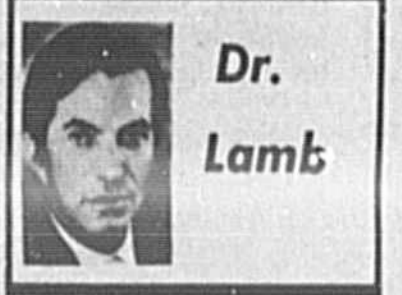
According To Most Other Nations

Spying: A Dirty Business, But A Matter Of Course

EDITOR'S NOTE — Intelligence agencies have many names: MIT, DNA, SID, MET, KGR, ISOC, SNL, MUS, SAD, AMAN, SAVAK. They add up to thousands and thousands of men and women secretly spying around the world.

Nicotine Is A Powerful Poison

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have become very nervous, dizzy, shaky, with feathery lines before my eyes, sweetness, fatigue and weakness. I have seen several doctors, many say nothing is wrong. One said I had nicotine poisoning. I smoke two packs a day. Could you explain what nicotineism is? Can cigarettes really cause these things?



Nicotine is a powerful poison to the cells. It can and will affect the nervous system. Most chronic cigarette smokers develop a tolerance to it. You see the effects of nicotine poisoning usually in a person who has not been smoking and then does. And, in that condition it can cause a lot of the symptoms you describe.

