## Flight service expanding at Sanford airport

SANFORD - Following the official ceremony today at the Orlando Sanford Airport, daily flights will be available between Sanford and Allentown, Pennsylvania. The flights, by Sun Pacific International, Inc. (SUNPAC), based in Tucson, Arizona, are to be scheduled one per day, every day except Wednesday.

Tom Wainwright, president of the airlines, flew to Sanford this morning to officiate in the inaugural service dedication ceremonies.

Wainwright also has Wainwright's Vacations, which is headquartered in Pennsylvania. Through that, he plans to offer flights to Grand Cayman, Jamaica, St. Martin, U.S. Virgin Islands, Turks and Caicos.

According to Orlando Sanford Airport Executive Director Steve Cooke, the new service to and from Pennsylvania will provide another positive growth opportunity for the airport. "We are very excited about the potential for this program, particularly with an experienced tour operator like Tom Wainwright," Cooke said.

The airport's Director of

Marketing and Development Ray Wise, said persons will be able to depart from Sanford as well as from Allentown. Most of the flights into Sanford are from the Caribbean or overseas, but with the new Sun Pacific agreement, there are now two carriers with flights in the continental US. The one already in operation includes three flights a week to Biloxi, Mississippi.

According to information released from Sun Pacific, the cost of a round trip between Sanford and Allentown is \$158. Allentown is considered an excellent location due to its close proximity to Philadelphia and western New Jersey.

Last month, when it was announced that Wainwright would be opening new flight service from the Orlando Sanford Airport, it was expected only the new flights to the Caribbean island area would begin.

Sun Pacific will operate Boeing 727-200 Stage III aircraft in the flights between Sanford and Pennsylvania.

Flights are scheduled to leave Sanford at 6 p.m. and arrive in Allentown at 8:25 p.m. The return trip will leave Allentown at 8:30 a.m. and arrive in Sanford at 10:55 a.m.

## Cops seek suspicious car; photo of suspect released

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary Police continue to investigate a Wednesday robbery at Colonial Bank, and are following a clue that a suspicious car was in the parking lot an hour before the crime.

An unknown man was stopped in front of the bank stating he was "out of gas". Police have run his tag through the Ocala County Sheriff's Office and are waiting for results. It is undetermined at this time whether the individual had anything to do with the robbery that occurred at 3:40 p.m. "We're still checking into it," said a Lake Mary police official.

A white female, approximately 27 years old, entered the Colonial Bank, located at the corner of Lake Mary Boulevard and Lake Emma Road, with a knapsack and implied that she had a gun. Police say that she made off with about \$11,000 in funds. The woman was last seen running in the See Robbery, Page 3A

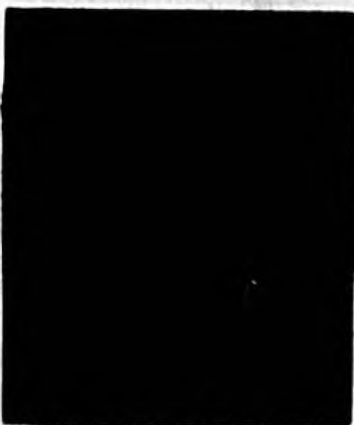
### Practice Makes Perfect

## Fund Web sites diversify and improve

A few years ago, a mutual fund family's online home page looked a lot like an ad — heavy on sales pitches and light on content. Now, much of that has changed. Online fund families today offer readers ways to open accounts, receive prospectuses, review fund performances and even study finance.

Consider Vanguard's Web site, where you can test your mutual fund knowledge and learn about investing for retirement. On its Investor Education site via the Vanguard Online University, you'll find information on mutual fund investing, the difference between saving and investing, and how to build a balanced portfolio.

The Calvert Group's home page features information on socially responsible investing, understanding risk and the securities markets. Its Understanding Investment subject, for instance, discusses how the world influences investments. It reads, in part: "Financial markets and the economy are like the ecosystem — all elements are interdependent, and changes that occur in one area can affect other areas, either directly or indirectly."

