



Into Death Of **U. S. Astronaut**

HOUSTON (UPI) - A spec center investigative team worked today to discover what caused the airplane crash Saturday that killed U. S. astroa naut Theodore C. Freeman, a quiet man who dreamed of soing to the moon.

The 34-year-old pilot's T36 twin-jet trainer crashed into an oil field, two miles short of a safe runway. An autopey Sunday showed Freeman died of a skull fracture and severe chest injuries.

The slender astronaut's body was found about 100 yards from the wreckage. The partially opened parachute and the ejection seat he used showed that he tried to escape the plane before it plowed into the ground.

There was increased specula tion Sunday that his jet, one of 15 the nation's 29 astronauts use, hit a flock of low-flying birds as Freeman eped toward a landing at Ellington Air Force Base south of Hous-

Astronaut Donald K. (Deke) Slayton set up the investigative board, which is headed by Joseph Algranti, the chief pilot Manned Spacecraft Center. Debris from the crash was removed Sunday to a hangar at Ellington, where the team will try to reconstruct the 46foot-long jet.

Approve Amendment 5

When Florida voters go to the polls Tuesday they must make one decision that could have a far reaching and direct effect on Seminole County's educational system.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment Five, if passed, would permit school systems in seven counties, ineluding Seminole, to have local option elections to determine if the people want to continue electing superintendents or give boards of public instruction authority to appoint them.

For many years Seminole, like other Florida counties, has elected school superintendents. The philosophy was based on the superintendent providing the leadership and an elected school board to approve or disapprove the superintendent's recommendations.

But times and circumstances change and so has the philosophy of administering education.

Today the men elected to serve on school boards provide much of the leadership needed by a system and superintendents, more than ever now administrative officers and secretaries, of boards, see that policies are carried out within the boundaries established by the State Board of Education.

Today's situation does not call for a superintendent to have to run politically for the office. No matter what his platform might be, he couldn't put it into effect if he wanted unless it met state standards and was

proved by the school board. So why, The Herald asks, should the position of school superintendent be based on a popularity contest at the polls?

The Herald is convinced beyond a shadow of a doubt that the time has arrived when an elected school board should remove the superintendent's position from the political arena and have the right and responsibility to appoint the best qualified man for the post.

We, therefore, have concluded that Amendment Five should be approv-

To avoid misunderstanding, The Herald points out that approval of this amendment does not mean that Seminole County would have an appointive superintendent overnight.

If this proposition passes, a mafority of school board members must call a local option election. The question would be settled by a county referendum.

If the voters approve, the school board would be in a position to appoint a superintendent. But they could not do it until the present superintendent completes the four-year term of office he will begin Jan. 1, 1965 and completes Dec. 31, 1969.

At that time the county school board could retain the present superintendent on an appointive basis or select someone else, perhaps an outof-county man, even from another state. It would be up to the board to "manage" Seminole's education pro-

The Herald believes that in the interest of better school auministration in the years to come the voters should give this measure their approval.

Trial Recommended

The Sanford Herald enthusiastically endorses the effort to be made Monday night by the Sanford Merchants Association to persuade the City Commission to authorize the covering of parking meters except those in metered parking lots - for a 90-day trial period.

Of course, the recommendation does not mean that the public will have unlimited parking. The Association is suggesting that a two-hour parking limit be enforced and that fines for overtime parking be increased from 25 to 50 cents.

Due to the changes in shopping habits by consumers, brought about principally by the advent of shopping centers which provide free and unlimited parking for their customers, The Herald is of the opinion that parking meters in the downtown shopping area are now completely outdated.





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
