someone's subjective reading list.

President Calvin Coolidge noted that "the world is full of educated derelicts." Supposedly intelligent men and women have grown the federal government as they have tried to perfect humankind through spending on bloated social programs. That they have repeatedly failed never indicates to them that they lack wisdom and that their ideas are wrong, only that their supposed intelligence has not been tried for a sufficient period of time, backed up by ever-more spending of the dollars earned by hard-working people, who never get a refund even when surpluses soar out of sight.

Bush is smarter than people give him credit for, and he is wiser than most of the arrogant, intellectual wizards think he is. If he weren't, liberal British and American commentators would not be taking potshots at him. Perhaps they sense that their greatest fear will be realized and Bush will succeed in dismantling the people's faith in the government gods.

I'm always prepared with canned goods, candles and extra water. If a hurricane gets close, I'll evacuate to my parents house in Clearwater.

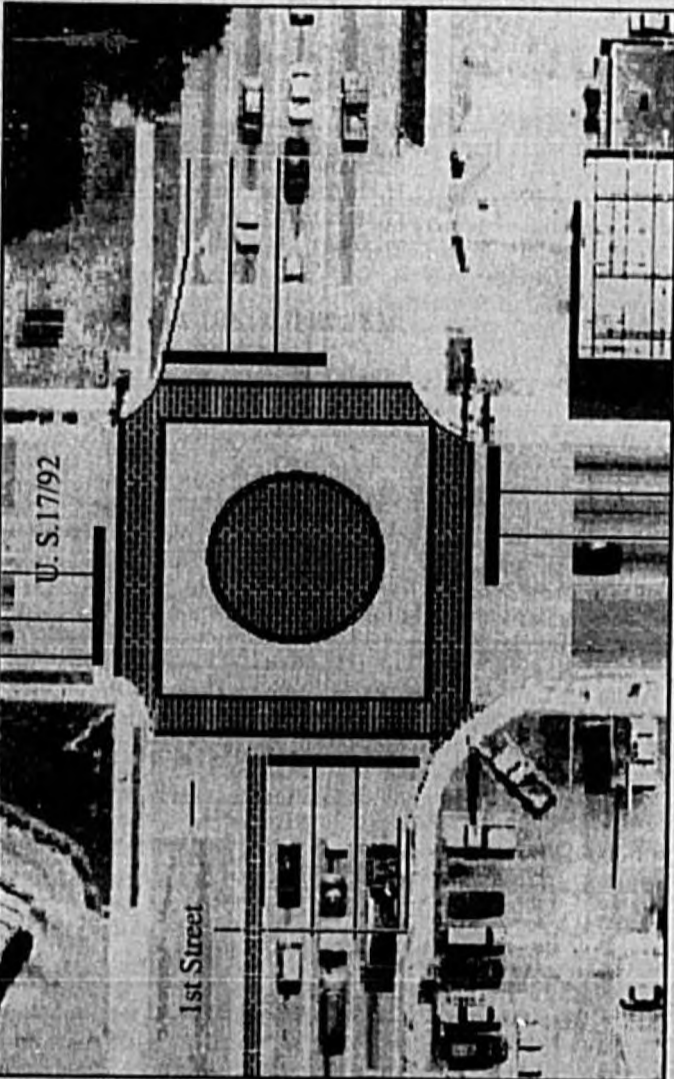

tear down the old Florida Power & Light building next to City Hall. That plan would provide 104 additional spots.

VanDerworp explained the current parking lot provides no revenue to the city and costs about \$38,000 a year to maintain. VanDerworp said the city could cover the cost of impact fees by charging for parking.

"It's doable if your charge for parking," VanDerworp said.

Commissioner Randy Jones agreed. He said redevelopment downtown will lead to more pay-to-park lots and the city should take the lead in charging to park.

"Public parking is going to come down to paying for parking at some point in the near future," Jones said. "You can't go anywhere in downtown Orlando without paying to park."

