

Seminole Teacher Leaves For Turkey

One of Seminole County's most outstanding teachers, Mrs. Lynn Sherlock, is embarking on the most challenging experience of her career when she leaves New York next Tuesday for Turkey.

A teacher for nine years and at the South Seminole Elementary School at Casselberry for the past two years, Mrs. Sherlock will be on professional leave of absence from the county school system for the next year.

She will assist Dr. Eleanor E. Green, University of Florida professor, who is on leave of absence, in establishing the first free primary school system in Turkey under U.S. A.I.D. (United States Aid for International Development).

Dr. Green needed an American familiar with the basic curriculum needs and concepts to work with her and since she has worked closely with Mrs. Sherlock on several important state committees the Seminole County teacher was a natural choice.

Dr. Green has already been in Turkey for a year and has found the children there to be alert and eager to learn. She feels that Mrs. Sherlock, who will be employed by the Turkish government, can make a worthwhile contribution in this endeavor.

Mrs. Sherlock will be working with Turkish men and women who are getting ready to come to this country to study in our colleges and universities to become teachers. She also expects to have the opportunity to work with 12 and 18 year old Turkish youngsters who have never had any schooling.

She will be working in Ankara and Istanbul and is buying heavy winter clothing for wear in Ankara, which is in the mountains at an altitude of 8,000 feet.

The last few weeks have proved very hectic with the many different shots required, many last minute arrangements getting her passport in order, as well as doing enough shopping to last for a whole year. She left Sunday for Charleston, S. C., where she will visit her mother, Mrs. E. Ralph Carter, before leaving for overseas.

After renting her home in English Estates and storing her furniture Mrs. Sherlock was a houseguest of Mrs. Nell Bruening, South Seminole music teacher, at her home in Casselberry prior to departure.

She was honored at a Bon Voyage Party given at the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Lunn on Crystal Bowl Circle, Casselberry, by members of the South Seminole Elementary Faculty. The theme of the luncheon was Turkish and the honoree was given a pair of Turkish shoes when she entered. She also received a gift of two lovely alips. A cold lunch of sliced ham and turkey, congealed salads and chocolate pie was served.

Village Police Now On Duty

North Orlando's newly organized Volunteer Police Dept., Chief Andrew Ferrin, Lt. Bob Stephenson and Sgt. William Hahn, are patrolling the area during the hours they are not on their regular jobs.

Ferrin advised that stop streets have been getting special attention since he was appointed three months ago and that motorists are being much more cautious now.

At the July meeting of the Village Council, members of the council agreed to act as special patrolmen to be called in on cases of emergency and Ferrin says that the department needs additional recruits to serve as volunteers.

The chief warns that speed limits within the village will be set at 20 mph with a 45 mph limit on Longwood-Oviedo Rd. and that they will be strictly enforced.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

A Real Problem

North Orlando's new council has been faced with a real problem this year concerning the maintenance of clay roads in the ranch area.

Until last year the roads were kept up by the North Orlando Co., however, after public election of the first Village Council, this problem was turned over to the new board which, at present, lacks sufficient capital to handle the road work. Consequently, residents of the ranch area are faced with thoroughfares which become almost impassable, especially in rainy weather.

At a special council meeting held last week, Vice Mayor Art Ferrin advised Councilman Irene Van Eeopel, herself a resident of the area, that he had contacted Frank Fasula, manager of the North Orlando Co., who offered to maintain the ranch roads for a fee of \$5 per hour until they are put in good shape and for a flat monthly rate of \$80 thereafter.

Included in this proposal would be Moss Rd., Morton Lane, Tradewinds Rd. and Shore Rd. These roads, in addition to serving residents of the area, also are used by many from Casselberry and Fern Park as a bypass of heavy traffic on Hwy. 17-92.

The big question now is who will pay the expense if Fasula's proposal is to be accepted. Costs would be prohibitive for the few homeowners in the area to assume and as an alternative it has been suggested that the village purchase a used grader which would be operated by the residents themselves.

A meeting to determine which proposal, if either, the property owners involved wish to accept, will be arranged by Mrs. Van Eeopel.