The United States this past year — involving even presidents in the misuse of the CIA and the FBI for political purposes — has ranged farther than any comparable spy scandal in the rest of the world. They surpass even the 1954 "Lavon Affair," in which it was revealed that Israeli spies sabotaged British and American property in Egypt, or last year's West German scandal, in which that nation's intelligence service, limited like the CIA to activities abroad, was found to be gathering dossiers on domestic politicians.

Intelligence operations in Turkey, Greece, Denmark, France, and a few other nations have been criticized recently, but the criticism hasn't resulted in change. Usually it's ignored.

The only other insight the British get into the activity of their spies is in the annual "supply estimate" which the government submits to Parliament. 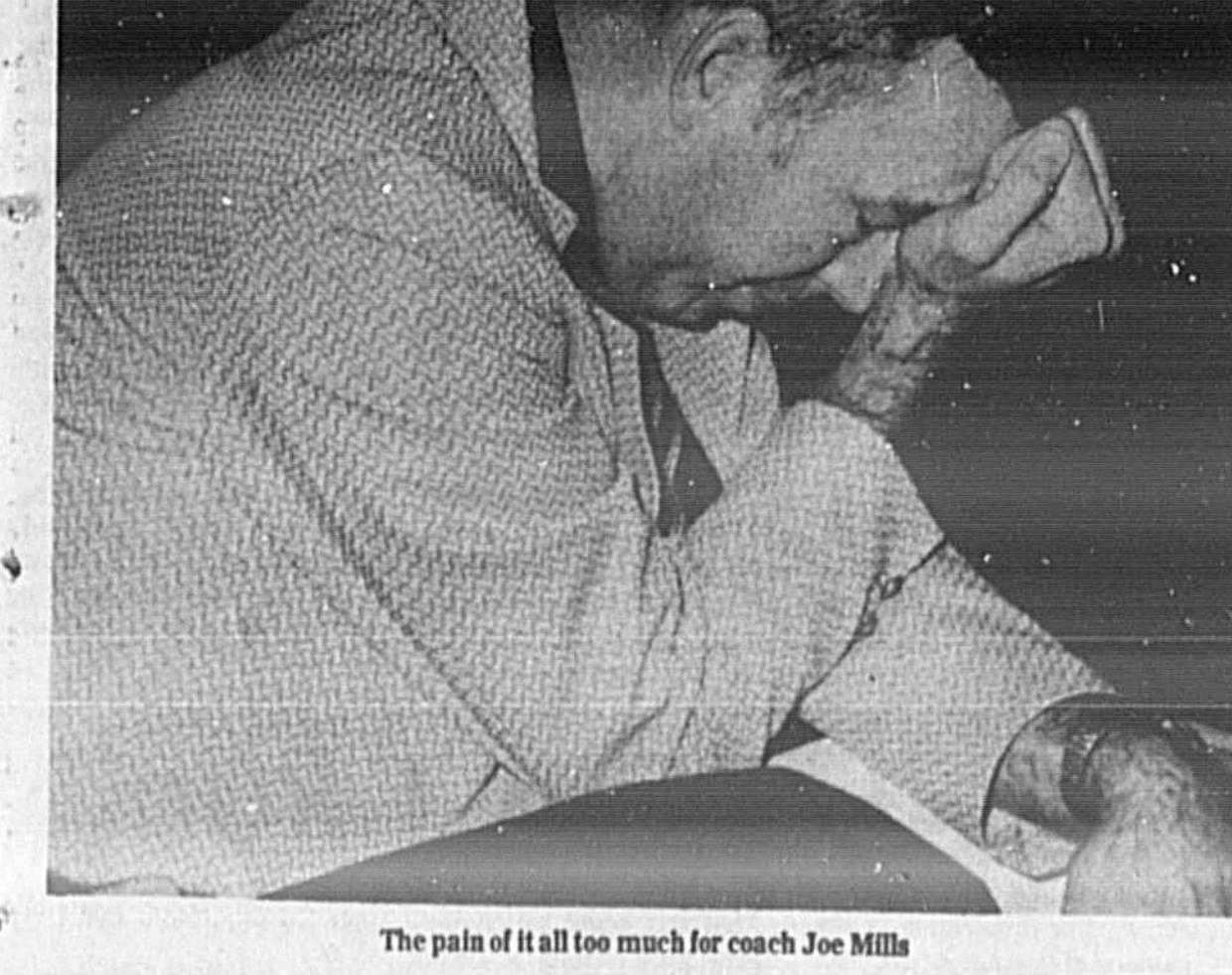
British publications are covered by the so-called defense notice or 4-notice, under which they are asked not to publish certain security information, including anything about DI-5 and DI-6.

