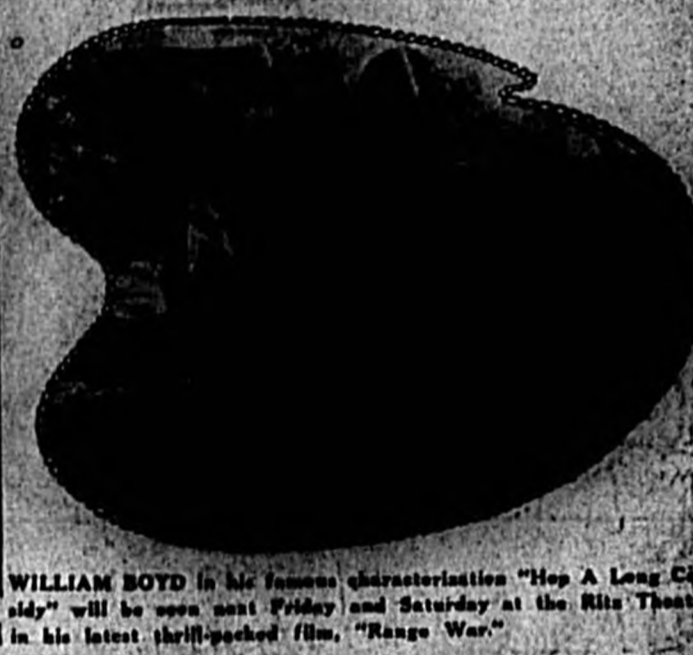

High School, College Graduates Forced To Go Elsewhere For Jobs, Mayor Says

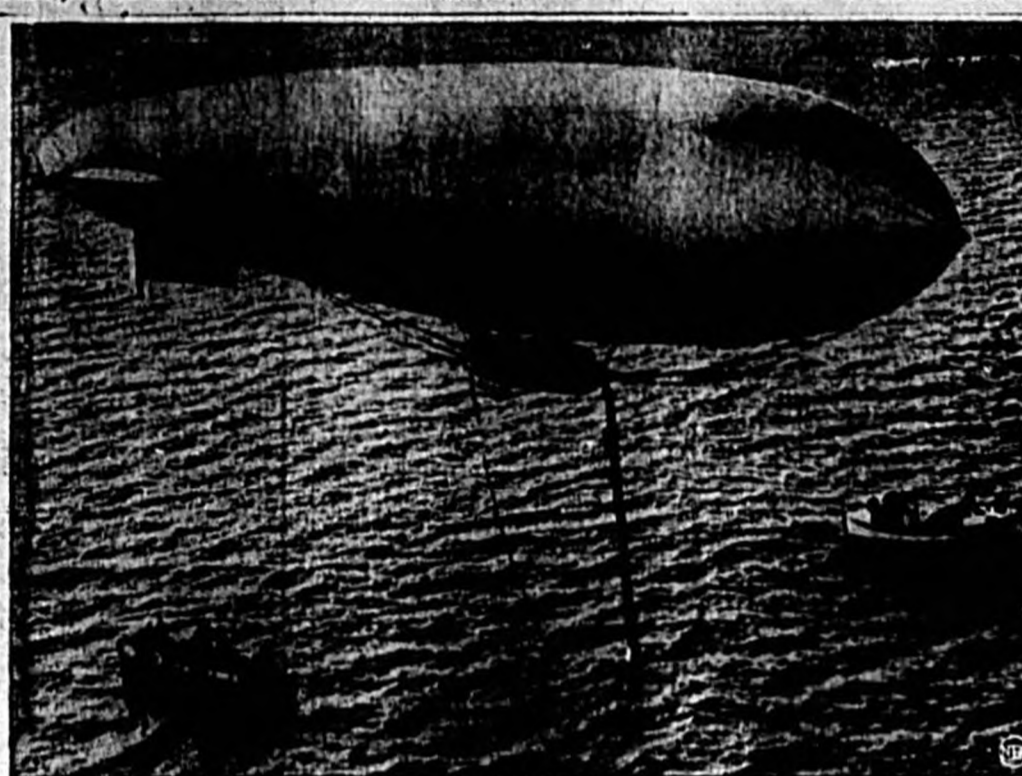

State Department Is Looking Into Future In Studying Possibility

25 Are Routed From Red Dance

Victory Meet Halted By Anti-Communists Who Wrecked Hall

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The government was reliably reported to be proceeding with caution, looking well into future in studying the possibility of severing diplomatic relations with Russia.

