The disappearing rights of smokers

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a smoker and I am fed up with hearing about the rights of non-smokers. If I want to smoke, that's my right. It's my body I may be harming, not yours. Why don't non-smokers just shut up and stay in non-smoking areas?

DEAR READER: Non-smokers DO stay in non-smoking areas. The problem is that tobacco smoke doesn't.

Let me respond to you as a pipe smoker who is familiar with both sides of the issue. The smoke I breathe from my pipe is MY smoke; I assume responsibility for the risks I take when I light up. No one would deny that you and I have the "right" to abuse ourselves; perhaps we're nuts, but that's another issue.

However, our smoke fills the environment. It spreads out in swirling blue clouds, leaks under doors, saturates upholstery — in short, it extends quite a distance beyond us. Increasingly, non-smokers are irritated by tobacco smoke. They're physically irritated because this smoke smells bad to them, stings their eyes, causes coughing, and is more than an occasional nuisance to many people

with allergies. Non-smokers are also psychologically irritated because they view smokers as selfish polluters who show little regard for the comfort and safety of those around them. If you look at the issue objectively and unemotionally, they are right. Come on — you know they're right. Nowhere in the Constitution is there a statement about the Rights of Smokers. On the contrary, there are lots of references to the rights people have when another person is doing something to them. That's the issue, I think.

No one might care what your smoke does to you — or mine to me. But when that smoke affects those around us, they have a right to insist that we think about THEM.

Here's an analogy. You are not permitted to burn garbage in your yard or turn up your stereo to the point where the sound shatters windows in your neighborhood. Those activities would be inappropriately intrusive, and there are laws to protect your neighbors from your garbage smoke and noise pollution. Similarly, you can't go around beating people up because you feel like it.

Instead of getting heated up about non-smokers, try to see the problem from their perspective. Tobacco smoke is unhealthy. Maybe all those non-smokers are really doing you a favor. Why not try, as I did, to cut down and limit your smoking to areas where only you will breathe the smoke? Your change in habit and atti-

tude could have some really positive effects in your life.

WIN AT

A silver anniversary

Last year, Ib Lundby completed 25 years as editor of Dansk Bridge, putting out his 25th issue in September.

Here is an interesting deal that he spotted. How should the play go in six diamonds? West's lead was awful. Leading a bid suit is a bad idea in the best of times, but when you have the missing ace, it is ludicrous. (If partner gets in to give you a ruff, the contract is dying anyway.)

South knew the lead was a singleton; also he took careful note of the club spots. After winning with dummy's ace, declarer played a trump to hand, getting the bad news. Now he led the heart seven, putting West on the spot.

If West had won with the ace, declarer would have taken West's return, drawn trumps, and cashed the king-queen of hearts, discarding a spade and a club. Then, South would have led the club queen, ruffing away East's king and setting up dummy's eight. The contract would have come home with one spade, two hearts, six diamonds, two clubs and a spade ruff in the dummy. So, West ducked.

Now came a low club from dummy, putting East in a quandary. If East had won with the king, declarer would have got two club tricks in the dummy and succeeded. So, East ducked.

After South played the club jack, West had an insoluble problem. If he had discarded, declarer would have drawn trumps, ruffed out the club king and got 13 tricks as mentioned above. So, West ruffed. But now there were two spade ruffs available in the dummy. South was home.

Summary facilitates estate of deceased

Florida law provides for summary administration of a decedent's estate when a decedent's will, if any, does not direct regular administration and: 1) the value of the entire estate subject to administration in Florida, less the value of property exempt from the claims of creditors, does not exceed \$25,000, or 2) the decedent has been dead for more than two years.

The two greatest advantages of summary administration are that it facilitates the speedy transfer of the property of the decedent and obviates the need for a personal representative thereby reducing the costs involved in administering the estate.

If an estate qualifies for summary administration, a petition for summary administration may be filed. If the petition is granted the court will enter an order of summary administration. This order will assign the property of the decedent to his or her lawful heirs and permit immediate distribution thereof. Once the order of summary

administration is entered and the property of the decedent is assigned and distributed, liability of the estate passes to the petitioner(s). Petitioner(s) thereby become(s) personally liable for all lawful claims against the estate of the decedent. However, this liability is not unlimited either as to value or as to time. The liability extends only to the value of the estate of the decedent actually received by each petitioner, exclusive of property exempt from claims of creditors under the constitution and statutes of Florida. Additionally, this liability is not unlimited as to time. There is a two year statute of limitations on claims against

the estate that begins to run from the time of death of the decedent.