Calvert's page also does research. To find out whether a fund — any fund — owns tobacco stocks, go to the section "Do You Know What You Own?" Enter the fund's name in the appropriate space, hit "go" and in about a minute you'll find out that fund's tobacco holdings, the holdings' market value, along with other companies in the fund's portfolio. I entered the name "Magellan," and found out that as of March 31, 1997, the giant Fidelity Fund owned Phillips 66, J.R. Heubusch...

Imperial Tobacco. It would be great if the portfolio holding data was fresher, but given that Calvert says two out of three fund investors can't name a single company owned by their funds, this service provides a great start.

Founders Investors, like many others, offers information for individual and institutional investors, financial advisers, and its own shareholders.

As nifty and informative as a fund's Web site can be, weeding through the 200 or so mutual fund sites is time-consuming. 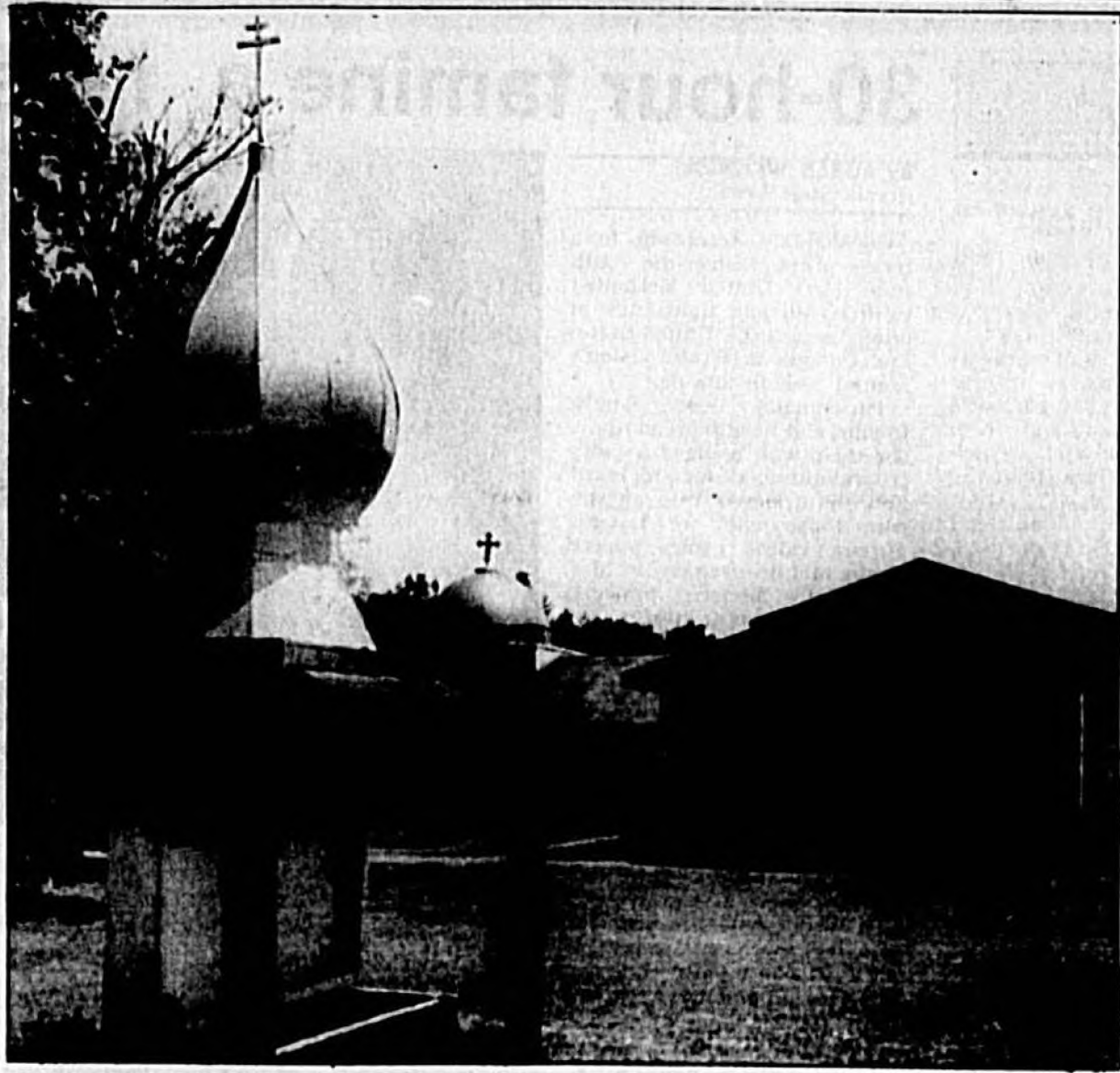

