The first heavy snow storm of the year swirled through the mountains of northern California, southern Idaho and Utah early today.

The weather bureau said the winter harbinger created "near blizzard" conditions in High Sierras of California. Warnings were issued for stockmen, motorists and hunters at high elevations in the three states.

The storm snowed out dedication ceremonies for a new all-weather highway across Donner Summit in California Sunday. Officials heading to the 7,200 foot high pass were stalled for several hours in the storm and few of them made it to ceremonies hastily called at a lower elevation.

Donner Summit was named for a party of 30 westbound settlers who were trapped in the pass by an early snow storm 120 years ago. Nearly half of them starved to death during the winter.

Light rain fell early today from the Pacific Northwest across the Great Lakes and temperatures ranged from 29 degrees at Old Town in south-east Maine to 73 at Orlando, Fla.

Security Criticized In Raid On U. S. Base

SAIGON (UPI) — Communist guerrillas using old American-made mortar shells destroyed or damaged 21 American B57 atom bombers Sunday in the worst single blow to the United States in three years of helping fight the Vietnamese war.

Four Americans and two Vietnamese were killed. Thirty-one Americans and five Vietnamese were wounded. A fifth American was killed a few hours later in a separate mortar raid seven miles away.

The raiders slipped away, apparently without suffering any casualties. An organized chase for them by three air-supported battalions ended at dawn today. U. S. officers estimated that as few as nine of them could have carried out the raid.

Both American and Vietnamese officers were critical of security precautions in what was coming to be called a "Little Pearl Harbor."

The B57s were parked on the air field at Ben Hoa, only 12 miles north of Saigon in an area thick with Communist Viet Cong.

U. S. officials refused to estimate the damage in dollars. The twin-jet B57s cost \$1.25 million apiece. Sunday, look "major" damage and several B57s were destroyed, eight on were slightly damaged.

13 Amendments Explained By Sen. Cleveland

Details of the proposed 13 amendments to the Florida Constitution were explained to members of the Seminole County Farm Bureau by Sen. Mack Cleveland, Jr., at the annual meeting of the association Friday.

Sen. Cleveland also officiated at the dedication of the new \$21,000 Farm Bureau Building on Hwy 17-92 south. He was joined in the ribbon-cutting ceremonies by Bureau President Joe Baker.

Approximately 275 members and guests enjoyed a beef and pork barbecue with all the trimmings as they officially opened the new building, which was paid for by bonds purchased by 76 members of the Bureau.

During the business meeting, 4-H leaders Miss Cathy Cammack and Bill Hine were presented with the 4-H Key Award of the Year by County Agricultural Agent, Cecil Tucker.

Sen. Cleveland, in outlining the meaning of the 13 proposed constitutional amendments, noted that two of them, number three and number 13 have been most controversial.

He urged a "yes" vote for number three which deals with allowing the principle as well as the interest of the state school fund to be used.

Cleveland noted that Seminole County is in a primary position to be approved next year for a new junior college but that with the uncertainty of the re-apportionment problem, Seminole County may not have a senator of their own after the 1965 legislative meets.

"We are well qualified right now to obtain this college — it is not necessary to even wait for a feasibility study, and we hope that the 1965 legislature will give us the go-ahead on this most important project," he pointed out.

On proposed amendment 13, involving homestead exemption in Sarasota County, Sen. Cleveland suggested a "no" vote, saying that "this is a foot in the door to eventually losing our homestead exemption."

The amendment provides that the first \$2,000 of assessed valuation in Sarasota County be taxable for school purposes only and that the next \$3,000 shall be exempt.

"We need money for schools, but I think we can find it somewhere else and leave our homestead exemption alone," Cleveland said. He suggested a "yes" vote on all the other proposed amendments.

This statistical information from Albert comes at a time when the Seminole County United Fund campaign for 1964 is at the half-way mark. For this reason it is interesting to see that Scout growth is limited, primarily, by the funds available for maintaining facilities and what appears to be an obvious need—increasing the professional staff.

