Important Subject Faces Truce Group, Communists Claim

Crisis Session May Determine Peace Fate

MUNSAN — The Communists said Friday night they have "an important subject" to discuss with the Red and Allied truce negotiators meet Saturday in a full dress crisis session that may determine the fate of an armistice. The subject was the only one mentioned by the Red request for a meeting at 11 to a Saturday at 11 a. m.

The Red negotiators and the negotiators might approve final truce details or that the Red would protest President Truman's release of about 20,000 anti-Communist prisoners.

The Red comment came in a Chinese language broadcast by the official Peiping radio heard in Tokyo. It said Gen. Nam Il, chief Red delegate, called the meeting because the Communists "have an important subject to discuss" with the U. S. and South Korea of collaborating to free the prisoners.

The armistice draft appears ready for signature by the Chinese, English and Korean translations are approved.

Observers predicted the armistice agreement probably would not be signed until after the truce, but they feared trouble later when the Allies must account for and hand over Red prisoners.

Meanwhile, the Red made public a letter he wrote President Eisenhower Wednesday in which he apparently rejected Eisenhower's offer of economic and military aid and a promise to negotiate a security pact if South Korea would accept a truce.

They pleaded with Eisenhower to find some other answer than a "death warrant" armistice.

He accused the U. S. and the U. N. of backing down on early war objectives of "a united, independent and democratic Korea and the punishment of the aggressors."

Tough Soviet Policy Ushers End To Strike

Workers In Berlin Begin Return To Jobs

BERLIN — Tough Soviet martial law apparently cracked workers' resistance in East Berlin today and men began returning to their jobs for the first time since Wednesday's bloody revolt against the Communist government.

A Soviet machinegun barrier divided the tense Eastern sector of Berlin from the West and a semi-blaze of normal traffic of workers could be seen from the frontier.

West Berlin track driver by Ernst Heiler appealed for top level Allied meetings with the Russians to free the Soviet sector from the iron grip of Red army troops.

The United States, Britain and France have already demanded that the Russians end their blockade of the Eastern sector. The Western powers condemned the execution yesterday of a jobless West Berlin track driver by a Soviet firing squad as "an act of brutality which will shock the conscience of the world."

As the East German Communist government broadcast frantic appeals for support from their people embittered by the years of dictatorial Red rule, there were these additional developments:

The Americans turned back to the Soviet sector Otto Nuschke, East German deputy premier who was kicked into the Western zone by rioters and held for two days. Bishop Otto Dibelius, head of the Protestant church for all Germany, appealed to Soviet high commissioner Vladimir Semenov to listen to complaints of workers in the East. Their resentment against Communist pressure of more work without adequate pay was an immediate cause of Wednesday's rioting.

In West Berlin all flags were lowered to half staff for the victims of the rioting. A numbering more than a score. A full day of mourning was planned for next Monday.

The American radio station RIAS advised the Soviet zone residents to avoid clashes with Soviet troops, saying violence would force the Russians to back up the Communist Government in the long run.

Reuters spoke in Moscow after a meeting with the Allied commandants. He said they were in general agreement with his views. He said he asked the Western Allies to request the Russians on the high commission level with demands for lifting the state of siege imposed on 1,000,000 East Berliners, the reestablishment of normal living conditions and permission for free unhindered traffic between both parts of divided Berlin.

He said he discussed also a new proposal for free elections throughout Berlin as an initial step toward German unity.

One indication that the Russians planned to quicken their pace of restoring martial law was the action restoring ration cards to 10,000 West and now cannot pass through Red army lines. The cards had been cancelled six weeks ago.

Communist broadcasts continued to blame the riots on "Western agents" and a Moscow broadcast today said "certain of the provocateurs who were arrested have been brought to justice." This could mean that there have been more executions than the one announced yesterday by the East Berlin Reds.