# Rams find a leader

## Lake Mary upsets No. 1 Oviedo behind Bingham advance to 6A-3 finals

**LAKE MARY** — With a couple of seconds left, Lake Mary point guard Jerome Bingham thrust the ball into the air.

As time expired, his game jersey went into the stands, and then he got really excited.

Bingham had every right to be excited. He had just led his Lake Mary Rams to a 57-39 win over Oviedo to advance to the Class 6A-District 3 finals Saturday against Lake Howell, which edged Lake Brantley in the other semifinal.

Game time is 7:30 p.m. at Lake Mary, following the Junior Varsity Championship between Oviedo and Lake Brantley at 6 p.m.

Oviedo was top-seeded in the tournament, and had beaten the Rams twice during the regular season, but Lake Mary dominated from the start and Bingham was a main factor. The Rams' point guard situation has been shaky at times, but Bingham has come on strong as of late and had his best game of the season against Oviedo.

"That was the best game of my life," Bingham said. "We had the will to win, especially after losing to Oviedo five straight times."

Oviedo's Seth Fowler and Lake Howell's Reggie Kohn have gotten most of the attention among Seminole County point guards this season, but Bingham said not to ignore him.

"I've been underestimated all year, but I work just as hard as anybody," Bingham said after his

game-high 14 points.

Lake Mary coach Mike Gaudreau agreed.

"Jerome Bingham was the difference tonight," Gaudreau said. "The referee told me with about 30 seconds left that he was the difference. Jerome penetrated and broke their press and made it easy for the rest of us."