Petitioners of summary administration may further shorten the time creditors have to file claims against the estate, however. This may be done by filing and publishing a notice to creditors. A notice to creditors serves to notify all persons having claims or demands against the estate of the decedent that an order of summary administration has been entered by the court. This notice must specify the total cash value of the estate and the names and addresses of those to whom it has been assigned by such order. Additionally, this notice must be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper published in the county where such order was entered and proof of publication of the notice must be filed with the court. If proof of publication of the notice to creditors is filed with the court, all claims and demands of creditors against the estate of the decedent will

be forever barred unless such claims are filed within three months from the first publication of such notice.

When available, summary administration will facilitate the speedy transfer of the property of the decedent and obviate the need for a personal representative. This usually will reduce the costs involved in administering the estate and which is a great advantage in light of the value of the estate. However, the use of summary administration does shift the potential liability of the estate to the petitioner(s). As noted above, though, this potential liability is limited as to value and can be further limited as to time through the use of a notice to creditors. In the coming weeks we will continue to discuss different aspects of probate and estate law.

DEAR ABBY: As a longtime member of our local traffic safety commission and past volunteer AARP 55-Alive driving instructor, I wish to comment on the recent letter from Tom Lynch of Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Mr. Lynch suggested that the use of cell phones is safe because truck drivers have used CB radios for many years. What he failed to add is that accidents involving trucks have increased dramatically in recent years. Part of the reason is the increased number of trucks on the road - but how many others are due to inattentive driving because the driver was on the radio or otherwise occupied?

He also suggested that you tell most drivers passing laws against using the radio while driving, but at your message and concerning while driving, advising the importance while driving to at-



ing without adequate time. While I don't advocate laws preventing their use, I do think that the use of cell phones while driving is a distraction. We would have much safer highways.

Being in a full-time managerial position, I have seen a lot more of these motor vehicle accidents

than any other single activity, although it's not always listed as accident reports as such, because it's too difficult to prove in a court of law.

Missy Guadagnino has come from nowhere to provide scoring and freshman Jen Forst has been a big help.

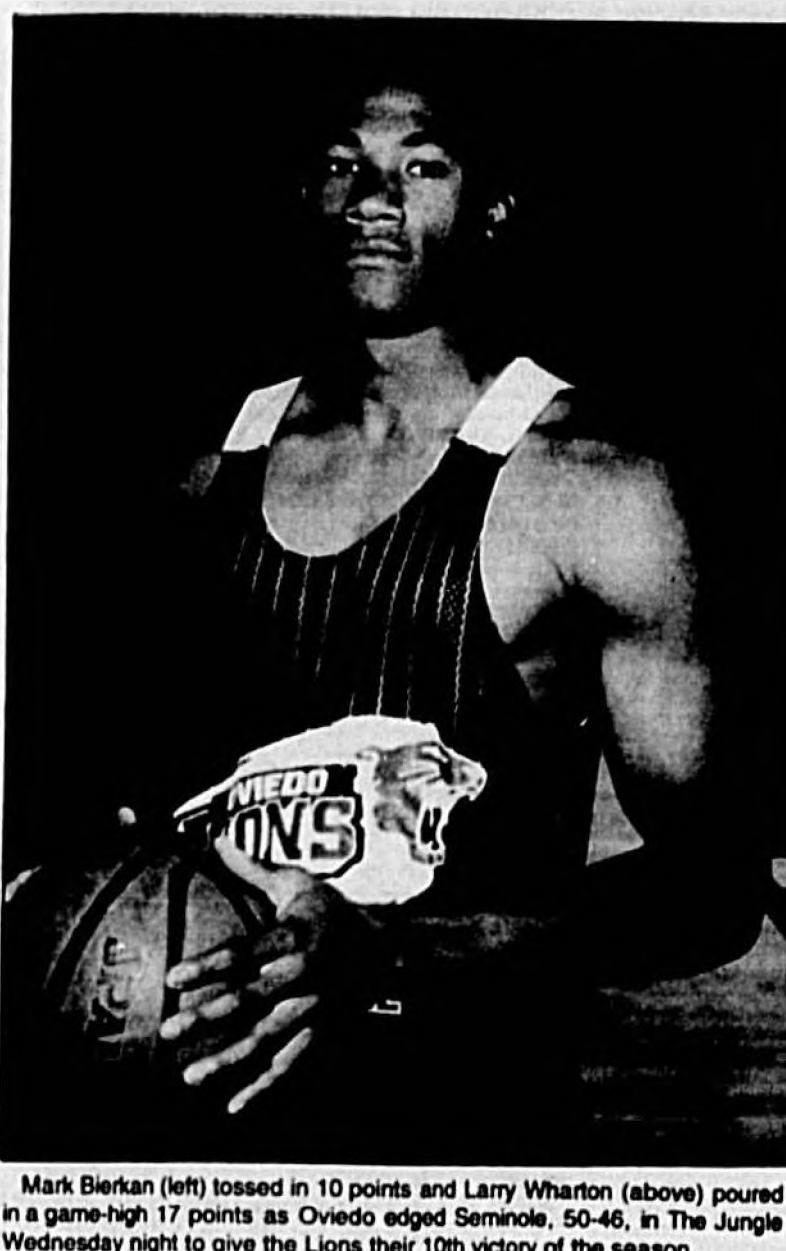
Toas in Lake Brantley transfer Dana Hicks and you have all of the ingredients of a state contender.