The demand for Boy Scouting exists. The geographical and climatical appeals of the county promote its growth. More and more families are coming here to live, and the positive effect of Boy Scouting is no longer a debatable question.

In a report submitted to the United Fund last July, it was pointed out that Seminole County District had 1,292 boys, 278 volunteer leaders, two full-time professional executives and one camp ranger. Now there are more scouts.

And it is on the climate, the population growth and the practical use that the Scout skills give the boys in the county that the Scout executive blames the happy fact that already the 1965 camping dates for La-No'-Che are filled with only six openings left.

During the past year Seminole County scouts have earned 1,400 merit badges, 1,718 boys have enjoyed at least one weekend of outdoor camping experience, 250 youngsters earned canoeing merit badges and 275 earned swimming merit badges.

Here is another Albert statistic: With 600 boys meeting at least once-a-week there are 2,400 opportunities for them to learn life-saving techniques every month. Attendance records show that a breakdown of Boy Scouts by class indicates 18 per cent of the 9-10 year boys enter Cub scouting, 34 per cent of the 11-14 year olds are in the regular scout program and five per cent of the 14-17 year olds continue their active interest.

Probe Launched Into Death Of U. S. Astronaut

HOUSTON (UPI) — A space center investigative team worked today to discover what caused the airplane crash Saturday that killed U. S. astronaut Theodore C. Freeman, a quiet man who dreamed of going to the moon.

The 34-year-old pilot's T-38 twin-jet trainer crashed into an oil field, two miles short of a safe runway. An autopsy Sunday showed Freeman died of a skull fracture and severe chest injuries.

The slender astronaut's body was found about 100 yards from the wreckage. The partially opened parachute and the ejection seat he used showed that he tried to escape the plane before it plowed into the ground.

There was increased speculation Sunday that his jet, one of 15 the nation's 29 astronauts use, hit a flock of low-flying birds as Freeman sped toward a landing at Ellington Air Force Base south of Houston.

Astronaut Donald K. (Deke) Slayton set up the investigative board, which is headed by Joseph Aigrant, the chief pilot of the federal space agency's Manned Spacecraft Center.

Debris from the crash was removed Sunday to a hangar at Ellington, where the team will try to reconstruct the 66-foot-long jet.



Editor, Herald: Dear Sir: Florida voters on Election Day will make a choice which vitally affects the college education of their children and the future welfare of our State. We refer to the Board of Regents Amendment (No. 2) to the State Constitution. Dr. Ralph McDonald, in the study of higher education in Florida, made in 1963, stressed that "in no other state does the state's governing board for its higher education system... have such weak status in government, such an uncertain role of leadership... such fluid membership... as is found in Florida." He also felt by faculty and students in our universities, of minimizing the influence of politics on higher education. Approval of Amendment Two will permit members of the board governing our public universities to be appointed for staggered terms of nine years rather than the current four. After the initial appointments, a vacancy for one board member would be filled each year. It usually takes a governing board member several years to become fully acquainted with the special nature of higher education problems. In recognition of this, four-fifths of the states have terms of tenure for periods longer than four years. For example, Regents of the University of California are appointed for terms of 10 years. The University of California and other institutions of higher education in which board members serve for long terms and political control is at a minimum have attained a peak of academic excellence. Let us strive for a similar goal in Florida. Those who favor achieving a superior system of higher education in Florida are encouraged to vote for Amendment Two. Movies Catch Plump Children Inactive

BOSTON, Mass. (UPI)—Dr. Jean Mayer, Harvard University nutritionist, has on hand a film that shows to some extent why plump boys and girls are that way.

Dr. Mayer and some camera-wielding associates took 29,000 filmstrips of children swimming, playing tennis and volleyball. The pictures showed why conventional exercise programs don't help overweight youngsters just stood around.

During swimming sessions, Dr. Mayer reported that the overweight youngsters just stood in the water talking.

