SEVILLE, Spain (UPI)—Children in the isolated outback areas of southern Spain peered anxiously into the sky today, awaiting the appearance of Santa Claus.

Not for them, a whiskered fat old merry chimney climber on a sleigh pulled by eight tiny reindeer. Their Santa is a U. S. Air Force pilot from the Strategic Air Command's 16th Air Force.

He is Capt. Jack H. Capers, of Apple Valley, Calif., and the drone of his L-20 light plane is more musical to the children's ears than the ringing of sleigh bells.

It all began back in early 1958 when Capers was patrolling the fuel pipeline running from U. S. bases near Seville to Rota in the south.

### Philly Water Becomes Tasty

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—Philadelphia can now offer strangers a drink of water without apologizing.

No more will this city be famous, or infamous, for the strong chlorine taste of its water.

The city recently started getting water through a 25-million-dollar filtration plant which has been described as the world's largest automatically controlled water treatment facility.

In the past, a big dose of chlorine was necessary to make water from the Delaware and Schuylkill Rivers safe to drink. Now, Water Commissioner Samuel S. Baxter says Philadelphia has "the best drinking water of any city in the country."

The new Torresdale plant, with a capacity of 423 million gallons daily, is the major unit of a 30-million-dollar program to modernize Philadelphia's water purification facilities.

## Growers Cautioned On Pesticide

County Agent Cecil Tucker today warned celery growers in the area to take proper precautions when applying pesticide on crops.

Tucker said he had heard reports that the Food and Drug Administration recently seized a "number of shipments" of celery produced by a Florida grower who used too much pesticide on his crop.

Tucker urged all growers who use chemicals like Parathion, not

to apply them within seven days of harvest.

He said that a meeting is planned early next month of all celery growers in the county to advise them of exact precautions to take when applying chemicals to celery crops before harvest.

Tucker said that no Seminole County celery grower has been involved in the FDA action, but warned that the agency is "crack-

ing down" because of the recent cranberry menace.

Some 1,500 acres of celery are nearly ready for shipment in the county, according to Tucker.

United Press International reported that FDA chief George P. Larrick said his agency had another case in which a lettuce grower left too much pesticide on his crops "and we're seizing them through the federal courts."

He cited the cases in an effort to show that some producers re-

fuse, or fail, to follow directions given by manufacturers or the government for use of pesticides, some of which have caused cancer in animals in laboratory tests.

Larrick said that the government normally tries to cope with such problems through educational programs, "by letting people know what's expected of them."

But if that doesn't work, he said it can institute seizure or bring criminal prosecutions and "we expect to use all of those."

## Project Appraisers To Be Named

The State Road Dept. takes another step toward getting land for use in widening Sanford Ave., with circuit Court Judge Volle Williams scheduled to appoint court appraisers at a 4:30 p. m. hearing today.

The two appraisers will estimate the value of the 96 parcels bordering Sanford Ave. needed for the widening project and make their appraisal report to Judge Williams.

After the judge holds a hearing on the appraisal figure, the SRD will put up money to buy the land so that construction can start, county Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. said this morning.

The SRD is holding Seminole County money which will be used to pay for the land.

The SRD has estimated the parcels owned by 137 persons to be worth \$22,103. Owners of land involved are commanded to file answers to SRD eminent domain petitions before Jan. 25 to show "what right, interest or liens" they have to the lands and to show why the land shouldn't be used to add to Sanford Avenue's width. The street will be widened from Geneva Ave. to Ginder's corner.

## Jan. 1 Bus Strike May Hit New York

NEW YORK (UPI)—New Yorkers may have a special reason for watching the seconds tick off New Year's Eve—the possibility that all buses and subways will stop running at midnight.

More than 1,000 members of Transport Workers Union voted unanimously Sunday night to walk off their jobs Jan. 1 if no contract agreement is reached.

The union has had the authority to halt all subway lines and all city and privately-owned bus lines in this metropolis of eight million persons.

Mayor Robert F. Wagner called a meeting of his emergency action committee today to plan what will be done in the event of a strike. The committee includes representatives of hospitals, the transit authority, and police, sanitation, fire, traffic and health departments.

The TWU and the transit authority also were meeting today. At the mass meeting, Michael J. Quill, international president of the TWU, said "we don't want to strike and we'll work every hour now till Thursday to settle the problem."

But he warned: "If we're forced to strike, it won't be settled overnight."

The TWU is asking wage and fringe benefits which reportedly would cost the transit authority 75 million dollars and the private companies 25 million dollars.

## GOP Leaders Favor Rockefeller For Vice Presidential Nomination

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gov. Nelson Rockefeller became the overwhelming favorite for the GOP vice-presidential nomination when he bowed out of the presidential race, a survey of state Republican leaders showed today.

A large proportion of GOP leaders refused to believe Rockefeller's declaration Saturday that he would "quite obviously" reject a place on the 1960 ticket as Vice-President Richard M. Nixon's running mate.

Rockefeller's support for number two spot in the ticket—despite his advance rejection—was registered in a weekend poll of party leaders across the nation.

State chairmen or top aides in 28 states were willing to name a vice-presidential favorite. Seventeen chose Rockefeller. Six named Rep. Charles A. Halleck (R-Ind.) and two listed Sen. Thurston Morton, GOP national chairman.

Single mentions went to Secretary of Labor James Mitchell, Rep. Styles Bridges (R-N.H.), and Sen. Barry Goldwater (R-Ariz.).

Virtually all the leaders polled by UPI in 46 of the 50 states accepted Rockefeller's withdrawal from the presidential race at face value.

Some felt this meant he would also be out of the 1964 race as well, since Nixon could be expected to seek a second term if elected. A few considered him a contender in 1964 (when he will be 60).

But a sizeable proportion ignored Rockefeller's simultaneous rejection of the running mate position next fall.

"Quite obviously," Rockefeller had said Saturday, "I shall not at any time entertain any thought of accepting nomination to the vice-presidency even if the honor were offered, for this would clearly run counter to all the considerations inspiring my present decision against seeking the presidency."