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Mid-Florida To Build Multi-Million Dollar Golfers' Luxury Resort

Plans for the biggest single civilian building program in Seminole County—second only to Sanford Naval Air Station—were revealed this morning by the Mid-Florida County Club.

Charles A. Bloom, president, and Joseph R. Horenstein, executive director, announced a multi-million-dollar golfers' luxury resort will be constructed on a 30-acre knoll adjacent to the present clubhouse off Highway 431. The first building, on which construction will start shortly and to be completed by Jan. 1, will be a 72-unit residential structure costing an estimated \$1 million, Bloom said. It also will house a dining room and shops. Each residential unit will have facilities for three to four persons.

The next step in the extensive program will be construction of a new dining room and lounge, with the necessary allied facilities. This will be adjacent to the present clubhouse, which, in turn, will be converted to a men's lounge, locker room and pro shop for the private club members.

Next in the program will be two more 72-residential units, each with dining rooms and shops, adjacent to the first, with all three atop the knoll and facing the present golf course. The swimming pool will be enlarged and, possibly later, Horenstein said, a second swimming pool will be added at the residential units for those guests. The present pool then would be reserved for the private club members and their families.

Furthermore, he added that should golfing privileges conflict at some future date another golf course will be added. The present course would be reserved for club members and the new course for resort guests.

Ocala Prisoner Held Competent
OCALA (UPI)—A Daytona Beach psychiatrist has found a private internist held here for a mental competency hearing "highly intelligent and well educated."

Dr. James Mosco of the State Health Department said 25-year-old Zeb Acelyny of Minneapolis, Minn., is mentally competent, "understands right from wrong, does not suffer from mental illness or retardations."

His statements were in a report to County Judge Lewis Myers who had ordered Acelyny, an organizer for the Congress on Racial Equality, held for a mental competency hearing after his arrest last week in Dunnellon. Acelyny was charged with resisting arrest without violence, and vagrancy.

Budget Requests Reviewed By County Board

Seven department heads met with the Seminole County Commissioners today to review budget requests, with all but the Welfare Dept. and the Agricultural Agents office listing needed increases in their new budgets, mainly in the salary line.

The Sheriff's Department topped the list so far with a request for a \$18,000 increase, most of which would go into salaries of deputies and clerks.

The success of the Foster Care Program, which was started last year, after commissioners appropriated \$10,000 to establish a much-needed plan to care for dependent children, was outlined by Mrs. Carmita Ray, state welfare supervisor, who administers the program.

Mrs. Ray presented and commended to the commissioners Mrs. Jackie Sween, whom she said often works week-ends, Sundays, nights and holidays to carry out the Foster Care Program.

Mrs. Abby Boyd, head of the county welfare department also commended the Foster Care Program and said that it had taken a burden off of her office, which had formerly had the problem of trying to find a place for children who have to be taken from their parents or have been abandoned.

There have been about 28 child cases during July and there are about 50 presently under care now, Mrs. Ray reported.

The department heads heard during the morning, besides the above, included supervisor of registration, home demonstration and the zoning board.

Hearings were to be held beginning at 2 p. m. this afternoon for the other county departments.

Quake Destroys Half Of City; Toll Heavy

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia—(UPI)—A "catastrophic" earthquake today destroyed more than half the city of Skopje 200 miles south of Belgrade and was reported to have caused thousands of deaths and injuries.

The official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug quoted rescue teams in the stricken city of 200,000 as saying "over a thousand people have lost their lives" in the disaster.

"The number of injured exceeds several thousand," it added.

In Geneva, a spokesman for the League of Red Cross Societies said Yugoslav Red Cross officials feared the death toll might reach 5,000.

The spokesman said the Yugoslav Red Cross in Belgrade had put in an emergency call to the Geneva headquarters appealing for aid and supplies for the quake victims.

"Over 100,000 people were made homeless in a few seconds," Tanjug said, adding that "nearly three-quarters" of the city was destroyed.

"Tens of thousands of people are standing in the streets scared, many of them injured," Tanjug said.

Aleksandar Blagojević, a Yugoslav airline pilot who flew to Belgrade after the earthquake, said he saw "great numbers of dead and injured lying in the streets."

The earthquake, which was centered in downtown Skopje, struck about 5:15 a. m. (11:15 p. m. EST) EDT.