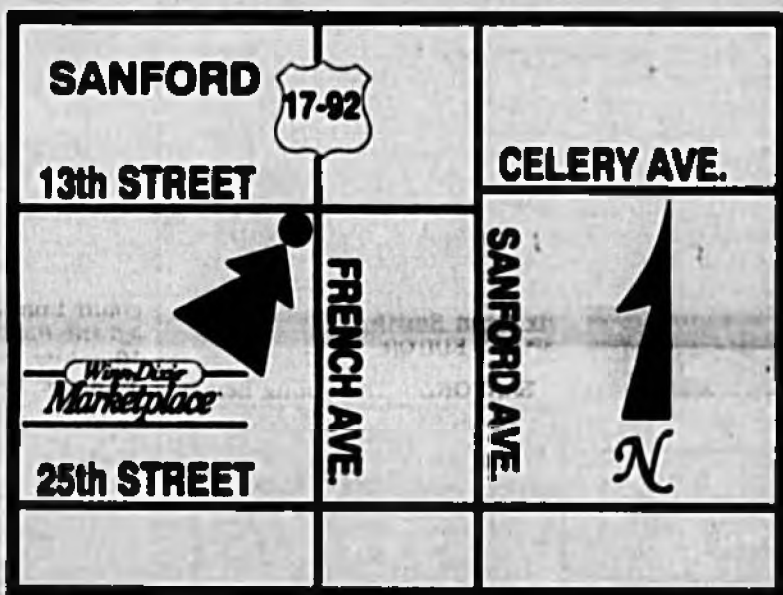

The way we were: Team trip continued

This is a continuation of Jim Stone's account of the Sanford High School basketball trip in 1922. As stated before, I have edited it some.

The next morning after the Sanford-Miami game, we thanked our hosts and hostesses for the lovely time we had and then gathered at the YMCA.

When we reached the other side, most of us went through the world famed Miami Aquarium. The great variety of tropical marine animals was wonderful; the most grotesque of creatures, the most beautiful of fish, the ugliest of animals were all there.

After going through the Aquarium, we went on to the beach itself, where some of the boys went in swimming and where Leonard took first prize.

Most of the boys were very hungry after the swim and they ate so much that Jim began to get worried because the treasury was getting low.

After we started to Fort Lauderdale, Victor said he would solve the hunger problem and if we would stop he would get some coconuts and our troubles would be over. Mr. Bache remarked, "Yes, they will all begin then, believe me, with stomach aches and other pains." Vic then pulled out a pistol and began to shoot at one of the coconuts. He succeeded in hitting one and the milk began to flow through the bullet hole. Vic next tried to catch the milk in his mouth, but got some in his eye and gave up.

Arriving at Fort Lauderdale we went to the Indian camp where Fred and Mac changed their minds about buying a squaw, but Victor saw an alligator farm and bought a

"Gator."

We then went to the gymnasium where the team had a good work out. Feeling fine, we waited for the game in high spirits.