Democrats claimed today that Rockefeller's withdrawal has boosted Democratic chances of capturing the White House.

They said Nixon would be an easier candidate to beat than

Rockefeller. These Democrats described Rockefeller's decision as a victory for old guard Republicans which would backfire on the GOP.

In Republican quarters, there was speculation that Nixon would revise his campaign plans and shun primaries which would have kept him away from Washington at perhaps crucial stages of the next session of Congress.

However, Nixon said Sunday that his plans "always have been made independent of what other people might say or do." He said it was "too early" to discuss his plans for 1960.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) a potential presidential candidate, summed up the general reaction of his party when he said Rockefeller's announcement nullified GOP nomination for Nixon.

He also said it showed "there is no place in the national Republican party for the able and progressive governor."

Forecasting a Democratic victory next November, Johnson said "the Democratic president" should seriously consider drafting Rockefeller for a high appointive post.

A car ran into a ditch and turned over on Hwy. 17-92 near Mobley's Corner this morning but its driver, William M. Carter of Longwood, escaped injury.

Herbert Lee Allen of Orlando pulled out of the Longwood Overlook road in front of Carter who was driving north on 17-92, Highway Patrolman J. L. Sikes reported.

When Carter slammed on his brakes his car careened off the road and flipped over, smashing the windshield and denting the top. Sikes charged Allen with violation of right-of-way.

## Lawyer Honored By Film Industry

NEW YORK (UPI)—The movie industry publication Film Daily has named Boston attorney Joseph N. Welch as the best supporting movie actor of 1959.

Welch, Army counsel in the 1951 Army-McCarthy Senate hearings, was cited Sunday for his role as a judge in "Anatomy of a Murder." It was the first acting chore for the 69-year-old lawyer.

Film Daily's selections were based on a poll of reviewers and commentators from newspapers, magazines and broadcasting.

The other citations included: Best performances by male stars: James Stewart in "Anatomy of a Murder," Frederic March in "Middle of the Night," Frank Sinatra in "Some Came Running," Laurence Harvey in "Room at the Top" and Rock Hudson in "Pillow Talk."

Norbert Wiener, one-time child prodigy who graduated from Harvard at 18, told the American Association for the Advancement of Science that if such machines are not used properly, dangerous economic and social problems could result.

"Many people have poo-pooed the dangers of machine techniques, and they have flatly contradicted the early prediction of Samuel Butler (an English author) that the machine might take over

## Control of Mankind, Wiener said.

"If the machines become more and more efficient and operate at a higher psychological level, the catastrophe foreseen by Butler of the dominance of the machine comes nearer and nearer."

Wiener declared the idea was false that "nothing can come out of a machine that has not been put in it."

"This is often interpreted as asserting that a machine which man has made must remain continually subject to man," he said. "The problem is very close to the great problem of slavery."

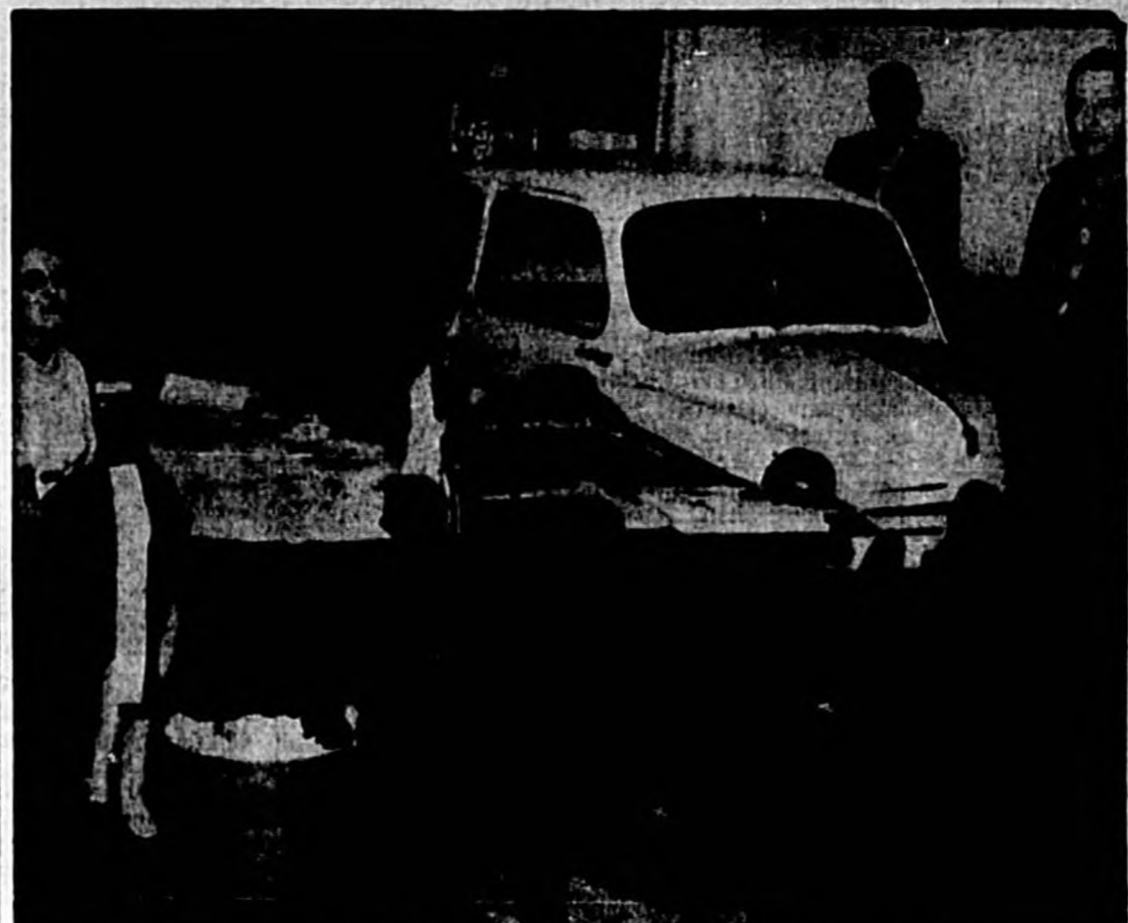

## Blizzard Strands Holiday Travelers

As United Press International reported, hundreds of Christmas holiday travelers were stranded by a howling blizzard that hit deep into the nation's midsection today, leaving a trail of winter misery and jammed hotels and motels in the central plains states.