"All the buildings" in the center of the city were "partially or completely destroyed," Tanjug said.

"Entire settlements, including a large number of those built after the war, are completely destroyed," it reported.

Authorities were in touch with the city by radio, but virtually all other communications were cut off.

Navy Locates Lost Rocket

SALISBURY, Md. (UPI)—A highly explosive rocket dropped accidentally from a Navy plane has been "pin pointed" in a 100-acre wooded area, Maryland state police said today.

The rocket was lost Thursday by a Sky Raider plane which was on a firing practice run from the super carrier Forrestal off the Virginia Capes.

JFK To Address Nation Tonight On Test Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy is expected to tell the nation and its allies tonight that the partial test ban treaty with Russia is a heartening first step toward slowing the nuclear arms race but by no means the end of the cold war.

The President scheduled a radio-television address at 7 p. m. EDT (6 p. m. Sanford time) to explain the details of the agreement initiated in Moscow Thursday by U. S., British and Russian representatives. The pact outlawed air, space and underwater blasts but permits continued underground testing.

One aim of the President's half hour talk undoubtedly is to rally public support for the agreement and bolster its chances in the Senate, where it requires approval by a two-thirds majority.

High officials said, however, that Kennedy's principal purpose was to put the agreement in perspective. He is reported anxious to head off runaway optimism which could lead to a fatal relaxation of western defense efforts.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk plans to fly to Moscow next week with a bipartisan congressional group to formally sign the pact.

Cuban Visitors Lose Passports
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The State Department has revoked the passports of 58 American students now visiting Cuba.

The State Department said Thursday it had notified the group by letters to their U. S. home addresses that their passports had been voided. Officials said the students would have to appeal to the government before their passports could be validated again.

Nixon Views

BONN, Germany (UPI)—Former U. S. Vice President Richard M. Nixon discussed nuclear testing and other issues with Chancellor Konrad Adenauer today, giving him a private citizen's views not always "in line with U. S. policy."

Two Rescued

APALACHICOLA (UPI)—A Texas motel owner and a Florida schoolteacher were rescued by a shrimp boat Thursday after being adrift in the Gulf in a 12-foot boat since last Friday. They are Stanley Bruno of Laredo, Tex., and Key West schoolteacher Davis Hanson.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The appointment of Dr. Malcolm B. Parsons, 43, as chairman of the Department of Government at Florida State University, was announced today.

All She Wanted Was 'Something To Love' Grieved Widow Arrested In Kidnaping Of Baby Kills Herself

CHICAGO (UPI)—A woman who was arrested a week ago for kidnaping a newborn baby shot and fatally wounded herself in a motel room Thursday.

Mrs. Mary Ann Dunlap, 39, was awaiting a hearing on a kidnaping charge.

Her life had been a series of heartbreaks during the past five weeks.

Her husband, Lawrence, a Chicago traffic policeman, died June 20.

A few days later, her father died, and Mrs. Dunlap, 39, made the long trip to Southern Illinois for his funeral.

Then she had a miscarriage. That was especially hard for her because although her husband had four children by a previous marriage they did not have any of their own.

But doctors found that hers was a psychosomatic pregnancy. She really wasn't pregnant at all.

A week ago Wednesday, Mrs. Dunlap returned to her West Side apartment with a newborn baby. She invited the neighbors in to see the child and she told them it was hers.

She treated the infant tenderly and stayed up late that night, caring for it.

The next day Federal Bureau of Investigation agents came to the apartment and arrested Mrs. Dunlap. They said she had kidnaped the 18-day-old daughter of Mrs. Rose Burnham, 19, in downtown Metropolitan, Ill.

Mrs. Burnham, whose husband is stationed at Ft. Campbell, Ky., had told officers that a "well-dressed, well-spoken" stranger with long blonde hair, swept into a French twist, had come to the home of her parents in Metropolitan.

Mrs. Burnham said the woman persuaded her to let her take the Burnhams' young daughter, Lori Ann,

to be photographed for winning a "baby of the month" contest.

The young mother said she became slightly alarmed when the woman speeded off, and when she did not return, she called police.

FBI agents traced the woman to Paducah, Ky., and then to Chicago. They charged her with interstate transportation of a kidnap victim.