He said these children were photographed totally motionless 72 per cent of the time. Meanwhile, normal weight children were active in the water more than three quarters of the time.

A report on the research project, supported by the Health, Education and Welfare Department (HEW), showed that studies of the youngsters' attitudes followed those of ethnic or racial minorities.

As victims of prejudice, it was reported, the obese adolescents were subjected to a heavy burden of self blame and had intense feelings of inferiority.

This led the Harvard investigator to conclude that it might be easier to get plump children more interested in physical exertion if they did not have to compete with normal youngsters.

Dr. Mayer said the weight-reduction program under study is designed to help the youngsters develop a feeling of pride in themselves. Attention to dress and good grooming is being stressed also.

It had a sort of litany that went like this: "For the want of the nail, the shoe was lost. For the want of the shoe, the horse was lost. For the want of the horse, the rider was lost. For the want of the rider, the message was lost. For the want of the message, the battle was lost." And so on.

This story illustrates what might be called the accidental or incidental theory of history

Which is the theory that great events result more from chance happenings than from grand designs.

Modern Example
A more modern example of the accidental-incidental concept can be found in a newsletter put out this week by Rep. Frank Thompson Jr. (D. N. J.)

Thompson sets forth the thesis that the nomination of this year's presidential candidates came about because of a home-made ballot cast 121 years ago by an Indiana farm hand named Henry Shoemaker.

"In 1843, Mr. Shoemaker's home-made ballot was ruled valid by election officials," Thompson wrote. "It broke a tie and elected one Madison Marsh to the Indiana State legislature."

"In those days, United States senators were elected by the respective state legislatures. That year, the Indiana legislature deadlocked the five ballots in trying to elect a United States senator.

Delegates Switches
"Delegates Marsh, who had been elected by a margin of one vote, switched on the sixth ballot, broke the tie and thus elected Edward A. Hannegan to the U. S. Senate."

"Two years later, Congress voted on the admittance of Texas to the union. The House was for it, but the Senate deadlocked 26 to 26. Senator Hannegan switched his vote, broke the tie and Texas became a state."

In 1846, Thompson continued, the Senate deadlocked again, this time over declaring war

on Mexico. Once again Hannegan cast the deciding vote. And from that war the United States acquired the territory from which came the state of Arizona.

Had it not been for Shoemaker's vote, which sent Marsh to the Indiana legislature, Marsh could not have voted for Hannegan, and Hannegan could not have cast the votes that led to Texas and Arizona joining the union.

And if those two states had not joined the union, Lyndon B. Johnson and Barry M. Goldwater could not have been nominated for the presidency this year.

Thompson says the moral of this story is: "Go to the polls. Each and every vote counts!" Yes, indeed. And also be sure to visit your blacksmith for regular checkups.

Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

It should encourage all readers when they see how many errors the best players in the world make in the stress of tough competition.

In the match between Poland and Ireland at the World Bridge Olympiad, the bidding went the same at both tables and both West players opened the king of diamonds. Each East dropped the deuce in order to discourage a diamond continuation. Both Wests thought for a while, then shifted to the six of spades. So far the bidding and play had been identical, but at his point the Irish declarer played dummy's queen of spades. The Polish declarer did not play

spade. The queen of spades play turned out to be fatal to the Irish cause. East won with the ace and returned the suit. This gave the defense two spade tricks and two diamond tricks. The low spade played by Wisniewski of Poland also forced East's ace and had East not led back a diamond, Wisniewski would have made five odd. As it was, he did score the game. It is easy enough for us to see the low spade play was correct. It also should have been fairly easy at the table. Few players lead away from an ace against a suit or act when they are looking at king-queen in dummy.