The game is on! Sanford is fighting hard, one side is in the lead, now the other. What is that! The whistle blows, the first half is over with Lauderdale High in the lead 19 to 16. Come on Sanford!

The second half is started, but Sanford, still tired from the long trip, slows up and Lauderdale forges ahead. The game is nearing the end. Fight on Sanford! At last the whistle blows, the losing fight is over, but the Celery Feds are still game.

Only 250 miles to go. We are off, but without Vic's gator which disappeared in some mysterious manner. Most of the players went to sleep, but the heroic drivers kept awake. We arrived in West Palm Beach just in time to get some gas and also to eat a midnight lunch.

We are off again (12:15 a.m.). About five miles from Fort Pierce we had another puncture. A strange bunch piled out of the Fords, without the pep that they had usually shown. Somebody found some coconuts and we ate them until we really were sick. We arrived in Fort Pierce in the early hours of the morning and found a garage that was open, much to our delight.

We started out on the third lap of our journey (the worst of the whole trip) without much joy. On and on we went, a fog had risen and everything was clothed in white. The shell road seemed rougher than when we had come over it on the way down.

We were a few miles out of Melbourne where we were to leave the east coast and go over a cut off road that went through St. Cloud and Kissimmee when we saw something ahead that was spread out over the road. Upon approaching closer we saw that it was the ponies, part of the "Mighty Haag Shows", and crossing the bridge a few minutes later we had to stop because the circus was parked in the middle of it. One of the boys heard some splashing in the water and said the elephants had probably fallen in.

Pretty soon the wagons moved on and we passed the circus and turned off at Melbourne onto the new road. The going was pretty good at first, but it became worse and worse. We stopped about 6:00 a.m. out in the middle of nowhere. The fog was not so very thick now, but it hid the sun and we could hardly realize it was day. As far as we could see it was nothing but prairie land and saw grass. The road was an embankment and on either side was water. This spot was one dreary place.

We went on a short distance.

struck a brick road and started on again with hope high and breakfast in sight. Our hopes were shattered, however, because the brick didn't go far and we hit the worst road of the trip. We had to creep along and even then we hit the axles now and then.

Hurrah! The true brick is in sight! Now we fairly flew along, mile after mile getting hungrier and hungrier. In back of us we saw Jake's Ford with Bill and Charlie lolling on each other fast asleep and Jake looking as if he would drop. St. Cloud and breakfast! Wheel!

When we were seated in the restaurant and began to look at each other, we nearly died. Leonard, his long hair standing on end and cap askew, a sheepish look on his face; Fred, grinning and showing his freckles more than ever, and all the other boys dirty and disarranged. Gale was fighting for his knife and fork; Fred was pouring salt on Gale's head; Leonard was trying to steal Gale's tableware; Harold was sleeping with his head on the table. Art, Hal Bache and Jim started laughing until they cried. A town marshal glanced at the Fords and looked us over suspiciously and at our suitcases. This made everybody start laughing again and we were nearly kicked out of the restaurant. But at last the meal was over (each table had to be fed one at a time because there weren't enough tables or tableware to go around).

Homeward bound! Now the miles seemed to stretch out, but at last we were nearing home. The fog lifted just before we got into Orlando and the sunlight followed us the rest of the way. We are home; it is noon.

There isn't one of us who would have misad that trip for anything and there isn't one of us who would be glad to make the trip again. It isn't everybody that can go to Palm Beach and Miami in midwinter, much less a basketball team. The same bunch will probably never make a long trip like this again, but the ones that are left to carry on for Sanford High are pledged never to tell that which is not published in this narrative.

State gives priority to natural resources

GAINESVILLE - Florida FIRST, a new statewide strategic planning process for the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Science (UF/IFAS), was announced this month by Michael Martin, UF vice president for agriculture and natural resources.

"Florida FIRST—short for Focusing IFAS Resources on Solutions for Tomorrow—will include all aspects of our statewide teaching, research and extension programs, with special emphasis on research and extension," Martin said.

"With the new millennium just a year away, the time is right for a thorough review of our programs," he said. "The Florida FIRST planning process will enhance the ability of UF/IFAS to carry out its state mandate of service to the food, agricultural and related natural

and human resources sectors of Florida."

