From Neville also came a warning that the NRA was threatening merchants in farmer territory with bankruptcy because of inadequate farm purchasing power. He said only an increase of buying power through a comprehensive public works program or higher farm prices could save thousands of small merchants although their response to the NRA's request to put men to work had been "wonderful."

The farm price concern also was emphasized at the annual convention of the Nebraska Farmers' elevator association in Omaha where J. R. Morrison, of Co-op, president of the group and head of the country's largest co-operative elevators, said even prices of last March would help.

Turner was an outstanding linesman as a Fresh last fall, and although slow to get under way this fall, has rounded himself out nicely in the past two weeks. Other than this shift, no changes have been indicated, yet Coach Stanley has maintained considerable silence on just what he considers his first eleven.
