neart is normally enclosed in not important. It can be mild membranous sac that looks a lot like a clear plastic bag. It is called the pericardium, meaning around the heart.



Bicentennial To Aid Tourism, **Industry Officials Report**

By The Associated Press The Bicentennial will give an extra boost to the travel market in 1976 and there is evidence of a boom already in the nation's capital and in New England, an Associated

Press sampling shows. Suprisingly, the increased travel to historic sites in the United States is not expected to hurt overseas touring or traditional domestic spas such as Hawaii and Florida, according to an AP check of travel agents, tour organizers, airlines, resort officials and trade publications in some 25 cities at home and abroad.

"We anticipate a good domestic travel year, the best ever in the area of touring," said Alan Fredericks, editor of Travel Weekly, an industry publication that keeps tabs on organized travel.

Avalanche Deaths Increase

FORT COLLINS, Colo. (AP) - More Americans than ever are seeking the solitude of a snowy mountainside for a winter day's leisure. And more Americans than ever are dying in the process.

An average of 12 persons a year have died in avalanches during the last five years, twice the average annual toil for the last quarter century, says a report released Friday by the U.S. Forest Service.

Last winter alone, 22 persons died, including eight in Colorado. This winter has begun with the deaths in November of a cross-country skier near Juneau, Alaska, and a snowshoer in Washington's Mt. Rainier National

Health Facilities Swamped

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Public medical facilities say they have been swamped with emergency cases referred by private hospitals as doctors in Los Angeles County protesting a malpractice insurance rate increse enter their third day of a slowdown.

Physicians and state officials held a "meaningful ex ploration of the issues" Friday night, according to Dr. Daniel A. Lang, medical director of Daniel Brotman Memorial Hospital in Culver City.

They were debating a state proposal to operate a doctor funded insurance pool in exchange for the doctors donating 20 days of free care each year to the poor and needy and their commitment to treat patients referred by Medi-Cal, a state medical program.

Bank Robberies Up 50%

WASHINGTON (AP)-FBI officials say bank robberies are occurring at a record pace across the nation, partly because of the sagging economy and because banks "are

FBI statistics show 50 per cent more bank robberies in fiscal year 1975 than in the previous year. Officials say, there has been no sign of a significant decline since the

"If you're looking for water, you go to the well. If you're looking for money, you go to the bank," remarked Benjamin H. Cooke, chief of the FBI's criminal section.

FTC Proposes Used Car Rules

WASHINGTON (AP) - People who want a used car will have a chance to learn its defects before they buy it, under proposed new federal regulations.

The Federal Trade Commission proposed regulations on Friday to prohibit "any false, misleading or deceptive representation, directly or by implication, of the quality, performance, reliability or lack of mechanical defects of

The commission said the proposed rules are necessary because "a substantial number of used motor vehicles ... are offered for sale ... with mechanical defects.

Veto Override Said Unlikely WASHINGTON (AP) - An override of President Ford's

veto of a bill to expand picketing rights for construction Ford vetoed the bill Friday, as he said he would do. saying it would cause "greater, not lesser, conflict in the

The bill, sought by labor leaders for 25 years, passed Congress this year for the first time. However, neither the majority needed to override a veto.

Reactor Program Confirmed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Energy Research and Development Administration says it plans to proceed with a 10-year research and development program on the controversial liquid metal fast breeder reactor. ERDA Administrator Robert C. Seamans Jr. said Friday the agency was setting 1989 as the date for a decision on whether to promote large-scale commercial construction of fast breeder nuclear power plants.

Domestic Recruiting Denied

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Ford's chief spokesman has declined to rule out that the United States is recruiting foreign mercenaries to fight in Angola's civil

However, Press Secretary Ron Nessen denied that Americans are being recruited for the fighting. Asked Friday about a report in the Christian Science Monitor that 600 Americans had been recruited indirectly by the CIA to fight in Angola, Nessen said, "As far as I know, no private company or contractor is hiring American mercenaries for combat duty."

Singer Withdrawal Announced

NEW YORK (AP) - The Singer Co. announced this past week that it is withdrawing from the business machines field, the latest in a series of company retrenchments because of the recession.

The move parallels decisions by Xerox Corp. and RCA Corp. to leave the computer business. 

The reputation which the late J. Edgar Hoover managed to create for the Federal Bureau of Investigation is now stained with revelations of abuse of power. The stature of Mr. Hoover himself has been diminished. A comparison of Gallup Polls tells the extent of the damage. Where 84 per cent of the people gave the FBI a "highly favorable" rating 10 years ago, only 37 per cent did so six weeks ago and probably fewer would do so today in the wake of more recent testimony before the Senate Intelligence Committee.

As in the case of the parallel disclosure of aberrations by the Central Intelligence Agency, we are left with the question of what to do about it.

The evidence that the FBI tried to harass and discredit Dr. Martin Luther King has prompted a call for an independent investigation to find out if this had any connection with his eventual assassination. For the President to respond would assume prematurely that neither congressional investigators nor those now reexamining the case in the justice Department are capable of answering that question. Mr. Ford is correct when he says there is no justification at this point to launch a Warren Commission-type inquiry.

While it might be hard to conceive of such a plan being an effective check on the FBI during the Hoover years, it is not unreasonable to assume it would work today.

Part of the problem, it now emerges, was the "untouchable" nature of Mr. Hoover's stewardship. For all the respect he deserved for building an extraordinarily efficient FBI, it can now be concluded that too much power had been ceded to him by presidents and Congresses over the years.

William D. Ruckelshaus, a former deputy attorney general and briefly an acting director of the FBI, has suggested that the director in the future serve a limited term, perhaps no more than eight years. This might be part of the answer. Also worthy of study is the proposal that the FBI director be directly accountable to the attorney general as a "buffer" against the agency being politicized from the White House.

Clarence Kelley, the current director, has made perhaps the most constructive suggestion of all - that Congress spell out more clearly exactly what it expects the FBI to do. As he points out, many of the sins now laid at the doorstep of the FBI were "Honest mistakes" by agents who thought they were doing what the American people expected of them when bombings and other violence during the 1960s were threatening civil order. That consideration must go into the scales in judging all the personnel of the FBI, past and present, in-





Magnificent Frescoes Found **Among Medici Family Tombs** FLORENCE, Italy (AP) - Workmen doing restoration work on the ancient San Lorenzo basilica here have found

what art experts believe to be previously unknown frescoes by Michelangelo. If the discovery in the new sacristy is confirmed, it would be the second find of a work attributed to the great Renaissance master in two years. The new sacristy was used as a chapel for the Medici family and it contains

Workmen found the frescoes when they broke through a trapdoor that led to a basement in the sacristy. When experts chipped off the lime covering the walls, they found magnificent murals showing two angels, a cloaked man and a figure that possibly represents Christ. Luciano Berti, the superintendent of galleries and chapels in Florence, announced the news of the discovery over the national television network. Another expert involved in the restoration project is Prof. Paolo del Pogetto, an expert on Medici chapels.