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The government rarely tells parliament anything about security matters. Inquisitive MPs are rebuffed. Like Britain, most countries have separate intelligence agencies for internal security and espionage abroad, roughly corresponding to the American FBI and CIA.

China's foreign espionage comes under the international liaison department, which reports to the central committee of the Chinese Communist Party. The service is headed by Keng Paio, 66, former ambassador to Burma, Sweden and Pakistan.

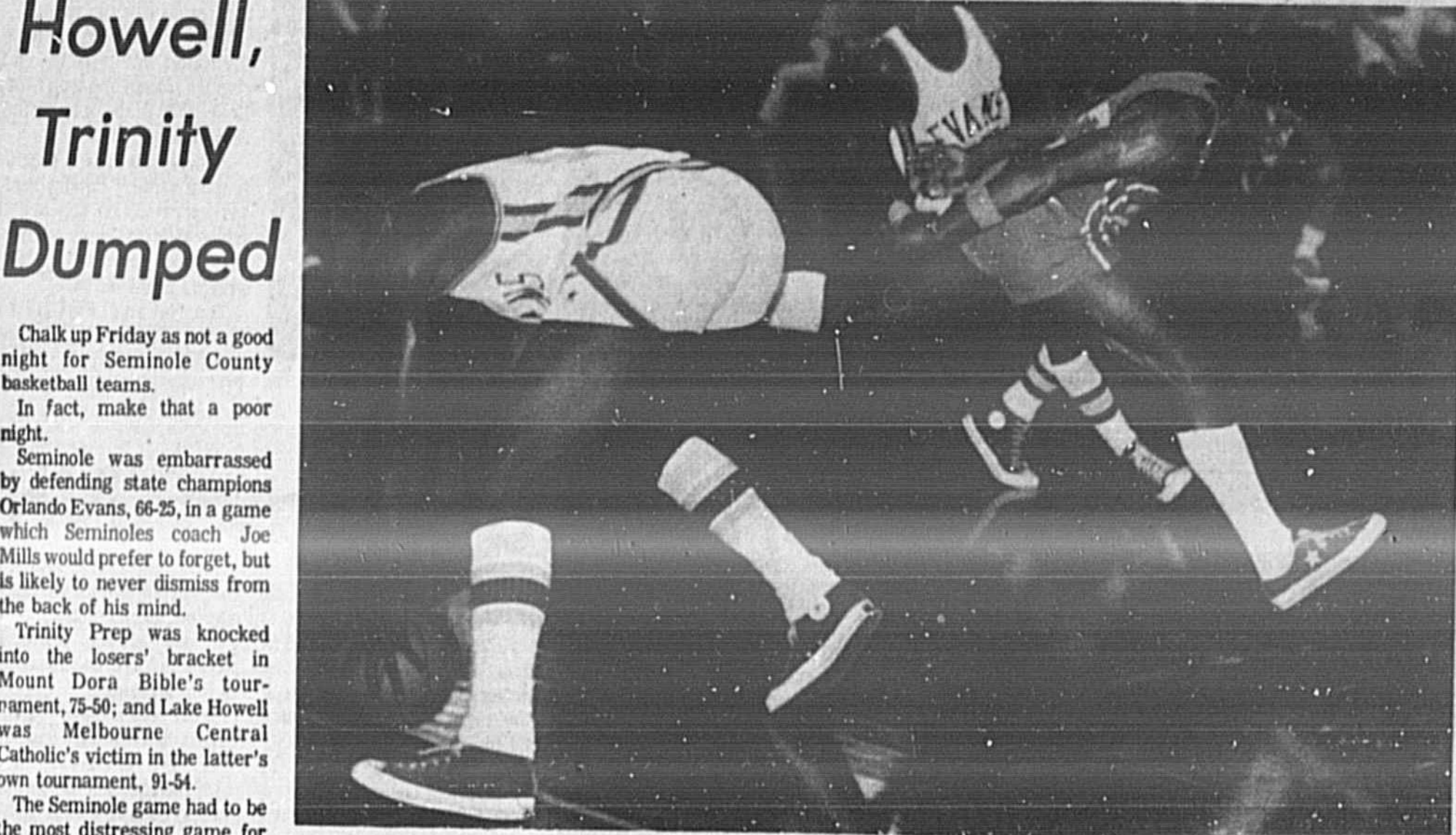

# Bradshaw Says 'No Secret, I Can't Run'

## Wekiva River Fishing Better, Panfish Appears Best Bet

Wekiva River fishing showed an upsurge this week with several good strings landed by visitors to Wekiva and Lake Weir.