Martin pointed out the planning effort is not about restructuring the organization or deleting programs, but it will be a flexible and adaptable process that will act as a springboard for future growth. All faculty and clients served by UF/IFAS will be involved.

He said the process will include an analysis of the 1997-98 UF/IFAS budget by function/unit/subject matter and commodity. Support and administrative operations also will be analyzed, and Florida research and education programs will be compared with those in other states.

The UF vice president outlined major phases of the planning process, starting with committees that are now preparing base papers for major commodity areas and related subsectors. The papers will in-

clude analyses of current situations, trends and major factors affecting change. These "determinants of change" identify major technological, institutional, human capital and natural resource forces affecting each subsector.

The nine major subsectors include: 1) animals (beef, dairy, horses, poultry and other livestock); 2) field crops (sugarcane and other field crops); 3) forage crops; 4) citrus and other fruit crops; 5) vegetable crops; 6) ornamental horticulture; 7) turfgrass; 8) forestry; and 9) aquaculture, fisheries and wildlife.

Once base papers have been developed by UF/IFAS faculty in cooperation with industry and government leaders, there will be a state conference to identify critical research and extension needs or "imperatives" for the next five to

10 years and beyond, Martin said. The conference will be held May 20-21 at the Safety Harbor Resort and Spa. Attendance will be invitation.

City will open bids for swimming pool

SANFORD - The city of Sanford could open bidding for construction of the community swimming pool at Seminole High School next week.

At Monday's commission work session, consultant Carl Pecht said pool construction could be placed in bidding in 7-10 days. Pecht Evans Engineering Inc. presented a design concept of the pool, with an estimated construction cost of \$928,000.

The city is splitting costs of construction with Seminole County and the Seminole County School District, with more than \$1 million in funding available.

"We believe this can be built with the funds you have," Pecht said.

The 50-meter heated pool will have a 20-meter by 30-meter water polo area and a diving bowl. Sixteen racing stands will be provided. Lane dividers will be competition style. There

will be underwater lighting, and area lighting. The concrete poles will be built to withstand 110 mile per hour winds.

A secondary lighting system will be included to provide low-level security lighting over the pool and deck area.

A multi-head shower will be provided near the bathhouse. The deck will be enclosed by an eight-foot high chain-link fence with top and bottom rails. The fence will be vinyl coated, dark green with slat gates to the concession area and the filter area, and double gates for movement of temporary bleachers.

Tony Acherson, the Seminole High School swimming coach, said the pool exceeds the swimming team's needs.

"It exceeds our needs, by far, and it serves the community's purposes," Acherson said. "That's what we were trying to do all along."

The pool will be open 12 months per year. Pool hours have yet to be determined.

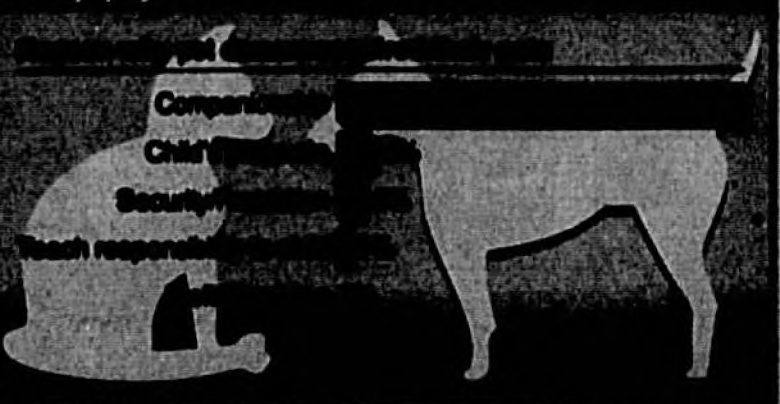

Tornado couldn't blow away teenager's spirit

SANFORD - Justin Roberts didn't let the tornado that destroyed his family's home last February get him down.

Less than a year later, the energetic 16-year-old has delivered on a community project he started before the devastating event.

"I just like being able to help out in the community," said Justin on Wednesday, "especially now that they've given so much back to us."

Justin was among nine members of a 4-H group which delivered home-grown produce to the Sanford Christian Sharing Center Wednesday.

The vegetables were grown in a garden at the Roberts' Laurel Avenue home. It was the first harvest of the season but the second time Justin has made the donation to the center.