The Swedish legation in Moscow was asked by Finland to consult the Kremlin on the possibility of peace without violating the independence and vital interests of Finland.

The Soviet press denied Russia intended to convert Finland into a dependency and attacked Britain, France and the United States' attitude toward the war.

Heavy Russian casualties were reported by the Finnish high command which said that "since morning's attack, many Russian tanks caused a growing toll."

Some Geneva observers said sudden league activity looked as though League members might be willing to force Russia to arbitrate or withdraw from the League.

Reparations from the Finnish-Soviet conflict focused in Rome where a crowd demonstrated in front of the Finnish legation, cheering Finland and booing Russia.

Britain and France started a joint blockade of all German exports. Britain said 55 German merchant ships have been turned out of action since the war started.

Germany and Britain gave conflicting versions of the British air raid on Helsinki Sunday. Britain said "direct hits" were scored on warships.

In Tokyo the United States Ambassador conferred with the Japanese Foreign Minister about whether a certain Japanese proposal for a tentative formula for the settlement of their problems.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The government won its Supreme Court effort to prosecute anti-trust proceedings charging a group of corporations, organizations and individuals with conspiracy to fix prices, restrict output and suppress competition in a Chicago case.

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Gubernatorial Timber

Whatever outcome next year's gubernatorial election may have, it will not lack for good gubernatorial material.

With the announcement this morning that Spessard Holland of Bartow will run for governor in 1940, it became an assured fact that the people of Florida can have a good governor if a majority of them want one.

Holland is 47 years of age, old enough to know his way around in state politics, not too old to give the office of governor the energy and direction it requires. He is a World War veteran and served in the aviation forces on the Western Front. He has been a prosecuting attorney, county judge, and senator for two terms in his home county.

In making his announcement, Holland declared, "Florida must continue to develop her attractions as the Nation's playground. Lawful amusements must be encouraged and improved. Public parks, national, State and local, for the recreation of our people and our visitors, must be fostered throughout the State as a part of our permanent policy. Of particular importance to the entire State is the speedy completion of the Everglades National Park."

Taxation is our principal problem, with the responsibility divided between the executive department, the Legislature and the people themselves. Temporizing in our tax policies disturbs Florida business, discourages prospective investors, and affects the security of our wage earners. It will be my earnest purpose to co-operate actively and sympathetically with the Legislature and with the general public, including business, agriculture and labor, in seeking to establish our tax structure on a more equitable basis.

A number of other candidates have also announced their aspirations for the highest office in the state. Another Central Florida candidate is definitely in the race in the person of Francis Whitehair of DeLand. He like Holland would have a great deal to offer the people as governor. B. F. Paty of Palm Beach and Fuller Warren of Jacksonville also deserve honorable mention.

With such a lively field of candidates, it should be a lively political campaign and one not devoid of spectacular oratorical bombardments. And the outcome of all this should be the inauguration of a capable man as governor in 1941.

Are You A Ham?

Are you a "ham" driver? asks the Melbourne Times. Do you drive your automobile just as the notion takes you, or have you studied the job until you are a reliable expert?

A "ham" driver in case you don't know, is one that comes under a description of the creature as offered by J. Stannard Baker, traffic safety consultant for the National Safety Council. Check over his eight points, just to see if you could possibly be included among the "Hams."