The storm, packing winds of nearly 60 miles an hour as it moved into the upper Midwest, whipped the snow into huge drifts that

blocked roads and knocked down utility lines.

Hundreds of cars were abandoned in Nebraska, Iowa, the Dakotas, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. Weary travelers sought shelter in farm homes and jammed hotels and motels in the storm area. Temperatures dropped sharply and rain changed to snow in the Great Lakes area. Chicago reported a record high for today of

31 degrees but the weatherman said the mercury would drop almost 20 degrees by morning.

A United Airlines plane with 30 passengers aboard made an unscheduled landing at Council Bluffs, Iowa, at midnight when the pilot lost momentary contact with the neighboring Omaha airport. The passengers waded off the field but the airline anticipated difficulty in moving the DC8 off the bogged sod.

Showers were forecast from Florida and eastern Alabama northward into the Ohio Valley and central Atlantic states, with snow changing to freezing rain in most of New England. Generally fair skies and warmer weather were in store for most of the western half of the country.

New Mexico, the Panhandle region and Nebraska caught the full fury of the storm Sunday.

The blizzard blew into the Panhandle after dumping eight to 10 inches of snow in eastern New Mexico during a 10-hour period. The Panhandle was blanketed by eight inches and winds of 45 miles an hour whipped five-foot drifts across highways.

A bus and 20 to 40 cars were stalled more than two hours near Clayton, N. M., before snowplows could clear a path for them. An estimated 600 travelers sought refuge in Vaughan and Encino, N. M., to escape the blinding storm which forced all highways in a 50-mile radius to be closed.

## Ike Agrees To Summit Meeting In Mid-May

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI)—President Eisenhower agreed today to join in a proposal for a summit conference at Paris in mid-May.

He also summoned 10 high government officials to a conference here Tuesday to discuss the government's nuclear program in 1960 along with other foreign and defense policy matters. This meeting presumably will deal with the current ban on testing nuclear weapons, which expires this week.

In the first working day of his year-end holiday visit here, the President conferred with Secretary of State Christian A. Herter by telephone about dates for the proposed summit meeting.

## Guard Stands By As Plant Reopens

ALBERT LEA, Minn. (UPI)—At least 150 non-strikers crossed picket lines and entered the Wilson & Co. packing plant without incident today as armed National Guardsmen stood by.

The peaceful reopening of the plant was in marked contrast to the scene nearly three weeks ago when angry pickets stoned non-strikers' cars and police confiscated guns, knives and blackjacks.

Major Gen. Richard Cook, guard commander, said there was excellent cooperation between company and union officials in preventing another outbreak of violence.

The guardsmen, with rifles slung over their shoulders, watched as workers filed into the plant during pre-dawn darkness.

Although the scene was peaceful, observers said pickets at each of the plant's six gates noted the license number of each car that entered the plant gates.

Marital law was declared here Dec. 11 and lifted as of midnight Sunday.

## Mediators To Hear 'Last' Strike Offer

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower's fact-finding board stepped back into the steel dispute today to get management's "last offer" to the union and to size up the stalemate.

The three-man board was scheduled to meet separately with union and company representatives preliminary to resuming public hearings today.

Both sides will present their position to the board of inquiry. This will include formal presentation of management's "last offer" which already has been rejected by the Steelworkers as inadequate.

The new sessions followed another futile round of bargaining here Sunday, both on a company-by-company level and on an industry-wide basis.

The factfinders, after their new hearings, must report back to the President by Jan. 6 on where management and union stand in the dispute.

This will set in motion machinery under the Taft-Hartley law for the 500,000 Steelworkers to vote Jan. 11-13 on whether they want to accept the final management offer.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The governor's office said Manatee County Sheriff Roy Bales will meet with Gov. LeRoy Collins today.

The purpose of the meeting was disclosed but it undoubtedly will concern Bolita operations in Manatee County. It recently said in the county rounded up more than 70 suspects in an alleged million dollar gambling ring.

# Florida Holiday Death Toll At 33

MIAMI (UPI) — More than 80 persons met violent death in accidents during Florida's Christmas weekend, exceeding all pre-holiday expectations.

A United Press International survey showed 22 died in automobile crashes, four drowned, and seven were killed in miscellaneous mishaps for a total of 33 deaths.