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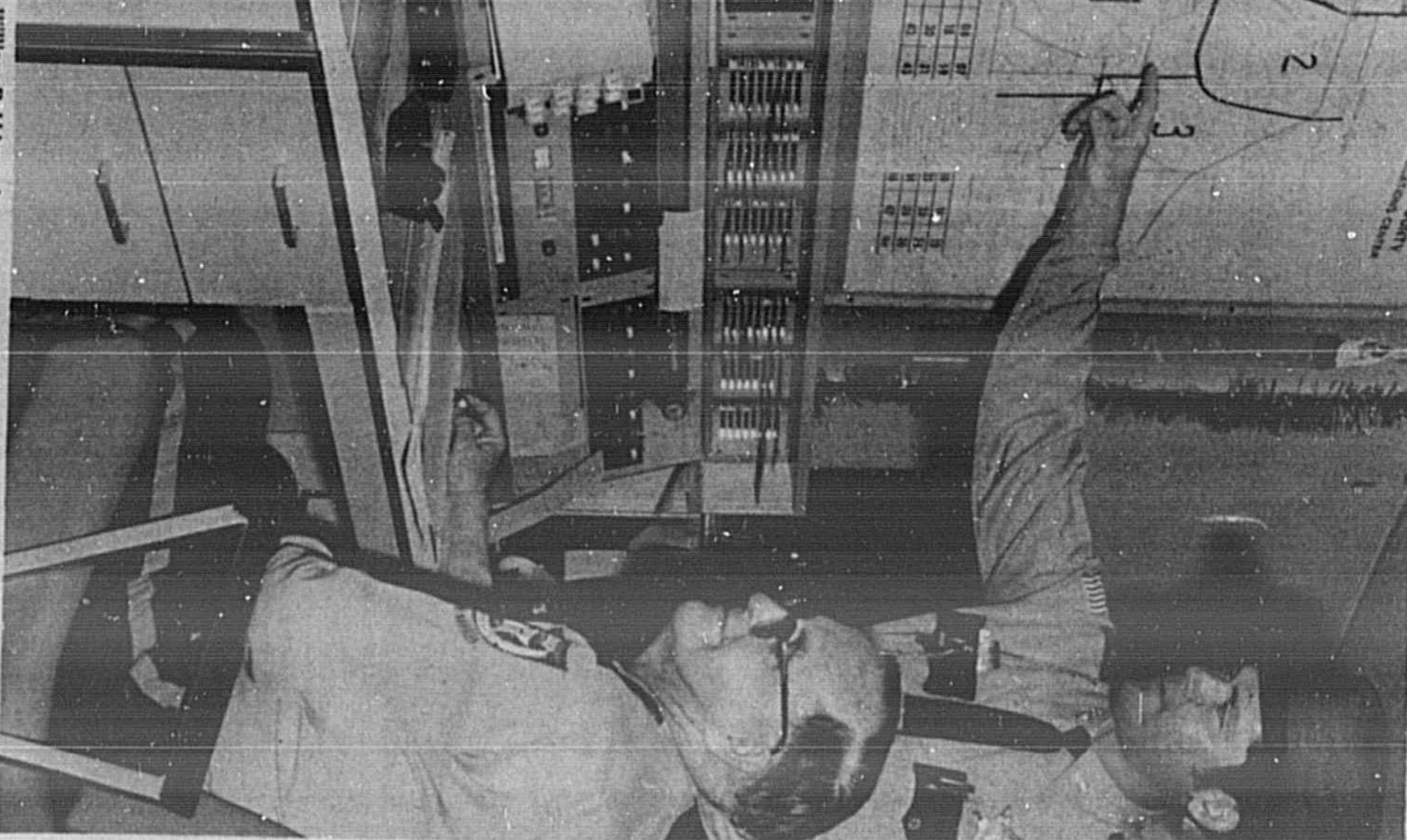

## County Commission Purchases Another Utility Co.

Third Such Buy Since November

County government continued buying its way into the utility business today with the \$160,000 purchase of Eagle Utility Inc. — the third private utility to be purchased since November.

Bill Dale, the county's director of environmental services, said Eagle officials are scheduled to deliver the title and deed to the county later today, closing out the deal Dale feels is "the best" purchase made to date.

The entire \$160,000, Dale said, will be paid from future hookup fees. County officials will pay \$200 to Eagle for each \$700 connection fee, a payment process Dale says will allow the county to own the firm in about three years.

Also, Dale said county sewer and water rates will remain about the same as Eagle's for some 150 customers who live in the Sterling Park area near Casselberry. Monthly rates are \$3.50 for first 5,000 gallons and 30 cents for the next 1,000 gallons of water.

The only major change is that customers will receive their December bills from Seminole County instead of from Eagle.

The reason, according to Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski, is essentially better services for cheaper prices.

"It's the board's feeling that the health, safety and welfare of the citizens must be guarded, and it is our feeling that we can do a very, very good job in this business," Kwiatkowski said.

Kwiatkowski pointed out the county is a non-profit corporation which can "provide services for less." Also, county government is eligible for state and federal grants which tend to offset the final price of services charged Seminole County consumers.

Because for now "money changes hands" Dale was elated at the county's acquisition of Eagle.

He said a number of housing projects are planned for the Sterling Park area.

Thus, Dale said, it will be less than five years before the county pays Eagle on its own money out of connection fees supplied by new customers.

## PERC Action Urged

The Seminole County Commission is being urged in a confidential memorandum to put pressure on the state Public Employees Relation Commission (PERC) for action of an earlier request concerning a local collective bargaining unit.

The commission early last month requested PERC to approve the establishment of a local agency to handle bargaining matters for the county. The state agency has not acted, although the request was made after the commission, under home rule, drafted an ordinance to establish a local agency.