- 1—He can't make up his mind as to what he wants to do soon enough and depends upon his ability to do it only when he has to.
- 2—He waits too long to get into the proper lane for turning. He's even likely to do his slowing down after he gets into the intersection or on the turn, rather than before.
- 3—He is oblivious to other traffic. He straddles lane lines as though he were the only driver on the road. In extreme cases he can be found completely over on the left side of the highway. He is not intentionally being a road hog; He simply drifts over unconsciously.
- 4—He zooms out of a parking position at the curb with no regard for traffic that may be coming from behind. Again, he is just thoughtless, rather than vicious.
- 5—He makes a "good enough" turn signal. He lets his hand dangle or flutter aimlessly from the window, and following traffic doesn't know whether he's signaling a turn, flicking ashes from a cigarette or waving at someone on the sidewalk.
- 6—He turns around and talks to others in the car as he drives, instead of keeping his eyes on the road.
- 7—He is guilty of bad posture. He slouches behind the wheel, sticks his left elbow out the window.
- 8—He is a one-hand wheeler. This is different from one-armed driving in which a girl usually occupies the other arm. In one-hand wheeling, the driver keeps only one hand on the wheel, the other rests in his lap, hangs out the window or holds a cigar, pipe or cigarette. He has nowhere near the control or leverage he needs in an emergency.

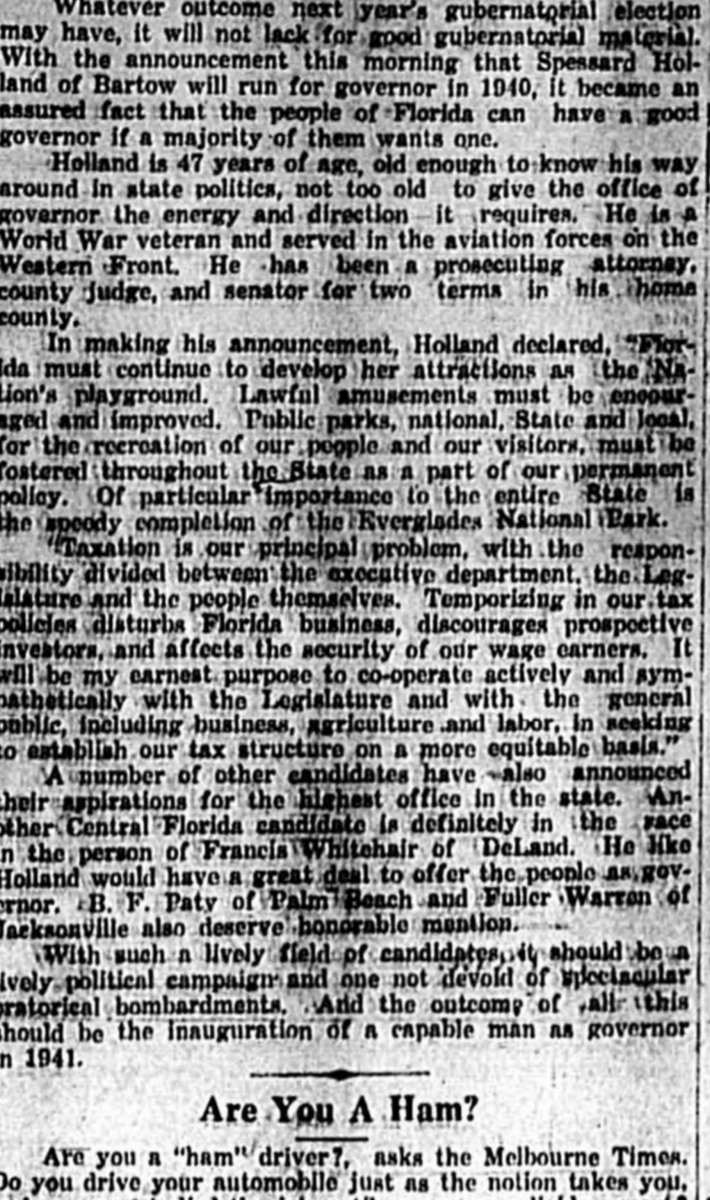

Winter Haven Is Planning For Big Orange Festival



WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

WASHINGTON—Strange as it may seem, the latest peace maneuvers by Holland's queen and Belgium's king are traced by many diplomatic minds straight back to the decision of the American Congress to repeal the arms embargo.

Here's the way, they figure it out.

The repeal of the arms embargo eventually will put at the disposal of the Franco-British Allies the arms output of American industry, including airplanes.