Chairman Langer (R., Pa.) of the Senate Judiciary Committee ordered Warren out of the witness chair after he criticized another witness, Mrs. Wesley Garrison, who testified Thursday in opposition to confirmation of Gurnea.

Warren said that there were a number of witnesses appearing here who represented themselves to be crusaders for the Republican Party in Florida.

He continued that among the "leaders" were Mr. and Mrs. Garrison who are "an effect what we call in the Southern district of Florida tax sharks, inasmuch as the Garrisons have amassed a rather considerable fortune from purchasing of tax warrants and tax deeds."

Langer interrupted him at this point.

- (1) That the bond election held in general election day was legal.
- (2) That the petitioner has the power to provide payment of principal and interest on bonds secured interest as redemption price of the bonds.
- (3) That a three mill levy based on the assessed valuation of 1952 will yield an annual return of 48.32 percent.
- (4) That payment of principal and interest shall be first, prior and paramount to all other claims in the sinking fund.
- (5) In the event three mills or higher rate is insufficient, that the bondholders have first priority and paramount lien on proceeds of all taxes levied.

County Attorney Lloyd F. Boyle said within time limits for appeals on both sides, the Supreme Court should have the case by between July 15 and 20. The Seminole County bond issue is one of the largest in the state.

Before the County can issue its \$300,000 worth of bonds for the hospital, the State Supreme Court must rule that the County has the right to do it. The County is according to the County Attorney is a formality to insure the value of the bonds on the market.

Florida Witness Receives Verbal Spank By Langer

WASHINGTON — Edward Warren, chairman of one of the two rival Republican executive committees in Duval County, Fla., was summarily dismissed as a witness today in a Senate hearing on the nomination of James L. Gurnea in Miami, to be U. S. Attorney for Southern Florida.

Chairman Langer (R., Pa.) of the Senate Judiciary Committee ordered Warren out of the witness chair after he criticized another witness, Mrs. Wesley Garrison, who testified Thursday in opposition to confirmation of Gurnea.

Warren said that there were a number of witnesses appearing here who represented themselves to be crusaders for the Republican Party in Florida.

He continued that among the "leaders" were Mr. and Mrs. Garrison who are "an effect what we call in the Southern district of Florida tax sharks, inasmuch as the Garrisons have amassed a rather considerable fortune from purchasing of tax warrants and tax deeds."

Langer interrupted him at this point.

Communist broadcasts continued to blame the riots on "Western agents" and a Moscow broadcast today said "certain of the provocateurs who were arrested have been brought to justice." This could mean that there have been more executions than the one announced yesterday by the East Berlin Reds.

COUNTY AGENTS' COLUMN

By C. R. DAWSON

This column is scheduled to appear every Friday in the Sanford Herald. Its purpose is to put forth information, useful and interesting to the farmer. There will be announcements and notices of meetings, reports on meetings, reference material, "timely topics," "hints and kinks," reports of new gadgets and perhaps a joke now and then.

We will try for interesting reading, leaving out the flowery language and promise to use no 50-cent words.

Sometimes we will be tempted to give a news item from some other county, such as the recent formation of the Florida Sheep Association. Hounds funny in Florida, but the sheep of the Manatee breed have done well on some Walton County farms. Farmers who do not have enough acreage for cattle can raise some sheep as an additional source of income.

Or another item, to show the interest in scabiosis and hairy root in the lower crops, we learn that 16 Broward County farmers recently bought 16 tons of these seeds for planting in vegetable fields.

This column will not attempt full coverage. Any suggestions from readers will be appreciated.

The following letter from C. M. Gay, comptroller of the State of Florida is of interest to farmers: "You are no doubt aware that the Florida legislature enacted a law providing a refund of four cents of the seven cents gas tax to farmers when fuel is used for agricultural purposes and to fishermen when fuel is used for commercial fishing purposes, exclusive of motor vehicle use."

"Since your position as county agent places you in direct contact with the farmers of your county, your assistance in bringing the provisions of the law to the attention of the farmers will be a great benefit to this office. I would like to ask that you lend your fine spirit of cooperation to this end."