Robert Ellis, the county commission's employe relations officer, signed the memorandum that asks commissioners for permission to draft a letter to PERC because of its failure to "take any meaningful action" on the commission's earlier request.

"It appears that PERC is delaying scheduling hearings on local option applications upon hope that the Legislature will repeal local option before any public employer in the state of Florida has an opportunity to implement same," the memo says.

The Ellis memo goes on to say that the City of Lakeland filed an application for review and approval of their local option ordinance on Nov. 21, 1974. Ellis said Lakeland officials are still waiting for PERC to act on their request.

The board's labor attorneys, Alley, Alley and Blue, submitted Seminole County's application to PERC in September, 1975.

Ellis said PERC's delay is a pressing problem and is in opposition to the state's home rule and the Legislature's plunges into wild horse territory to set up their own PERC.

The county commission's rationale behind setting up their own unit is that local people would be appointed to the board which would then rule on labor relations problems.

Ellis said local people would be "more familiar" with labor problems that exist in Seminole County.

On the other hand, Ellis said an appeal to PERC authorities in Tallahassee often times results in delayed decisions.

## Brock Returns To Sanford—On The Screen

### Helped Develop Central Florida Zoo

The man whom Sanford has come to regard as its own champion of wildlife conservation and cornerstone of the Central Florida Zoo, will be back in the city Friday — not in person, but on the cinema screen.

Stan Brock will star in the jungle spectacular, "Forgotten Wilderness," opening Friday at the Plaza Rocking Chair Cinema in Sanford, and simultaneously in many other cinemas in the Central Florida area.

During the past two years, Brock has become a familiar face in Sanford as he worked at the zoo and promoted its development.

"The people of Sanford have watched closely the progress at the Central Florida Zoo," observed Brock. "We have stimulated their awareness that the wild animals of the earth must be saved. Many of the animals they see in captivity in the zoo, they will be able to see in their natural habitat in 'Forgotten Wilderness.'"

The film, says Brock, is for family viewing and is entertainment-oriented, but it also carries a strong conservation message.

It was during his 13 years as a jungle cowboy in the dense, isolated Amazon Basin that Brock first developed a deep concern and understanding of many exotic animals — a closeness few people ever achieve. This dedication and sense of caring for wild animals was furthered during Brock's years as co-host of television's "Wild Kingdom."

A champion of endangered species, Brock has devoted his life to the care and welfare of exotic animals and the world in which they live.

"Not many of the South American animals are on the endangered species list yet," he commented, "but the jaguar, which you have seen in captivity at the Central Florida Zoo, is an endangered animal. One of the world's largest and most dreaded snakes, the giant anaconda, forest. They also see newborn jaguar cubs, visit a primitive Indian village and view dramatic scenes of animals who roam the Amazon shores only at night."

Brock will be in Sanford briefly during the film's week-long run in the city, then he hopes to proceed once again to South America where filming of his next movie, "Jungle Cowboy," adapted from his book of the same title, is scheduled to begin in March.

## 32 Floridians Die On State Highways

At least 32 people, as predicted, died on Florida's highways during the long New Year's holiday period, a Highway Patrol spokesman says.

The toll for the 102-hour period, from 6 p.m. Wednesday to midnight Sunday, included six people killed New Year's Day when their station wagon collided with an Amtrak passenger train in the tiny community of Loughman in Polk County.

Four of those victims were from one family. The other two were neighbors. All were headed to nearby groves to pick citrus fruit. Troopers said the toll also included:

—David Dean Horne, 18, of Melbourne, involved in a two-vehicle smashup in his hometown on New Year's Eve.

—Olga J. Kutza, 59, of Fort Myers, a passenger killed Saturday when the car in which she was riding was hit head-on by another vehicle in Lee County.

—Three-year-old Jennie Lee Dunbar, fatally injured while crossing a street in Fort Lauderdale at dusk Saturday.