Any kind of synthetic brush is extremely bad for dry hair. 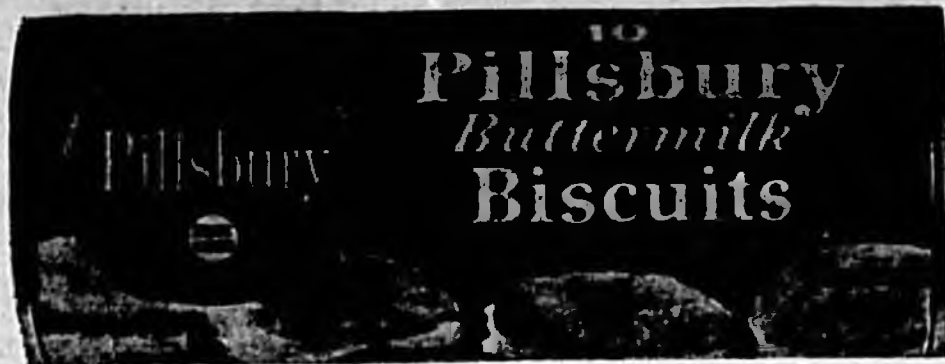
How much latitude parents should grant their offspring is a question as old as people, I'm sure. I don't know that there is one pat answer.

Making a home an attractive, yet respected, place to gather takes a good deal of finesse.

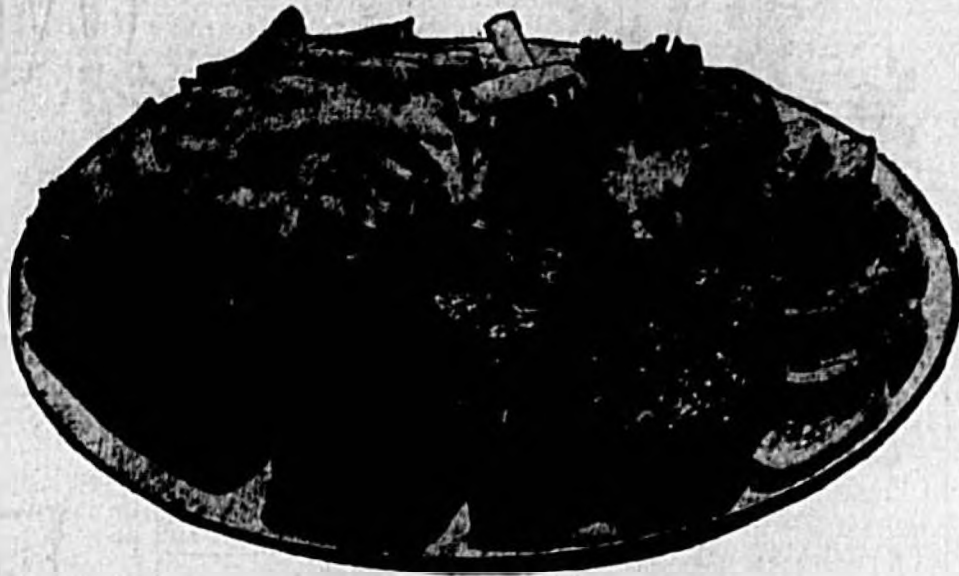

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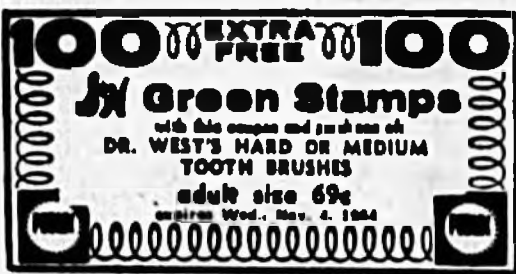

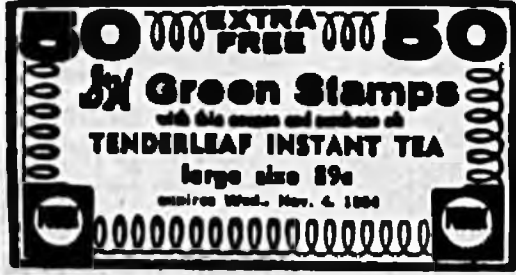