"The law takes effect August 5 and it is our hope to have the applications for the refund permits and the rules and regulations ready for distribution on or before July 1."

"It is my thought to furnish you with a supply of these applications for permits and rules and regulations so you would have them to supply requests in your county."

"If you think it would be advantageous for you to call a meeting of the farmers of your county, a representative of this office could possibly be present at the meeting to outline the law and make a full discussion of it. Since a number of such meetings are expected, if you desire such a meeting, please advise and an agreeable date can be fixed."

"One of the features of the law which I think should be made plain is that the maximum refund provided in a calendar year is \$500,000, and it is anticipated that the refund claims will far exceed this \$500,000. In this case, the law provides that refund claims be reduced to a proportionate percentage basis for payments which would result in an applicant receiving less than his full claim. In fairness to the applicant, I feel that I should mention these possibilities before they advance their permit fee of \$2.00."

"If you will be so kind as to help us, I would like to hear from you and will furnish you with the forms as soon as they are available."

Since Ole King Celery has turned out to be a pretty good wrestler and has thrown some of our boys plumb out of the ring, they are turning to some of the minor crops, such as cantaloupe. Georgia 47 and Smiths Perfect are two good eating varieties. And if you care to put some of these by for winter eating be sure to select fully matured melons, but not overripe. Wash the melon and cut in halves, remove seeds, peel and cut in uniform cubes. Pack the cubes gently into freezer cartons, covered with a cold syrup made with 2 cups of sugar to 1 cup of water. Chill before using.

If everyone in Seminole County who normally likes cantaloupe either fresh or frozen knew how good this locally grown product is, there would be no need to worry over how to ship to distant markets. All we can grow would find a home right here at home.

Property Owners Notified Regarding Building Ordinance

The City Manager's office today sent out a notice to property owners, contractors, and sub-contractors, stating that due to the necessity for more rigid enforcement of the City Zoning, Building, Plumbing and Electrical Ordinances, the Building Department serves notice that in the future the pertinent ordinances will be strictly enforced.

John M. Gillon, department head, listed the following laws which must be complied with:

Section 141. Southern Standard Building Code
(a) Any owner, authorized agent, or contractor who desires to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, demolish, or change the occupancy of a building or structure, or to erect, or construct a new building or structure, or to install or alter any fire extinguishing apparatus, elevators, engines, or heaters, incinerator, or other heat producing apparatus, or appliances, the installation of which is regulated by this code, or to cause any such work to be done, shall first make application to the building inspector and obtain the required permit therefor.

No plumbing or wiring shall be covered until inspection has been made and a notice posted for electrical work in fuse panel, chandelier, or other place on the outside of any new construction or addition.

Section 47. Water Supply Code
A main shut off, on each water supply line, shall be provided near the curb. Accessible stop and waste cocks or valve and blowers shall be provided on the main supply line, just inside or outside the foundation wall of a building.

Section 174. Covering of Work
No drainage or plumbing system or part thereof shall be covered until it has been inspected, tested, and approved.

Section 202. Misuse of Certificate
Transfer of Certificates Forbidden
No Master Plumber shall send any person on any job requiring a license, in the capacity of a plumber without such person being in possession of a certificate issued by the Board of Plumbing Commissioners of the City of Sanford, Florida.

Section 5. Ordinance No. 274
(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, not a Certified Electrician in accordance with the provisions of the Ordinance, to do any electrical construction, or make repairs, alterations, additions or changes to any existing system of electrical wiring, apparatus or equipment for light, heat or power within the limits of the City of Sanford.

Health Services Will Be Cut Due To Fund Slashes

JACKSONVILLE (AP)—Dr. Wilton T. Sowder, state health officer, says some public health services will be cut because of reduction in funds from federal and other sources.

The Legislature increased appropriations for the State Board of Health substantially, he told the board Thursday, but the principal increases were for county health departments, mosquito control and mental health.