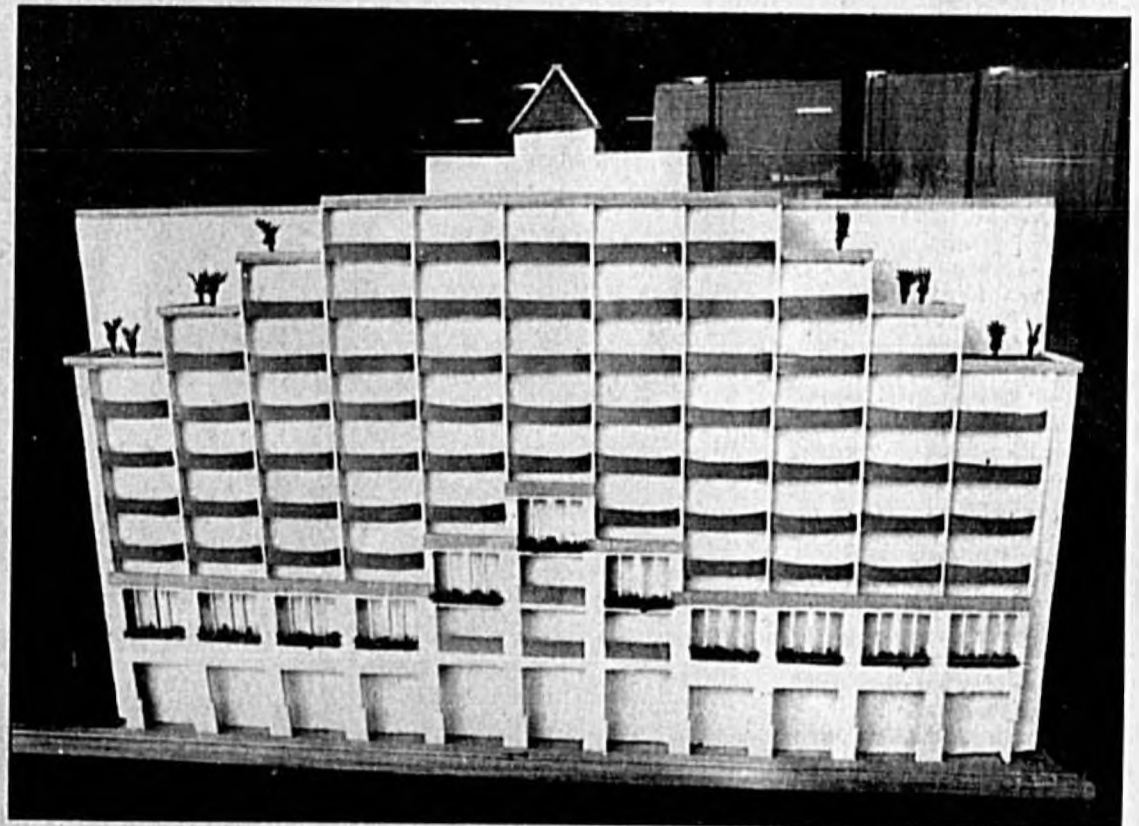
"If we don't have a situation where people can charge to park, it means we don't have a vibrant downtown," Lessard said.

Commissioner Art Woodruff said he wasn't opposed to paying to park, but noted there should be some balance.

"There's something to say about living in a town where you don't have to pay to park," Woodruff said. "We need to balance what we're getting with what we're giving up."

Woodruff also said he wanted to make sure any residential/retail project would tie in with the city's Riverwalk, which is currently being planned and engineered.

"I would feel a lot better if this was worked through [the Riverwalk project]," he said. Lessard said he had talked

with Bill Kercher about coordinating the projects. Kercher's firm Glatting Jackson is doing the work for Riverwalk. Lessard said Kercher had agreed to review the condo plans at no cost and offer suggestions for compatibility between the two projects.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said he liked the plans but was against giving Yosefian the land.

"I'll work with him on the impact fees, but I don't see giv-

ing him the land," Eckstein said.