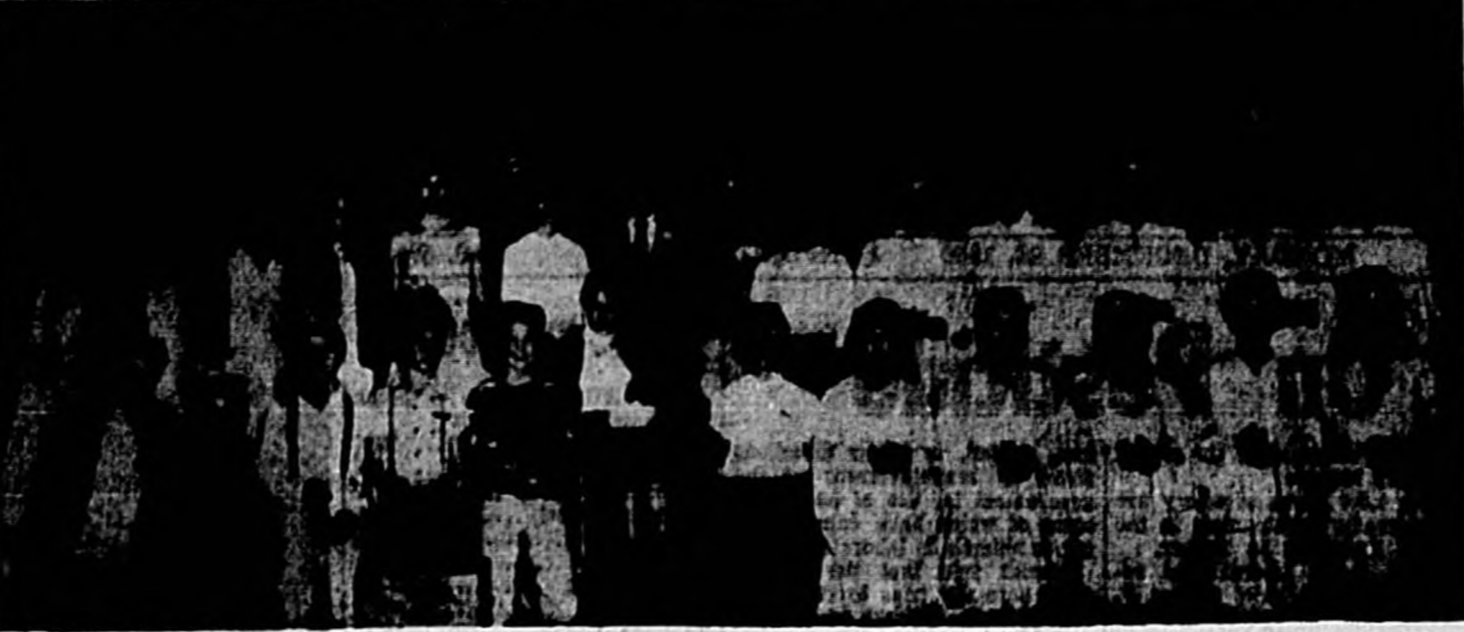

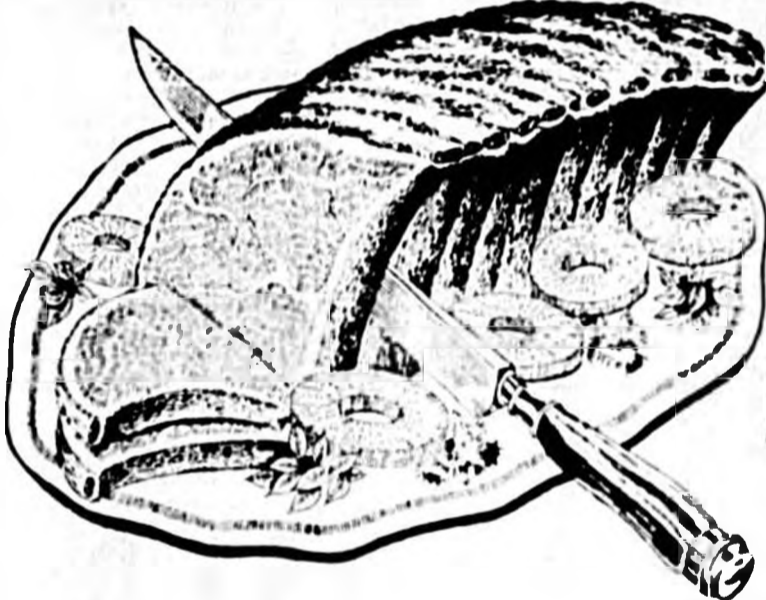

# Do-It-Yourself Census Forms Ready

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Do-it-yourself census forms for 1960 have been on public view for several weeks now and the Census Bureau can't believe its good luck. Nobody so far has raised any serious squawk.

Oh, a few congressmen have complained that the census taker these days is getting too nosy, wanting to know about our plumbing (indoors or out); our washing machines (automatic or not); and how we get to work in the morning (many a morning I wonder about that one myself).

One lawmaker went so far as to suspect, publicly, that psychiatrists might have taken over the bureau. By and large, though, the bureau's final decisions on what questions to include and leave out in the 18th decennial census have been received with resignation if not outright enthusiasm.

The bureau doesn't expect enthusiasm. All it asks is that you answer the questions, ranging from your income to your telephone number. Anybody who refuses can be fined \$100 or sent to jail for 60 days; though the bureau can't recall a case where this actually happened.

"We persuade 'em," a spokesman said of the comparative few who every 10 years can be depended on to balk at some question or other or even to refuse, on religious grounds, to have any part at all of the census.

Anyway, it's not as bad as it might be. In 1950 the census taker inquired among other things whether each household included any paupers, idiots, or convicts. There are other grounds to be

 (Third of 12 Articles)  
**IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA**—Over the door of the tiny store the sign read: "Ovovec - Zelinajny"—Fruit and Vegetables. The line queued out from it a block long, three and four abreast.

Here I found the story of Czechoslovakia. They saw me coming from across the street and they stared enigmatically, as bored crowds usually do.

Since practically nobody in this country speaks any English, I addressed them in Czech, using an approach that often brought results—saying that I was an American correspondent looking over the homeland of my parents.

A woman in a brown cloth coat that reached to the ankles of black cotton stockings which were stuffed liberally into old shoes came up to me and extended her hand. I thought she was greeting me, but instead she reached up and ran her fingers up and down the lapel of my coat.

"Cloth like this we don't get in Czechoslovakia," she said to a woman at her side. "You can tell her's from America."

The queue broke ranks and there was a big circle around me—wary, untrusting, unsmiling strangers. They reported, they replied to questions. They had been waiting for the store to open to buy imported apples.

All over Czechoslovakia people were waiting at state stores to buy apples—four pounds apiece and no more. This had been a dry year and no apples were harvested in the entire state.

I pulled out a pack of American cigarettes. I was a hero. Suddenly they forgot themselves and there were cheers. I went through two packs in three minutes.