One and a half million dollars was set aside for mosquito control. However, the appropriation of \$1,200,000 for general operations, a gain of \$126,000 over last year, was "insufficient to compensate for loss of revenue from other sources," he said.

Dr. Sowder explained federal funds were reduced from \$833,000 to \$385,000 and added the board also faces loss of emergency funds for enforcement of narcotic laws.

and anticipated loss of funds from private industry for stream pollution research and control and funds formerly contributed by Franklin County toward operation of the marine biology laboratory at Apalachicola.

He said: "The effect of the reductions will be to reduce the personnel and work of every program carried on by the State Board of Health, except those for which special funds were provided."

The board approved elimination of 34 positions and fund-slashes for tuberculosis control, sanitary engineering, bureau of laboratories, cancer control program, and field training center at Gainesville. The cuts ranged from \$12,000 to \$17,000.

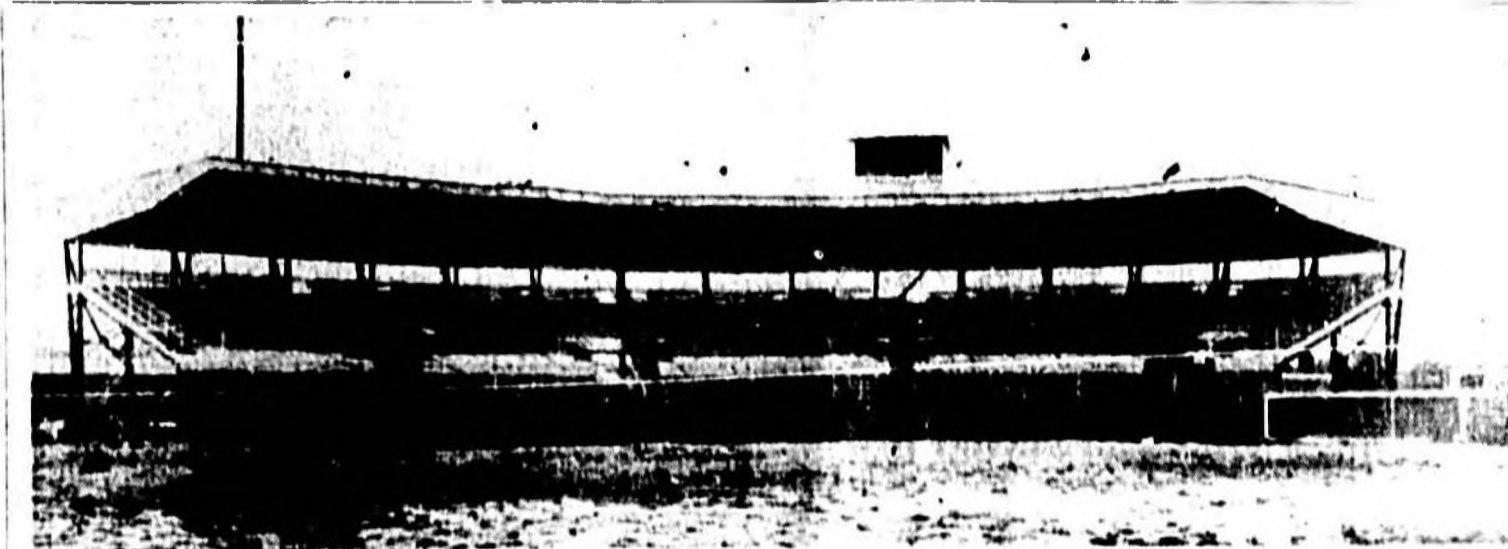

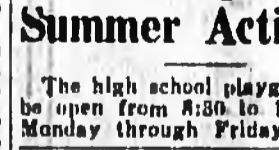
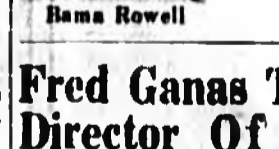