VanDerworp said the parking lot is appraised at about \$800,000. He also estimated property taxes generated from Yosefian's condo/retail project would be approximately \$167,000 annually.

Commissioner Velma Williams said she wanted more details about the project, but said she didn't want the commission to delay the project for disagreements over minor details.

"I hope we're not still debating this thing two years from now," Williams said. "I think we need to move forward on this and send a message that we want this type of development."

VanDerworp said he would arrange a special meeting for commissioners to negotiate additional details of Yosefian's proposal. No date has been set, but VanDerworp expects to post a public notice for the meeting within two weeks.

here. We're the only Front Porch community rally he's going to attend."

The Front Porch program is a revitalization initiative that targets key urban neighborhoods for improvement. Earning a Front Porch designation provides communities with direct access to state and federal funds, as well as the necessary personnel and support structures to assist in planning revitalization efforts.

Front Porch Florida employs a comprehensive approach, empowering residents to define and develop solutions to their problems, with influences in the areas of higher quality education, economic growth and environmental preservation.

"Our priority is to empower the residents of the community, and to do that, we provide them education, training and technical support to not only create their Neighborhood Action Plan, but to make sure it is viable," said Allison Hewitt,

director of the Office of Urban Opportunity, which administers Front Porch Florida.

"The residents know the problems better than the government does," Hewitt said in explaining the importance of technical support. "They also have some pretty good ideas about how to fix the problems. Our mission is to make sure they have the resources and the training to do it."

After being named a Front Porch community, Goldsboro residents must elect a board called the Governor's Revitalization Council, which will develop a Neighborhood

Action Plan. Most of that plan is already in place because Charles Rowe, Sanford's director of Community Development, has worked with residents to create a Goldsboro Master Plan.

The Office of Urban Opportunity was created by Gov. Bush in 1999. The office is charged with:

- Assisting communities in obtaining federal and state funding, other agencies and departments, and private and not-for-profit resources necessary to implement community Neighborhood Action Plans.
- Eliminating and consolidating bureaucracy, creating strate-

gic alliances and networks of community collaboration, and developing and forging better relationships between Front Porch communities and other community, corporate and faith-based organizations.

Program dollars initially could be allocated to Sanford for expenses such as: establishment as a 501(C) 3 organization, funding a local Front Porch Neighborhood coordinator or funding neighborhood planning meetings. Local governments would also be required to provide fiscal and technical assistance.

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Florida bass are growing larger

For many anglers, nothing can match the excitement of having a largemouth bass on the end of their line. The bigger the bass, the harder the fight. And according to a report from the Florida Freshwater Fisheries of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, the bass in Florida waters are growing larger.

The Commission said that during 1991 and 1992 bass fishing in Florida reached an all-time low point. Florida Sportsman Magazine recorded no bass weighing 10 pounds or more that was caught in any tournament during those years. Over some 197 competitions in 1992, the Florida Sportsman says the average bass size was 3.99 pounds. Compare that to the 7.49 pound average over 30 events which took place in the state during February, 2001.

One angler that realizes Florida bass are getting larger is Gary Bradford. Bradford reeled in a bass weighing just over 10 pounds at the Southern Pro Bass Trail Tournament on the St. Johns River. Bradford, however, ended the tournament as runner-up to Foy Underwood's 11.69 pound bass. Another bass fishermen, Dennis Dean, caught and released a 15-pound monster while fishing the Stick Marsh.

 first, the children think it's going to be like a 25-cent game. They learn quickly that it isn't."

This year's fifth-graders are the first Goldsboro students to plan and perform a mission since the Kids Space Center opened in February 2000. Future classes will begin learning the basics for the program in kindergarten, adding to their skills each year until their final mission in the fifth grade.

"The children are learning applications they will use in the future," Host said. "Most of them will probably go up to space one day."

"My generation saw JFK's dream of sending people to space become a reality," she said. "Now, people are up in space for days, even months, at a time. By the time these children reach my age, they will be living up there."