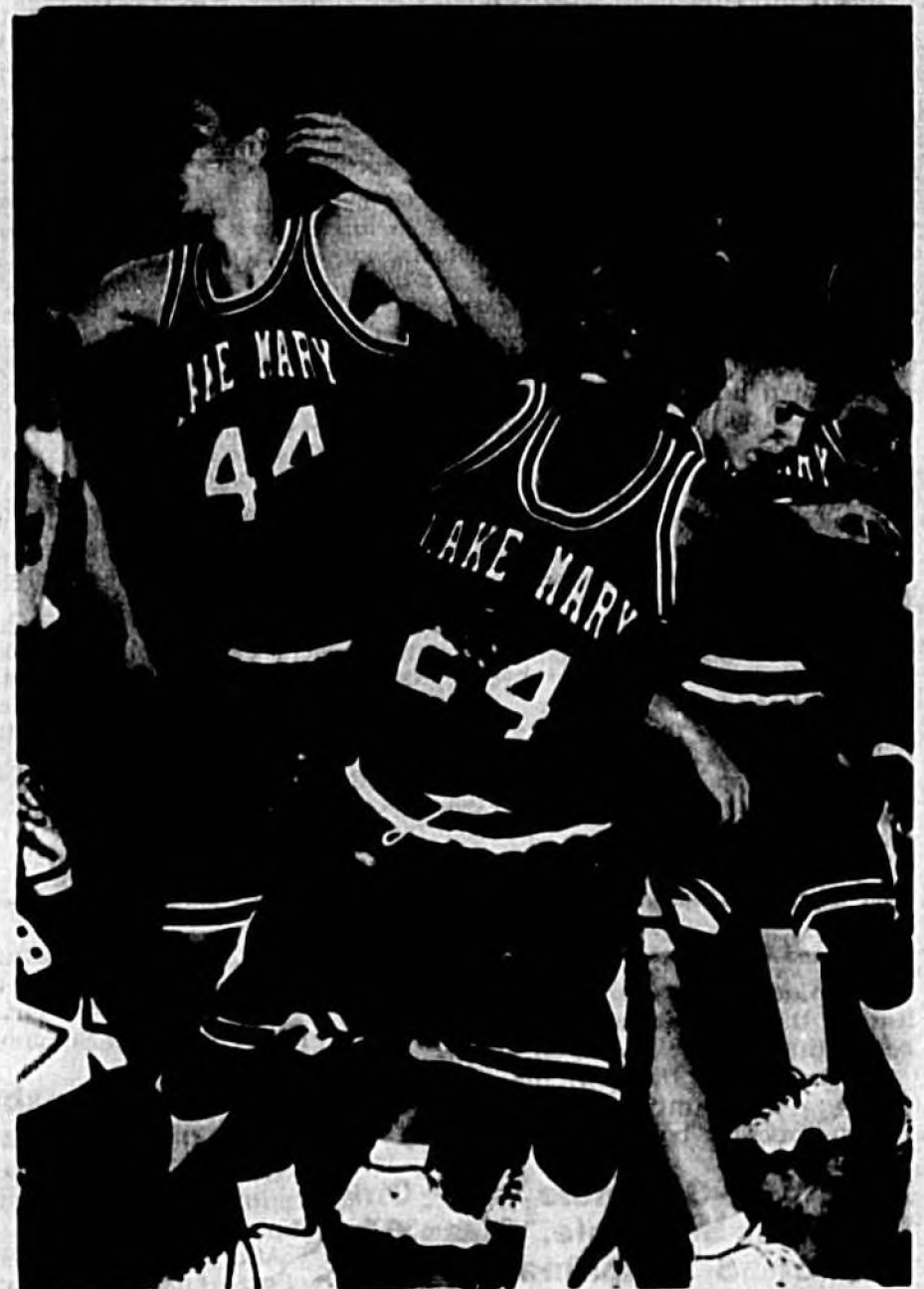
Lake Mary jumped out to a 4-0 lead on short jumpers from big men Jamal Harrison and Robbie Shapiro. The Rams never trailed the entire evening and held an 18-10 lead after the first quarter. Bingham had seven points in the period.

The Rams went up by 10 at the break as shooting specialist Randy Abrams hit a pair of three-pointers, but it was the third quarter that iced the win for the Rams. Lake Mary outscored Oviedo, 14-3 in the period, holding Oviedo to just one field goal.

It was never close again as Lake Mary went into a slowdown offense in the fourth quarter and was able to hit its free throws.

For Oviedo, it was a tough loss coming on the heels of last season's state finals when the Lions lost to Miami Senior after a run through the regionals. Oviedo lost four starters coming into the season and were generally picked to finish somewhere in the middle of the Seminole Athletic Conference, but coach Ed Krahner found a way to make his Lions competitive and it paid off with a regular-season district title.

After the injury and everything he had to overcome, this is a great situation for him to be in. He's a very hard worker and I know he'll do well."

All of the hard work and inability to give up have come back two-fold for Brown. He will begin college life in the fall at one of the state's best institutions.

"I am so excited about this scholarship," Brown said. "The fact that FAMU is so close played a large part in my decision because my parents and older brother have always come to everyone of my games. I couldn't imagine playing without them in the stands. They'll be able to come to at least all of the home games and I'm very happy about that."

# HHS to double anti fraud force

Remember the Pentagon buying scandals of the 1980's, the \$6,000 toilet seat on an Air Force jet? The war on waste and fraud in the massive Medicare and Medicaid programs will be one of the big stories as the 1990s come to a close: the government finds that as much as 25 percent to 40 percent of the home healthcare visits in some markets were provided to ineligible people, or else they never took place at all.

Suppliers to nursing homes are classifying adults diapers as "urinary incontinence control systems" and are marking up the price 500 percent.