Several women took two and apologized. "One for after supper." I noticed they tucked both of them deep in their purses.

And now everybody was excited and we talked like old friends. We got to talking prices. "How much is coffee in America?" one of them asked.

"About 90 cents a pound," I said, and I could hear the itching halfway to St. Wenceslaus Square.

"You know how much it is here?" Twenty-four dollars a pound.

And a little old woman at my side cupped her hand and whispered hoarsely, "Even as much as dollar 30."

A Czech worker gets about 100 crowns (about dollar 190) a month. Wages vary little over the country. A laborer must work more than one month to pay for a good coat. "Only half as good as yours," somebody said. Mine cost dollar 60.

Like a bunch of old women we kept comparing figures. Here are some average Czech prices: butter, dollar 3.50 a pound; oranges, dollar 2.50 a dozen; bananas, dollar 3 a dozen; eggs, dollar 1.10 a dozen in the winter and double that in the winter; beef and pork about dollar 1.60 a pound.

The crowd was getting chummy now. One woman wanted to know if I still had any hair when I told her my age, and she lifted my hat to see. Another seriously asked if she could put my teeth to determine if they were real.

In this environment, the inevitable question came. "Tell us," and the question came wistfully, "is it really a good life in America?"

# Notes On Some Of Ike's Problems

### THE MAN TO PLEASE:

One of the thorniest problems President Eisenhower had to deal with in Paris was President Charles DeGaulle's refusal to permit integration of French forces into NATO. Now, as result of agreement reached between the two, French experts are preparing a plan which the French Air Force at least will "cooperate" with the Allied Integrated Air Command. The man who will judge it and who also is the man to be pleased is Supreme Commander U.S. Gen. Lauris Norstad. The French report is expected about mid-February, giving Norstad a month to study it before reporting on it to the allied military committee.

### IAT IN THE RING:

West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt is said to be quietly working behind the scenes to become the Social Democratic Party's nominee for West German chancellor in the 1961 elections. The socialists never have been able to dislodge Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's Christian - Democratic Party but the popular Brandt might give Adenauer some election-day troubles.

### COMPETITION:

Reliable economic sources in Frankfurt say West German steel firms are preparing to step up their exports to the United States in the event of a new walkout by U.S. Steel workers. The West German firms already are making some U.S. deliveries but the plan now is to step up these shipments to meet a considerable part of U.S. steel needs.

### SOME TROUBLE:

Observers in Southeast Asia expect new troubles in Laos to break out around the middle of January. Not only will there be pressure from the Communist North Vietnamese border area, but it is possible that a civil war

**Kidney Disorders**

# Control Diseases Of Azaleas, Camellias

Homeowners throughout the state are turning their interest to azaleas and camellias since the main blooming periods of these two plants are here or approaching.

Dr. R. S. Mullin, plant pathologist with the Florida Agricultural Extension Service, warns that unfortunately, there are several diseases of these two plants which will be problems during the blooming season.

One disease of azaleas is called petal blight. This disease attacks only the flower petals on other part of the plant. It first causes a white or light colored spot on the petals. Usually this will turn to tan or brownish color as the tissues die.

Starting as smaller spots, they enlarge rapidly, and several spots may run together, causing a large irregular one. These spots detract from the beauty of the blossom and also cause a premature wilting and dying. After the infected blossoms drop to the ground, hard black structures are formed on them by the fungus causing the disease.

The structures stay there until next blooming season, then produce spores which are carried to the new blossoms.

One of the best controls, says Dr. Mullin, is to collect and burn the old infected flowers. Also, a strong spray of ferbam on the ground around the plants shortly before blooming will help. Another control is to spray the blossoms with zineb two or three times a week. For protection, all unfolding blossoms must be covered with the spray.

A disease of both azaleas and camellias which occurs during and after blooming is called leaf gall. This causes a thickening and enlarging of the leaves with a change in color to light green, nearly white, or even a reddish color. Buds may also be attacked.

"Normally," says Dr. Mullin, "this disease causes no great damage to either azaleas or camellias. It may attack enough leaves to seem to be damaging the plant. The most effective control is to pick off the infected leaves or buds and destroy them. The disease will disappear as the weather becomes warmer."

Both azaleas and camellias have diseases causing a strobark of twigs and branches. Where this occurs, the diseased parts should be removed. Be sure to cut about six inches below the lowest visible point of infection. Large cuts should be treated with a prepared wound treatment.

Worm-borer root rot is a disease occasionally found on camellias and severe on azaleas. When this disease attacks, a plant will gradually become untidy and die.

Little or nothing can be done for a plant attacked by this disease. All infected plants and as much as possible of the root system should be removed and burned to protect other plants in the area.

## Nearly 12,000 Gather For YFC Convention

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nation's capital was invaded today by nearly 12,000 teen-agers from all parts of America, here to prove that there is no necessary link between the words juvenile and delinquency.

The young people, who arrived by special trains and chartered buses, will participate in a three-day convention sponsored by Youth for Christ International (YFC).

YFC is an interdenominational Protestant organization which conducts programs of Christian evangelism among teen-agers particularly the four million U. S. high school students who are not members of any church.

Evangelist Billy Graham, who began his career as a member of the Youth for Christ staff in 1945, will speak to the teen-agers at the closing rally of the convention Wednesday.

Other speakers will include Dr. Bob Pierce, missionary-evangelist and president of World Vision, Inc.; Sen. Frank Carlson (R-Kan.), who is serving as general chairman of the convention; and Dr. Ted W. Engstrom, president of Youth for Christ International. "The aim of this convention," Engstrom said, "is to challenge American teen-agers to appreciate and help preserve the Christian foundations on which this country was built."

"We want them to go back to their homes, schools and churches with a deeper dedication to Christ and a greater appreciation of their American heritage."

