U. S. Warships Shell Japanese Strongholds

Supremacy In South Pacific Appears To Be Unchallenged As Action Broadens

WASHINGTON, July 2. (AP)—The Navy said today that the 14th Fleet, under Admiral Halsey's command, had shelled Japanese strongholds in the Solomons area of the central Pacific as the general offensive in the Southwest area of the New Britain zone continued.

Allied naval supremacy in the southwest Pacific appeared unchallenged today as United States warships steamed deep into the northern Solomons, shelling a series of Japanese strongholds, while victorious American troops completed the conquest of Rendova Island after wiping out the enemy garrison.

United States shore batteries on Rendova were heavily bombarding the Japanese air base at Munda, in New Georgia Island, seven miles away.

General Halsey's headquarters announced that Japanese planes were shot down yesterday in the Southwest Pacific. Other war actions were relatively quiet, although Soviet war planes harassed the Germans on both sides of the Reich Strait.

WASHINGTON, July 2. (AP)—Powerful American sea and air forces today began the final drive on the Southwest Pacific, attacking the heavy Japanese base at Munda, New Georgia Island, seven miles away.

A Navy committee said reported today that the 17 United States ships, 113 planes, 1,000 troops and 1,000 tons of supplies were damaged in the attack.

Axis Insists Allied Thrust Is Approaching

London Newspapers Give Prominence To Pacific Action U. S. Is Warned

LONDON, July 2. (AP)—Promised that this Summer would see fighting on a European front, the British turned attention today to the Pacific, where General MacArthur's rush toward Rabaul was regarded as emphasizing Allied ability to carry the offensive to the Axis on both sides of the world.

The Axis, alone in the matter, kept up a clamor of invasion speculation. The Paris radio reported heavy British troop movements to Southern England and stuck to the Nazi prediction that an Allied blow was set for Saturday, July 3.

The Star said the drive was one which "the Japanese must resist with all their available sea, air and land forces if they are to prevent a breach in the southern eastern bastion of the fortress of Asia."

German military commentators finally reached a decision as to what to say of Prime Minister Churchill's speech of yesterday. A military spokesman for the German agency DNB, in a broadcast recorded for Saturday, July 2, said that before Autumn heavy fighting will rage on more than one front.

He suggested, however, that this fighting might include "some operations over which Churchill has no control."

Seven Persons Burn To Death In Auto Crash

Fourth Of July Celebrated With Heavy Travel But Few Accidental Deaths

MARIENVILLE, July 5, (AP)—Seven persons were burned to death, another killed and two seriously injured yesterday in a head on collision of two out-of-state automobiles three miles south of this town, state police reported.

Both cars—one from New York and the other from Ohio—burst into flames with the impact of the crash, trapping the seven persons in the New York automobile and burning their bodies beyond recognition. In general, Americans, celebrating the second wartime Fourth of July set an all-time high in holiday travel but due to gas rationing and no fireworks set a new low in holiday deaths and accidents.

Except for a few freak twists, Sunday, July 4 brought no more deaths than a normal Sunday, early reports indicated.

Travel Facilities Taxed While railway, bus and airline facilities groaned under the heaviest passenger load in their histories, the Office of Defense Transportation warned workers that the return travel jam would be even worse, and urged all who could to start home before Monday night.

Transcontinental railway, bus and airline terminals were almost deserted Sunday and employees took a breathing spell before the coming of the homeward trek.

Love Raped One holiday death was that of a Detroit wife, who worked at a factory in the same war plant where her husband works night. She was raped and killed her husband by their holiday.

A Kalamazoo, Mich., girl was killed when a beam of brass bolted through her head.

At Oakland, Calif., a boy was killed in a bicycle accident.

A 58-year-old New York man was burned to death when a small plane crashed into his car.

Seven persons were killed in Ohio in automobile accidents.

Two persons died in traffic accidents in Iowa; four died in traffic accidents.