Taxi drivers taking beneficiaries to clinics or hospitals are collecting payment for ambulance service.

Waste and fraud may gobble up as much as \$20 billion a year--10 percent of Medicare's annual outlays of \$200 billion. Across the Spectrum

June Gibbs Brown, the inspector general of the Department of Health and Human Services, has announced that her staff of auditors and investigators, now 960, will be increased by 20 percent this year and will double by the year 2002.

An aggressively expanded campaign against fraud will be waged "across the whole spectrum" of health spending, said Bruce Vladick, director of the Health Care Financing Administration, which oversees Medicare, the program for those aged 65 or older and the disabled, and Medicaid, the pro-

gram that pays the health bills for the poor.

Attorney General Janet Reno said that companies dealing with the federal government's health programs should adopt voluntary internal guidelines to prevent or detect fraud.

"We expect businesses to take the steps on their own initiative, before any unlawful conduct occurs", she declared. For those who ignore this advice, she warned, "We will bring the full weight of the government's power to bear to enforce the law and protect the American people from being ripped off".

The government has had its biggest successes in LabScam, a two-year-old program which has collected \$800 million in settlements from laboratories that cheated Medicare by performing blood and urine tests that weren't ordered by doctors, or by falsifying test results.

For example, doctors routinely order a blood analysis along with a variety of tests. "This practice cost Medicare about \$0 per test for tens of thousands of examinations", said John Phillips, a Washington attorney who filed a case that led to a settlement producing \$325 million. The laboratory included the results of a rarely used test for a type of anemia and billed Medicare for another \$1.50 per test, Phillips said.

Even by the standards of Washington, where budgets are reckoned in billions of dollars, the recovery of \$800 million is stunning.

# Parents, respect teen's preference

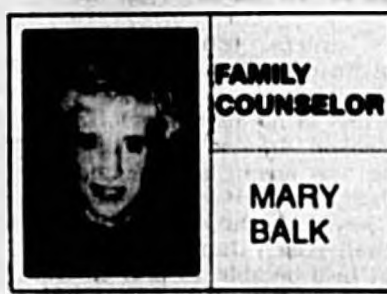
Dear Mary,

monitoring these decisions, but unless they are violating a school rule, law or public sensibility, parents should respect a teen's preference as much as you want them to respect yours.

If your son does violate the school dress code, you must let him know that you expect him to follow the school's rules. But he could still dress the way he chooses at other times. You can bet that what he wears, listens to and does will be greatly influenced by what his friends are wearing and doing. Therefore, as long as he is picking friends that you feel good about, you can feel pretty safe that he's going to be OK.

There is really nothing to be gained by sweating the small stuff. You are much better to pick your battles, and make sure they are both worth winning, and winnable. Keep an eye toward the big picture or you'll end up driving both yourself and him nuts.

P.S. In the not-too-distant future, I'll bet you are going to get a boost in the dress and hygiene department from another source--when he discovers girls. You may find yourself

yearning for "the good old days!"

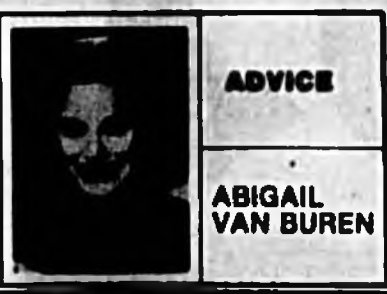
I have talked to his family and mine, and most of them just want me to be happy. My children adore him. I know my dear late husband would have no objections. He loved us both and would want us to be happy.