## Floridian Faces Death In Iraq

JAKARTA, Indonesia (UPI)—The defense attorney for American soldier of fortune Allen Lawrence Pope, 29, demanded today the government try him as a legitimate prisoner of war—a move that would eliminate the death penalty if the government agrees. Pope, of Homestead, Fla., went on trial today before an air force military court on charges of flying bombing missions for the Indonesian rebels against the Indonesian government during Indonesia's rebellion in 1958. Conviction on that charge carries the death penalty. Pope's attorney, Sukarjo, appointed by the court, won a five-day adjournment of the case today with a series of legal maneuvers that included the demand the government apply the rules of the Geneva Convention on prisoners of war.

If the Geneva Convention rules were applied to Pope he would not be subject to the death penalty and could be imprisoned only so long as hostilities exist or until there was a legitimate exchange of prisoners by the two sides.

The opening session in a heavily guarded courtroom lasted only an hour until the prosecution asked the trial be adjourned until Jan. 2. The trial itself promised to be a lengthy affair because of the number of witnesses to be heard. Pope was suddenly brought to trial after being detained 20 months by the air force. He was captured when his World War II type B-26 bomber was shot down in remote East Indonesia and has been recuperating since then from his injuries.

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### Cold Reception Is Predicted For Gas Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A chilly reception in Congress was predicted today for any administration request to hike federal gasoline taxes by another half cent a gallon next year.

The American Automobile Association (AAA) said the extra levy would be proposed in January as part of a plan to raise the tax eventually to five cents a gallon from the present four cents. It said the second half-cent increase would be asked later.

Frederick T. McGuire Jr., president of the motorists' organization noted that Congress boosted the tax by one cent at its last session and pledged an all-out fight against any further increase. He predicted Congress would cold shoulder a new request.

McGuire said the effect of such an increase would be to repudiate the compromise on federal highway financing legislation which was worked out "with such difficulty" in the last session of Congress.

President Eisenhower asked Congress last January for a 1½ cent increase in gas taxes to help finance the superhighway program. Congress finally approved the penny-a-gallon boost until July 1, 1961.

McGuire said a new one-cent increase, plus the average state tax of six cents, would mean an average gas tax of 11 cents and would cost motorists more than a half billion dollars a year.

The AAA did not disclose the source of its information on administration plans. However, it normally is well informed on highway financing programs.

### Huge Landslides Slam Into Train

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — A train load of 188 holiday travelers, riding in a train escaped death or serious injury late Sunday as two huge landslides crashed down on the Great Northern Railway's Empire Builder on the outskirts of town here. Nine cars were derailed.

The two slides, which struck 20 minutes apart, knocked the four-unit diesel engine and a combination mail and baggage car into the waters of Puget Sound. At least six crewmembers and four passengers were injured but most of the injuries were considered minor.

Great Northern officials said the first slide halted and partially derailed the 13-car Chicago-bound streamliner. The second compounded the damage.

A combination mail and crew dormitory car was buried to the windows on one side by the slides but it did not follow the mail-baggage car into the chill waters.

The two sets of tracks were twisted in almost braided fashion and formed an arch from the railroad bed to one of the derailed diesel units. One diesel unit was pushed about 300 feet from the railroad bed.

Three of the six crewmen were seriously injured while the other three suffered injuries termed minor in nature. None of the passengers was thought to be seriously injured.

### Couple Favors TV Over Baby

WHITLEIGH, England (UPI) — A couple who planned to give away their fourth baby so they could afford a television set have decided against it because of pressure from the neighbors.

"Dozens of people told us that if we gave the child away 'You've had it.' Well, you can't do without neighbors," said Bill Williams. Williams, 35, makes \$21 a week as a landscape gardener.

"We have three boys," he said, "that's all we wanted. It was either keeping the baby that is coming or getting the telly. I couldn't afford both."

"But because of a slip of the tongue the neighbors got to know. There was hell to pay. So the missus and I decided not to give the child away and forget having the telly."

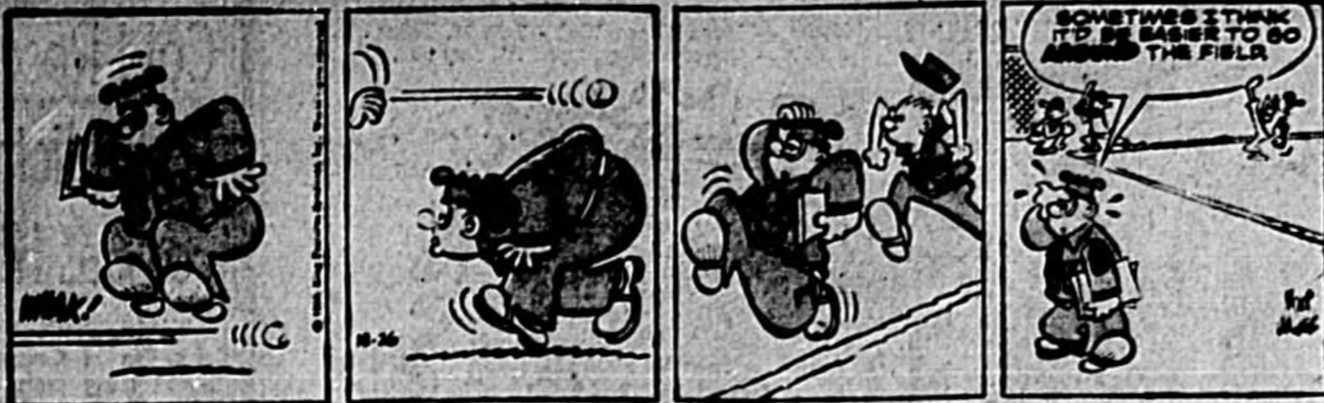

## Unitas Proves Too Much For Giants

**BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)** — Johnny Unitas will get better.

But the big story is that you can get the blond Baltimore Colt quarterback down but you can't keep him there.

That was the story of Baltimore's second straight triumph over the New York Giants in the National Football League championship game, 31-16. And Sunday's story may tell the tale of the league for years to come because Unitas is only 26 and coach Weeb Ewbank of the Colts says he will get better.