In 1997, Justin, along with his brother, Jacob, 11, mother, Linda, and father, Jimmie, cu-

livated at 60-foot by 40-foot garden and harvested 650 pounds of potatoes, cucumbers, tomatoes, zucchini, squash and eggplant. Justin called it a "Community Share Garden."

His plan was to get more people involved, so that more could be grown. This year, his 4-H group helped out.

The work the family was doing to recoup from the tornado damage did not allow Justin to get started on his garden as soon as he would have liked.

The family helped with the construction work on the new home. The house was replaced by Mennonite disaster relief volunteers.

Justin was able to start his garden in September, and the Roberts moved into their home the day after Thanksgiving.

While only one member of the family's sizable menagerie was lost in the storm, all of the garden implements had to be replaced. A church donated a tiller to the family.

The Roberts' home-school their sons. The 4-H activities supplement the curriculum. In the past, Justin has developed a garden for St.

Peters Preschool, in Lake Mary. He said he will soon be teaching a gardening workshop at the Cooperative Extension Service Center.

The first harvest was not as good as Justin expected. "Heat has been a factor," he said. The lettuce did not do well and the peas were stunted, but the group was able to deliver mustard greens, broccoli, cauliflower, and a few peas.

The group is already planning and planting its next garden.

"We're going to do it again, for the spring," said Justin. "We hope to reach more people."

Fire marshal arrested for assault

McGibeny was transported to the branch jail in Ormond Beach and held without bail. He was released on his own recognizance Tuesday.

Sanford fire department chief Tom Hickson said he could not comment on the allegations.

"Right now they're only allegations," Hickson said. "It's hard for me to comment on allegations."

McGibeny is a former fire chief in Daytona Beach. He could not be reached for comment.

County courts Nelson for legal work on cases

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot and American Liberties Institute attorney Frederick Nelson are meeting today to finalize a contract for Nelson to work all future cases concerning the county's Adult Entertainment and Public Decency ordinance.

Nelson will handle the Public Decency litigation Pro bono (free of charge) and be paid \$125.00-an-hour for the Adult Entertainment Ordinance cases. The Orlando firm of Shutta & Bowen had been receiving \$150.00-an-hour for the AEO case work.

By a unanimous vote on Tuesday, the five county commissioners authorized Groot to negotiate a contract with Nel-

son. If Nelson agrees to a contract today, Groot will bring the agreement back to the Board for its approval.

"Nelson's fee is a significant reduction in the hourly rate," Commissioner Randy Morris said today, "but isn't exactly what the board was led to believe last year by Commissioner Grant Maloy. We never discussed paying this guy."

For the sake of compromise, Morris and Commissioner Daryl McLain did not protest the suggestion made by County Attorney Robert McMillan to give Nelson all new litigation but to have Shutta & Bowen attorney Andy Brusby represent the county on the Adult Entertainment Ordinance cases in the Fifth District Court of Appeals.

City will relocate historic trees

SANFORD - Despite objections from All Souls Catholic School, the Sanford City Commission voted in Monday's work session to move forward with relocating the city's famous and historic trees from Fort Mellon Park to George W. Touhy Park.

The school of 300 students uses the park for physical education classes, according to a letter from principal Thomas Doyle to the commission.

"Your converting Touhy Park as you plan to do seriously inhibits our ability to offer a strong physical education program," Doyle said in the letter.

The 80 small historic trees in Fort Mellon Park are being moved to George W. Touhy Park, as the park receives \$100,000 in improvements. The improvements include park benches, sodding, modified irrigation, and a brick walk way. No existing, full-grown trees in Fort Mellon Park are being moved.

Doyle requested that the city find an alternative site for the conversion plans, or convert Park on Park to a usable field.

Touhy Park's location near the Seminole County Student Museum, and the park's distinction as one of the original five park sites planned by General Sanford, were key reasons for moving the historic trees to the park, Sanford landscape architect Howard Jeffries said.

"The park is large enough to accommodate all of our trees," Jeffries said. "Plus, there is room to add more."

The commission considered four different options for placement of the historic trees. The first option, which the commission approved, was to relocate the trees in Touhy Park as planned.

"I think we have an opportunity to make something of (Touhy Park)," commissioner Whitney Echstein said. "We have students from all over the county coming to the Student Museum. What a better opportunity do we have?"