Goldsboro is the only public elementary school in the nation that includes a simulated Mission Control Center, space shuttle, lunar lander and lunar landscape. Through a Magnet School Assistance Program grant awarded to the Seminole County School District, the facility was constructed for \$400,000.

The students at Goldsboro probably think it was money well spent, especially fifth-grader Elizabeth Accurso, who wants eventually become an astronaut.

Accurso was the flight direc-

tor for a recent Mars simulation. As part of her job responsibilities, she had to make sure all went well during her mission.

 give it to the commission."

Eckstein said the city not only has invested significant funds at the airport, he pointed out that the city has budgetary oversight of the entire airport operations.

County begins plant a tree program

For an event observance, in memory of someone, in honor of an anniversary or particular individual, the Seminole County Parks and Recreation Department has a good suggestion - Plant a tree.

The plan is simple. A group, club or individual makes a donation of \$75 or more to the Seminole County Parks and Recreation Department. They, in turn, supply a tree with the root system of at least a 10 gallon size. Then, following discussions with the donors on the type of tree, location, and time of planting, an "event" is scheduled.

While the donor may suggest which county park, the Parks and Rec. Department will determine the location within the park where the planting will take place. Then, on an agreed upon date, donors and park officials gather and conduct the

planting ceremony.

Included with the tree will be a special memorial plaque, to be supplied by the county, approximately 10 by 12 inches in size.

The plaque may be used to mark a birthday, anniversary, to thank someone, salute a retiree, or in memory of a departed loved one. Wording on the plaque will require approval by the department.

According to Bob Chorvat with the Parks and Recreation Department, larger trees may also be purchased at additional cost. 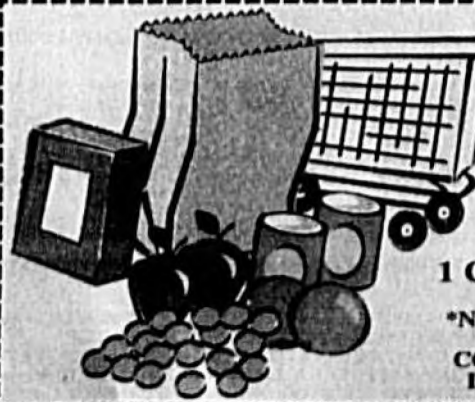


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Citrus trees adapt easily if appropriate care taken

Citrus trees adapt easily to a wide variety of cultural practices, soils, and landscape uses. The trees can be pruned into any desired shape and thus can play many roles in the landscape. There are a few basic items to remember when growing citrus. It is best if the tree is planted in a well-drained area as the citrus roots die if kept under water for an extended period of time. Sunlight is also important for good growth and fruit production.

year. If four applications are used per year, then 20 divided by four will make 5 pounds of fertilizer per application. Generally, the best place to determine the tree circumference is at the soil line of the trunk.

Fertilizer Distribution

Spread the fertilizer uniformly over the area from about 1 foot from the trunk to 3 feet past the "drip line" of the tree. If this area is also sodded with lawn grass, be sure to come back and fertilize the lawn or add about 25 percent to 50 percent more fertilizer for the lawn. It probably would be best to fertilize the lawn and the citrus as if the other was not present to assure proper amount for both lawn and citrus.

Weed Control

Citrus trees should be kept free of weeds and never mulched. Keep the weeds away from young trees in the 3-foot area around the trunk. For older trees, keep weeds out of the area under the canopy of the tree. Be very careful with any herbicide used around the tree and use only those herbicides that have no soil activity to be on the safe side.

Irrigation

During the spring, summer, and early fall, two applications of 3/4 to 1.0 inch of water per week should be adequate. At other times, irrigate only if the tree shows signs of wilt.

Pruning

The best time for pruning citrus trees is after the danger of freezing temperatures is over and just before the spring growth flush. Normally, pruning is done during the months of March through June.