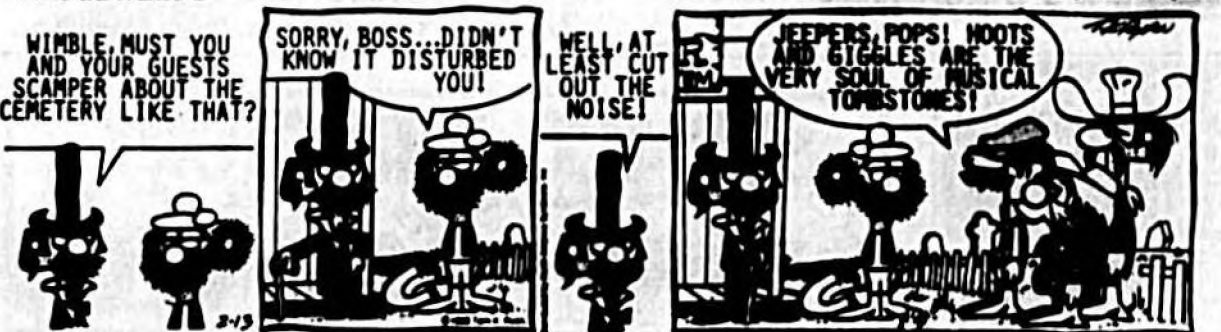

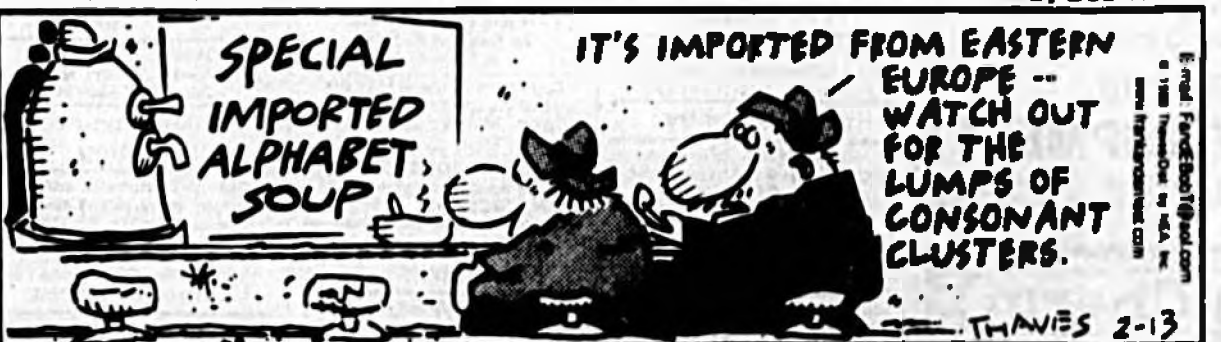

**Be alert to inappropriate behavior**

DEAR DR. GOTT: Several years ago, my wife went to a doctor because of a stiff neck. Once alone in his office, she was instructed to remove her blouse and bra. After examining her neck, the doctor fondled her breasts. Now I always go with her to the doctor. Am I being overly cautious?

DEAR READER: I don't believe so. The original doctor may have had a bona fide reason for asking your wife to disrobe. In all fairness to him, he may have thought that a breast examination was necessary, and she may have misperceived the exam as "fondling."

On the other hand, he may have been behaving inappropriately. If he felt your wife's breasts for other than medical reasons, he behaved unethically and should have been reported to the state medical society.

But that's all past history. I can understand why your wife feels comfortable when you accompany her to the doctor, and I see no reason why you shouldn't do so. In my practice, I often ask spouses if they wish to be present when I examine their wives or husbands. Sometimes they do, usually they don't. The important consideration is that they, not I, make the decision. This arrangement works well for me — until the wife balks because she has some personal concerns that she doesn't want to share with her husband. But that's a subject for another day.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I believe that a husband who insists on being present for his wife's examination may actually be engaged in spousal abuse. The patient has a right to privacy. Therefore, we should praise the physician who discourages such an arrangement. The patient — not the husband — should come first.

DEAR READER: Point taken. I would be interested in other readers' views on this complex situation.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A recent television drama addressed the problem of Tourette syndrome. What is this fascinating affliction?