But New York's defensive platoon, one of the finest developed in recent years, has put Unitas to the supreme test in two consecutive games and found him composed of equal parts of talent, skill and heart.

This defensive unit — and 37,547 Memorial Stadium fans plus millions of TV viewers will certify the action — repeatedly hammered Unitas into the scarred sod. This defensive display by such huskies as Andy Robustelli, Sam Huff, Cliff Livingston and Dick Modestewski enabled the Giants to nibble away until they took a 9-7 lead into the final period. Baltimore fans watched in awe while their hero was buried under heaps of white-shirted Giants for losses totaling 57 yards.

But Unitas, who was turned down by major colleges because he was too small and released by the Pittsburgh Steelers, bounced back just as he always has in the past. His passes gave the Colts a 23-17 victory over the Giants in last year's unprecedented overtime game for the title and they finally cracked Sunday's bitter defensive struggle wide open.

Starting on his 15 late in the third period, Unitas drove the Colts 75 yards in 10 plays for the touchdown that started a 24-point Baltimore blitz. Unitas fooled the New York defense when he swung around right end to score it, but the plays that set it up were his key losses to Raymond Berry and Lenny Moore.

The Giants had been successful in keeping Unitas from completing vital third down passes when the Colts needed eight or 15 yards to keep rolling but as the final period began, Unitas hit Berry for a 17 yard gain on a third and-

eight situation. Then Moore, who had teamed with Unitas to produce a touchdown on a 60-yard perfect play in the opening minutes, took a pass from Unitas on the New York 46, broke loose from Rosey Grier and ran to the New York 13.

Moore then leveled Livingston with a vital block while Unitas raced to put the Colts back in front at 14-9. Thus after 47 minutes and 42 seconds Unitas cracked open the defensive classic that might possibly have ended in at least a near re-run of last year's "sudden death" overtime title clash. The biggest crowd of the week — 100,000 — will see Wisconsin (7-2) oppose Washington (8-1) in the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif., and 78,000 will be on hand in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.

Pav-A-Way's low bid offered the hot asphalt mix for \$7.75 per ton. There were three other bidders. The \$24,567.50 paving project is to start by Jan. 20, will cover Melville Ave. from 20th to 25th St., Second St. between Melville Ave. and Sanford Ave., N. Third St. from French to Persimmon and Persimmon from First to Third St. The city has appropriated \$25,812.30 for the work.

City Manager Warren Knowles reported to the commission that this project, added to the Sanford street resurfacing program which began in 1956, will make 16,307.2 miles of city streets resurfaced at a cost of \$170,455.82 since the program's start.

## Government Plans New Tax Rules

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government will announce today its new rules aimed at nabbing executives ducking taxes on "hidden income" and corporations claiming improper deductions for expense accounts.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Dana Latham was scheduled to announce the new reporting rules at a press conference. The new questions will appear on tax returns to be filed in 1961 for 1960 income.

The press conference was scheduled for 3 p. m. Government sources emphasized that the IRS is not changing its basic rules governing deductions. The deductions still will be allowed for ordinary and necessary business expenses.

**Fire Razes Homes**  
ORLANDO (UPI) — A fire that destroyed 20 apartment units and left about 36 persons homeless, broke out in a line of stucco-frame units last night about three hours late Monday. No one was injured but one dog was killed. No damage estimates were immediately available.

**Democrat Target**  
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon's alleged advisers today weighed possible moves to counter Democratic efforts to pin an "old guard" label on him. Nixon now an almost sure bet for the Republican presidential nomination, became the target of stepped up Democratic attacks over the week end identifying him with the conservative wing of the GOP.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — V. R. Gray, Secretary of State R. A. Gray, 77, was back at his desk today following two days in the hospital for treatment of a mild circulatory disturbance. Gray was released from the hospital Monday afternoon. He had entered St. Johns Hospital in Tallahassee at the end of his present term because of poor health.

**Distorted News**  
HAVANA (UPI) — The Soviet-sponsored Havana Press Agency has authorized newsmen and printers to label any foreign news story they disapprove "false or distorted." A resolution approved unanimously by the association authorized newspaper employees to "clarify" any foreign item published by their paper which in their opinion contains "false or distorted data" concerning Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime.

## New Sanford Ave. Lights Operating

Fourteen Cham Ave. petitioners were granted a street light by the city commissioners last night. The light will be put up in the 1900 Cham Ave. vicinity.

City manager Warren E. Knowles also called the commission's attention to 14 new 50,000 lumen mercury vapor lights on San O. A., which are the first part of a program calling for 42 new light fixtures on Seminole Blvd. to Third St. between Oak Ave. and Sanford Ave. The 14 light fixtures replaced 36 of the old white lighting system.

The new Sanford Ave. bulbs give 230,000 lumens of light against the 36,000 lumens provided by the old system, Knowles reported. They cost \$1,293.50 per year a gain the old cost of \$406 per year. This completes the improvement program on the part of the city as requested by the Sanford Ave. Improvement Association. Knowles said.

## Sanford Ave. Lot Considered Best Post Office Site

A lot behind the Strickland Morrison Inc. building on Sanford Ave. across from the Civic Center has been recommended as the best location for a new post office.

The site was the first choice of a committee of businessmen which has studied the location problem. The recommendation will be forwarded to the General Services Administration.

Two other sites were recommended as second and third choices by the committee, which has been flooded with inquiries after an announcement that a site for a new post office was being sought.

The recommendations were studied by the GSA, which might not approve any of them, but the Sanford Ave. location is considered the most logical by the members of the committee.

## Lake Mary Roads, Zoning Subjects Of Protests

A representative of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce today complained to the County Commission about the "hasty" zoning regulations and deplorable road conditions in Lake Mary.

Don Coleman said "we are trying to make Lake Mary a bright spot on the map of Seminole County but residents never know when they'll wake up and find a trailer subdivision right next door."