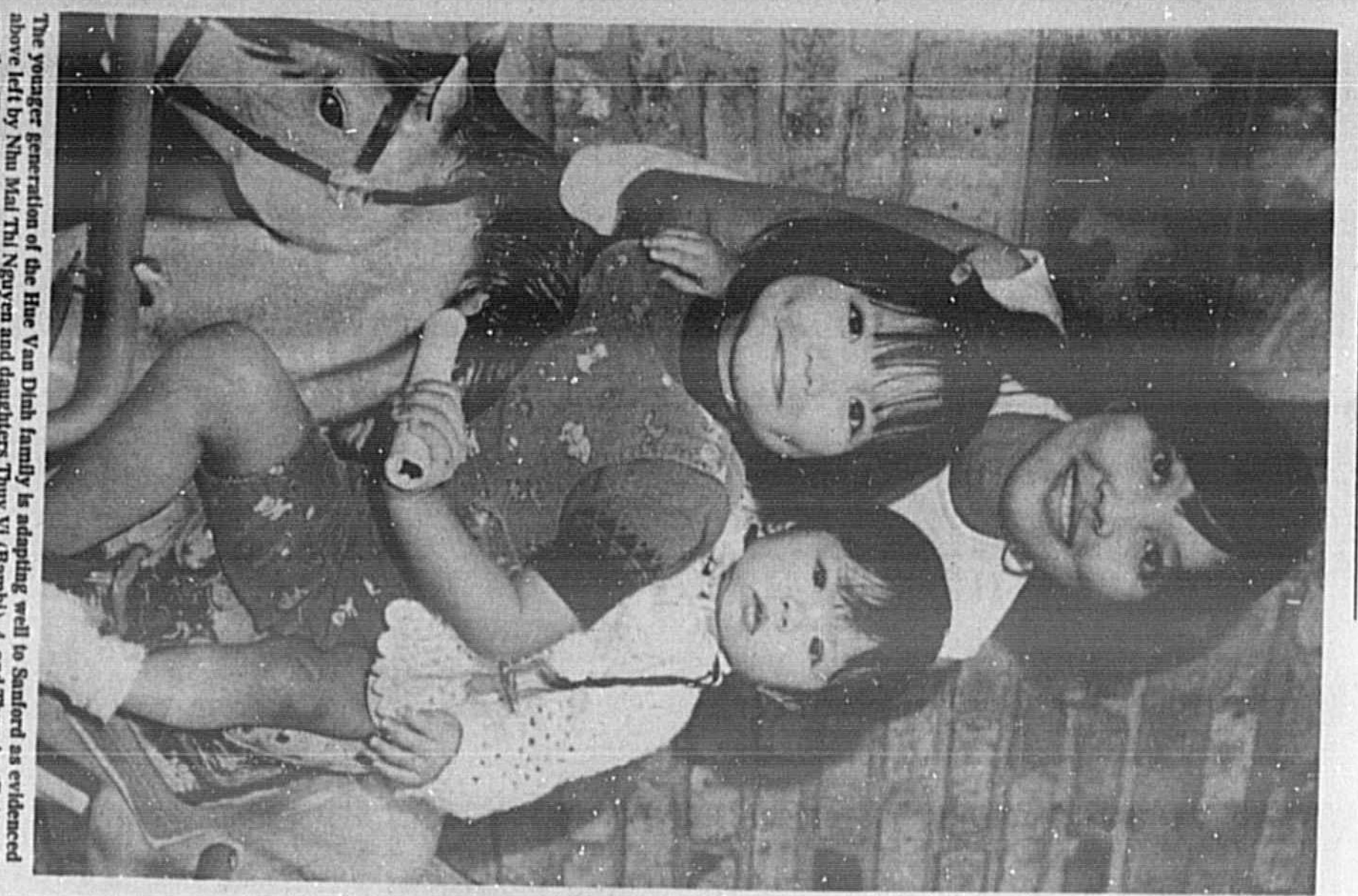
—William C. Simmons, 24, Gainesville, killed when his car ran off a roadway in Alachua County late Saturday.

—Curtis Moore, 30, fatally injured Saturday when the car he was driving ran off a road and struck a culvert near Byronville in Escambia County.

Troopers also identified Sunday a pedestrian killed Saturday near Pinedas Park as John Lester Fitzmaurice, 31, of Largo.