"I just wanted something to love," Mrs. Dunlap sobbed.

Authorities released her on her own recognizance, pending a mental examination, and scheduled a hearing for next Thursday.

Thursday, Mrs. Dunlap

went to a Southwest Side motel and occupied a room. She scribbled a note which said, "My name is Mary Ann Dunlap. Please get in touch with my lawyer, Mal Coglian."

Then she drew a .22 caliber revolver and shot herself in the abdomen.

A guest saw her arm through the partly-open door. She was rushed to Vel Soble Hospital. She was still conscious.

"It is all built up inside me," she said on the operating table. "I just don't want to live anymore." She died.

Her body still was not claimed hours later.

Gideon Ruling Cuts Prison Population

TALLHASSEE (UPI) — Florida's prison population has taken a decided dip as a direct result of the U. S. Supreme Court ruling in the Gideon case, Louis L. Wainwright, director of the Division of Corrections, said today.

Wainwright said the decline results, not from the number of prisoners released, but as a result of a decrease in the number of new prisoners being committed.

Courts are proceeding cautiously on disposing of cases because of the Gideon ruling, he said.

In this ruling of two months ago, the court said the state must furnish attorneys for penniless persons accused of a crime. The court ordered a new trial for Clarence Gideon, Panama City, as a result of the decision.

Since this ruling, Wainwright said, more than 2,000 inmates

of Florida prisons have petitioned for new trials on the claim they were convicted without defense counsel.

Approximately 225 of these inmates are presently in county jails awaiting hearings, Wainwright said.

During April, he said, 276 new commitments were received from the courts. In June, new commitments had dropped to 154, a decrease of 122.

Total prison population dropped from 7,728 on April 1 to 7,597 on June 30, a drop of 131.

Wainwright said a canvass of the big counties showed the number of commitments and the prisons could expect increased numbers of inmates during the next six months.

The sudden drop, he said, apparently is only temporary while newly-created public defender offices are getting into operation. The office, in each of the 16 judicial circuits, was set up by the 1963 Legislature as a direct result of the Gideon ruling.

Combining the 225 inmates now out of prisons and in local jails awaiting court hearings and the 120 fewer commitments than average, Wainwright estimated at least 350 less inmates as a direct result of the Gideon case.

For A Good Buy

Many homemakers like to buy "seconds" — clothing, sheets, and pillow cases that have flaws in their weave and sell for considerably less than they would if perfect. Manufacturers, however, don't like to turn out this merchandise. It costs them as much or more to produce a seconds as a first-rate item. And, to offset this, they have to raise the price of their regular products.

Currently, researchers in the U.S. Department of Agriculture are studying the spinning performance of cotton to find ways to overcome flaws due to broken threads. The work is being done in the Clemson, S. C., laboratories of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

If the researchers are successful — and can maintain the inherent quality of the

We The Women: By Ruth Millett

What to do about a teenage daughter who is pretty, well-liked—and shy? That is one mother's problem. She writes:

"My daughter doesn't mind double dating with another couple she knows well, but when a boy calls her up and asks her for a date by herself, she becomes petrified. Most of the time she turns him down.

"Also, when she talks to strangers she keeps her head down.

"If I knew she'd grow out of this I'd sit by and wait, but I know she is suffering as much as I am, but won't admit it."

It's natural for a mother to want her daughter to have a good time and to worry if she seems so shy that she makes herself miserable. It is always so very easy for an older person to see how crippling such shyness is, and yet how simple it should be to overcome it.

But it isn't a simple problem for a teen-ager to overcome. And I'm afraid the more a mother shows her concern over the problem, the more self-conscious the girl becomes.

It should be worth a long-term try for the mother in this situation to adopt a strict "hands-off" policy.

If the mother doesn't appear to take undue notice whether the daughter accepts dates or not, and does not avoid her for her diffidence with strangers, the daughter may gradually begin to lose some of her fear and tenseness.

Double-dating ought to help her, too. She can depend on the other girl to help carry off the evening. Then, perhaps, she won't be so fearful of striking out on her own.

If the girl doesn't gain in self-confidence during this "hands-off" period, the mother might feel if necessary to get the opinion of a qualified psychiatrist.