Fertilization

Citrus trees need to be fertilized. They are heavy feeders and need adequate levels of fertilization in order to obtain adequate growth and production. The amount of fertilizer applied to a citrus tree depends on the size of the tree and how much fruit it produces. It is best to fertilize all citrus trees with a special citrus fertilizer that contains minor elements of magnesium, manganese, and boron. However, if such a fertilizer is not available, use a common 6-6-6 general fertilizer. As long as the mature leaves are healthy, showing a good deep green color and full size, continue with your program. Occasionally, the leaves will show yellow patterns. When this occurs, use a complete nutritional spray that can be found at most garden supply stores. It will generally contain zinc, manganese, and boron. Some will also contain copper.

Application Rates

The amount of fertilizer to use at each application can be determined by a simple method. Measure the tree circumference in inches at its greatest point near the soil level and divide that number by the number of applications per year (four applications suggested). For example, a tree measuring 20 inches in circumference needs 20 pounds of fertilizer per

Tour of bass lakes continues

This week we will look at Lake Tarpon and Lake Weohyakapka on our tour of the Top 10 bass fishing lakes in Florida according to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission.

LAKE TARPON

Lake Tarpon is a 2,500-acre lake near Tampa/St. Petersburg in Pinellas County.

For years, this lake has produced excellent bass fishing. Most fish range from 12 to 16 inches long, however, quality and trophy fish are also present in good numbers. Biologists have observed anglers catching upwards of 20 fish with an occasional 10-pounder.

Anglers are most successful flipping or pitching plastic worms along canal and bulrush edges. Offshore bass fishing is productive for anglers who fish around ledges, humps, coontail and eelgrass beds. Popular lures offshore include shad-imitating jigs, crankbaits, jerkbaits and topwater baits. Fishing wild shiners and live shad is also effective.

There are two public boat ramps within county parks. Anderson Park boat ramp is on the west shore, off U.S. 19 and Chestnut Park boat ramp is on the east side of the lake, off C.R. 611.

Some bank access is available in both parks. Boardwalks and piers serve as excellent fishing locations.

LAKE WEOHYAKAPKA

Lake Weohyakapka, commonly known as Lake Walk-in-Water, is a 7,532-acre lake, off S.R. 60 south of Orlando, east of Lake Wales.

The lake has a national reputation as an outstanding spot to catch largemouth bass. Anglers frequently catch up to 25 bass a day with several ranging from four to eight pounds.

Weohyakapka also produces many trophy bass exceeding 10 pounds each year. Last year, Walk-in-Water anglers entered 130 bass with a qualifying weight of eight pounds in the FWC's Big Catch Program.

A 15-to-24-inch slot limit regulation with a three-bass daily bag limit is in place to help maintain quality bass fishing. Anglers may keep three bass per day, either under or over the protected slot range, of which only one bass greater than or equal to 24 inches is allowed.

The best technique to catch trophy bass is to drift live wild shiners over hydrilla beds in the northern half of the lake. Hydrilla can pop up anywhere in the lake, so time spent looking for smaller, lesser known pockets may be rewarding. Jerkbait, lipless rattling crankbaits, and plastic worms also produce bass in the offshore hydrilla.

Topwater lures are productive, particularly chuggers or walk-the-dog type baits. Although topwater baits catch fish throughout the year, summer months offer the best action when schools of bass roam deep-water areas. Flipping soft plastic baits in the bulrush and behind cattails in the northern and eastern areas of the lake also works well January through March. This technique is effective for smaller bass, but the larger females spend the majority of the

Will it be the Rams team that rallied from a 2-0 deficit in the late innings to beat Apopka, 5-2?

