North Orlando's new council has been faced with a real problem this year concerning the

maintenance of clay roads in the ranch area. Until last year the roads were kept up by the North Orlando Co., however, after public election of the first Village Council, this problem was turned over to the new board which, at present, lacks sufficient capital to handle the road work. Consequently, residents of the ranch

area are faced with thoroughfares which become

almost impassable, especially in rainy weather. At a special council meeting held last week, Vice Mayor Art Ferrin advised Councilman Irene Van Ecopel, herself a resident of the area, that he had contacted Frank Fasula, manager of the North Orlando Co., who offered to maintain the ranch roads for a fee of \$5 per hour until they are put in good shape and for a flat monthly rate of \$80 thereafter.

Included in this proposal would be Moss Rd., Morton Lane, Tradewinds Rd. and Shore Rd. These roads, in addition to serving residents of the area, also are used by many from Casselberry and Fern Park as a bypass of heavy traffic on Hwy. 17-92.

The big question now is who will pay the expense if Fasula's proposal is to be accepted. Costs would be probibitive for the few homeowners in the area to assume and as an alternative it has been suggested that the village purchase a used grader which would be operated by the residents themselves.

A meeting to determine which proposal, if either, the property owners involved wish to accept, will be arranged by Mrs. Van Ecopel.







A week ago Wednesday, Mrs. Dunlap returned to her West Side apartment with a newborn baby. She invited the neighbors in to see the child and she told them it was

She treated the infant tenderly and stayed up late that night, caririe for it,

came to the apartment and arrested Mrs. Dunlap, They said she had kidnaped the 18day-old daughter of Mrs. Rose Burnham, 19, in downstate Metropolis, III.

Mrs. Burnham, whose husband is stationed at Ft. Campbell, Ky., had told officers that a "well-dressed, well-apoken" stranger with he blonde hair, swept into a French twist, had come to the home of her parents in Metropolis.

Mrs. Burnham said the woman persuaded her to let her take the Burnhama' young daughter, Lori Ann,

The young mother said she became slightly alarmed when the woman speeded off, and when she did not return, she called police.

FBI agents traced the woman to Paducah, Ky., and then to Chicago. They charged her with interstate transportation of a kidnap victim. "I just wanted something

to love," Mrs. Dunlap sobbed. Authorities released her on her own recognizance, pending a mental examination, and scheduled a hearing for next Thursday.







But where the rate on farms was recent years it has been higher. And the difference appears to be increas-ing. In 1961, when the national rate fell to an all-time low of 50.4 deaths per 100,000 population, the farm average rose to 58.8. National Farm Safety Week, July

21-27, is an opportune time to examine the record to learn where farm safety falls down.

National Safety Council statistics show that motor vehicle, home, and public accidents—the three largest sceident categories nationally - hit farm resideents about as hard as the

rest of the country.

It is in work safety that farming lags behind. Work accidents are second only to motor vehicle accidents among farm residents, comprising 31 per cent of the total.

Other industries have developed safety procedures that have made work accidents the smallest of all four categories—accounting for 15 per cent of the nation's accident toll. on the form, can bring form safety back into line with the national record.

A farmer must be many kinds of a craftsman. He often is called on to he a carpenter, an electrician, a mechanic. He uses fuels, chemicals, fertilisers, and many different kinds of

To work safely he must know and follow the safe practices developed in many different industries.

In most industries, employes' mistakes are noticed and corrected immediately. But much of farm work is done away from direct observation and supervision. Too often, an unsafe act, unseen and unrecognized, becomes a habit instead of being corrected promptly. These bad habits must be discovered and replaced with proper methods.

National Farm Safety Week is

not a week in which to be more careful, then to be forgotten until next year. Instead it is a time to examine work habits, to compare methods with those proved effective in other industries, and to seek out better and safer ways to do our jobs.

Accident prevention is a yearround job. An official "week" is simply a reminder that emphasizes the importance of that job. Every week should be Farm Safety Week.







Assuming your stance, make sure your feet are lined up with the line of flight, pointed outward to the degree you in-

tend them to be in. Be certain the weight is distributed evenly on the feet.

When your stance becomes natural, you learn to check the weight distribution automatically as you start to address the ball.

The stance should become as groved as the swing. Flex your knees slightly when you have properly tak-en your stance. This will aid distribtuing the weight on the feet more toward the heel pather than the ball of the foot. This brings up the matter of balance again. Weight on the heels is a much better

than weight shifted to the balls of the feet.

The slight bending of the knees causes them to act as a eushion, or a shock absorber, in swinging the club to and through the ball. This produces an even motion to your swing going back, at contact and following through. Other-

Seminole Police Work **Done By Outsiders??**

The burning question here today was: Why was the Seminole County sheriff's department seemingly ignored in the bolita raid here Satur-

At first blush it is wondered why does Seminole County need a sheriff's department, now asking for an increase in its annual budget? Why does Sanford need a police department? When our law enforcement work is carried on ... partly, at least ... by the federal government, Orange County deputies and Orlando po-

Not one Seminole deputy or one Santord police officer was on that raid. In fact, the two departments did not know it was being staged. Sheriff J. L. Hobby explained today the in-

vestigation commenced "a year ago" at Orlando. Don Derry, Internal Revenue agent, said it started there three months ago. Hobby said he apprised "them" that "we do not have the money or the manpower for an intensive investigation and I gave them full permission to extend their investigative operations into Seminole County whenever they wished.'

Sheriff Hobby said further that C. R. Trulock, special investigator of the Florida Sheriff's Bureau, was "looking out for our interests." Trulock was reported ill today. Derry stated further the Orange and Orlando officers were working "under federal supervision and we felt we had all the help we needed."

Queried why the Seminole Sheriff's department was not informed of the pending raid, Derry added "we had all the help we needed and we had to move fast." Police Chief Roy Williams said today his de-

partment was not invited, apparently, "since it was out of the city." He added that he had had "trouble with that same bunch five years ago." The Herald, pursuing all phases in an effort to obtain the facts, telephoned Tallahassee to re-