But oftentimes a teen-ager can work out her own problems—if she doesn't feel that her parents are agonizing over all of her failures.

Editorial Comment: Seminole Police Work Done By Outsiders??

The burning question here today was: Why was the Seminole County sheriff's department seemingly ignored in the bolita raid here Saturday?

At first blush it is wondered why does Seminole County need a sheriff's department, now asking for an increase in its annual budget? Why does Sanford need a police department? When our law enforcement work is carried on . . . partly, at least . . . by the federal government, Orange County deputies and Orlando police.

Not one Seminole deputy or one Sanford police officer was on that raid. In fact, the two departments did not know it was being staged.

Sheriff J. L. Hobby explained today the investigation commenced "a year ago" at Orlando. Don Derry, Internal Revenue agent, said it started there three months ago. Hobby said he apprised "them" that "we do not have the money or the manpower for an intensive investigation and I gave them full permission to extend their investigative operations into Seminole County whenever they wished."

Sheriff Hobby said further that C. R. Trulock, special investigator of the Florida Sheriff's Bureau, was "looking out for our interests." Trulock was reported ill today. Derry stated further that the Orange and Orlando officers were working "under federal supervision and we felt we had all the help we needed."

Queried why the Seminole Sheriff's department was not informed of the pending raid, Derry added "we had all the help we needed and we had to move fast."

Police Chief Roy Williams said today his department was not invited, apparently, "since it was out of the city." He added that he had had "trouble with that same bunch five years ago."

The Herald, pursuing all phases in an effort to obtain the facts, telephoned Tallahassee to request a statement from Gov. Farris Bryant and was informed the Chief Executive is in Washington testifying before a U. S. Senate committee on the public accommodation bill.

Gen. J. C. Hutchison, chairman of the Seminole County Commission, this morning said: "I guess I'm not well enough informed on this thing to make a statement. I was told the Sheriff was in on this raid."

The Herald is not satisfied as to the reason Derry ignored the Seminole County Sheriff's department. We have been given answers to our questions . . . but we are not satisfied with them. If Derry's statement is the complete truth it appears the County Commission can save the taxpayers some money, drop the Seminole Sheriff's department and permit Orange County and Orlando law officers to do our police work.

Possibly the Governor will have a statement Tuesday when he returns from Washington. His office said today he will be apprised of the local situation on his return.

Bryant Pleads For Rights Of Business

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Florida Gov. Farris Bryant asked Congress today not to bury the rights of businessmen in the drive to assure equality for Negroes.

"It would be a tragic mistake if we tried to purchase equality for minorities," Bryant said, "and as part of the price gave up freedom for all."

Bryant was the fourth Southern governor to testify before the Senate Commerce Committee against President Kennedy's proposal to ban discrimination in hotels, restaurants and other private businesses serving the public.

"I think I can understand the aspiration of minority groups to improve their status," Bryant said. "Nothing is more American than to aspire. But surely, we should remember that when the majority loses its freedom, the minority loses its hope for freedom."

The Florida governor thus joined Govs. Ross R. Barnett of Mississippi, George C. Wallace of Alabama and Donald S. Russell of South Carolina in testimony against the so-called public accommodations bill, keystone of the administration civil rights package. (See story on Page 2).

Two Sought In Ocala Shooting

OCALA (UPI) — Police questioned witnesses today and sought two men who fired shotgun blasts through the window of a Negro integrationist leader's home Saturday night.

Chief deputy H. A. Geiger said buckshot found in the home indicated two blasts were fired.

The shots were fired into the bedroom of the seven-year-old daughter of Dr. R. Hampton Jr., a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. No one was hurt.

Hampton, who was riding in a car with his daughter at the time of the shooting, said "It's a miracle no one was hurt — my mother-in-law and two sisters-in-law were in the house at the time of the shooting."

7 Bolita Suspects Free On Bond

Group Seized In Raid Here Over Weekend

Seven persons arrested here in a gambling raid Saturday have been released under bond pending the filing of a direct information and/or a preliminary hearing, according to Don D. Derry, U. S. Internal Revenue Service, who led the raid.

Derry was assisted by Orange County sheriff's deputies and Orlando police. No Sanford or Seminole County law officers participated.