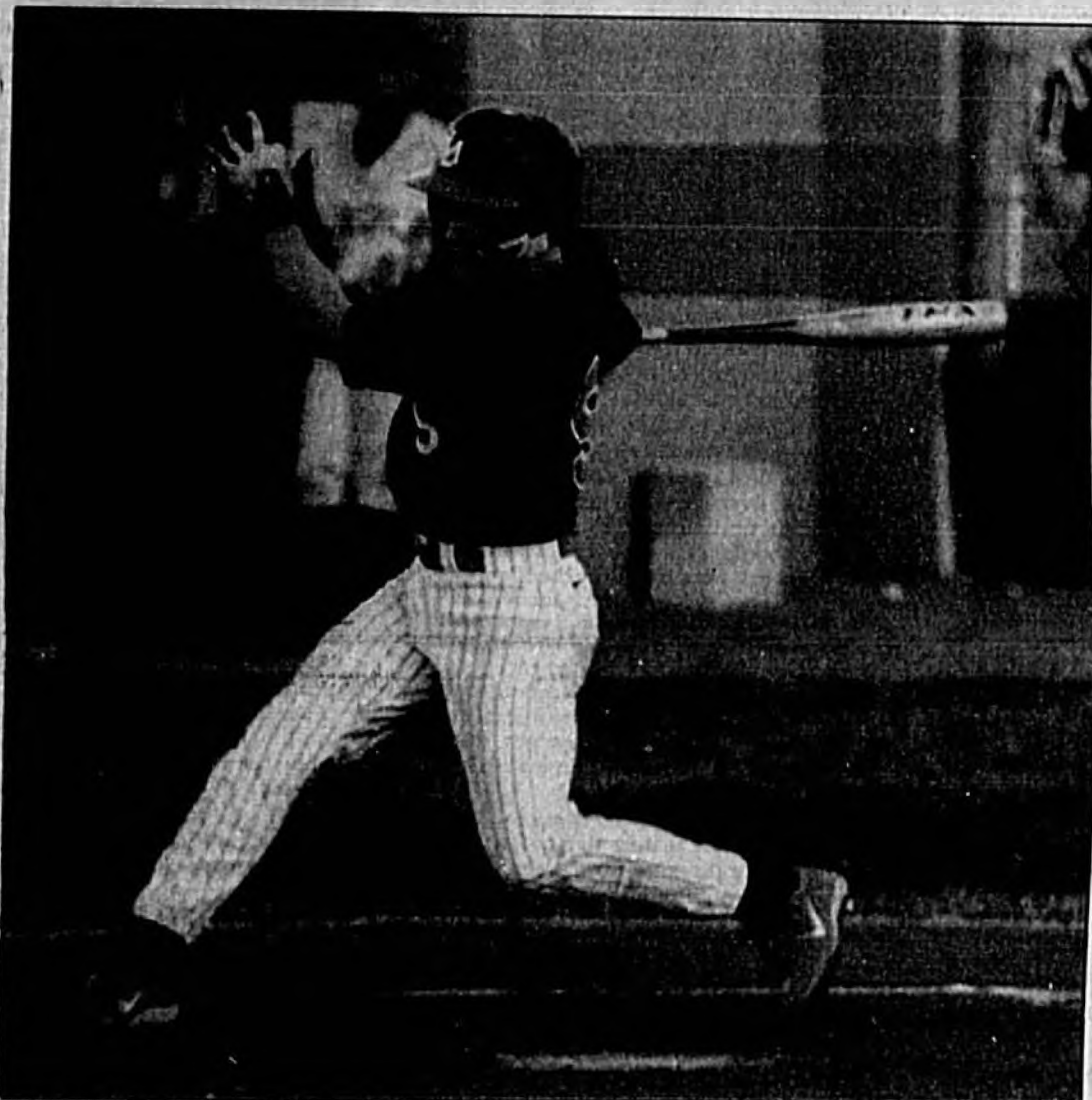
Will it be the Lake Mary squad that got off to a fast start, then used outstanding relief pitching to hold off Lincoln, 5-4?

Seminole County anglers to compete in Wolfson benefit

SANFORD — Once again it's time for Seminole County anglers to gear-up and head north down the St. Johns River to Palatka City Riverfront for the Wolfson Children's Hospital Bass Tournament, the largest one-day bass tournament east of the Mississippi River.

In its 12th year, the huge benefit tournament launched a record 597 boats in last year's event, and looks to break the 600 mark at this year's tournament Saturday, May 19.

With an available \$75,000 in cash prizes and \$37,000 guaranteed in cash prizes, Seminole anglers will be fishing hard to bring home a piece of the Wolfson pie.