He cited a recent case when a trailer was put up in the city limits without even having a septic tank. Robert Brown, county zoning director, told Coleman that the zoning board was acquainted with Lake Mary's problems and is studying ways to correct them.

Commission chairman John Krieger said that the county commission has approved a comprehensive zoning plan which would go into effect soon after Jan. 1 which would solve the problem.

Brown said public hearings on comprehensive zoning will be held. Coleman also called roads in Lake Mary "deplorable" and said he had heard that the commission had not set aside any money for paving in the area.

## Lake Jessup Boat Mishap Fatal To Man, Grandson

A grandfather and his six-year-old grandson died in a Lake Jessup drowning tragedy this morning, the sheriff's office reported.

The name of the grandfather was not given by the two other children who were rescued after a boat the group was in capsized a mile off shore from the Black Hammock fishing camp.

Peace Justice Hugh Duncan said a paper in the man's pocket revealed he was visiting J. Fred Christian Jr., Rt. 2, Maitland. The man actually died of a heart attack after being rescued. He was about 50 years old, Duncan said. Sheriff J. L. Hobby stopped at his Sanford headquarters for more dragging equipment at 1:30 p. m. and then left to rejoin deputies, Constable George Kelsey and a Navy helicopter still searching for the drowned boy.

## Blizzard Drives Snow East

A deadly storm that ripped through the country's midsection in blizzard proportions drove toward the East Coast today.

High winds which pushed the storm through the Plains states and Middle West and battered Lake Superior with the worst gales in a half century were diminishing.

But the last great storm system of the year still carried heavy snow for the eastern seaboard. The weather bureau posted heavy snow warnings for much of New England, including New Hampshire, Vermont and Maine.

Parts of New York State were told to expect several inches of snow. The heaviest snow depth in the east was at Lebanon, N. H., which reported 10 inches of snow on the ground.

Rain, fog and sleet preceded the storm into the East Monday. Heavy fog shut down three New York area airports for a time, stranding hundreds of travelers. Scores of flights were diverted to Washington, D. C., from New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore because of the fog. At one time, more than 200 aircraft were parked on ramp space at the Washington National Airport.

Two jet airliners headed from Los Angeles to the East Coast made uncheduled landings within 15 minutes at Columbus, Ohio, Monday because of the fog blanket in the East.

## Addition Approved

## File Homestead Applications Assessor Urges

Tax Assessor Richard McCanna today urged homeowners whose names appear on the 1956 tax roll, to file for homestead exemption as soon as possible after Jan. 1.

McCanna said the law requires that exemption applications be filed in his office every year before the Mar. 31 deadline.

The tax assessor emphasized that homeowners filing applications for the first time are requested to do so in person and to bring with them satisfactory proof of ownership and occupancy as of Jan. 1.

Proof of ownership consists of recorded deed, contract or agreement for deed, which must be recorded with the clerk of the Circuit Court prior to Jan. 1 of the year in which application is made.

Renewal applications will be mailed to all homeowners whose names appear on the 1956 tax roll, excepting those having sold their property during the year, McCanna added.

## Beach Fire Causes \$100,000 Damages

JACKSONVILLE BEACH (UPI) — Fire destroyed a department store and skating rink Monday night and threatened other buildings along Jacksonville Beach's popular boardwalk before being brought under control.

Owners estimated damages at \$100,000 or more. The fire broke out in a heater room in the rear of Morgan's Department Store about 6:30 p. m. and ate rapidly through the two-story masonry structure.

Fire fighters from the neighboring coast line towns and the Mayport Naval Base helped combat the flames about two hours. Fire Chief I. D. Brunson said it was the city's largest fire in the past 10 years.

A few concession stands along the boardwalk suffered minor damage from flying sparks and water, but major damage was confined to the department store and skating rink, located upstairs over the store.

## U. S. Refuses Atom Test Ban Extension

AUSTIN, Ga. (UPI) — President Eisenhower refused today to extend the formal U. S. moratorium on nuclear weapon tests but promised that tests would not be resumed without advance notice.

At the same time, the president denounced the attitude of what he called "the politically guided" Russian experts in the Geneva negotiations seeking agreement on a permanent prohibition of nuclear tests.

## Residents Again Oppose Howell Park Shop Center

Representatives of 80 families in the Lake Howell area today formally protested a proposal by Hettler Co. to build a shopping center in this area.

The zoning commission has approved the area to be rezoned from R-1 to C-1.

After hearing complaints by property owners and Attorney Gordon Frederick, who represented some of the owners, the board agreed to view the area in question and come up with a decision at the next board meeting.

Frederick said that at the present time there is no need for any shopping center in the area. "When Hettler proves there is a need, then it may be justified," he said. He said there is a shopping center being constructed "just one mile away from the subdivision on U. S. 17-92 and there is no reason why the people who are in favor of a shopping center cannot use these facilities."

Frederick pointed out there are only about 200 homes in the subdivision "and that certainly doesn't justify any neighborhood shopping center."

Hettler officials say they hope to build some 5000 homes but, now all we have is their word," Frederick said.

## Firemen's Social Security Proposed

City commissioners last night instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance which would give social security coverage to Sanford firemen.

Any fireman who wants to join the program will get a sum equal to two and one-half per cent of his salary contributed by the city towards his social security fund. The coverage would be effective April 1, 1960.

## Road Right-Of-Way Appraisers Named

Circuit court judge Volie Williams yesterday appointed T. W. Mero of Sanford and Lawrence R. widening eminent domain proceedings. Both men are realtors.

Judge Williams set Jan. 11 as the date to receive the appraisers' reports on their estimate of how much the 98 parcels bordering Sanford Ave. are worth. The hearing on the appraisers' report will be Jan. 18 at 4:30 p. m.

The land owned by 137 persons and organizations is needed to widen Sanford Ave. from Geneva Ave. to Ginzler corner. The State Road Dept. has estimated the value of the parcels at \$22,104.