Derry said that released under \$5,000 bond each were Clyde Lee, 53, Orlando; Ralph Tilghman, 39, Eau Gallie, and Cecil Merritt, 48, Altamonte Springs; and under \$2,500 bond each were Carol Tilghman, 22, Eau Gallie; Jesse W. Joyner, 32, Longwood; Dorothea Halford, 21, Fern Park, and Donald A. Dunn Sr., 50, of Cameron Avenue.

The group posted bond after arraignment before U. S. Commissioner David Kerber at Orlando. Derry explained that direct information will be filed against the group and that a preliminary hearing will be held at a date only if requested by the defendant's attorneys. Otherwise, he said, next action will be by the federal grand jury at Orlando.

The federal agent reported the group was arrested at the home of Donald A. Dunn Jr., on Cameron Avenue, near the Sanford Naval Air Station, in a surprise raid Saturday afternoon. Dunn Jr. was not present. Derry estimated the raid broke up a \$1 million-a-month bolita operation.

Derry said the investigation commenced three months ago in Orlando and Orange County and finally spread to Seminole County.

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle said today that despite differences between France and the United States it would be a "ridiculous absurdity" to believe any split is imminent.

De Gaulle said relations between the two nations "are based on friendship and alliance."

"Despite the divergences that exist, it would be a ridiculous absurdity to think the United States wants to do harm to France and that we should be afraid of it," he said.

The United States and Britain agreed at the Moscow conference last week to consult their allies on further steps toward easing the cold war, including a possible pact between East and West military blocs.

De Gaulle declared that France and the United States have every reason to maintain the Atlantic alliance.

Game Agency To Spend \$800,000

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission will spend nearly \$800,000 on Florida fish and wildlife habitats during the coming year.

Half of the money, \$394,700, will come from the federal government under the accelerated public works funds.

The purpose of the federal appropriation is to help restore and improve wildlife habitat.

Three projects are in Brown County, one in Washington County, another in Walton County and the sixth along the Tamiami Trail across South Florida.

Third Shot In Ambush Of Patrol

SEOUL, Korea (UPI) — Communist North Korean raiders killed two American soldiers and critically wounded a third. The United Nations Command (UNC) quickly placed some U. S. units on a "reinforced alert status."

The Communists crossed into South Korean territory and ambushed a U. S. Army jeep patrol with submachine gun fire and Soviet-made hand grenades.

The UNC called it a "vicious and unprovoked sneak attack." There was no sign the Americans had been able to return the Communists' fire.

"The attack was deliberately planned, premeditated, and executed in a grey early dawn," a UNC spokesman said. As a result of the attack, he added, "elements of the 1st Cavalry Division were placed on a reinforced alert status" along the truce line. The three soldiers were members of the 1st Cavalry.

The victims were not identified pending notification of relatives. The wounded soldier had been hit four times, in the chest, arms, and legs, and was reported still unconscious several hours after the attack. "He may not live," UNC spokesman Col. George Cread of Birmingham, Ala., said.

It was the second North Korean attack on U. S. troops guarding the Korean truce line in less than a year, and it came within two days of the 10th anniversary of the truce ending the Korean War.

UNC officials could not reconstruct the attack with certainty because there were no living witnesses besides the wounded soldier. Cread said the attackers were North Koreans but it was not known for certain whether they were soldiers, although the UNC was assuming they were.

The three soldiers, members of the 1st Cavalry Division on truce line duty, were driving to a guard post in the demilitarized zone between North and South Korea.

Man Taken From Lake, Revived

HARRY L. LARSON, 22, of Lockhart, suffering from shock after nearly drowning Sunday in Little Bear Lake, was reported in "satisfactory" condition by Winter Park Memorial Hospital attaches today.

Sheriff's deputy Jim Moore said Larson struck his head on the elbow of his brother-in-law, George Falls, Orlando, while in swimming, and was brought to shore. Moore added the man was revived by the Lockhart Volunteer Fire department.

2 Boys Confess 3 Burglaries

Two Negro juveniles, brothers, confessed to three burglaries and are being interrogated about others after they were surprised in the act of breaking into and entering the Rol in Sporting Goods Store, 304 East First Street, at 6:20 p. m. Sunday.