First place pays \$10,000 and trophies to the winning team. A \$5,000 check will be written to the team with the largest bass, with \$1,000 going to each team with the second and third largest bass.

Tournament officials will select ounce weights, to be sealed in envelopes. If the largest bass ounce-weight matches the selected weight, the team will win an additional \$15,000. If the second largest fish ounce-weight matches its selected

weight it will pay an additional \$10,000.

Sanford's Frank Dodson and Wayne Russell, who have fished the Wolfson every year for 11 years, have pre-fished areas near Palatka and plan to make a second trip to scout the river for the elusive largemouth bass.

Dodson, a transportation manager, said he and Russell experienced a heartbreaker last year at the Wolfson, losing their three largest fish at the weigh-in dock. "We had the limit of seven fish," said Dodson. "I had four fish in one plastic bag and Wayne had our largest three in another bag."

"As Wayne stepped on to the dock, the bottom of his bag burst and the fish went into the water between the boat and the dock. We were in shock," said Dodson. "The three fish weighed close to 13 pounds. We had second place for sure, and ended up in 55th with 10.92 pounds."

"But that's fishing," laughed Dodson. "We will be better prepared this year. Wayne and I don't miss a Wolfson. It is a great tournament and the proceeds go to a worthy cause, the Children's Hospital."

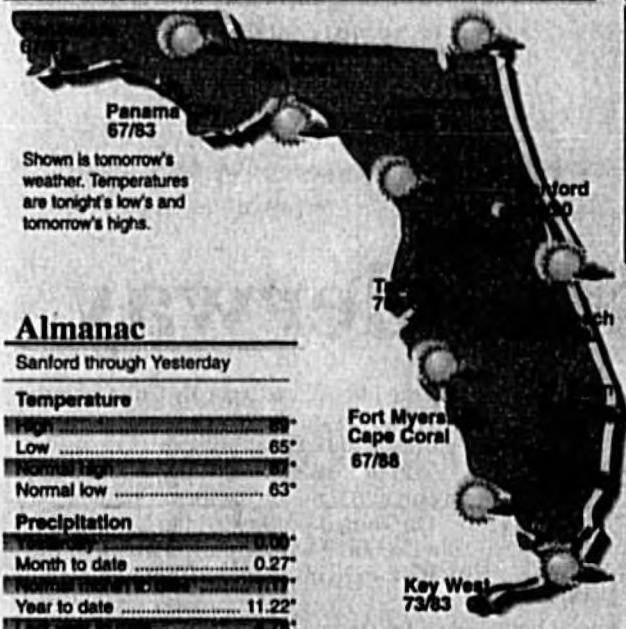

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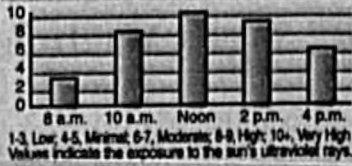

and we know where all the money goes. The hospital is there for everyone's children, not just Jacksonville residents," said Dodson.

Seminole County Professional B.A.S.S. angler Charlie Youngers of Oviedo will be fishing the Wolfson with his brother John. SUPE'S SCOOP

Big bass prefer large meals. It is also a matter of energy conservation. Heavyweight bass would rather chase down one large meal rather than expend a great deal of energy running down many small tidbits.

FISHING FORECAST

Snook, redfish, trout, and flounder are all biting at Sebastian. Live bait works best, and live shrimp and finger mullet are hard to beat. Live shrimp worked slowly along with a bare leadhead jig is also effective.

River action continues to be good. The mild spring, coupled with low water levels, makes bass active and easy to locate. River bass are still bunched up, and can be found in deep bends, slough and creek mouths, and sand bars. Bream and catfish are also active in the deep bends.
Captain Jack at Port

Canaveral reports that exceptionally high seas have kept boats in Port. It will be a while before the huge ground seas subside. Inside the Port, look for the usual sheepshead and flounder. Trout and redfish are fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers.