Some experts in the industrial and military fields suggest that American production can supply the needs of the Allied military equipment if the war continues for more than a year. That means the odds against German success in a long-term war are heavily increased by the new American neutrality law.

Of course, other factors besides the American arms embargo have given Hitler time—and caused delay setting into action. But the picture under the neutrality act has been an important one. The lifting of the embargo under the new neutrality act now makes Germany's more and more costly.

With repeal, therefore, every day's delay in a final conclusion of the war favors the Allies. It gives the British more time to train and develop their infantry forces.

It gives the French more time to buy more American planes. That will cut down Germany's advantage in the air. With planes to 14,000 first line planes, the Germans now have a probable air superiority of 1-3 to one.

Further entering the picture is the evident willingness—until now the Germans to give the western front a "breathing spell" in the wake of Hitler's strong peace offensive last month.

Law Changes Brewings

Washington and Leppold must look upon that breathing spell as German maneuver to demonstrate their earnest desire for peace—a demonstration, as it were, of good faith, with nothing to lose.

But now, with the neutrality law a fait, and great reservoirs of supply ready over here for the Allies, that demonstration in no longer of any value to the German high command. It must set in the future against the background of the neutrality law, knowing full well the advantages that will accrue to the Allies in a long term of war.

home untouched by the British blockade plus a modicum of military advantage in the air and on the ground.

Knowing the cold, calculating desperation that has motivated the German high command in previous wars, the Dutch and the Belgians cannot but see in their own countries the logical battlefields of today—just as they always have been the logical battlefields when England was involved in a European war.

Natural Backgrounds

AIX-LE-CHAPPELLE (now Aschen) looms large in the history books. Belgium was the scene of the final military drama of Napoleon's career.

Belgium and Holland are the wedges between European powers and the British forces. They are natural battlegrounds because they have no high-ground barriers to invasion.

Before hostilities officially began, these neutrals, once before offered their good offices for the interests of humanity.

Now, most diplomats feel they are acting solely in desperation to protect their own people—which, after all is their first concern.

It is also ironic that a nation 2,000 miles across the Atlantic should make a decision which brings tiny Belgium and Holland back into the limelight as apostles of peace—for their own security.

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Two Peace Moves Made To End War Of Finns, Soviet

HELSINKI, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Finland today appealed to other nations to give her effective help against the Soviet invasion while Finnish troops, aided by a blindfolded movement, reported new victories over the Red army along a 150-mile front.

"We think we should have not only the sympathy of the rest of the world but effective help as well," said Valmo A. Tanner, new foreign minister, in a statement to the people.

Government announcements said the Russians were being held at a standstill at the Kapellen islands north of Leningrad by Finnish troops outnumbered more than two to one.

A force of 1000 Russian troops was reported to have been wiped out in the Karolan town of Turku—site of the Soviet so-called Finnish people's government—by land mines left behind when the Finnish army abandoned the town Saturday.

On the eastern frontier, north of Lake Ladoga, the Russians were said in Finland's war bulletin No. 3 to have suffered heavy losses when they tried to advance over the frozen lakes during the week.

The Russians, plainly outnumbered on the ice, were said to have been picked off by expert marksmen.

In the far north above the Arctic circle Soviet attempts to recapture the ice-free port of Petsamo were reported. It was said that Finnish every fighting position in the barren, snow-covered region.

Russian troops and marines were reported to have attempted to land at the Arctic port of Lapland, but were driven off by Finnish guns.

A new Russian attack on Helsinki, which Finland's war bulletin No. 4 said in late morning hours, was said to have been repulsed. Other dispatches said that Russian soldiers who parachuted from Red army near Helsinki fell into a death trap behind the Finnish lines.

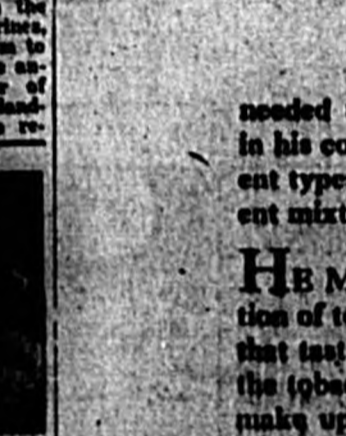