DEAR READER: Gilles de la Tourette syndrome is a rare neurological disorder of unknown cause, marked by severe motor tics (stitches of the face, neck and shoulders), vocal tics (grunts and words), and sudden, unpredictable utterances of expletives. In the program you watched ("The Practice," ABC, Jan. 3, 1998), a little girl with the syndrome was banned from public school. The situation was resolved because the judge,

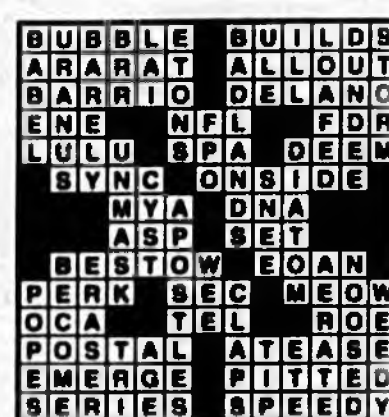

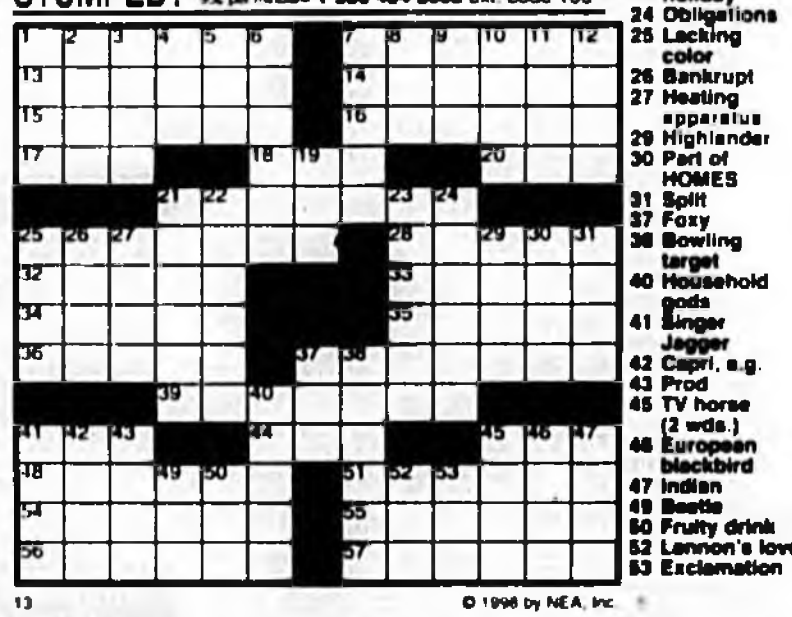

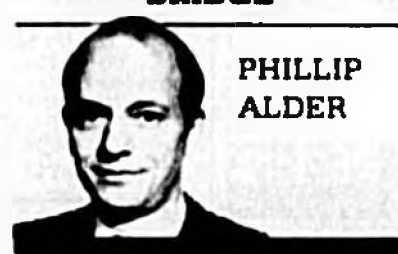

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

**Seeing without looking**

It's Friday the 13th. Stuck behind enemy lines, you come up against two doors, one leading to freedom and the other to the dungeon. Wouldn't you prefer better than a 50-50 chance at liberty? Unfortunately, as each door is guarded by a 300-pound bouncer, it will be impossible to have a quick peek while no one is watching. Good luck!

At the bridge table, though, sometimes you can peek at the opponent's cards without letting your eyes stray sideways.

Against three no-trump, West leads the spade two, four, queen, ace. That's annoying because it's your weak suit, but assuming the lead is honest, at least the spades are splitting 4-4. So, once you drive out the heart ace, you appear to have only four losers (three spades and one heart), with nine tricks (one spade, three hearts, one diamond and four clubs) available. However, there's a 32 percent chance that the

missing clubs won't split 3-2.

If you play a heart immediately, the defenders might win with the ace, cash their spades ending with West, and switch to a diamond. Then what would you do? If the clubs are worth four tricks, you can win with dummy's diamond ace and run for home. But if the clubs are splitting badly, you must hope the diamond finesse is working.

One peek is worth several finesesses, but the secret is to peek without looking. Just start by cashing two top clubs. Has the suit split favorably? If so, drive out the heart ace and claim. If
